Mayor Brian Arrigo announced this week that the City of Revere has been awarded a Massachusetts Preservation Projects Fund grant toward the restoration of the Revere Historical Society Museum, located at 108 Beach St.

Over the years, the historic building has aged and is in need of substantial rehabilitation. Recognizing the potential financial opportunity from the state, the City actively pursued this grant funding to return the building to its former architectural glory.

Huge crowd attends final live racing at legendary track

Over 21,000 racing fans packed Suffolk Downs for the final weekend of live racing at the historic oval as the track hosted its final weekend of live racing.

On Saturday, the track was forced to suspend the live racing card after the seventh race due to severe thunderstorms that rolled through the area.

"It was very gratifying to give live racing a fitting send-off and we are amazed by what a wonderful and appreciative crowd showed up today to celebrate with us.

us with these festivals," said Chip Tuttle, the Chief Operating Officer at Suffolk Downs.

Tammi Piermarini, the third all-time leading female rider in history and a mainstay in New England racing, piloted home Saint Alfred in the \$50,000 Thomas F. Moran Stakes for trainer Karl Grusmark and Joseph DiRico, the owner and breeder of the five-year-old Massachusetts-bred son of Dublin.

"It means a lot to be able to win a race on the final day of live racing here and it was even sweeter to get to do it for two local trainers," said

Piermarini. "I have so many wonderful memories here and Suffolk Downs will always feel like home."

Successful Saint, a homebred for owner Anthony Zizza, remained undefeated from four starts with an authoritative score in the \$50,000 John Kirby Stakes with Jose Baez in the irons.

The final race in the track's 84-year history was won in a maiden breaking score by Catauga County (\$9.60) and jockey Andy Hernandez Sanchez. It was the third win of the day for Sanchez who also won the third race aboard longshot Morgan's Z Va (\$30.60) for M. Anthony Ferraro and the eighth race for the Matthew Clarke-trained Fifty Eight OG (\$24.60).

Finishing touches for Waterfront Square

The final building in the Waterfront Square development is ready to be built, marking over two decades of development along Ocean Avenue.

The Zoning Board of Appeals granted several variances for a brand new, 12-story, 230-unit residential apartment building to be built by principal Andy Montelli and Post Road Realty, LLC at Lot 2, 656 Ocean Ave.

Parking will also be included in the building and it will be included in the rent - a

bone of contention with the city since other developers have forced people to park in the street or pay extra for the privilege to park in the building. The building will also have a coffee shop.

Attorney Corey Rhodes, who represents Post Road Realty, said this is the final vacant parcel in the Wonderland Transit Oriented Development overlay district better known as WTOD.

"Post Road is a marquee developer and recently renovated the Charleston Chew

Rizzo submits nomination papers for mayor's race

Councillor-at-Large Dan Rizzo submitted his nomination papers for the office of mayor to the Revere Election Department Monday at City Hall.

In a Facebook post, Rizzo indicated that he and his team had collected four times the number of signatures that were required for nomination.

Rizzo is one of three candidates who have pulled nomination papers for mayor.

Incumbent Brian Arrigo and Cheryl Whittredge have also pulled papers.

Rizzo said he has knocked on more than 5,000 doors in the city since announcing his bid for election on April 4. A campaign reception for his birthday celebration drew a large crowd, estimated at more than 350 people, to the Casa Lucia Function Facility.

In previous campaigns, Rizzo said he had collected

Baby Boomers should be wary of Medicare changes

Baby boomers are aging rapidly. Around 10,000 Americans celebrate their 65th birthday every day.

Unfortunately for these seniors, the government health care to which they're entitled may put their lives at risk. That's thanks to a new proposal from the Department of Health and Human Services that would impose price controls on certain medicines covered through Medicare.

HHS' plan could save Uncle Sam a few dollars in the short run. But its long-term side effects would be far costlier for both the government's budget and patients' health.

The proposal impacts treatments covered through Medicare Part B. These are highly potent medications administered in doctors' offices, including oral cancer drugs, infusions, vaccinations, and IVs.

Currently, doctors purchase Part B drugs ahead of time and store them on site. Once physicians administer a treatment to patients, Medicare reimburses them the average sales price of that particular drug.

Under Sec. Azar's proposal, Medicare would instead reimburse doctors a flat fee for the drugs they administer. This reimbursement would correspond to the average price of that drug in 14 benchmark countries.

