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A Great Cause for the Canoeists Row Row Row raises funds for autism programs

Revere's Row Row Row has become one of the most anticipated events on the summer calendar since its revival three years ago after a long hiatus.

On Saturday morning rowers will leave from the Point of Points Yacht Club (POPYC) and compete in the third annual race. The day concludes with one of the great celebrations of the year, an awards and food extravaganza at Victor Molle's popular Mari-

na Restaurant and Bar at the Wharf.

Rowers are not only participating in a fun and friendly competition, but they are making a donation to an important cause. Row Row Row is held to benefit Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD).

A look at what Row Row Row has accomplished in the past year underlines the planning committee's ongoing commitment to the cause of helping individuals with ASD, which is a developmental disability.

Stacey Livote, coordinator of the event and principal at the Revere Seacoast Academy, said last year's Row Row Row to Revere's proceeds went to the construction of a sensory integration gym at the Beachmont School.

"It's a beautiful site with all kinds of sensory, motor equipment," said Livote. "It's just an amazing facility."

This year, Livote said, the committee will use the proceeds to purchase two sensory

Revere Community School awarded a grant by the Foundation Trust

The Revere Community School, which serves Revere and surrounding communities, received a \$16,624 grant from The Foundation Trust to support its 2019-2020 initiatives addressing the learning needs and advancing the life prospects of immigrant and refugee adults and youth who are trying to build a new life after experiencing trauma, violence and other forms of life adversity.

This is the first grant the Revere Community School has received from The Foundation Trust, a private operating foundation that supports the ongoing work of small to medium-sized nonprofit or-

ganizations that provide vital services to under-resourced populations in the Greater Boston area.

Fatou Drammeh, Coordinator at the Revere Community School said "we are honored to be among the first round of grantees from the Foundation Trust to strengthen our program and increase our impact in the community. This grant will help us support more individuals by addressing language barriers and skill building for daily life and employment and support for families in Revere. At the Revere Community School,

Mosquitos: not too bad but they're there

Compared to last year, the number of pesky mosquitos is down but the diseases they carry are still a concern, and that's why Northeast Mosquito Control has been spraying as requested in Revere, Winthrop and Lynn.

Kim Foss, an entomologist with Northeast Mosquito Control in Georgetown, which covers Essex County, and Winthrop, Revere in Suffolk County said reports come in to her weekly through local health departments and treat-

Revere roadways highlighted in state transportation report

MassDOT released a comprehensive 172-page traffic congestion report on Thursday for the state and the several major arteries, which flow through Revere.

"Massachusetts has reached a tipping point with respect to congestion," Stephanie Pollack, Transportation Secretary for the Baker administration, of the report entitled *Congestion in the Commonwealth: Report to the Governor* last Thursday.

"The city of Revere bears the brunt of the North Shore's traffic flowing into and out of Boston each day - Revere residents did not need a study to tell us that, as we sit in it every day on our way to and from work," said State Rep.

RoseLee Vincent (D-Revere).

While congestion is a major problem within the Route 128/95 loop, the congestion for Revere continues to push along the major arteries of Route 1A (North Shore Road), Route 1, Route 60 on the Malden line and the Revere Beach Parkway.

The section of Route 1A southbound carries traffic from Revere, Saugus, Lynn, Swampscott, Salem, and other North Shore communities to and out of Boston through the Summer and Callahan tunnels.

The report continues to state that trips between Lynn and Boston along Routes 1A, 60, and 107 are also unreliable heading in both direc-

we believe that it is important to provide an array of support services if we are to properly support immigrants to be self-sufficient and lead successful lives in the United States."

The grant from the Foundation Trust will enable the Revere Community School to support low or moderate-income Revere parents and high school students to participate in ESOL courses and/or continue their learning to improve their academic and personal situations. The program anticipates providing scholarships to 80 individuals over two years. The scholarship program will help to ensure the quality of our program by reducing the "dropout" rate – in this case, the adult learners and youth who do not enroll or who stop coming to class because they cannot afford it.

Dr. Joseph Spinazzola, Executive Director of the Foundation Trust said "the Revere Community School is doing tremendous work to elevate and empower high-risk communities in Revere. The Foundation Trust is proud to offer this grant to help them

advance educational and employment opportunities for diverse immigrants."

The Foundation Trust funding will also help 80 low-income families and seniors (40 per year) purchase a computer after completing 15 hours of free computer training so that they can do homework, find jobs and connect with loved ones. A free citizenship classes will also be available to up to 60 individuals planning on taking the citizenship exam in the next 12 months.

Revere Community School unites life-long learners with community and partner resources to empower its adult learners and encourage workforce development, health and wellness, community awareness, and civic participation. Established in 2013, our mission is to ensure quality, robust community-based learning opportunities for residents of Revere, where they can improve their English language skills, attend college preparedness classes, gain employment and citizenship preparation. Revere Community School is a city-funded

program under the Revere Parks & Recreation department, hosted and supported by the Revere School district.

Revere Community School serves a highly diverse youth and adult student population each year. About 90% of our students are English language learners. Students come from over 30 countries and speak more than 20 languages. Each year, over 600 adults and youth attend our courses to learn new languages, new skills, financial literacy, workforce development and civic engagement. We currently offer a wide range of courses such as English for Speakers of Other Languages, High School Equivalency diploma (HSET), Spanish, computer and citizenship courses to address the learning and educational needs of the communities. walks for the Whelan Elementary School. The walks are interactive and allow children to participate in activities as they walk the path.

