ARDAGNA FIELD IS DEDICATED

Softball facility is named in memory of Tony and Vanessa Ardagna

Family, friends, classmates, teammates and the current Revere High softball team paid tribute to two outstanding individuals who were synonymous with softball excellence Friday.

The city held a dedication ceremony for Ardagna Field, named in memory of former coach and youth softball league official Tony Ardagna and his daughter, former RHS softball star Vanessa Ardagna. The new softball field is located at Griswold Park, which is home to the Revere High softball team.

"It gives me great pleasure every day to come down here and look at that scoreboard and see those names," RHS Softball Coach Joe Ciccarello told the assemblage at the ceremony. "I know them very personally. I taught and coached Vanessa and I taught and coached [Vanessa's sister] Natalia. And I came to know

Tony very well for being the gentle giant that taught so many girls the game of softball and instilled in them a great love for the game. His heart was bigger than his body. He was a great man." Ciccarello said Vanessa Ardagna was "all smiles but

such a dirt dog – and there's really no better tribute to call a softball player somebody who gets their uniform dirty with a smile on their face."

The RHS coach also lauded Vanessa's mother, Maria Ardagna ("such a great woman") and older sister, UMass/Boston head softball Coach Natalia Ardagna ("she's made such a great name for herself in the softball world leading UMass/Boston to great heights").

"I'm so glad and happy that this day is finally here that we dedicate this field," said Ciccarello.

Mayor Brian Arrigo began the ceremony, saying that "Vanessa will forever be teammates of everyone who plays on this field."

"Fourteen years ago Vanessa was a vibrant young woman enjoying the exciting final months of her senior year at Revere High," said Arrigo. "She was a good person in every imaginable way.

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Residents hear more details in 'Next Stop Revere' Master Plan meeting

The 'Next Stop Revere' master plan continues to generate excitement in the city, drawing a large turnout of residents at the second of two public forums May 8 at the Hill Elementary School.

Metropolitan Area Planning Council (MAPC) officials led the presentation and discussion about transportation, public health, open spaces, and energy efficiency and sustainability.

Mayor Brian Arrigo was

pleased by the liveliness of the discussion on all the topics, particularly about open spaces in the city.

"What I've been really energized by is the amount of great ideas and the number of people that have come to the forums to give some input and feedback about what the future of the city should look like," said Arrigo. "I'm also energized by the work of the staff both from the city and the MAPC. They've done great work.

"We also have a great steer-

State police, Ocean View Kennel rescue stranded coyote

When Massachusetts State Police Trooper Carlo Mastromattei responded to a call for a wounded dog in the road on Revere Beach Parkway in Revere on the night of Sunday, May 5, the type of dog he found was not exactly what he'd expected.

Trooper Mastromattei, who

was on patrol out of State Police-Revere, pulled up to the animal's location, on the edge of the busy roadway near Suffolk Downs, and saw a small frightened, solitary coyote pup. The pup's mother was nowhere in sight.

Realizing the danger the pup was in on the busy park-

way, Trooper Mastromattei contacted environmental, wildlife, and local animal control officials, but no one was available to assist. So he then called Ocean View Kennels in Revere, and the kennel's owner, Lisa Cutting, respond-

ing committee that has been the driving force behind a lot of work that is being done," added Arrigo.

MAPC will be reviewing and incorporating public comments from residents, stakeholders, the Plan's Steering

Committee, and the City with its own extensive research and findings. Once that process is complete, MAPC will release a draft master plan document for public review sometime in the fall.

Rumney Marsh students will head to DC for the National History Fair finals

In June Rumney Marsh Academy students Kathy Trinh, Christy Ly, Andri Kaidaiciu, and Emma Higgins will represent the entire state of Massachusetts at the National History Fair Finals in Washington DC in June.

The four eighth grade students recently placed second in the state finals for the National History Fair, which qualified them to represent the Commonwealth at the national finals in the state capital.

"The group's placement marks the third year in a row that the Rumney Marsh Academy will be represented at the National Finals for History Fair, an incredibly impressive

accomplishment," said Revere School Superintendent Dianne Kelly.

At the last School Committee meeting the four students said the project was a departure from the standard history fair project with poster boards or powerpoint presentations.

The students decided to conduct a live performance detailing Mother Jones fight against child labor during the late 19th and early 20th Centuries. The presentation will highlight certain parts of Jones's life. She was an Irish-born American schoolteacher and dressmaker who became a prominent organized labor representative. In 1903, to

during regular City Hall business hours.

"We're always glad when City Hall can make life a little easier for our residents," said Mayor Brian Arrigo. "With the MBTA moving more and more of their operation to automated processes, obtaining a Charlie Pass is the most convenient way to have ready access and take advantage of reduced fares on both the train and bus lines. And the cards can be loaded several different ways, including the convenience of few simple steps on the internet."

