RBC DEDICATES NEW POINT OF PINES SIGN

City says goodbye to 'Revere's Angels' By Sue Ellen Woodcock

Several hundred people gathered at City Hall last Thursday evening for a vigil for "Revere's Angels," the two sisters who were struck and killed by a SUV on the evening of Sunday, Dec. 9 on Winthrop Avenue.

"Tonight there are tears, there is heartbreak, there are no words. But there is love. There is prayer. May our prayers express our support for this family and for Revere's Angels," Mayor Brian Arrigo said.

Mejia-Rivera, Adriana 5-years old, died at the scene of the accident, her 2-month old sister Natasha Nicole died on Wednesday, Dec. 12.

The operator of the SUV that struck the children and three others was driven by 42-year-old Autumn Harris of Beacon Hill who was arraigned on charges of motor vehicle homicide and negligent operation of a motor vehicle. The accident happened near the intersection of Route 145 and North Shore Road. Chelsea District Court Judge

Matthew Machera set bail at \$10,000 and ordered Harris to remain drug- and alcohol-free if she posts that amount.

Prosecutors say Harris was behind the wheel of a 2015 Chevrolet Equinox shortly before 5:00 p.m. when the car left the roadway and struck the victims, who were on a sidewalk along the median strip of Route 145. In a recorded, post-Miranda statement, she allegedly stated that she had consumed one beer earlier on Sunday afternoon, that she had taken prescription and over-the-counter medication to help her sleep the night before, and that she had only slept two hours before working all day. She allegedly stated the she had vaped CBD oil in the vehicle and that she might have nodded off at the wheel.

Harris is represented by attorney Jeff Miller. She will return to court on Jan. 10, 2019. Further charges in the death of the 2-month old are expected.

Revere Public Schools clears first hurdle to building a new high school

For the past three years Revere has been trying to get a plan off the ground to consolidate some old school buildings and build a new high school that will serve the city's students and families for generations to come.

"This is a first step," he said. "It's a huge first step, and without it, there is no second step. But now we embark on the long process that only begins with MSBA approval. We move on to feasibility studies, site selection, design, and eventually construction."

The Mayor estimated that the entire process could take six to eight years.

According to the MSBA once a school district is accepted into the 'Eligibility' program it kicks off a 270-day period for the district to complete certain preliminary requirements and benchmarks.

Revere must now draft the district's understanding of the grant program rules by executing an Initial Compliance Certification.

Revere must then form a School Building Committee and submit the membership to the MSBA for acceptance.

The city will be asked to then complete an Educational Profile Questionnaire to further inform the MSBA's understanding of the district's current and proposed educational facilities, teaching methodology, grade configurations and program offerings.




Christmas this year is part of what for many people will be a four-day weekend, which means that for many of us, we will be indulging in the "Christmas spirit" early and often.

Revere Police awarded grant to reduce impaired driving

Mayor Brian Arrigo and Chief of Police James Guido announced that Revere Police was awarded a special grant from the Highway Safety Division (HSD) of the Executive Office of Public Safety and Security (EOPSS) to increase the number of impaired driving patrols during the holiday season.

Revere Police will join other departments across the state and the State Police in the national Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over (DSOGPO) enforcement mobilization and public information campaign. "When an impaired driver is behind the wheel, everyone is at risk - passengers, oth-

er motorists, pedestrians and bicyclists," said Chief Guido of the Revere Police Department. "These funds will in-

driving patrols over the holidays. Regardless of the type or level of impairment, if a driver is operating the vehicle in a dangerous manner, they will be stopped."

The education component of the DSOGPO campaign, "Plan ahead. Get a Ride", will stress the importance of engaging a sober driver, using public transportation or a rideshare service before celebrating this holiday season.

"Arranging for a sober ride home before celebrating should be a part of everyone's plans for the holiday season," said Jeff Larason, director of the EOPSS Highway Safety Division. "In 2016 alone, impaired drivers took the lives of 79 innocent people in our state. This campaign recognizes the important role cab, ride-share drivers, MBTA operators or a sober friend will-

crease the number of impaired ing to take you home, play in reducing the number of people killed in impaired driving crashes."

Massachusetts Data:

•Marijuana was the most prevalent drug found in drivers involved in fatal crashes from 2012-2016.

•From 2012-2016, an average of 10 percent of all drivers involved in fatal crashes were found with both alcohol and drugs in their system.