Row Row Row also provides monetary support to the Special Education Parent Advisory Council (SEPAC) and its activities such as a skating event at Easter time at the Cronin Rink, swimming lessons, and a movement class at Dance Junction in Saugus.

Row Row Row has raised more than \$50,000 for the past two years, according to Livote, whose energy on the committee and for the cause is noteworthy.

"We hope to raise \$25,000, which is a good goal," said POPYC Commodore Jay Bolton, who with Vice Commodore Jill Simmons Wetmore leads a group of volunteers at POPYC, who assist in the event.

tions. Going inbound in the morning on an average day, the non-rush hour trip will take 30 minutes, but during the peak hour commute could take up to 40 minutes. Drivers headed outbound can expect to experience the same conditions with roughly the same frequency.

Another area of concern is the American Legion Highway (Revere), which carries the Route 60 designation, and connects the Salem Turnpike (Route 107) at Brown Circle to Route 1A, all in Revere. The south-bound direction is congested for 11 hours per day, from 6 a.m. to 5 p.m. The northbound direction is congested for nine hours per day, from 11 a.m. to 8 p.m.

"The DOT Traffic study confirms what we have known all along: traffic in Metropolitan Boston is a regional problem, not a unique Revere problem. Our own analysis of traffic on the eastern side of our city indicates that over 90 percent of rush hour traffic is from outside of our city—it's motorists just passing through on their way into Boston or to the Airport. And, as the study points out, traffic problems in many parts of the region are far worse than what we in Revere experience. Motorists face literally miles of bumper-to-bumper travel that can take hours. We are fortunate that Revere has the benefit of public transportation and short access to downtown Boston and Logan Airport," said Mayor Brian Arrigo. "That is the primary reason that we continue to forcefully advocate for the creation of a commuter rail stop at Wonderland, which we hope will move up on the MBTA's priority list as development occurs at Wonderland, Suffolk Downs, and the Neco site."

"This was a long awaited and overdue study," said State Sen. Joe Boncore, chairman of the Senate Transportation Committee. "Greater Boston has the worst congestion of any area in the country and it's only getting worse."

"With the release of this report, I am hopeful that state leaders will begin to seriously discuss ways to mitigate commuter traffic that floods our roadways," Vincent said. "I have been a strong proponent of widening Route 1 at the Revere/Saugus bottleneck to allow traffic to flow better from Revere into Saugus and points north. I am proud that Revere's State Delegation was able to secure funds to begin the first stages of this project in the last Transportation Bond Bill the Legislature enacted. I also support the idea of a Blue Line extension to Lynn and a commuter rail stop at Wonderland to create a link between the commuter rail and the Blue Line. Both of these would strive to deter vehicular traffic on Route 1A from North Shore residents coming to the Wonderland/Revere Beach/Beachmont T-stations every day. In or-

der to have a meaningful impact on lessening traffic in the Commonwealth, and in Revere specifically, we need to properly invest in projects like these."

According to the report, in the 7 a.m. hour, more roadway segments are highly congested within the problematic I-95/128 belt, including from Route 1A southbound (from Lynn, Swampscott and Marblehead through Revere to the Summer Tunnel.

From 8 a.m. to 8:59 a.m. Routh 1A South is listed as "congested" and one of the most consistently congested roadways in the Commonwealth.

The Lynn/Boston corridor travel times range from 30 to 40 minutes with congestion impacting jobs and the transit services, the report points out.

During the rush hour between 5 p.m. to 5:59 p.m. Route 107 North (The Marsh Road) is "congested" and Route 1A north is "Highly Congested".

Other places where travel time increased by more than 50 percent during the morning peak travel period include many of the most problematic segments in Greater Boston – include American Legion Highway (Route 60) in Revere.

The congestion not only affects automobile traffic, but bus traffic too.

According to the study, MBTA Bus Route 441 travels from Marblehead to the Wonderland MBTA station in Revere via Swampscott and Lynn. Since 2012, median travel times on both inbound and outbound trips have remained steady at around 50 minutes. It can take over 70 minutes to get from one end of the route to the other.

The study also looked at why congestion occurs. Recurring congestion is traditionally associated with commuting patterns, but the regular increase of traffic volumes beyond available roadway capacity is the product of several and overlapping forces including population and employment growth, housing and land use development priorities, travel behavior, and elements of the roadway network itself.

"The study also recommends building more affordable housing near transit. People will be able to get out of their cars and jump on the T instead," Boncore said. "We need to do more in the Commonwealth to get people out of their cars."

"To the extent that public transportation is a partial solution to roadway traffic, I am also a proponent of the long-discussed Blue Line-Red Line connection between the Bowdoin and Charles/MGH MBTA stops. This will connect large segments of the regional population that will be vital to the success of development on both sides of Boston," Arrigo said adding, "The development along Re-

vere Beach Boulevard and Ocean Avenue benefit from state programs that emphasize transit-oriented development, in other words, development located near public transit. Revere development actually adds relatively little additional traffic to our roads because of its easy access to public transportation."

According to the study, congestion itself can change travel behavior, inducing people to change their commute times in order to avoid the worst congestion; this is called "peak spreading."

In a recent poll on transportation issues, 67 percent of all respondents and 72 percent of respondents who work full-time stated that travel delays (on either roadways or on public transit services) have caused them to "leave earlier or later to avoid the busiest times of day." With respect to full-time workers who exclusively drive, 71 percent of these respondents have adjusted their commuting routines or telecommute.