The majority of these countries rely on artificial price controls to keep drug spending in check. By copying this model, HHS hopes to cut Medicare spending by as much as 30 percent.

Implementing price controls would harm American patients in a couple of ways.

First, artificially capping the cost of medicines will devastate access to quality

healthcare providers. Consider what happened when the government tried cutting Medicare reimbursements in 2013. Eight in 10 oncologists said payment cuts impacted their practices. And half had to turn cancer patients away because of it.

Second, HHS' plan would stall the medical advancement that benefits patients today -- and paves the way for breakthrough cures for the patients of tomorrow.

Drug development isn't easy. It takes \$2.6 billion and over a decade to develop a single drug. Scientists and investors need ample financial incentives to put money towards future medicines.

Price controls make development even harder than it currently is. Innovators won't risk billions on pharmaceutical research if they don't think they'll recoup their upfront costs. And when pharmaceu-

tical investments start drying up, so will new cures.

In addition to undermining seniors' health, the proposal would cost more money in the long run.

Hospitalizations due to mismanaged conditions cost Medicare more than \$5 billion a year. If HHS is really concerned with lowering costs and improving patient health, it should invest in more preventative medical innovation.

HHS should look for better ways to keep seniors healthy in their homes. Not only would the new proposal sacrifice seniors' care, it would cost more in the long run.

ON THE RIGHT WHALES

Dear Editor:

We appreciate that your June 21 editorial "Another Sad Sign of the Times" calls attention to critically endangered North Atlantic right whales, but it made several misleading claims about their fight for survival and the current protections in place.

The most immediate threats to right whales are entanglement in fishing gear and ship strikes. Neither the U.S. nor Canada is doing enough to protect right whales from the maze of thick ropes and the dearth of commercial shipping vessels they are forced to navigate in their annual migrations. Although long protected in the U.S. under the Endangered Species Act and

the Marine Mammal Protection Act, it has been several years since any new laws designed to protect right whales have been put in place in the United States.

Your article suggests that the U.S. has fully protected right whales in the Gulf of Maine, however, the reality is starkly different.

For example, more than 70 percent of Maine waters -- where most of the fishing in the Gulf of Maine occurs -- are exempt from federal regulations to protect right whales from entanglements. These exemptions include requirements to mark fishing gear so that problematic gear can be identified (and ideally removed), and to use sinking lines between traps to decrease the risk of entanglement. Further, any most

speed restrictions in the Gulf of Maine, when implemented after a group of whales are sighted, are merely voluntary. Thus, they are largely ignored.

Just this year, six more whales died out of a population of barely 400. At least two of these whales were mature females capable of bearing calves. This is catastrophic, and both countries need to treat this like the emergency that it is for a species at risk of extinction. Since 2017, Canada has moved quickly to close areas to fishing as soon as whales were spotted and to implement mandatory speed restrictions in certain areas. However, even these measures were not enough to prevent the last six deaths. Here at home, right whales are increasingly present south of Martha's Vineyard and Nan-

tucket for much of the year, yet the U.S. has not created a new closure in this hotspot with fishing and mandatory speed restrictions to decrease risk.

Long term solutions will require both countries to increase their monitoring so that mandatory speed restrictions can be put in place as soon as whales are sighted. Innovative new technology such as ropeless fishing also holds great promise because it eliminates dangerous lines from the water altogether and would allow fishermen to fish whenever and wherever they want.

Right whales can recover, but humans need to stop killing them first.

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

factory and completed the recent development of the Harley Davidson building in Everett," Rhodes said. "They have been lauded for their attention to detail and high quality. This is the keystone building of the W TOD."

The lot is currently being used by the Department of Recreation and Conservation as its maintenance facility as a new DCR maintenance and bath facility are built.

Rhodes said: "It will sit between Ocean 650 and the Vanguard, just north of Wonderland station. It will finish Waterfront Square which has spanned the last two decades."

The building will be built with steel, concrete and glass. Seventy percent of the development will be studio and one-bedroom units.

"We justly believe this is going to be the gem of Revere Beach," Rhodes said. "We want to promote it to young professionals who commute to Boston via the T. These will be good-sized units, not micro units."

Rhodes gave a brief history

of Waterfront Square, which was created under former Mayor Tom Ambrosino, the DCR and then the MBTA. The MBTA parking garage, with 1,400 parking spaces and the Markey pedestrian bridge were also part of the project. Developers have taken formerly underutilized vacant lots and spurred on economic development in Revere. There is also access for the fire department along the side and back of the building. There will also be an easement for maintaining the Eastern County Ditch.

