Bobby McKenna rescues switchbox after vandalism

When life gives you lemons, it's time to make lemonade and that's what artist and Marine veteran Bobby McKenna did when one of his pieces of art – an intricately designed switchbox at Washington and Sargent streets - was tagged sometime last week with black paint.

McKenna had spent eight hours a day for three weeks painting the switchbox, and now it will take another week to repair. McKenna found out and Sargent streets is a walkabout the act of vandalism through a friend. When he went to see it for himself he was beyond devastated.

"I immediately started thinking how hard it would be to get the paint off," he explained since there is a clear coat covering every layer of paint. McKenna said luckily where the person had painted - he was able to clean off a lot and ended up using the black graffiti paint as shading for some other artwork.

"I couldn't have figured out a better way to do it myself," he said.

Baker said McKenna's switchbox was not the only one tagged in the city. Four boxes have been hit.

Police Chief James Guido encourages people planning to go to the Sand Sculpting Festival to take public transportation since there is no designated parking area for the festival. There will be no parking at Suffolk Downs or at Wonderland and no shuttle busses bringing spectators to the beach.

Deadline to submit nomination papers is July 23 for municipal election

With the deadline for submitting nomination papers set for this Tuesday, July 23, the field of candidates for the 2019 municipal election is definitely taking shape.

Several candidates have had their nomination papers certified. If all candidates do proceed with their election plans, there would be a preliminary election in certain races on Sept. 10.

Three candidates, Mayor Brian Arrigo, Councillor-at-Large Dan Rizzo, and Cheryl Whittredge are seeking the corner office.

The most crowded race is for councillor-at-large where 13 candidates are seeking the five at-large seats on the City Council.

There are currently three contested ward races. In Ward 2, incumbent Ira Novoselsky and Robert E. Bent are the

candidates.

In Ward 5, incumbent John Powers and Eric Lampedecchio are the candidates.

In Ward 6, seeking to succeed Charles Patch as city councillor are Nicholas Moulaison, Francis Sarro, and Richard Serino.

Seven candidates are vying for the six available seats on the Revere School Committee (The mayor of Revere also has a seat on the Committee). The candidates include incumbents Stacey Rizzo, Michael Ferrante, Susan Gravellese, Frederick Sannella, and Carol Tye. Also seeking election to the School Committee are John Kingston and Albert J. Terminiello Jr.



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YES, DRUGS ARE BAD, BUT ALCOHOL IS STILL THE WORST

We've all become aware of the opioid epidemic that has spread throughout the country in recent years and that has been responsible for about 60,000 premature deaths annually in the United States.

The dangerous and deadly drug fentanyl, which often is laced into heroin, chiefly has been responsible for the rise in opioid

However, we should not lose sight of the fact that alcohol abuse still rates as the number one health problem in the country, as it has for decades.

Here are a few statistics:

It is estimated that excessive drinking is responsible for 88,000 deaths per year in the United States, about one in 10 deaths among working-age adults. The cost in 2010 was almost

And drinking is a serious problem among adolescents. More than nine percent of those 12 to 17 years drink alcohol, and almost five percent engaged in binge drinking in the last month. Drinking in the teen years makes a person five times more likely to become an alcoholic than if they had waited to take their first drink after the age of 21.

For men, risky drinking is more than four drinks on any day or more than 14 drinks in any week, according to the National Institute for Alcohol Abuse. And for women, it's more than three drinks on any day or more than seven drinks in any week. (The institute defines a drink as 12 ounces of beer, 5 ounces of wine, or 1.5 ounces of spirits.)

Among people aged 15 to 49, alcohol use is the single most common risk factor for death and disability. In 2016, alcohol accounted for 6.8 percent of male and 2.2 percent of female deaths.

Finally, alcoholic beverages are classified by the International Agency for Research on Cancer (IARC) as a Group 1 carcinogen (carcinogenic to humans) -- the same category as asbestos -- with 3.6% of all cancer cases and 3.5% of cancer deaths worldwide being attributable to consumption of alcohol.