•From 2015 to 2016, alcohol impaired driving fatalities increased 41 percent (105 to 148).

•In 2016, impaired drivers killed 79 people – an increase of 19 fatalities from 2015.

•From 2011-2015, 82 percent of impaired drivers in fatal crashes were men.

•From 2011-2015, 45 percent of all alcohol-related driver fatalities were ages 21 to 34.

were published several times over the years by the Revere Journal.



Capt. Benjamin H. Linscott. Breaking up a 19th Century burglary ring on Chelsea (Revere) Beach

of the Massachusetts State Police, was Benjamin H. Linscott, who gained notoriety for a shootout with a burglary gang on Chelsea Beach (now Revere Beach) in 1866. Linscott was born in Alfred, Maine, in 1833 and married a New Hampshire woman when he was 21. They would have two sons. Like many other early officers of the MSP, which was formed several weeks after the end of the Civil War, Linscott was a veteran of the Union Army, having served with the 40th Infantry Division. In the MSP's infancy -- July of 1865 -- William Sterling King, chief constable of the newly-formed State Police, appointed Linscott as a State Police Deputy Constable. On Sept. 5, 1866, Linscott and fellow Deputy Constables James P. Wade and James W. Kirk began surveillance of three men who were gambling

One of the earliest officers and behaving suspiciously on Chelsea Beach. The deputies followed the men north to Beverly by train and horsedrawn wagon, and several days later were waiting for them as they returned on a road leading to Chelsea Beach. The deputies confronted the men at 4 a.m.; a struggle ensued as the deputies tried to arrest them. Linscott was shot in the knee, and one of the suspects was fatally shot four times by Deputy Wade. The second suspect was captured, and the third, though shot three times, escaped. As for the burglars' ill-gotten gains, the deputies recovered some \$4,000 in silver stolen from two homes on West Beach in Beverly. Linscott continued to serve as a constable for two more years, and later worked as a grain inspector. He is believed to be the first State Police officer shot in the line of duty.



RHS boys basketball open season with 73-68 win over Peabody

The Revere High boys basketball team accomplished something Friday evening in front of a packed house at the Roland Merullo Field House in their season-opener that took them until Jan. 30 of last year -- they earned their first win of the season.

Peabody pushed back, led by senior forward Mike Tansey (21 points, eight rebounds), who made some tough shots down the stretch, and Revere would go into halftime with a slight lead, 37-34.

The third quarter proved more of the same as both teams would go on scoring

"I am really proud of the toughness and togetherness we showed, but we have to keep our emotions in check," said Leary. "We gave them seven points on technical foul shots and we made just fivefor-16 from the free throw line in the fourth quarter. You are not going to win many games doing things like that.

"That being said, we have a lot to improve on, but these kids work extremely hard and are committed to progress," Leary added.

The Patriots were set to play at cross-town rival Chelsea Monday night and will host Somerville tomorrow (Thursday) at 7 p.m.

ELDERS ASKED ABOUT PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

CHELSEA - There has been no shortage of discussion about what people think about public transportation service in Chelsea, but many of those conversations don't always include the elderly, and that is one of the largest populations to use the service. Last week, GreenRoots staff and a graduate student

from Boston University gathered to speak to seniors in a multi-lingual, confidential discussion about what needs to be improved.

"We wanted to have this conversation because so many seniors depend on public transportation," said Sarah Levy of GreenRoots. "We want to know what is working and what is not working. We hope this will being a conversation on how to improve public transportation for you all. It's not going to be us coming one time and going away." The group was lively and many seniors turned out for the meeting.

Some of the answers were unique to the older population.

"The strollers are often a problem for us," said one woman. "Seniors get on with canes or walkers and the baby strollers block the space. When the bus starts going, they can't get to a seat because the strollers slow them down. They can fall down."

Added one woman, "I would suggest that they have strollers get on in back. That gives more space for seniors

RINCONS LIQUOR LICENSE SUSPENDED

Attorney John Dodge, representing Orlando Pineda of Rincons Latinos, argued that his client is planning to install a second handicap accessible bathroom in the restaurant. That move would double the occupancy limit of Rincons Latinos from 17 to 34, he said. "That is the only thing that

has been reducing the occupancy level in the restaurant," said Dodge. "It isn't a safety concern in regard to (the number of people) in the restaurant.'

"It's just breaking the law and not following rules," countered Mark Rossi, the Licensing Commission chairman.