The cards can be loaded with monetary value for subway or bus fares at the MBTA Train Stations, participating convenience stores in Revere and online at the MyCharlie Account Center on the MBTA's webpage. Having a CharlieCard can save a rider time and money. Using a CharlieCard to board, a train reduces a rider's one-way fare by \$.50 and reduces ones bus fare by \$.30.

The MBTA also offers discounted CharlieCards for Seniors 65+, people with disabilities and students.

Senior 65+ CharlieCard registration will be held at the Rossetti Cowen Senior Center, located at 25 Winthrop Ave., on Tuesday, May 21, 2019 from 10:30 a.m. to noon. Seniors should have with them a picture id such as a valid Massachusetts Driver's License, Massachusetts ID Card or a valid Passport. Passes will be mailed to the applicant's home.

The Youth Pass is for youth age 12-18 not enrolled in middle or high school or young adults age 18 - 25 enrolled in an accepted GED, job training, or state or federal benefit program. Verification of eligibility is completed at the Revere Public Library located at 179 Beach Street. Passes will be mailed to applicant's

address. Student Passes for Revere's middle school or high school aged students are available at Revere High School

"I am very pleased to have offered this motion and equally pleased that it was approved by Mayor Arrigo" said Ward 3 Councillor, Arthur Guinasso, "Providing access to CharlieCards will help our residents access the MBTA's rail and bus lines. Many of the residents I have spoken with, did not know how to obtain a CharlieCard and that there is a discounted pass for Senior 65+." The current construction on the Tobin Bridge will create additional traffic on our roads and in our neighborhoods for the next few years. Having the CharlieCards readily available for our residents to ride instead of drive will relieve some of this traffic."

The MBTA will be switching to AFC 2.0, a cash less fare system in late 2020 or early 2021. The MBTA will not accept cash on buses or trolleys once this system is in place. Riders will need a pre-loaded CharlieCard before boarding. The City's goal in promoting and distributing CharlieCards to its residents will ease the transition from cash to card once the AFC 2.0 fare system is operational.

METROPOLITAN BEACHES COMMISSION TO HOLD REGIONAL REVIEW

The Metropolitan Beaches Commission (MBC) will hold a public hearing on Saturday, May 18, from 10 a.m. - noon at the UMass Boston Campus Center 3rd Floor Ballroom C to review the preliminary results of the Commission's public hearings held in Lynn, Nahant, Revere, Winthrop, East Boston, South Boston,

Dorchester, Quincy and Hull.

The MBC was created by the Legislature in 2007. It was made a permanent legislative commission in 2014, charged with making findings and recommendations to improve management and maintenance on the region's public beaches from Nahant to Nantasket owned by the Commonwealth and managed by the Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR). The Commission is co-chaired by Senator Brendan Crighton of Lynn and Representative RoseLee Vincent of Revere, and has been led and managed since its inception in partnership with Save the Harbor/Save the Bay.

This hearing is open to the public, and will give the nearly 500 people who took part in local MBC hearings in 2018 and 2019 the opportunity to make sure that the Commission accurately captured their hopes and concerns for their beach.

On June 4th, the MBC will hold a public hearing at the State House to hear from the DCR on their plans for the metropolitan region's public beaches in 2019. The Commission also will take expert testimony on best practice for managing beach parking, marine mammal disposal, and the importance of free events and programs to the region's waterfront neighborhoods and beachfront communities.

Following the State House Hearing, the MBC will prepare a final report on their findings and recommendations which they will release to the Legislature, DCR and the public in late June or early July.

"We both followed in the footsteps of our father and became catchers - this was unnerving for my mom and she was always making sure we didn't get hurt," related Natalia. "Her time around my father, sister and me had turned her in to

a super fan. She never missed a game and she still doesn't.

"This complex, this field has led me down a path that I have been lucky enough to be able to turn in to my passion, my family's passion, and I turned in to a career. Being a collegiate head softball coach is a gift that I believe my father and sister gave to my mother and me."

"Every day that I hear cleats on the pavement or the snap of leather from a glove, I am reminded of the experience this complex gave us. The game was and is what bonds my family. It keeps us all together to this day. Now that I'm older and my mom can only cheer me on at alumni games, having this field dedicated in memory of my father and sister not only represents what softball gave to us, but what it provides for every young woman who plays down here, whether she makes a new friend or a great play or overcomes an injury, it will happen here at the Ardagna Family Field with two angels watching over them."

protest the lax enforcement of the child labor laws in the Pennsylvania mines and silk mills, and organized a children's march from Philadelphia to the home of President Theodore Roosevelt in New York.

"We decided to focus on child labor and Mother Jones affect on it. We were talking about child labor laws and how her (Jones) work affect us to this day," said Andri.