So here are a few ways to ensure that neither we nor our friends and loved ones become one of those statistics this sum-

1) If you are planning on going out for a night, leave the car at home and have your cell phone programmed to call an Uber. Drunk-driving lawyers say their business is way down thanks to Uber use by millennials -- so be smart and plan ahead while you're still sober and before you leave your house!

2) Friends don't let friends drive drunk -- take their keys and drive them home yourself or get them an Uber.

3) Do not drink and captain a boat -- it IS against the law (just like drinking and driving a car) -- and the risks to your passengers and other boaters on the water are huge if you are captaining under the influence.

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

ReBooting Recycling Part 2: The Dos and Dont's

Last week we reflected on some 30 years of recycling in Revere, from the early days when residents had to separate recyclable paper, metal, and glass and place it in small green or red bins. It was a chore, but residents quickly adapted to the process and appreciated its benefits.

Over the years, recycling has changed dramatically. Revere began single-stream recycling in the early 2000s, so that all recyclable materials can be placed into one container, and that made the environmentally-beneficial recycling process so much easier.

But new regulations, along the response of the worldwide marketplace to accepting and processing recyclable materials, requires everyone to carefully reconsider the way we go about our recycling. In Revere, we are "re-booting" our recycling efforts because, frankly, we are doing a terrible job of it right now. A full 100 per cent of our recycling is contaminated, mostly because residents are not following the new rules and requirements of recycling. In simple terms, we flunk recycling.

It's important to realize how much money it costs for the City to conduct weekly curbside collection of trash and recyclable materials. At \$3.8 million for the current fiscal year, it is one of the largest line items in our municipal budget. Worse, when residents do not recycle in compliance with state and federal regulations, recycling costs 30 per cent more per ton to dispose. That amounts to thousands of dollars every year that taxpayers must spend unnecessarily.

For sure, Revere is not alone when it comes to the high cost of trash disposal. Every business and every community in the country is striving to foster recycling programs that will reduce waste, aid the environment, and, ultimately, save taxpayers millions of dollars.

The point is, people earnestly want to recycle properly, so our objective here is to help residents learn the right way to go about it.

Your best source of information is the City of Revere website, revere.org/recycling which has all the details about the City's trash collection and recycling. You also can easily download the City of Revere Trash/Street sweeping app from Google Play or the App Store on your mobile phone.

Here is a quick summary of our recycling rules:

DO RECYCLE:

First and foremost, DO NOT place plastic trash bags filled with recyclable materials into your brown recycling bin. If you store your recyclable materials in plastic bags, be sure to empty the recyclable materials loosely into the recycling bin. You do not need to sort the materials, but do not enclose them in a plastic bag. You can place in your recycling bin:

- Rinsed glass bottles, jars and similar containers.
- · Clear rinsed plastic microwave trays and containers. It's OK if the labels and caps are still on the container, but rinse the inside. BUT DO

"take-out" containers.

- Plastic bottles, jugs, and containers, empty and rinsed. • Aluminum and steel cans
- (i.e. soda, food cans) but make sure they are empty and rinsed. • Corrugated cardboard—
- flatten boxes to 3x3 feet and less than a foot in height. You can put torn up cardboard into a paper bag or cardboard box, and if it doesn't fit in your recycle bin, place the bag or box next to your recycle bin.
- Clean cardboard of all types, cereal and snack boxes with the plastic liners removed. Egg cartons and similar containers provided they are clean.
- Paper: Newspaper and glossy inserts, magazines, brochures, junk mail, envelopes, telephone books, and brown paper bags. But NO shredded paper!
- Clothing and cloth materials: Revere is contracted with SimpleRecycling.com, a nationwide collector of cloth and clothing for recycling. You can obtain a free Pink plastic bag at the Mayor's office at Revere City Hall, or visit the SimpleRecycling. com website. Once you have your Pink bag, fill it with cloth items such as bed sheets, blankets, drapes, curtains, pillows, sleeping bags. Fill it with clothing, jackets, hats, sneakers, shoes, and even small tools and household appliances. Place the Pink bag next to your brown recycling bin on your regular recycling day, and you will help keep tons of disposed items out of the trash stream, again saving NOT recycle black plastic the City of Revere taxpayers

thousands of dollars. You can even obtain a receipt for your Pink Bag disposal for tax deduction purposes.