The variances were for side yard setback, minimum parking ratio and maximum floor ratio.

"I want to emphasize the importance of this being the final development project in the Waterfront Square development plan," said Bob O'Brien, director of Economic Development for Revere. "I commend the quality of this development team. They're exactly the kind of developer Revere wants."

Following the final live racing weekend scheduled for June 29-30, the track will remain open year-round for simulcasting. Sterling Suffolk Racecourse (SSR), the company that operates racing and simulcasting at Suffolk Downs, is currently working alongside the New England HPBA and the Massachusetts Thoroughbred Breeders Association (MTBA) on plans to refurbish and return live racing to the Great Barrington

Fairgrounds in Great Barrington, Mass., and to continue simulcasting operations in Boston.

Built by 3,000 workers in just 62 days when Massachusetts authorized pari-mutuel wagering in 1935, the historic track has been a showcase for some of the most famous names in Thoroughbred racing history, including Seabiscuit, Whirlaway, John Henry, Cigar and Skip Away.

appointed because I think that Brian (Golden) would've brought fresh eyes to Massport and would have been a great consensus builder in the community," said Nucci after the vote Thursday. "On the other hand, Lisa (Weiland) will work herself into the job just fine and I will support her thoroughly as we move ahead".

In 2016 the Massport board voted to promote Wieland from Acting Port Director to Port Director.

Wieland has served as the Acting Port Director since March of 2015 and previously as Maritime's Chief Administrative Officer. As Port Director, she oversees planning, development, marketing, operations, security, financial management, administration and maintenance of all of Massport's non-aviation properties. Before joining the Maritime team, Wieland served in several roles at Massport, including the Director of HR Strategy & Employment and the Director of Corporate Planning and Analysis. Wieland has been with Massport since 2006.

Prior to her employment with Massport, Wieland worked as a consultant for Bain & Company serving health care and consumer products clients, and for CNN in various news and political assignments. She received her B.A. from UCLA in Political Science, and her M.B.A. from the Harvard Business School.

East Boston's Logan Airport Impact Advisory Committee (AIR, Inc.) said they have discussed the pros and cons of confirming either Wieland or Golden for the CEO post.

In a statement after the vote AIR, Inc.

"This important hire will have long-lasting implications," the statement reads. "It comes at a time when the rapid spread of Airport impacts is increasingly deteriorating Boston's health, economy, quality of life and our reputation. We now have a label hung on our necks: the most congested city in America. That puts us right up there with LA as a polluted city. And there is no single institution which is creating more health, environmental and traffic impacts, than Logan Airport. The airport currently attracts more motorists than a

Red Sox, Bruins, Celtics, and Patriots game combined every weekday. And our city's roadway infrastructure simply can't handle it."

"Wieland will need to listen to the people who are inundated with noise, pollution and being in the flight path," said Revere Ward 1 Councilor Joanne McKenna, who lives in the flight path. "There have been 64,000 flights over Beachmont, the Point of Pines and Revere Beach in the last six months."

McKenna said the airplanes greatly affect the quality of life.

"The planes are so low I can see what they're serving for snacks," she added.

AIR, Inc. said as Massport's new CEO Wieland needs to address and improve Massport's planning model so those who now have disproportionate access to the Port Authority's higher ups and help shape transportation get in line behind those who are impacted.

"Tom Glynn's Massport grew the airport by 35 percent with impacts rising in equal measure," continued the AIR Inc statement. "The air and noise pollution and traffic congestion driven by Logan are regional crises which themselves are driving asthma, COPD, stroke, heart disease, sleep interruption, and a host of painful outcomes for people on the ground -not just in neighborhoods such as East Boston but also in communities such as Milton nearly ten miles to the south, cities like Somerville to the west and across the entire region in a ten mile footprint. The next CEO will need to show that they can collaborate with community stakeholders to shape the transportation services that Massachusetts needs in a manner that we can live with."

"The City of Revere looks forward to working with the new Director Lisa Wieland at Massport," said Mayor Brian Arrigo. "Revere's proximity to Logan Airport makes our City's relationship all the more important. Ms. Wieland has proven herself throughout her tenure at Massport as a capable leader, and we look forward to her skills both in growing Massport and responding to concerns in communities that surround the airport," Arrigo added.