So why is congestion so bad?

"We need have to have discussions about new revenue for transportation," Boncore said.

According to the study, congestion is bad because the economy is good. Since 2010, Massachusetts has added 350,000 new residents, nearly 39,000 just from 2017 to 2018. During the same period, employment in Greater Boston (roughly along and within I-95/128) grew by 19 percent, while employment in the rest of the state grew by 12 percent. More people, more households, more workers and more jobs lead to more driving and more congestion.

Recommendations for Next Steps

- Address local and regional bottlenecks where feasible
- Actively manage state and local roadway operations
- Reinvent bus transit at both the MBTA and Regional Transit Authorities
- Increase MBTA capacity and ridership
- Work with employers to give commuters more options
- Create infrastructure to support shared travel modes
- Increase remote work and telecommuting
- Produce more affordable housing, especially near transit
- Encourage growth in less congested Gateway Cities
- Investigate the feasibility of congestion pricing mechanisms that make sense for Massachusetts, particularly managed lanes

MWRA Advisory Board seeks to stop cable charge

The MWRA Advisory Board is calling upon state officials to protect ratepayers against a \$150 million charge to move a cross-harbor cable owned and operated by Eversource and its subsidiary Harbor Electric Energy Company (HEEC).

The sole customer for HEEC is the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA).

Due to a court order, MWRA ratepayers will be paying \$150 million over 30 years.

"This is the second time ratepayers will pay for a cable to Deer Island," said Joseph Favaloro, executive director of the MWRA Advisory Board.

The first cable ran from K Street to the reserve channel to Deer Island. Now it will go past Conley Terminal across and deeper in the channel to Deer Island.

The cable runs and carries power from Boston to the MWRA treatment plant on Deer Island. The cable needs to be buried 60 feet deeper because it is too close to where the proposed dredging would occur.

"I am outraged. Dredging of the harbor benefits MassPort. Through increased shipping and cruise ships traffic they will significantly increase revenue. It's not enough that the federal government is paying \$225 million for their project and that the Commonwealth is paying \$75 million - they needed to extort another \$8 million on the top of \$150 million from MWRA ratepayers through their negotiations with Eversource to mitigate their temporary inconvenience to dig a trench on the edge of Conley Terminal," Favaloro said.

The \$350 million dredging project is already being paid for through taxpayer monies in federal grants, state bonds and through Massport. The project is to make the shipping lane deeper for bigger ships.

"Eversource/HEEC negotiates an \$8 million charge for the easement at Conley Terminal South Boston, a cost

that is passed on to MWRA ratepayers," explained Favaloro. "Eversource is responsible to their shareholders and therefore collects 9 percent on these negotiated costs to Massport."

"The Advisory Board's calculations are misleading in that we negotiated in good faith a project financing structure with the MWRA that was both favorable to the customer and is less than half of our typical return on a project of this size," said Priscilla Ressa, Eversource spokesperson.

"In , we agreed to further lower the overall project costs by \$17.5M representing a credit for the early retirement of the old cable. While the Advisory Board takes issue with an \$8 million payment to MassPort, it must be recognized that it is compensation for the continued use of MassPort property for the cable to serve Deer Island. It's also important to note, the construction of the new cable project has gone exceedingly well. It's expected to be completed ahead of schedule and on or below budget."

"The Advisory Board is working with our communities to send petitions asking the Legislature and the Governor to withhold the remaining state funds until Massport rethinks their decision," said Favaloro.

"We realize the dredging is great for the Commonwealth and Massport," Favaloro said. "Yet it's another cost to MWRA communities and their ratepayers."

"We respectfully disagree with Mr. Favaloro's characterization of this issue. The installation of the new cable was necessary because the existing cable was not installed as permitted, said Fred Laskey, executive director of the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA). "We believe we negotiated a favorable agreement for our ratepayers. The bottom line is that we now have a new cable, which also includes redundant fiber optic lines for Deer Island, that will serve our ratepayers for the next 45 years," said Fred Laskey, executive director of the MWRA.