Christy explained that the main protagonist in their performances is Mother Jones and how she was the main reason child labor was abolished in the U.S.

"Children under 14 had to go to work in factories and mills and they would get injured, sick and sometimes die," said Kathy. "Now since Mother Jones fought for children, we can go to school and don't have to work anymore."

The four students then performed for the School Committee. The performance was incredibly real and shocking true of how bad child labor was in the early 1900s.

"I'm incredibly proud of this group of students, these students have been working

But the baby coyote's adventure was far from over. Trooper Mastromattei took the pup to his girlfriend AnnBeth (the couple are devoted animal lovers), and the pup stayed in the crate in her house overnight. As you can see in the photos, he received great care.

The next day, Ocean View Kennel transported the pup to Tufts Wildlife in North Grafton, where he was examined and determined to be healthy. The little guy is going to be transferred to the care of a wildlife specialist in the Berkshires, who will rehabilitate him and acclimate him to life in the wild, where he will eventually be released to live out his life.

The Department offers its sincere thanks to Trooper Mastromattei, his girlfriend, Ocean View Kennels, and Tufts for their compassionate care for this beautiful little creature.

ANTI-VACCINE HYSTERIA PUTS ALL OF US AT RISK

The recent outbreak of measles in the United States is cause for concern for every American.

First and foremost, measles is a highly contagious disease that places at risk anyone who is in the vicinity of someone who is infected with measles, whether it be on a plane, a ship, or the person standing next to you in line at the store.

Second, measles is a disease that can have severe complications for those who contract it, especially the very young, the elderly, and pregnant women. Though measles can lead to death in rare cases, there are many more complications, ranging from flu-like symptoms to encephalitis (the swelling of the brain) that can cause lifelong cognitive and physical defects.

Third, the recent outbreak shows how dangerous our society can become for all of us when a small minority decides, for reasons ranging from religious beliefs to quack science, that they are not going to accept vaccinations for their children.

Vaccinations for smallpox, polio, measles, and other contagious diseases are the single-most significant reason why life expectancy in the developed world has increased exponentially in the past 100 years, even though rates of death from heart disease and cancer have remained roughly the same.

The spread of misinformation over the internet about the safety, reliability, and efficacy of vaccines is yet another example of how viral misinformation via social media is damaging our society.

Measles was declared eradicated in this country in 2000. Hopefully, our public health officials will address the situation swiftly, not only to eliminate the threat of measles itself, but also to ensure that the anti-vaccine contagion does not spread to other diseases that can have serious consequences for all of us.

May 19, 1949

One of the largest-attended City Council meetings in quite a while lasted until well after midnight, as the council discussed issues involving parking meters, rezoning of land at Pt. of Pines, housing, and borrowing money, among other matters.

The Rev. Arthur W. Terminiello, a former Revere resident, whose father operates a law practice in the city, was the subject of a recent U.S. Supreme Court decision concerning free speech. Rev. Terminiello, who at the time was suspended from his duties as a Chicago clergyman, had been fined \$100 in Chicago in 1946 pursuant to a state law that prohibits any speech that "stirs the public to anger, invites dispute, brings about unrest, or causes a disturbance." Justice William O. Douglas, writing for the majority, said, "A function of free speech under our form of government is to invite dispute." Fr. Terminiello has been referred to as the "Fr. Coughlin of the South" for his incendiary speeches in which he has attacked racial and religious groups and has referred to former First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt as a Communist.

May 18, 1939

One witness testified that O'Brien, when he was speaking before the Jewish Men's Club, asserted that there were seven gambling places in the city, not merely four, as a radio commentator recently had stated.

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





third. The Rockies added a run in the fifth when Wong, who walked, scored on a Bobby Foote fielder's choice.





"Salem has a tough pitcher, so we knew that we needed to receive good pitching and play well on defense if we were going to win," said RHS head coach Joe Ciccarello.

GIRLS TRACK SETS TWO SCHOOL RECORDS IN WIN OVER SOMERVILLE

The Revere High girls outdoor track & field team put it all together last Tuesday in an 87-49 victory at Somerville.

"It was our best performance to-date," said RHS head coach Antonio LaBruna. "We got contributions from all phases and the girls really showed a high-competitiveness level."

The Lady Patriots' triumph was highlighted by two girls writing themselves into the RHS record books.

Claritza Vazquez set a new mark in the long jump with a leap of 16'-2.5".

"Claritza eclipsed her own school record in the long jump which she set back in 2017 when she was a sophomore," noted LaBruna. "Her previous jump was 16'-1.5", and she topped that by an inch against Somerville."

Chloe Giordano tied the RHS school record in the triple jump with her landing of 32'-11".

"For Chloe, talent has never been the issue," said LaBruna. "She has been struggling to hit her mark on the board all season, but she was perfect on the board on her record-tying jump. I knew it was a bomb."