DON'T RECYCLE:

Place the following items in your regular blue trash bin, not in your recycling bin:

- Containers that are stained or contain food scrap, such as pizza boxes.
- Disposable plastic cups of any color and straws; clear plastic cups may be recycled.
- Plastic bags, plastic wrap, plastic packaging materials such as bubble wrap of any type.
- Shredded paper.
- Black plastic takeout containers—but the clear plastic covers may be recycled.

This summer, the City is partnered with the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection to improve our recycling habits. Inspectors are out checking the contents of Recycling bins and will issue warning stickers so that residents can better understand the proper ways and materials to recycle.

Keeping our city clean, whether it's through trash disposal or recycling efforts, requires everyone's cooperation. But we all will enjoy the direct benefit of these efforts: a cleaner city. And your efforts will play a major role in combatting rodent problems in the City, also.

So let's change Revere from a recycling failure to a recycling leader. This is one way every resident can play a personal role in our city's overall prosperity.



ZBA DENIES SPECIAL PERMIT

CHELSEA - In a split decision, the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) denied a request for a special permit and variance for a proposed eightunit, four-story, market-rate condominium project at 254 Spencer Ave.

In a 2-2 vote, ZBA members Arthur Arsenault and Marilyn Vega-Torres voted to okay the project, while members Hugo Perdomo and Joseph Mahoney voted to deny approvals, siding with the recommendation of Planning Director John DePriest.

DePriest stated that the conversion of the existing two-family house to eight units was too large for the site, and that the developers did not meet the hardship requirements to gain approval for the special permit and variances.

While the Planning Department recommended no more than five units on the parcel, a number of neighbors and city officials came out in support of the project Tuesday night, much as they had done last month when the project was approved by the Planning Board.

"I would hate to see these units be abandoned, it is kind of an eyesore right now," said District 3 City Councillor Joe Perlatonda.

Perlatonda noted that the City has recently approved larger, affordable housing projects, such as at the old Midas site, and that 254 Spencer Ave. sits next to the 34-unit Acadia affordable housing development.

"The neighbors want this, I want this, and I don't think it should be limited to five units," said Perlatonda. "It's a great project, and I don't see why we wouldn't want it right now.'

Richard Lynds, the attorney for developer Ricky Beliveau, said the four-story condo building would fit into the neighborhood by serving as a transition from the taller, five-story Acadia development on one side to the triple-deckers on the other side of 254 Spencer Ave.

To make the project work financially, Lynds said Beliveau needs the eight units at market rate. He said Beliveau would be investing \$2.5 million into the project, with units selling for about \$500,000 each.

"Ricky believes in the City of Chelsea," said Lynds. "For him to make this type of investment shows where his mind is and where his wallet is."

As the special permit and variance failed to garner the necessary vote, several of the supporters who attended the meeting voiced their displeasure to the board members and DePriest.

"We are going with what the law is in the books," said Mahoney.

After the meeting, Lynds said he and Beliveau will regroup to see what their next steps are for 254 Spencer Ave.

"It's too early to tell what we will do right now," he said. "We will look at all of our op-

Lynds said he was surprised by DePriest's staunch vocal opposition to the project.

"This was an opportunity for good, market-rate units," said Lynds.

COUNCIL VOTES DOWN CHURCH REQUEST

EVERETT - On June 24, Councilors debated at length about the petition of a local church owner to have donation bins on his property.