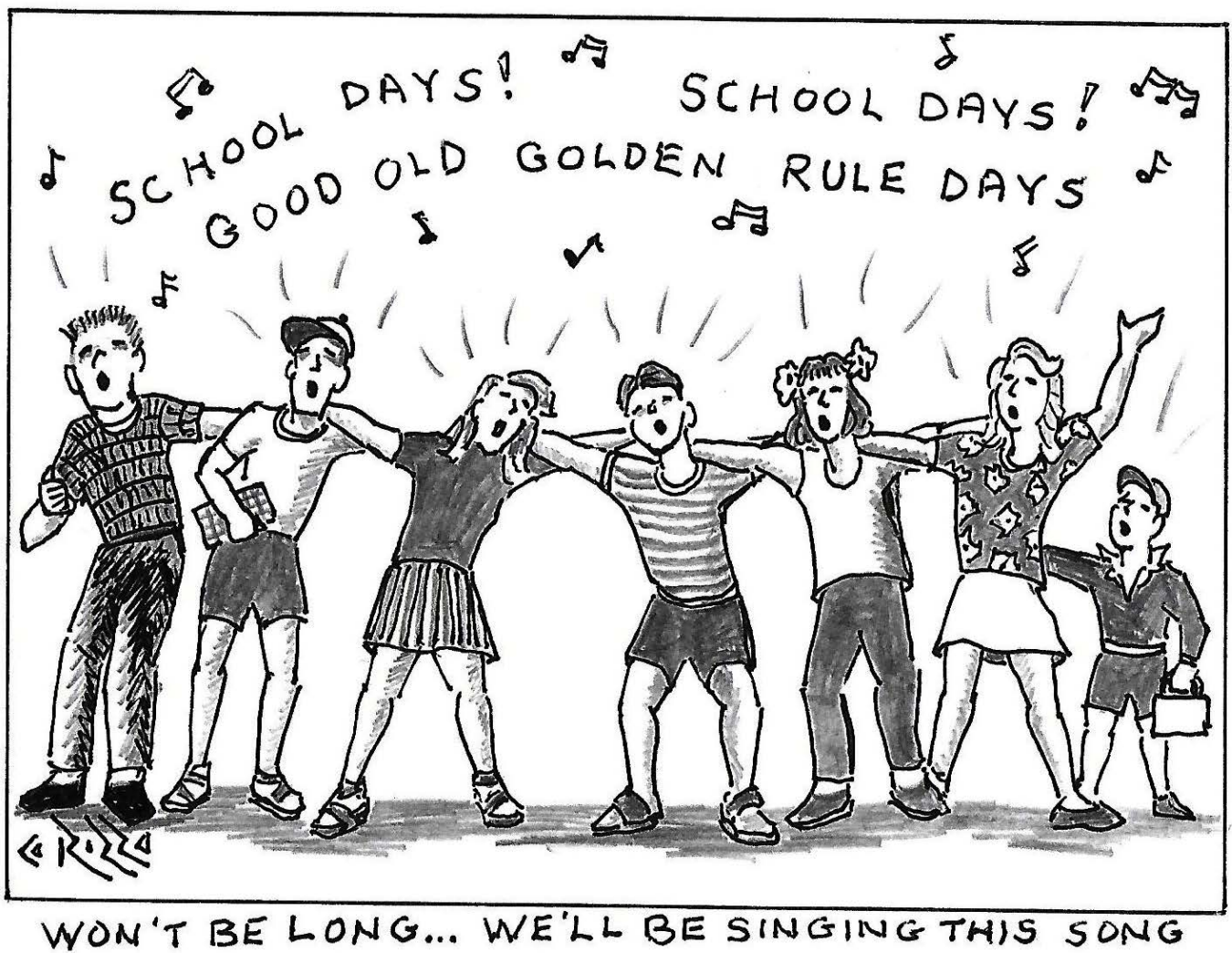

Aug. 12, 2009

The city has lost its long-standing legal battle with the Moon-Lite Reader adult bookstore, with a Superior Court judge entering an award of \$750,000 in legal fees against the city. The lawsuit has spanned more than 16 years.

The City Council unanimously voted down a measure that would have enacted a local meals tax applicable to restaurants in the city. Mayor Thomas Ambrosino had urged the Council to add a 0.75% local tax on top of the existing state meals tax. The Revere business community opposed to the tax.

Two persons died and three were seriously injured in a motor vehicle crash on Route 1 North on the elevated portion of the roadway above Copeland Circle. The vehicle was operated by a 19-year-old female from Weymouth.

A store clerk at the One Stop convenience store suffered a serious injury when he chased a man who had stolen \$81 along Shurtleff Street, catching up to the alleged robber, who then almost bit off the clerk's finger. Off-duty Police Sgt. Jeff Langone assisted and also suffered injuries before subduing the suspect.

Aug. 16, 1989

Although as many as six potential candidates said they might challenge incumbent Mayor George V. Colella, his lone opponent after the deadline for filing nomination papers is Revere School Department attendance officer Robert Nardone.

Mayor Colella told the 22-member Budget Crisis Committee that the \$1.6 million reduction in local aid from the state will require deep cuts in the city budget, but that he does not anticipate having to make layoffs.

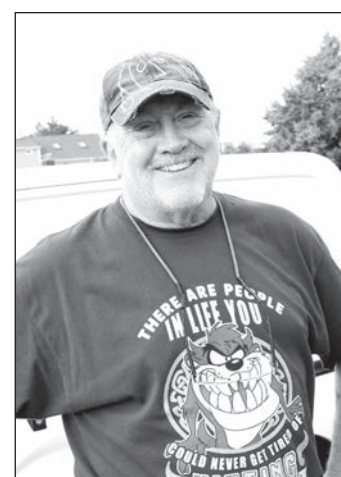

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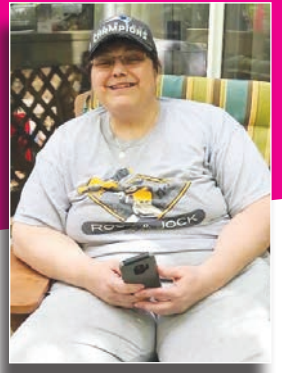

State Police Air Wing visits Revere Youth Academy

Children in the Revere Police Youth Academy have been having a great summer. The highlight for many included a visit from the Massachusetts State Police Air

Wing Tuesday morning on the Revere High School baseball field.

Youths and adults watched as Trooper John Hazelrigg and Trooper Ken Dinjian landed their helicopter on the field and opened it for inspec-

tion.

The Youth Academy is held for one week in July and one week in August. Participants interact with police and go on field trips and demonstrations which include hiking, Codzilla, the Aquarium, a ropes course, K9 demonstration and more. These activities give police and youth time to interact. They also get to have discussions about texting and driving, vaping, social media risks, and other topics of concern, including the various roles of police officers in the community.