About 35 Beachmont residents turned out at the City Council meeting Monday night to oppose the plans by VFW Post 6712 to build a new clubhouse on Henry St.

The 2-year-old Immaculate Conception Drum and Bugle Corps added yet another laurel to its phenomenal record of wins as they marched themselves into a big victory by capturing the state championship at the state convention of the Veterans of Foreign Wars held in Northampton.

The City Council has reversed its vote of the previous week and will allow Civil Defense volunteers to patrol the city's street corners in an effort to curb the rampant vandalism being caused by gangs of youths.

70 years ago July 7, 1949

McCarrick said action should be taken at once to prevent the further construction of flimsy camps and cottages that have no foundations.

More than 400 persons gathered at a \$100 per plate dinner at the Copley Plaza Hotel in Boston that put the

fundraiser over the top for the new Fr. Brennan Hall at Immaculate Conception Church. Guest speaker was Judge John P. Higgins, Chief Justice of the Mass. Superior Court.

The free chest X-rays for all citizens concluded this week, with 10,000 residents availing themselves of the program, which is designed to root out tuberculosis in the state.

career I was lucky to have worked alongside the captain and he taught me so much," said Chief Bright. "He was old-school, dedicated, a workaholic, and tough as nails. His personality would always light up a room, making everyone laugh or feel better."

Bright said that "Captain Dom's file is full of commendations." The chief noted the depth of heroism for which men and women in this profession are known for and how they must often react on a moment's notice.

Bright cited a 10-alarm, wind-driven conflagration on Dec. 14, 1990 on Highland Street. "The conflagration turned out to be the fourth fire Dom and his group fought on that memorable night," said Bright.

"And most recently, May 16 on Griffin Street, Capt. LaSala and his Engine 4 crew were recognized for rescuing nine baby ducklings from a storm drain and safely reuniting them with their mother, who was anxiously standing by on scene," said Bright.

Bright then said of the revered captain: "Here at the Revere Fire Department, the simple truth is that Capt. Dom is one of the most loved fire-

fighters this department has ever seen. He has given 38 years of extraordinary service protecting the lives and property of the citizens of Revere. And we - his brother and sister firefighters, retirees, elected officials, family and citizens are all grateful for your service," said Bright.

LaSala elected to be brief in his remarks, but it was clear that he was touched by the beautiful tribute and the large crowd that had assembled for the momentous occasion.

"Good morning to my family, my extended family my friends," began LaSala. "If I could sum it all up, it was an unbelievable experience. If you can't get up every day and do something you love, then what's the sense of living? "Being part of the Revere Fire Department was my biggest and proudest moments of my entire life.

"Every day that I would come to work was like my first day on the job," said LaSala. "The many memories that I have with each of every one of you will last a lifetime for me. Every time we made a difference in someone else's life was my biggest gift. It's the best job in the entire world and I want to thank you all,

Fire officials urge public to leave fireworks to the professionals

"Last year, several people lost fingers and suffered serious burns lighting off illegal fireworks in Massachusetts," said State Fire Marshal Peter J. Ostroskey. "Thirty-four firefighters were injured when an errant firework ignited a six-family building. Have a fun but safe Fourth of July and leave the fireworks to the professionals," he added.

Fourth of July No Holiday for Firefighters

Needham Fire Chief Dennis Condon, president of the Fire Chiefs' Association of Massachusetts, said, "The Fourth of July holiday is a busy time for firefighters. We are supervising the professional displays so that they are safe for spectators and licensed operators; we are busy responding to all types of fires and medical emergencies. In fact, the week of July Fourth is one of the busiest times of the year for fires."

State Fire Marshal Peter J. Ostroskey said, "This year, set a good example for your children. Just as children know where you keep the matches and lighters, they know where you stash your illegal fireworks." He added, "Children imitate adults. If you use fireworks, children will copy you, not realizing how very dangerous fireworks are."

Fireworks Cause Many Dangerous Fires

Last summer, there were many fires, amputations and burn injuries from illegal fireworks in Massachusetts. In the past decade (2009-2018), there have been 800 major fires and explosions involving illegal fireworks in Massachusetts[1]. These incidents resulted in 12 civilian injuries, 39 fire service injuries and an estimated dollar loss of \$2.5 million.