Caroline Stasio and Gianna Mahoney were double-winners for Revere. Caroline took first place in the 800 in a clocking of 2:49 and then won the mile in a time of 6:17.5.

Gianna's twin wins came in two of the throwing events, the javelin with a toss of 94'-3" and the shot-put with a throw of 26'-7".

Other first-place finishers for Revere in their individual events were Carolina Betteo in the 110 high hurdles in 17.0, Erika Cheever in the two mile in 13:57, and Skyla DeSimone in the discus with a twirl of 83'-3".

The Lady Patriots' 4 x 400 relay quartet of DeSimone, Nubya Filho, Giulia Cincinnati, Gabby Mogavero defeated their Lady Highlander counterparts with a clocking of 5:28.1.

Girls who added three points to the Revere score-sheet with second-place performances were: Luana Barbosa (high hurdles - 17.4), Jerelys Canales (400 hurdles - 84.6), Vazquez (100 dash - 13.5 and 200 dash - 27.6),

Hoang now advances to the second round of the tournament this Saturday at Andover.

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
William Churchill



Mystic Valley Elder Services' offers tips to help older adults avoid being financially scammed

There has been a lot of talk about identity theft and the need to protecting your financial information. Is this all media frenzy, or is there more you should be doing to protect yourself and your assets?

There are many different ways that criminals and fraudsters might try to get money out of you. Below is a list of nine scams targeting older adults, and what you should be on the lookout for. A good rule of thumb is to let common sense prevail. If it seems like a scam, it probably is a scam and these tips are meant to help you avoid being in one of those situations:

- In addition to guarding your financial information, you'll want to protect your health insurance information by routinely reviewing statements and bills from your hospital, and never signing blank insurance claim forms.

- Be skeptical of anyone offering an unsolicited service that seems too good to be true, whether this is for health insurance enrollment, reverse mortgages, investment opportunities, or email offers.

- Before making a financial commitment, consult a trusted friend or financial advisor to review the opportunity. Make sure that you know exactly who you are dealing with and that you fully understand the business agreement.

- Consult a doctor or pharmacist before ordering from an online pharmacy or taking any new medication.

- Be hesitant to provide money upfront for any goods or services.

- Never give your social security or any other private information over the phone to solicitors.

Health Care/Medicare/Health Insurance Fraud: In these instances, a scammer can pose as a Medicare representative, and ask you for your personal information; or they can offer phony services to obtain your personal information. This can come in the form of a television commercial urging people to call a number to sign up for new insurance, scammers going door-to-door claiming to be with the government to sell fake medical plans, or telemarketers seeking personal information to issue new Medicare cards as required by the health care law.

Counterfeit Medications: With some drugs costing as much as they do, it's understandable that we might try to find them at a cheaper cost, but there can be many risks involved. Most online pharmacies follow the laws and regulations to put your health and safety first, but some do not. An unsafe online pharmacy might fill an order without a prescription, or without a doctor reviewing your medication history. Unsafe online pharmacies have also been known to sell products that are past their expiration date, are fake or mislabeled, have danger-

ous ingredients, or have been made using unsafe or unapproved standards.

Funeral and Cemetery Scams: While you are grieving the loss of a loved one you are faced with a mountain of decisions to make, and unfortunately scammers could try to take advantage of the situation. Funeral homes might try to push unnecessary services to drive up your bill, or a person might show up at the funeral claiming your loved one had an outstanding debt with them. Consider appointing a friend or neighbor to be your ally throughout the process, to ask hard questions and to keep an eye out for your best interests. And if anyone approaches you after the death of a loved one asking for money, refer that person to the executor of the estate.

Bogus Anti-Aging Products: The promise of the fountain of youth can certainly be enticing, but look out for fake Botox or other products claiming to take 35 years off your face, as these products can contain chemicals and substances that can have serious health consequences. Research the product thoroughly before buying it, and watch out for "secret formulas" or "breakthroughs". You'll want to consult your doctor before taking any new medication, especially as it could interact with something else you take.

Telemarketing Fraud: Telemarketing fraud can take many different forms. Most often, the scammers will try to sell you bogus products or services, or tell you that you've won free money or prizes. If you get one of these calls, do your research on the company and ask for written material

about any offer. Check out unfamiliar companies with your local consumer protection agency or Better Business Bureau.

Internet Fraud: Similar to telemarketing frauds, internet fraud can take a variety of forms. Some emails prompt you to download software that will then copy your personal information. Others emails will ask you to "update" or "verify" your personal information. You might get fake notices from the IRS or other government agencies. If you receive online notices or emails, make sure you independently verify all of the information.