The Youth Academy is funded through a grant from the Executive Office of Public Safety through the Suffolk County District Attorney's office.

"This is the second year we've been funded and the goal is to build relationships with youth. We partner with

the school department," said Revere Police Academy Capt. Amy O'Hara.

Kris Oldoni, of the Revere Police, heads up the Youth Academy.

"We're addressing issues that today's youth are facing, social media, substance abuse, gang prevention, things of that nature," Oldoni said. "We're looking to build healthy relationship with the kids in the community and the agencies that are serving them."

Interim Police Chief James Guido said he hopes the program continues for many years to come.

"You can see that the kids love the program. It's money well spent and we hope to expand it," Guido said.

Thanks to additional grant monies the children were able to go on more field trips this year.

ments are been done.

"Our region has a microclimate that's a little different than the rest of the state. Rain fall amounts make a difference too," she said.

One area always a concern for Revere and Winthrop officials is the Belle Isle Marsh, which had swarms of mosquitos last summer.

"We've been doing regular treatments down there and all salt marsh areas with a bacterial product," Foss said.

She explained that the traps were light, not many mosquitos. She added that there had been some residential complaints from Revere coming, but nothing unusual.

"Some of the tidal areas, with the rain and high tides we've been getting some hatching and some places we can't reach because the fragilities are tall," Foss said.

No triple E or West Nile Virus has been detected in the district, which includes Revere, Winthrop and Lynn. Although one case of triple E

in a human has been reported statewide

"This is sort of a mixed year so I don't know what to expect," Foss said. "We are seeing activity in the areas where there are cat tails and a lot of the mosquito populations are rebounding because the drought years have ended, and rebounding to a normal level."

Foss said there was such a cold late spring that it delayed a lot of mosquito activity.

Any resident in Lynn and Revere can contact Northeast Massachusetts Mosquito Control directly and request a spraying. In Winthrop the call must go through the health department.

"From now until heavy frost, people should be aware there is mosquito-borne illness and they should be wear-impies when they are outdoors," Foss said.

Avoid Mosquito Bites

Apply Insect Repellent when Outdoors. Use a repellent with DEET (N, N-diethyl-m-toluamide), permethrin, picaridin (KBR 3023), oil of lemon eucalyptus [p-methane 3, 8-diol (PMD)], or IR3535 according to the instructions on the product label. DEET products should not be used on infants under two months of age and should be used in concentrations of 30% or less on older children. Oil of lemon eucalyptus should not be used on children under three years of age.

Be Aware of Peak Mosquito Hours. The hours from dusk to dawn are peak biting times for many mosquitos. Consider rescheduling outdoor activities that occur during evening or early morning.

Clothing Can Help Reduce Mosquito Bites. Wear long-sleeves, long pants, and socks when outdoors to help keep mosquitos away from your skin.

Mosquito-Proof Your Home

Drain Standing Water. Mosquitos lay their eggs in standing water. Limit the number of places around your home for mosquitos to breed by either draining or discarding items that hold water. Check rain gutters and drains. Empty any unused flowerpots and wading pools, and change water in birdbaths frequently.

Install or Repair Screens. Keep mosquitos outside by having tightly-fitting screens on all of your windows and doors.

Protect Your Animals

Animal owners should reduce potential mosquito breeding sites on their property by eliminating standing water from containers such as buckets, tires, and wading pools - especially after heavy rains. Water troughs provide excellent mosquito breeding habitats and should be flushed out at least once a week during the summer months to reduce mosquitos near paddock areas. Horse owners should keep horses in indoor stalls at night to reduce their risk of exposure to mosquitos. Owners should also speak with their veterinarian about mosquito repellents approved for use in animals and vaccinations to prevent WNV and EEE. If an animal is diagnosed with WNV or EEE, owners are required to report to DAR, Division of Animal Health by calling 617-626-1795 and to the Department of Public Health (DPH) by calling 617-983-6800.