Council voted against this

request by a tally of 7-3. Pastor Denis Hernandez from Ministerio Monte de Sion (Mount Zion Ministry) at 108-144 Spring St. spoke before Council to request a new open-air parking license for the church property. The church owners want to use the space to house donation bins as well as trucks that can transport donations. The new license would not affect the church parking available for parishioners.

The item had been put forth for a Council vote by the Committee on Community and Business Development, which recommended favorable action. The license would be subject to general restrictions, including compliance with all local zoning ordinances. Had it been approved by Council, the next step would have been for the request to go before the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) and possibly the Planning Board.

However, the request gave pause to several Councilors due to its vagueness.

Hernandez wasn't able to answer Council's specific questions regarding the donation bins, possibly due to a language barrier. He couldn't tell Council who would be do-

grateful to Elliot and Donna nating, what would be donated and where donations would be going.

Councilor John Hanlon was hesitant and wanted assurance that the Clerk or the Inspectional Services Department (ISD) would be able to inspect all donation bins in the city.

"We had major problems before with people filling up containers and shipping them out," he said. "I'd like to trust people all the time, but I want to be able to say we know exactly what's going on."

Councilwoman Rosa Di-Florio, who chairs the Committee for Community and Business Development, called the request "too broad."

"I'm not against the church, donating or charity, but unfortunately it's just not the right place for it," she said. "We don't know what's going to be there. Is there going to be food? Are we going to have rats? There's nothing that specifies what's going to be there."

City Clerk Sergio Cornelio said that Council could write specific conditions into the li-

"Put some type of limitation on it," he said. "You can state there is no broken-down vehicles, maybe just one or two box trucks. You can say not before 8 a.m. and not past 8 p.m. Those are conditions that are within your jurisdiction to do."

Councilor McLaughlin supported approving the center with specific guidelines attached.

"These types of centers are important for donation purposes, especially when a country gets hit with a storm," he said.

Councilor Wayne Matewsky mentioned local apartments and hotels that could consider donation bins and box trucks an eyesore.

"This is something that should go to the Planning or Zoning Board before we vote on it," he said.

But Councilor Michael Marchese felt that wasn't necessary.

"Forget about the Zoning Board, let's make a decision right here," he said. "We rezoned this area recently. We shouldn't be putting that crap there. A church is one thing. I wouldn't welcome this into the city of Everett."

Councilor Fred Capone motioned to send the request to the Zoning Board of Appeals as well as the Planning Board, but only himself and Councilors Hanlon, Matewsky and Napolitano voted in favor of this.

Next, the Council took a vote to approve the request outright. The request was voted down by Council 7-3, with only Councilors Fred Capone, Michael McLaughlin, and Peter Napolitano voting in favor of it. (Councilor John McKinnon was absent from voting, though Clerk Cornelio noted that he had opposed the request in committee.)

"I'm disappointed to see the way the vote went," said Councilor McLaughlin in a follow-up interview with Independent. "You can't say that you want to help others and then deny a location in which donations are collected.

"I absolutely support putting regulations on such a license," he continued. "The license should have been granted with stipulations and regulations so that it could be respectfully handled."



COUNCILOR SEEKS TO BRING BIKE **INFORMATION TO PUBLIC**

EVERETT - At a recent City Council meeting, prior to the summer recess, Councilor Fred Capone suggested that the City work with the Police Department in order to bring bicycle safety and regula-

tion information to residents, whether through live classes or televised programming on ECTV.

"I've been pushing bike safety for five years," he told the Independent. "We need to educate folks about the rules of the road for bikes.

The councilor cited things like always biking with the flow of traffic, wearing safety gear and dressing in brightly colored clothing.

Councilor Capone said he has seen not only minors but adults biking recklessly, and is afraid that "someone's going to get hurt or die."