Investment Schemes: These investment schemes are often designed in complex financial terms meant to confuse you. Some common investment schemes are 419 Fraud, Advance Free Schemes, or Prime Bank Note Fraud. While the details of the "offer" might differ, most investment schemes have several defining characteristics: you are often asked to pay some kind of fee or initial investment up-front, you are asked to deposit money into a foreign bank account, you are asked to sign a nondisclosure or non-circumvention agreement, or you are promised huge investment return rates. The bottom line here is: If it seems too good to be true, it probably is. Make sure that you know who you are dealing with and that you fully understand the business agreement.

Reverse Mortgage Scams: Unsecured reverse mortgages can lead you to lose your home when the scammer offers you money for the title

to your property. In many reported scams, victims are offered free homes, investment opportunities, and foreclosure or refinancing assistance. Be suspicious of unsolicited advertisements or of anyone claiming that you can own a home with no down payment. You'll want to seek out your own reverse mortgage counselor. In Massachusetts, consider contacting HOME (Homeowner Options for Massachusetts Elders) at 978-970-0012. HOME is a reverse mortgage counselor that has been approved by the Executive Office of Elder Affairs.

The Grandparent Scam: You get a call in the middle of the night from someone claiming to be your grandchild asking for money for overdue rent. If this happens to you, make sure you verify the person's identity. Ask specifically for a name and have a question ready that only your real grandchild would be able to answer, for example, a question about a Christmas present that was given or received. If you're still suspicious even after a "real" name is provided, insist on returning the call to your grandchild at his or her home or cellphone, but don't ask the caller for the number.

If you find yourself in one of these situations, don't make any immediate decisions. Contact a trusted friend or advisor. If you suspect that a family member is involved in trying to scam you or otherwise control your finances, call the Protective Services Team of Mystic Valley Elder Services at 781-324-7705. Specially trained caseworkers will investigate your situation and work with you for a solution.

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NEWS FROM AROUND THE REGION

FBI AGENT TALKS AT BREAKFAST

CHELSEA - He had his audience totally engaged on every word, his knowledge so overwhelming, his delivery so confident and precise.

Joseph R. Bonavolonta, FBI special agent in charge of the Boston Field Office, was the guest speaker at the Jordan Boys and Girls Club Breakfast Series Tuesday and his remarks were so captivating that he received two other guest speaking invitations before he left the hall.

"It's been an incredibly interesting and enlightening morning - that was great," said Breakfast Chair Mark Robinson at the conclusion of Bonavolonta's remarks.

Bonavolonta took the guests on an up-close look at the vital work that the United States' principal law enforcement agency does around the clock and how it affects people not only in this nation but around the world.

He began by illuminating "about the types of threats we're facing in our AOR (Area of Responsibility)," which is the four-state region of Maine, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, and Rhode Island.

He divided the subject matter between the categories of national security threats and criminal threats.

"I'll start with pure national security, that's really where we're focusing on our counter-terrorism and counter-intelligence threats, two of the absolute top threats, not only here in our area, but also nationally," said Bonavolonta.

He said the FBI is focusing on two types of counter-terrorism, international terrorism and domestic terrorism.

"International terrorism is where you have your historical terrorism threats, really pre-and-post 9/11: Al Qaeda and ISIS. They still are persistent. They still are significant threats for us, but the threat landscape in terrorism has really changed every year since Sept. 11, 2001," he said.

Bonavolonta noted that the primary threat here is Homegrown Violent Extremists (HVE). "What I mean by that, simply, are individuals who have been self-radicalized

primarily over the Internet - it could be by other means as well. They go out and commit significant acts of violence against what we would call or they call to be soft targets: schools, shopping malls, any areas where there are public gatherings where you can potentially inflict mass casualties with the lowest amount of risk or immediate interaction with law enforcement.

"It's something that concerns us every day," said Bonavolonta.

He said the agency has to take each threat seriously and be very quick to react. "We've had cases right in our own area where we've had individuals that have one day woken up and they're in that radicalization process and they've decided that today's the day they're going to go out and they're going to attack or kill members of law enforcement or other individuals.

"These are threats that have to be acted on immediately and we have to be ready to mobilize and cut them off before they commit these acts of violence," he said.

Bonavolonta defined domestic terrorism "as individuals who are associated with or inspired by US-based movements that are promoting 'violent extremist ideologies.'"

He said what makes domestic terrorism a complex issue is "the fact that a lot of what we see in that realm potentials butts right up against First Amendment freedom of speech issues.

"That's something that we really have to be incredibly careful when we're looking at it. It's a very, very high threshold for us to predicate a case where we're charging acts related to domestic terrorism.

"In a lot of cases, these issues start with individuals that are spewing certain types of speech that are protected under First Amendment activities," Bonovalonta clarified.

During the question-and-answer session that followed, Bonavolonta was asked about FBI resources, hiring and personnel.