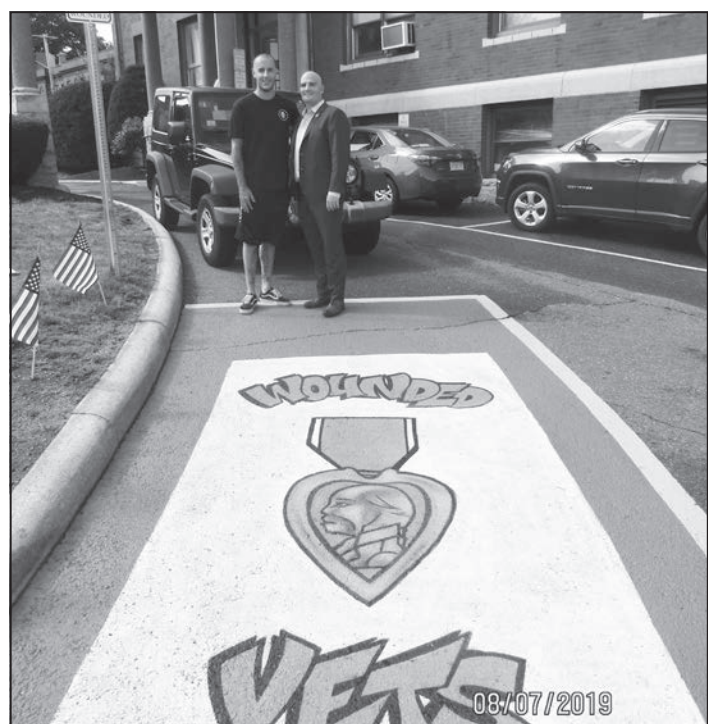

THREE ARRESTED AFTER SHOTS FIRED

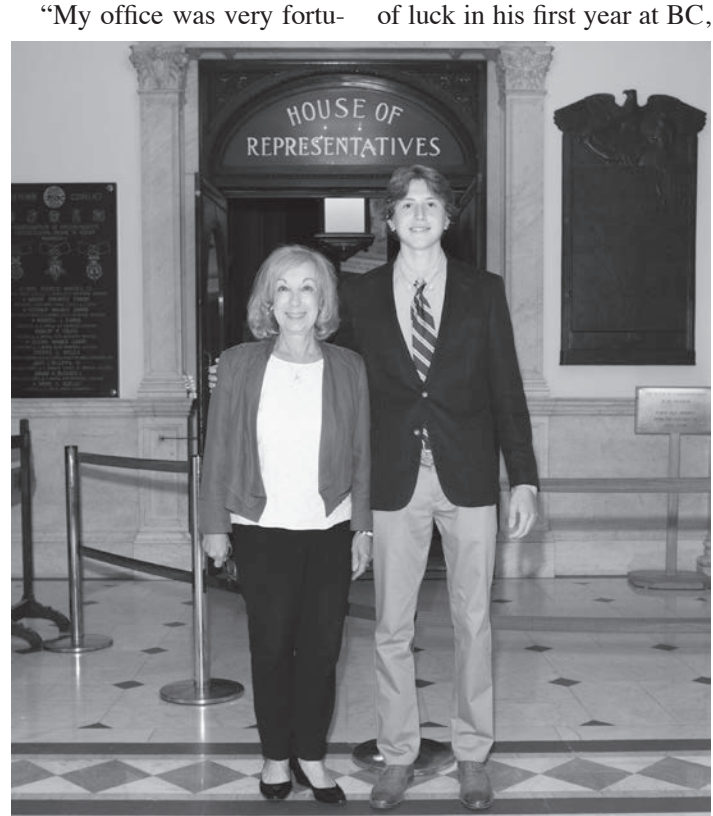

READING IN YOUR 'FREE' TIME Little Libraries debut throughout Revere

The Little Free Libraries program in Revere is off and running in 17 different locations in the city.

Mayor Brian Arrigo joined Project Manager Elle Baker and some of the key contributors to the program during a ceremony held at Gibson Park.

Revere residents are able to obtain free books from the colorful boxes that are situated mostly at parks but also at other sites such as the American Legion on Broadway and the Prospect House on Reservoir Avenue.

The idea is for residents of all ages to share books with

their friends and neighbors by taking a book or leaving one for someone to find.

Baker said the project began in October when Margo Johnson and Kathleen Heiser, president of the Beachmont Improvement Committee, approached her about launching a citywide Little Free Libraries program.

"The first two libraries were installed in the Shirley Avenue area [by Rachid and Kristen Janjar] and that was their inspiration to bring it citywide," said Baker. "It was with Margo and Kathleen's idea and drive that we were able to all work together. We applied for some funding through the Revere Cultural

Council and luckily we were awarded the funds."

Interestingly Baker's daughter, Victoria, was the artist for the Gibson Park book box.

Mayor Arrigo said it has been "incredible" to watch the process go from idea to installation.

"To watch everyone take their time and energy to make these Little Libraries go from blank slates to beautiful pieces of artwork - I'm thankful to the people who took the time and effort to do the work and make these a reality," said Arrigo.

Arrigo thanked the program's key contributors,

saying that "projects like the Little Libraries epitomize the work that people do every day to make the city a better place."

The mayor also credited Elle Baker for spearheading the effort on behalf of the city. "Elle has been tremendous in finding great ideas and then making sure the ideas move forward and get done. This park [Gibson Park renovations] is one small thing that Elle has done. She's made such an imprint in the city in our green spaces and things like the Little Libraries."

Heiser noted the important contribution of Margo Johnson in moving the idea forward

and collaborating with Elle Baker on writing the successful grant application.

Heiser said that her son, Charlie Benjamin, and his friend, Ray Crimmins, built ten of the boxes. Heiser and School Committee member Carol Tye donated the five additional boxes.

Heiser also lauded Mayor Arrigo, who "was 100 percent behind the Little Free Library Project and made space available at City Hall to collect and stockpile donated books."

Margo Johnson said simply, "It's an honor to be part of the Little Free Library project. I went to see Elle and she believed in me, took it to the

city, and the city made it happen."

Kristen Janjar and her daughter, Nora Janjar attended the ceremony. Nora painted the book box that is located at the Susan B. Anthony school complex. Kristen said she was excited to see the program expand citywide.

"We built it and installed the first Little Library at Sandler Square and the second one on Shirley Avenue and it's been going really well ever since," said Kristen. "And now they're putting in 15 more [libraries] and it's exciting. We started something new."

NEWS FROM AROUND THE REGION

COUNCIL RECEIVES RFP FOR BUILDING

CHELSEA - City Manager Tom Ambrosino has forwarded a draft Request for Proposals (RFP) to the City Council for review and possible approval when the body reconvenes in late summer.

The Salvation Army building was taken by the City after it went vacant and seemingly had no viable plans. It is a key property in the City's hopes to revitalize the downtown, and the RFP from Ambrosino has been long in the coming.

Now, the bones of that five-page RFP have become public and the vision is a mixed-use, affordable housing project with a retail component. Ambrosino has suggested that the City apply for zoning relief to build 16 units on top of the existing store. That, he suggested, would reduce the cost for any developer that wins designation for the site.