Dodge said Pineda is doing his best to run a business and will spend upwards of \$7,500 to install the new bathroom to comply with regulations.

"Mr. Pineda has put his life and soul into the place, and he lives right upstairs," Dodge said.

Dodge also noted that the police withdrew a previous charge against the restaurant from the fall that people were illegally bringing cases of beer into and out of the restaurant.

"Mr. Pineda and his brother Ricardo are trying to do the right thing," Dodge said. "They are doing their best to increase the occupancy. I question the fundamental fairness (of the charges)."

Commission member James Guido took exception to Dodge's accusation of unfairness.

"They have had plenty of chances," he said. "The biggest complaint now is the occupancy and we are going to

additional bathroom since July with no movement on the issue from the Pinedas.

Rossi said Dodge was basically taking a "no harm, no foul" approach to the occupancy violations and that the Pinedas have not made enough effort to address them over the past six months.

"The explanation has been, ehhhhh, it's a big enough place and nobody got hurt," Rossi said. "They have not taken the proper steps to alleviate the matter. Now, you are saying give me more time so I can try to make this right."

The commission members batted around several possible punishments, from a 30-day license suspension to outright revocation, before deciding on the eight-day suspension meted out over four weekends.

Rossi said if the establishment violates the 17-person occupancy limit before approval for expanding to 34 people, it will be subject to license revocation proceedings.

In other business, the commission took its annual vote to allow extended New Year's Eve hours to 2 a.m.

The commission also approved giving a six-month extension to Samir, Inc. to find a new location to use a wine and malt beverage license.

Councilor-At-Large Michael Marchese has been pushing forward a plan that would give landlords more leeway to prevent apartment inspections without first notifying the landlord.

The proposed change has raised the ire of James Soper, the City's Inspectional Services Director, as well as public safety personnel. The major issue has been the wording in the ordinance which requires the City to notify landlords before conducting an inspection.

In effect, Soper and Fire Chief Tony Carli said this would prevent tenants from requesting an inspection if an inspection is taking place in another unit and would limit inspections of units where inspectors believe there may be an emergency situation, such as a fire or gas leak.

"I'm asking you not to

Over the past six months, change the ordinance," said Carli at Monday night's City Council meeting. "It is one of the biggest tools we have to fight problems in homes."

> Marchese countered that his proposal has nothing to do with safety. He said inspectional services is required to do an inspection before occupancy of a vacant unit and any common areas in a building.

> "They are supposed to do an inspection so it is safe for new tenants, so I am not sure what the issue is." he said.

What the ordinance does do is prevent inspectors from entering other parts of a building, or other units, without first contacting the landlord.

"We have no intention of running amok," said Soper.

But, he added inspectors should have the right to inspect an area if they believe there is an illegal unit or if they are asked to inspect a unit by another tenant.

"The change (the council-

or) does not seem to be getting is the wording in Section D, which limits inspectors to go into another apartment if asked," Soper said.

He said Marchese's changes would also violate state law.

Ward 1 Councilor Fred Capone presented an amendment to Marchese's proposed changes that he said would be fairer to tenants and still help protect the rights of landlords. That amendment will be taken up in committee before coming back to the Council for a vote.

"The intent is to stop tenants from piggybacking on apartment inspections," Capone said. Unless it was an emergency situation, Capone said tenants would have to contact Inspectional Services for a separate visit.

Soper said he would be happy to give more input into Capone's amendment in committee.

CITY ANNOUNCES WINTER STORM PLANS

EVERETT – With the snow season now upon us, the City is well prepared for both snow removal and emergency measures. The Mayor recently met with his senior staff to ensure that the procedures, staffing, and supplies for snow removal and parking enforcement are effectively in place.

The City has reaffirmed their strategy for notifying residents of parking bans. Parking bans and restrictions will be implemented and enforced ahead of storms to

so that plows can properly remove snow from streets. Once the decision has been made to declare a snow emergency, the information will be made available to residents through robo calls, postings on ECTV, social media, website and by the activation of the blue emergency lights along main arteries. Residents can also call 311 for any information.

For this snow season, December 2018 - March/April of 2019, the year used for parking bans will be 2019 - an odd numbered year thus vehicles should park on the ODD side of the street. For secondary streets, where parking is normally allowed on both sides, when a snow emergency is called parking is ONLY allowed on the side of the street were the house numbers are odd. This would apply for the entire snow season. As always, there is no parking permitted on main arteries.