He said the FBI is always looking for "cyber-talented people with a true background in cyber skills."

"And nationally we are making a significant push

for much more aggressive recruitment - we are aggressively recruiting people with skills in the STEM field," said Bonavolonta. "We are placing a specific emphasis on recruiting females into the agent cadre as well. We need to make sure that from a diversity perspective that our agent cadre, as much as it can, mirrors overall society. And just within the last three or four years, there has been a very definitive effort to proactively put on female law enforcement symposiums."

ELECTRICAL SHORT CAUSES FIRE

CHELSEA - Chelsea Fire Chief Leonard A. Albanese Jr., Chelsea Police Chief Brian Kyles, State Fire Marshal Peter J. Ostroskey and Suffolk District Attorney Rachel Rollins announced the cause of the May 3 fire at 48 Watts St., a two-family home in Chelsea, was electrical.

The fire took the life of an adult man believed to be a relative of the occupants of 48 Watts St. The victim was identified as Milton Lopez, 37.

In the dense neighborhood, the fire spread to rear of 107-109 Highland St.

The fire originated in a void space above the suspended ceiling of an enclosed porch. Investigators determined that an electrical event took place in the area of origin where there were numerous electrical circuits. Just before the fire was discovered, residents reported that the lights in the first floor kitchen, the room next to the porch, went off. The victim was found on the enclosed porch.

Chelsea fire investigators, Chelsea detectives, and State Police assigned to both the Office of the State Fire Marshal and to the Office of Suffolk District Attorney Rachel Rollins jointly investigated this fire. The Chelsea Inspectional Services Department, State Police Crime Scene Services and the Department of Fire Services' Code Compliance Unit provided assistance.

The home had a mixture of working, missing and disconnected smoke alarms, carbon monoxide alarms and heat detectors. All of the alarms found in the home, wheth-

er they were disconnected, lying on a shelf, or actually functional, had expired and were more than 10 years old. First-arriving firefighters report not hearing any alarms sounding.

State Fire Marshal Ostroskey said, "May is Electrical Safety Month and electrical fires are the second leading cause of fire deaths in Massachusetts behind smoking. It's important to have a licensed electrician check out your system every ten years to prevent problems."

SCHOOL OFFICIALS SEEK TO HIRE 53

EVERETT - On Thursday, May 2, the City's School Finance Review Commission met with leadership from the Everett Public Schools to talk about their proposed budget for fiscal year 2020 - which leaders learned includes hiring some 53 new positions districtwide with a major jump over school net spending.

The goal of the hiring is to reduce class sizes and to add English Language Learner (ELL) teachers.

Those in attendance included Mayor Carlo DeMaria; CFO Eric Demas; Director of Organizational Assessment Omar Easy; Chief Procurement Agent Robert Moreschi; City Councilors Anthony DiPierro and John Hanlon; School Committee Member Frank Parker; Assistant Superintendent of Schools and Business Affairs Charles Obremski; Assistant Superintendent of Schools Kevin Shaw; and Parlin School teacher Kimberly Augur (also the Teacher's Union president).

Principals and Vice Principals from each of the public schools spoke in turn about how to best meet the needs of the district's 7,281 students.

Across the district, principals requested to eliminate 10 positions and add an additional 63. Roughly a quarter of all new positions across the district were introduced with the goal of reducing existing class size.

The schools requested three new guidance counselors to meet the day-to-day emotional and social support needs of students, seven additional math and reading interventionists to serve more students who are not performing at grade level, and four

additional Wilson (a highly specialized reading program) Teachers and Special Education Teachers. The district also requested 14 new certified English Language Learner (ELL) professionals to deal with the growing population of students who don't speak English.

The schools requested an additional \$772,950 in funds for maintenance, repairs and library expansion.

The individual, school-specific requests are outlined below:

•George Keverian School requested to eliminate one Grade 6 Teacher position and one Grade 1 Teacher position, while adding one additional position for each of the following: Grade 3 Teacher, Grade 8 Math Teacher, Wilson Teacher, Guidance Counselor, Art Teacher (or STEM specialist), Literacy Interventionist and Math Interventionist. The school also requested five additional ELL teachers. The total for these positions is \$750,000.

•Albert N. Parlin School requested to eliminate one Grade 4 Teacher position, while adding one of each of the following: Grade 1 Teacher, Grade 3 Teacher, Grade 5 Teacher, Wilson Teacher and Guidance Counselor. The total for these positions is \$675,000. The school also requested adding two Math Interventionist positions and three ELL Teacher positions.

•Sumner G. Whittier School requested to eliminate one Grade 2 Teacher position and one Grade 5 teaching position, while adding one each of the following: Grade 4 Teacher, Grade 6 Teacher, Grade 7-8 Math, ELL Teacher, Special Education Teacher, Literacy Interventionist, Math Interventionist and Wilson Reading Specialist. The total budget for these positions is \$450,000. Whittier School also requested \$210,000 for maintenance and repairs.