"I'm happy we are making some progress, and I hope to have an RFP ready for advertisement in the Fall," he said.

The RFP explains that on the first floor, "the City envisions retail space that enlivens the streetscape, offers opportunities for small, locally owned businesses and entrepreneurs, and yields community benefits."

The City is hoping that there could be new construction on top of the existing one-story store, with an affordable housing or mixed-income approach. The RFP encourages developers to be creating in helping to solve the City's housing shortage and also bring life to what has been a troubled area for a long time.

"Projects shall aspire to increase the social and economic vitality of the central business district," read the RFP. "Searching for an innovative, exciting project, the City desires an architecturally attractive and lively project that will result in positive, cascading effects throughout the central business district, while providing an inviting and alluring atmosphere for residents and the community."

The RFP calls for a robust community process from any developer that wins the right

to develop the property.

Also, the sale price has been suggested to be somewhere around \$1.34 million, which was the appraised value in 2017.

An exciting process to complement the downtown initiatives are expected this fall.

BACK TO SCHOOL CELEBRATION PLANNED

CHELSEA - When do you know it's almost time to go back to school?

When Yolanda Valles, parent liaison at the Mary C. Burke Elementary Complex, announces the date of Chelsea's annual Back to School Celebration.

"The Chelsea Public Schools is hosting this event on Thursday, Aug. 22 at the Williams School," reported Valles about the 18th annual kickoff to the school year.

All Chelsea students and their families are invited to the celebration, which is free of charge. There will be amusements, including bouncy houses, face painting, hula hoops, and slime making. Also on tap are a disc jockey and live musical performances.

Dr. Mary Bourque, superintendent of Chelsea public schools, will be attendance, as will administrators and teacher from all the local schools.

The event annually draws a tremendous crowd. Chelsea's, Pollo Campero, and Kayem will be providing food for all the guests.

Assisting Valles in the coordination of the event are Krishell Orellana, ELC parent liaison, Marlene Garcia, middle schools parent liaison, Daniel Mojica, parent information center director, and Jay Velez, Chelsea High School parent liaison.

Valles suggests that families consider walking or taking public transportation to the event as street parking is limited.

Mojica said that approximately 6,500 students will enroll in the Chelsea schools for the coming school year. He offered thanks to Dr. Bourque, who is retiring at the end of the year.

"Dr. Bourque has been fully supportive of the parent liaisons program," said Mojica. "She has been 100 percent supportive of not only the liaisons but the back-to-school celebration and so has the entire central office."

"I hope everyone can make it to our kickoff celebration," concluded Valles, herself a proud product of the Chelsea schools.

ZBA APPROVES SPECIAL PERMIT

EVERETT - The local Seventh Day Adventist Church could soon have a new home on Vernal Street.

Last week, the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) approved a special permit allowing the church to add a first-floor addition and a partial second floor to the existing building at 18 Vernal St.

"The second story will be over the right side of the building and will be strictly for administrative space," said attorney Andrew Delory, who represented the church.

Delory said the additions will be an upgrade for the building and the neighborhood, and provide a new home for the Seventh Day Adventist's approximately 60 active parishioners.

Until a year ago, the building at 18 Vernal St. was a functioning church, but Delory said that due to wear and tear, it was not the most aesthetically pleasing site. The proposed renovations also include new windows, a small steeple, and a handicap accessible entrance.

"The applicant's intent is to fit into the neighborhood, not overtake it," said Delory.

Several parishioners asked the ZBA to grant the special permit allowing for the additions, stating the improved building would provide a home for the church and allow them to better support their church and the community.

"We are trying to make a home for our future, and we are looking to open up more to the community and reach our young people," said Elden Lainez, who has been a member of the church since 2001.

The ZBA unanimously approved the special permit,

although member Joseph DeSisto did have some questions about parking on the site.

Delory noted that while parking did not fall under the purview of the ZBA granting the special permit, the applicants have been looking at ways to ease parking concerns near the church.

In other business, the ZBA granted a variance that will allow the Short Path Distillery on Kelvin Street to apply for an entertainment license.

Jackson Hewlett, one of the distillery's founders, said he is looking for the ability to play recorded music and have a television at the craft cocktail tasting room.

The ZBA also granted a variance allowing a single-family house on Winthrop Street to be converted back to a two-family home, and granted a variance allowing for an addition and garage at a house on Rock Valley Avenue.

The meeting was also the first with Mary Gerace chairing the board, as former chair DeSisto and member Richard Zullo served their last meeting as board members.

WHITSONS TO REPLACE ARAMARK IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

EVERETT - On Aug. 1, the Everett School Committee held a special meeting to discuss a major change in the Everett Public Schools (EPS), the end of a 26-year relationship with school cafeteria food and staff provider Aramark.

In attendance were School Committee members: Chair Thomas Abruzzese, Marcony Almeida-Barros, Millie Cardello, David Ela, Joseph LaMonica and Frank Parker, who also chairs the Subcommittee on Cafeterias.

For nearly three decades, EPS contracted with Aramark to provide cafeteria food and workers to the district. Now a new company, Whitsons Culinary Group, is taking over.

EPS first entered into a contract with Aramark 26 years ago. The contract had been extended several times. Having exhausted their rollover years, the district was required by law to put out a public bid for new contracts. Aramark

and Whitsons both responded to these bids in June, with Whitsons coming out on top.