On June 25, 2018, people shooting fireworks in the street started a fire in a six-unit Lynn apartment building. One ricocheted to the second floor porch and ignited several items. The fire spread to the rest of the second floor and to the third. Thirty-four firefighters were injured at this fire.

On July 2, 2018, the Worcester Fire Department was called to a fire in a three-unit apartment building. The fire was started by fireworks igniting trash in a first floor doorway.

On July 3, 2018, Dartmouth District #1 responded to a pier fire at Anthony's Beach. Crews discovered remains of many fireworks on and around the pier after the fire was extinguished.

On July 4, 2018, the Agawam Fire Department responded to a brush fire started

by three juveniles who were using illegal fireworks.

On July 5, 2018, the Lynn Fire Department put out a car fire started by fireworks.

Fireworks Injuries

In the past decade (2009-2018), 38 people were treated at Massachusetts emergency rooms for severe burn injuries from fireworks (burns covering 5 percent of more of the body) according to the Massachusetts Burn Injury Reporting System (M-BIRS). Fifty-five percent of the victims were under age 25. Eighteen percent (18 percent) were between the ages of 15 and 24; 8 percent were between the ages of 10 and 14; 18 percent were between five and nine; and 11 percent were children under five. The youngest victim was a six-month old boy. These victims are scarred for life. In the past year:

A 22-year-old man was seriously injured when roman candles were set off inside an Amherst apartment.

A 22-year-old was injured in Gloucester playing with sparklers.

A 10-year-old boy was injured by illegal fireworks at a Marshfield beach on July 3, 2018. He was an innocent by-stander.

A man lost part of his hand when a firework he was holding exploded. The explosion occurred in a Mansfield MBTA parking lot.

The Tewksbury Fire Department provided emergency medical care to a man who lost a part of every finger on his right hand when a firework he was holding exploded.

All Fireworks Are Illegal in Massachusetts

The possession and use of all fireworks by private citizens is illegal in Massachusetts. This includes Class C fireworks, which are sometimes falsely called "safe and sane" fireworks. Class C fireworks include sparklers, party poppers, snappers, firecrackers, spinners, cherry bombs and more. Sparklers burn at 1,800°F or higher. It is illegal to transport fireworks into Massachusetts, even if they were purchased legally elsewhere. Illegal fireworks can be confiscated on the spot.

- Slow down, and avoid strenuous activity. Don't try to do too much on a hot day.
- Wear lightweight, loose-fitting, light-colored clothing. Light colors will reflect heat and sunlight and help maintain normal body temperature. Protect your face with a wide-brimmed hat.
- Drink plenty of water regularly and often, even if you do not feel thirsty. Stay hydrated.
- Limit your intake of alcoholic beverages, as they can

actually dehydrate your body.

- Eat well-balanced, light, regular meals. Avoid high protein foods that increase metabolic heat.
- Cover windows that receive morning or afternoon sun with drapes, shades, awnings or louvers. Outdoor awnings or louvers can reduce the heat that enters a home by up to 80%.
- Stay indoors as much as possible.
- Air-conditioning can provide a lot of relief in a summer like this one. On the most unbearably hot days when it's too hot for fans to be effective, air-conditioners can even help you stay safe. If you don't have air conditioning, stay on your lowest floor, out of the sun. Electric fans do not cool the air, but they do help evaporate perspiration, which cools your body.
- Seek relief from the heat in air-conditioned schools, libraries, your local senior center, theaters and other community facilities that may offer refuge during the warmest times of the day.
- The heat affects more than just people. Our pets can be in danger when the temperatures

reach highs. Keep your animals safe and healthy in this heat. Do not leave them in a hot car or without water.

In extreme heat, it's important that we watch out for each other and stay informed about how to remain healthy when the thermometer climbs. Stay cool!



When she was a young college student, Elizabeth Marra had a serious motorcycle accident that ultimately changed her life. Two years after the crash, her painful open fractures had failed to heal. Then she heard about a new and complex surgery pioneered by a surgeon who used a patient's own stem cells to concentrate the healing process. This time, her surgery and subsequent therapy were successful.

Elizabeth's experience cannot be underestimated by those who are agonized, inspired by the medical professionals who helped her reclaim her active lifestyle, the changed her major to study physical therapy—a profession where her own experience could help other patients prevail through difficult recoveries.

We all Elizabeth Marra's story here to illustrate one of the most profound messages we know. Don't give up, and remember to give back. If reading it inspires just one more person to achieve something special, then its telling here has been well worth while.