He claims that it is especially prudent now that Everett has taken steps to strengthen its cycling infrastructure, entering into contracts with two different bike-share com-

panies, Lime and Bluebikes. "It's irresponsible if the City provides ample access to bikes but then neglects the obligation to ensure that cyclists understand the rules of the road," said the councilman. 'Without providing some safety information, serious injury or even a fatality is a real

possibility." Councilor Capone said he has asked the administration and the police department to take up the issue of bicycle safety in Everett for over four years, but that his request has 'fallen on deaf ears."

The councilor is not alone in his thinking.

Councilor Michael Mc-Laughlin also believes that bicycle safety needs to be taken seriously.

"We as a community need to do more on bike awareness and education of safety on riding," he said.

Bike awareness means not just educating cyclists about road rules, but educating drivers about how to keep bikes safe on the road.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, 783 cyclists were killed in traffic accidents in 2017, with three quarters of these occurring in urban areas.

New York City Mayor and

that city's cyclist death toll to laws. 15 just this year.

New York's new measures include steep fines for driving or parking in a bike lane, not obeying pavement markings and not yielding to cyclists while making turns.

De Blasio promises to also crack down on cyclists biking the wrong way, biking through red lights and distracted cycling. City officials have proposed license plates for all bikes, knowing that traffic cameras can catch cyclists disobeying road rules even when a police officer isn't present.

In Chicopee, Mass., a female cyclist lost her life on July 3, prompting town officials to recommit to bicycle

safety initiatives. Councilors in Everett are hopeful that they can take a lesson from New York and Chicopee and take action before any cyclist fatalities oc-

•Laws for Cyclists

According to the General Laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, cyclists must obey the rules of the road. These include obeying traffic laws; using correct hand signals when stopping, slowing and turning; yielding to pedestrians; keeping one hand on handlebars at all times; wearing an approved, fastened helmet if under 16; using reflectors before sunrise and after sunset; and meeting all standards of cycle equipping and modification.

•Laws for Drivers

Motorists in Massachusetts are responsible for knowing how to interact with cycles on the road. This includes yielding to oncoming cyclists when making left turns, checking for cyclists before opening their doors when parked and remaining a safe distance from cyclists when passing.

SOCIAL CENTER RECEIVES GRANT FOR NEW WINDOWS

Fond memories of Wonderland Dog Track

It has been said traveling back in time, reminiscing, sharing one's thoughts and feelings about significant events is important and good for the soul.

Prior to moving to Florida last June, I had viewed the 2017 abbreviated beginning of the demolition, which has now been completed at 190 VFW Parkway, the former site of the Wonderland Dog Track. I knew exactly what I was about to witness, a barren tract of land. The past months friends, former co-workers and racing fans had graphically described to me what had transpired in the past year at 190 VFW Parkway, Revere.

There was never a question that during my visit to Boston I would return one final time to where I had been employed from 1978 to 2010. So on May 27th I walked down the hill from bell circle and saw 27 acres of concrete, macadam, overgrown grass, weeds and a small patch of dirt, the only remainder of the racetrack's far turn come into view. It took a few minutes to identified exactly where the administration building had been, my office for 32 years. It was here my attention was diverted to the ground and my penny from heaven. The penny more than likely had been there since the demolition, its so dark and grimy, the heads side appears completely blank (the year, In God We Trust or the word Liberty is not visible). It's edges are ragged chipped away in multiple areas, also it has been damaged by three distinct digs into the copper coin; located below Lincoln's chin, to right of his

But 190 VFW Parkway had been much more than just a defunct dog racing facility. It will always be deeply rooted in the history of Revere. During its hey day Wonderland had been an economic engine for the city. In addition to charitable contributions and tax dollars many citizens were able to put children through college, purchase a home, or provide for a vacation because of employment at the track. For many it was a second job. Revere's Mayor, Brian Arri-

go was among the residents

who got their start working at

Wonderland.

eye and just below his head.