•The Lafayette School requested to eliminate one Grade 3 Teacher position, while adding one position for the following: Grade 2 Teacher, Grade 4 Teacher, Grade 7 Math Teacher, Guidance Counselor, Art Teacher and Literacy Interventionist. The total for these positions is \$375,000.

•Madeline English School requested to eliminate one Grade 5 Teacher position and add one of each of the following: Grade 2 Teacher, Grade 3 Teacher, Grade 4 Teacher, Art Teacher, Math Interventionist, Literacy Interventionist and

Special Education Inclusion Teacher. It also requested two additional ELL teachers and \$130,450 for maintenance and repairs.

•Webster School requested to add one Grade 3 Teacher, one Grade 4 Teacher and 1 Technology (Computers) Teacher, totaling \$225,000.

•Everett High School requested to eliminate three hallway supervisor positions, adding two Deans, and adding one of each of the following: Director of Academics, Physics Teacher, Math Teacher, Spanish Teacher, Physical Education Teacher, Health Teacher, Art Teacher, Social Studies Director, ELL Department Chair, ELL Coordinator for K-8, Programming Teacher, Medical Assistant, and Hospitality Teacher. The total for these positions would be \$1.2 million. It also requested a total of \$420,000 for maintenance and repairs and an additional \$12,500 to help them to expand their library's book selection.

•Devens School requested the creation of a Job Placement Coordinator position to help high school students connect to meaningful work opportunities in the community. It requested \$75,000 for this position.

ZONING BOARD BOOTS BULL

EVERETT - The bull on Broadway has certainly bucked the trend, but City officials donned the tearer's red cape and denied the owner the right to keep it displayed in front of his restaurant - though prior to that vote the owner volunteered to take it down anyway last week.

A big trend of the night - outside of the bull - was the fact that the ZBA is starting to bar new developments from participating in the residential parking sticker program. It's a new condition they can include, but it's one that many on the Board said was their last resort to easing horrendous parking issues citywide.

The bull has grown on a number of residents, with many wanting to take pictures of it in front of Wilton Rangel's Broadway restaurant. However, it has grown into a problem for several others - including Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) officials who had decided that the six-foot tall bull constituted an illegal advertising sign.

It was for that reason Rangel was called before the ZBA on Monday night, to debate the

Monday night, to debate the merits of the bull and to make it official as an accessory sign. However, Rangel didn't show up, and ZBA Secretary Kim Rauseo said a man named Felipe had called to inform the Board that Rangel wouldn't come. Instead, Felipe said Rangel had volunteered to take it down.

"Felipe said Wilton is not pursuing the application and the bull will be taken down," she told members.

Still, the Board decided they wanted to vote on the matter in case it were to come up again.

The Board voted 0-5 to deny the application for the sign.

"Does this mean the petitioner will get a letter saying no more bull?" asked member Mike Dantone.

"There's no bull," laughed Chair Joe DeSisto.

Six unit townhouse developed ok'd on Main Street

The ZBA approved by a unanimous vote the petition by Amandeep Dillon, of Everett, to demolish a home at 108-112 Main St. and build a six-unit townhouse development there.

The development would be connected, but each unit would be separated by entrance and by water/sewer/electrical service. There would be 11 parking space, with 12 required.

Dillon plans to live in one of the units, his attorney, Anthony Rossi, said.

Councilor Wayne Matewsky said he supported the project and spoke in favor of the character of the developer.

"He plans to live here and that makes a big difference," he said. "He likes Everett. His family and friends are here and he's a gentleman. He also owns a property in the Village three blocks away. He's a good man and a family man and I support him."

However, the Yebba family said they had concerns about the project, including parking problems and construction management issues.

"My parents have been bothered by another project on Carter Street that has been going on for a year now," said Dennis Yebba. "This one will probably go on for a year and we'll have more problems."

Rossi said they planned to have construction workers park on site, and he also said they would likely build with modular construction - which can cut down the construction timeline by three months.

Chair DeSisto said he had concerns about the three-bedroom units - as they are likely to have more cars. There are currently four three-bedrooms and two, two bedroom units.

"There is a significant chance with three-bedrooms you're going to have multiple cars," he said. "I don't want to hear about Millennials and they don't have cars and take Ubers. With a three-bedroom, there is a strong possibility of multiple cars."

That led to a discussion about the residential parking sticker program, and Dillon agreed to prohibit residents of his development from participating in that program - meaning they cannot park on the street. That is a relatively new condition, and those that agree to it are put on a list, and the addresses are excluded from getting a sticker to park in resident parking areas - thus preserving parking for those already in the neighborhood.