Aramark's contract officially expired on August 1 after a series of 30-day extensions.

"The relationship with Aramark has been very strong," said Parker to Independent. "But because of the laws, we had to go out and rebid the contract."

School Committee members evaluated the companies' bids based on a rubric of 10 criteria in the categories of meals, customer service and experience, and program management. Whitsons scored a 57 out of 70 possible points, while Aramark came in just under that at 55 out of 70.

Whitsons is a family-owned business founded in 1979 and based in Long Island, N.Y. With more than 3,000 employees, their mission is "enhancing life one meal at a time."

Specific language written into the contract with Whitsons guarantees that the cafeteria workers who were previously employed by Aramark can continue in their positions if they so choose. The language preserves workers' school locations, job titles, salaries and benefits.

Parker admitted that he understood how the change could be difficult for some people to stomach.

"It's been a hectic year for the schools," he said. "The last thing everyone wanted to change was the food service, because it wasn't broken."

But Parker wants the public to know that the Subcommittee on Cafeterias, which also includes School Committee members David Ela and Allen Panarese, will be fully involved in the transition from Aramark to Whitsons.

"Both [Ela and Panarese] have been in healthcare for over 40 years," Parker said. "They understand the importance of good nutrition and they're more than capable to aid in this transition."

Whitsons is currently meeting with Aramark cafeteria workers and inviting them to meetings with its HR department and transition team.

"We're going to make sure the employees are reached

out to, feel secure and have stability in their jobs moving forward," said Parker.

City Councillor Michael McLaughlin, who was in attendance at the meeting, expressed his disappointment with the end of the Aramark contract.

"It was sad seeing a company that has been in our community 20 years mistreated," he told Independent. "I believe that this issue was much larger than the school lunch program."

Aramark had the contract in place under the former Supt. Fred Foresteire, who resigned under a cloud of allegations of misconduct last year and has been criminally charged in Malden District Court (His next appearance is this Thursday, Aug. 8). Some have suggested that the Aramark contract was just another cog in the Foresteire machinery, which the City is now trying to distance itself from.

The councillor wanted assurance that Whitsons would "provide the same high-quality [meals] to the students as they received with Aramark."

ARRESTS MADE IN SEX TRAFFICKING

EAST BOSTON - Two individuals from East Boston as well as seven others from surrounding communities were arrested last week by State Police at three residential locations in East Boston, Chelsea and Lynn that served as alleged fronts for human trafficking.

Attorney General Maura Healey made the announcement that Marlon Nagano, 37, of East Boston and Fabian Galeano, 40, of East Boston were both charged with Trafficking of Persons for Sexual Servitude, Deriving Support from Prostitution and Conspiracy to Commit Trafficking.

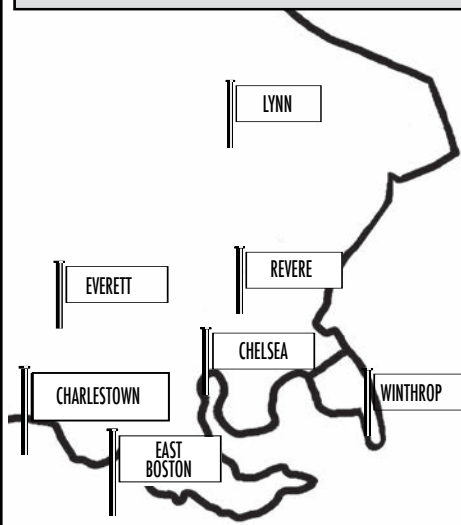

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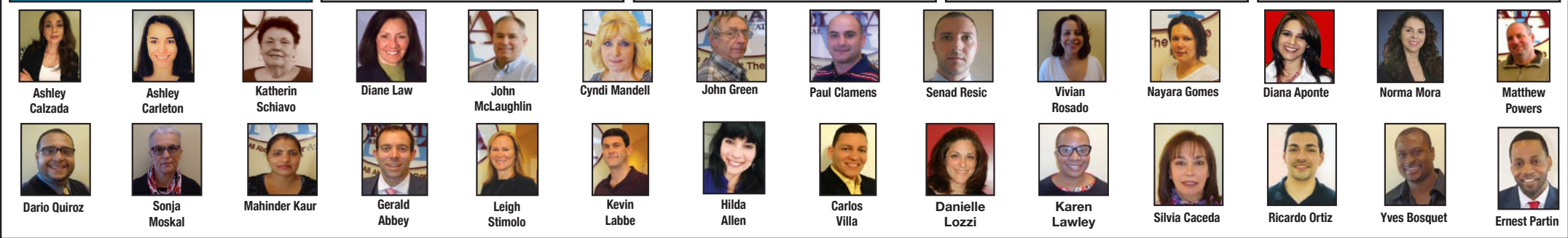

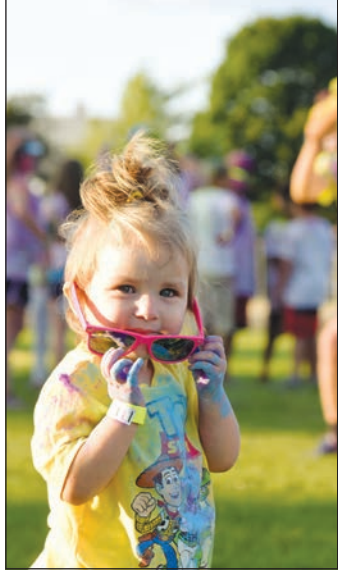