Located on a tract of land near Revere Beach, long before the first greyhound race in 1935, developer Thomas Barrell constructed Wonderland Park an extension of the Revere Beach amusement park. Wonderland was modeled after the International World Fair's. It included a theater, exhibits, and rides. The center piece was a beautiful lagoon part of the exciting ride "Shoot the Chute" at the time it was proclaimed one of most unique in all the World. Like Disney's theme parks parades occurred daily. The park even included a full service health center. Due in large part to New England's unpredictable weather its operators suffered great financial difficulty forcing its closure in 1911, after only six years of operation. As the Revere Beach amusement park continued to prosper and draw huge crowds Wonderland was briefly converted to a bicycle track.

In 1934 Wonderland Greyhound Park was constructed, opening night was June 12, 1935 as 5,000+ fans watched

Pensy Walker lead the field over the finish line during the tracks first official race.

Wonderland experienced many historic moments and events over the course of its 75 years, possibly the most noteworthy stories are those of RURAL RUBE. The Rube dominated the 1939 season, winning 19 times while setting a 5/16th World Record of 31.00. On June 15, 1939 1,500 fans and dignitaries paid to have dinner honoring the canine superstar at the famed Copley Plaza in downtown Boston. Seated at the head of the table with owner R.B. "Bud" Carrell, greyhound racing's Babe Ruth was presented a gold collar, after devouring a steak. Then on Aug. 30, 1940, the Legendary Rural Rube, who made greyhound racing in Massachusetts, retired to a standing ovation as he was paraded around the track one final time before being pre-

sented a gold medal. Wonderland quickly became the premier racing venue in the Northern United States. Know throughout the industry for hosting greyhound racing's most prestigious championship stake races each year; the Wonderland Derby and Grady Sprint, formerly the World Sprint, annually attracted the sports biggest stars.

Rural Rube was the first of many great, four-legged athlete's who graced the Revere oval. More All-American greyhounds competed at Wonderland than any other track in the country, thirty five including 18 Derby champions (from 1963 thru1998). While showcasing many of the most famous greyhounds in the sports history, nightly crowds often exceeded 19,000 fans. During its heyday handle exceeded more than one million

A dozen experts comprised

dollars on four occasions.

of Management, Kennel Owners and fans named Wonderland's All-Time "Dream-Team" as part of the 50th Anniversary festivities. The results read like who's who of greyhound racing. Captained by Rural Rube the first team included Lucky Pilot, Canadian Pacific, Hondo Monopoly, Never Roll, Evening Glamour, On the Line, Rinaker, Honey Line. and Rock a Dee.

The track's last race was won by Stanton's kennels JJ's Make Me Pop on Sept. 18, 2009. Normally referred to as "The Au Rior" (its meaning is "goodbye until we meet again") so it was not appropriate in 2009, as this was the final race ever! The last finish line photo, prior to the race track lights being turned off for the final time included two of the three State's Racing Commissioners along with two Track Officials, representatives from the Stanton Kennel, a leadout and the winning greyhound.

By the end of 2018 bulldozers had demolished the race track, tote board, and remaining buildings; however, Wonderland's, history and fond memories of the fans and those of us who had the pleasure of working, or racing greyhounds at 190 VFW Parkway, Revere from 1935-2009 will remain forever!

As for my penny from heaven, following 10 days of business, doctor appointments, visiting old friends and great food my daughter and I headed back south, me with the penny in my pocket.

I had forgotten about the penny until one day last week while paying at my favorite coffee shop I found it in my hand. I'm not sure what possessed me, but when I got home, I googled "is there spiritual meaning to finding a coin." The response directed

I've never been one to believe in the supernatural. After reading the article "penny from heaven" and thinking about its message "When you need cheering up these spiritual coins are a sign from heaven and loved ones who have passed over". "If you are missing a loved one who has passed on a day when you think of them, you may find coins popping up in your path." I now have a new perspective regarding my spiritually. As my daughter as my witness the penny from heaven was the second penny I picked up on VFW Parkway. The first I made a wish and threw it into a small body of water along the walking route to 190 VFW Parkway.