The Board then voted unanimously, 5-0, to approve the development.

CEDAR STREET, TOUGH CALL

The ZBA members were faced with a tough decision when a family on Cedar Street petitioned to include a driveway on the side of their home in order to access a large parking area in the back. That area is currently unavailable, and Gesler Volquez said parking

issues on the street are incredibly difficult. In fact, he and his wife said they had run out of solutions and were desperate for a place to park their car.

However, long-time neighbors and abutters came out in force to oppose the driveway - which is similar to many already-existing driveways on the street. However, the driveway is very narrow in some places, going down to just over six-feet wide.

The Griffin family, who are next door, indicated there was no way to build the driveway without infringing on their property - particularly important to them was a flower bed to the side of the home.

However, the Volquez family said the flowers and side of the house are only accessible to the Griffins if they walk on the Volquez property.

"We never say anything about it, but she walks on our property all the time to get to her flowers because there is no fence," said Mrs. Volquez. "If we put up a fence, that part of her property wouldn't even be accessible to her."

Many of the other neighbors showed up as a show of solidarity in the neighborhood, noting they had been there for 50 years and this could alter what has been constant for so long.

"If they can park in the backyard, then another person will get the same idea and then we'll have everyone parking in the backyards," said Tony Scrima. "That's an eyesore."

Said Mrs. Volquez, "They keep saying they've been here 50 years and I'm sorry I haven't been around 50 years. I'm only 32. However, it doesn't make us any less of a homeowner on the street than they are."

Said Member Dantone, "I sympathize with the petitioner, but I also understand that is a really tight driveway."

The matter was denied by a vote of 2-3, with Roger Thistle, Mary Gerasi and DeSisto voting against.

LIMITING RESIDENTIAL PARKING

One of the more common sights now at the ZBA is that the members are starting to press developers of new units to exempt their tenants from the residential parking sticker program. That program allows anyone with an Everett address to apply for, and get, a sticker that allows them to park in resident zones. With parking at a premium on the street in nearly every neighborhood and the city growing at breakneck speed, the Board has felt pressure to deny good projects on the basis that they will make the parking situation "substantially worse."

Recently, however, the ZBA learned from City attorneys that they have the ability to request developers exempt their tenants/addresses from the parking program. That means those tenants would have to park off-street or risk getting ticketed or towed.

Surprisingly, many developers are agreeing to the stipulation, as they don't want to risk losing the project.

"This is the only solution we've had lately to address this issue," said Dantone. "The mayor wants everyone to commute and take the us... That's our only alternative now because everything is always parking at this Board... This exemption is the only thing we have left except to say 'no.'"

A project at 11 Mason St. agreed to have only one sticker per unit, a project at 227 Hancock agreed to have no stickers at the address, and the 108-112 Main Street agreed to have no stickers.

APPROVALS

The Board also approved the following:
•Audames Nelson was approved 5-0 at 10 Plumer St. to add a sunroom addition to the back of the home, and to also replace a crumbling fence at

the rear of the property.

DeFronzo also highlighted a relatively new program that started a few years ago at PPSC.

Throughout the sailing season kids work closely with instructors, and learn everything from sailing basics to advanced racing, boat maintenance, and navigation. Besides learning to sail, kids learn how to work as a team, build self-confidence, gain leadership and character skills, and develop a deeper appreciation for the sea and its natural surroundings.

This team has an extensive background at prominent businesses in finance, wealth management, risk and project management, and experience working with investors and on boards throughout the community. Not only are they working swiftly to build a strategy, but to align this product and process to the mission that was started by the Sisters of St. Joseph and Cardinal Cushing in 1966. The current and prospective, registered students at Pope John XXIII High School are the priority for this strategy. It is the hope of the team and administration that these students in their care will continue on with their Catholic education and will have a home at Pope John in the fall of 2019, but also in the many years to come. The vision of PJHS is to after graduating the 50th class on May 23.

In the first 14 days, under the direction of Paul Sobolewski, athletic director, and Kelleyrobin Mulvihill, director of development, outreach on social media to alumni, parents, and friends of Pope John, raised nearly \$76,000 in gifts and pledges. This remarkable effort has been made by more than 325 donors to the #NotDeadYet Facebook Challenge. The news media from all the major networks have carried the story on their newscasts bringing Pope John's story into living

rooms around the greater Boston area and inspiring viewers to reach out, donate, and call in to help continue the Pope John legacy and offering of support to keep to the school open. To that end, young alumni, parents, and faculty have initiated events and activities to support the efforts of the working committee in the coming weeks including a car wash that raised \$3,000 and restaurant nights at local

businesses coming up this weekend. These activities will not only contribute to the overall financial goals, but will reignite the family environment and cultivate relationships that make PJHS a special place.