What really gives me pause

for reflection is the fact May 27 was Memorial Day and just a few hours prior to stopping by 190 VFW Parkway I had placed flowers at the grave site of my Mother, Father and Sister - My penny from heaven will no longer remain in my pocket. It will be forever in a locket near my heart!

Many of you I thought would appreciate the full history of Wonderland so I tagged you here.

Businesses in Lynn make up the large majority of Chamber members but there is "healthy representation" in the other four communities.

Codner said Monday's official launch consisted of an unveiling the agency's new logo on the Website. The rebranding is continuing on social media and a letter has been sent to all members notifying them of the change.

"We also have an event on Friday (July 12) at Land of a Thousand Hills (61 Munroe St.) between 9 and 11 a.m.," said Codner. "We hope that members come on down and have a cup of coffee and get our new logo on top of your latte."

The acronym for the Greater Lynn Chamber of Commerce is likely to be "GLCC," eschewing the preposition "of" as most chambers do.

General Edwards Bridge) does use the letter 'O' in its acronym, which is POPYC. perhaps an attempt to differentiate itself from the Pleasant Park Yacht Club (PPYC) in nearly Winthrop.

Friday's introductory event is, in fact, being called "Meet the GLCC." Lynn's Chamber of Commerce experienced unprecedented growth under previous Executive Director Leslie Gould. The Lynn Chamber is one of the largest in Massachusetts with approximately 400 members.

The Chamber's business and social events, including the Annual Business Excellence Awards Dinner – with its Academy Awards-style feel and the considerable prestige associated with being an award recipient - have attracted large turnouts.

The Chamber has become a strong and effective voice for the business community with leaders and members appearing at City Council and other governmental board meetings.

The Chamber has continued its resurgence under the reign of Codner and his management team - and even "Greater" things are expected



DeMARCO TO FILL VACANT COUNCIL **SEAT**

WINTHROP - The Town Council unanimously selected Rob DeMarco to fill the seat vacated by Councilor at-Large Mike Lucerto.

DeMarco was the only one to put his name in for a nomination since Lucerto resigned June 12. Lucerto stated he sold his house and was moving to Salem. This also came on the heels of several absence from

council meetings. DeMarco, a third-generation Winthropite, ran against Lucerto in 2017, but came up short despite garnering more than

1,700 votes. "My first plan is to listen and keep my mouth shut," DeMarco said. "I think people do too much preaching of what they would like to see. I see my job as being a voice of the people and doing what the community wants. My first job is to listen to the community.'

DeMarco has been involved in youth sports and flag football at Ingleside. He serves on the Park Committee and has taught Catechism classes at St. John's.

"I think I'm fairly wellknown all over the town and I'm not going anywhere," De-Marco said. "I'm really humbled and honored by the opportunity to serve my town."

RESIDENTS UPSET **OVER ZONING MESS**

WINTHROP - For months the Center Business District (CBD) has been an area of concern for residents and town leaders, and with a developer interested in placing 30 residential units on Somerset Avenue, straightening out the zoning mess is crucial.

Town Council President Ron Vecchia said this has been clumsy since day one and he wants the Zoning Board of Appeals to come to a meeting and explain what happened. At the center of the center

issue is a "map" and a "line". The Zoning Board made it a little clearer on June 27 for one house at 20 Cottage Park Road, which was thought to be Residential A, but determined to really be mixed use.

At the July 2 Town Council meeting, the topic came up again with former Council President Tom Reilly (who helped draw up the town's charter) and his wife Donna Segreti-Reilly, who read a statement about getting citizens involved in the government process.

She stated that the 2014 process to re-define the Center Business District did not reach out to abutters and she has specific concerns.

"A petition put forth on May 27, 2018 was never heard or addressed," Segreti-Reilly stated. "It was about forthcoming building projects in Winthrop

Center." Tom Reilly, said when Terry Delehanty was Town Manager in 2017-2018, there were no single or multi-family homes in the Center District.

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
