

Council votes to send a letter to Wheelabrator on emissions

Acting on a motion by Councillor-at-Large Jessica Giannino, the City Council voted by a 10-1 margin to send a letter to the Department of Environmental Protection, requesting that Wheelabrator, Saugus, be held to the same emission standards as all other incinerators in the state.

Giannino stated in her motion that Wheelabrator has been the only incinerator to ask for a special

Councillor-at-Large Anthony Zambuto cast the lone dissenting vote, saying

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Due to the Monday, Oct. 14, Columbus Day holiday, trash will be delayed by one day Capitol Waste Services, Inc

that the letter was "a moot point."

"Since Wheelabrator opened 25 years ago, they have been operating at 185 parts per million on emissions," said Zambuto. "The standard right now is 205 parts per million. The DEP is now getting ready to implement a new standard of 150 parts per million. So they've issued a conditional permit to Wheelabrator continue functioning up there. And as part of that permit, the rule is that Wheelabrator has to comply with the 150 parts per million standard. If they don't, they won't be allowed to operate. So this letter to DEP that was approved tonight, it's a moot point. I absolutely support 150 parts per million as the

Revere, Chelsea and Winthrop working on regional approaches to health priorities

Revere, Chelsea, and Winthrop have come together in an unprecedented collaboration to identify and address their most urgent health concerns. What they've come up with relates to social, economic, and environmental factors that are known to have significant impacts on a person's health status. Housing affordability and availability, economic stability and mobility, and behavioral health, including youth mental health, have been prioritized through the first-ever integrated Community Health Needs Assessment (iCHNA), a year-long process bringing together hospitals and social service agencies serving the region, municipal departments, and, most importantly, residents and

than 2,000 people in the three communities were involved in the just-released iCHNA report.

Along with community members, participants in the project included Massachusetts General Hospital, Cambridge Health Alliance, Beth Israel Deaconess HealthCare, MelroseWakefield Healthcare, East Boston Neighborhood Health Center, Community Action Programs Inter-City, North Suffolk Mental Health Association and The Neighborhood Developers. Mass General's Center for Community Health Improvement provided coordination and data analysis for the effort.

multi-provider, The multi-community assessment was undertaken at the request of Revere Mayor Brian Arrigo, Chelsea City

and Winthrop Town Manager Austin Faison to gain a more comprehensive understanding of the region's health needs and identify opportunities to work together to address them. "We appreciated the willingness of all the service providers to work in tandem with our three municipalities so we could all be on the same page as far as understanding how best to respond to current needs," said City Manager Ambrosino.

Assessment leaders focused on the impacts of what are now called "social determinants of health," factors such as housing affordability and safety, economic stability, social inclusion, air and water quality, food security and access to transportation, recognizing that where one

Manager Tom Ambrosino, lives, works, learns and plays are key influencers of wellbeing. They also took steps to ensure that the voices of population segments that are sometimes hidden or stigmatized were captured. "We realize that social determinants involve big, complex issues," said Mayor Arrigo, "but in working together, we can have positive impacts by building on good work already being done locally or developing new initiatives to meet the challenges."

> Collecting data and identifying priority health needs of the three communities is just the first step. Working groups will be creating a community health improvement plan, or CHIP, to help guide health care providers and municipal officials in program planning and action over the next

three years and beyond. "Our communities each have different populations and challenges," said Town Manager Faison, "but there are shared issues like adolescent mental health and air quality that may lend themselves to regional approaches and we look forward to collaborations with our neighbors in Revere and Chelsea." The working groups expect to have the CHIP plan, including shortterm and longer-term initiatives, completed by the end of the year.

The North Suffolk Public Health Collaborative was established in 2016 by three adjacent communities - the City of Revere, the City of Chelsea, and the Town of Winthrop - to identify priority public health challenges and opportunities to work together in addressing them. Powers advocates for new commercial development for Bell Circle

Ward 5 Councillor John Powers said he has been in meetings with Paul Kneeland, president and chief executive officer of Channel Building Company of Wilmington, about a proposal to put two brand new buildings on the site of the current Bank of America branch and Enterprise Car Rental office in Bell Circle.

Powers said it was Kneeland who helped transform the previous site at Bell Circle into a vibrant commercial district that also includes the nearby Revere branch of the state Registry of Motor Vehicles, located at 9 Everett St.

"It wasn't an attractive



ing Company President and CEO Paul Kneeland, who is proposing to demolish the Bank of America and Enterprise Rental Car branch offices and replace them with new

site, to be honest," recalled Powers about the unsightly appearance of Bell Circle in the 1990s. "There were old garages and auto body shops that had sat there

for years. Today, thanks to Paul's vision, we have a district that is beneficial to the city of Revere."

Powers said he has reviewed Kneeland's current plans that involve the demolition of the current Bank of America building and the construction of a brand-new Bank of America building.

"It's going to be a new building with a glass façade a real attractive building,"

said Powers. "He [Kneeland] also intends to expand the parking lot and make it easier for bank customers in motor vehicles to enter and exit."

The second phase of the project, according to Powers, will be the demolition of the Enterprise Car Rental building and the construction of a brand-new building at that site.

"These are the positive things that we want to see happening in Revere," said Powers, noting the two sites are located in Ward 5. "I've supported Mr. Kneeland's Bell Circle project in the past and I intend to support his new plan that will further transform Bell Circle. He is an outstanding developer who has already demonstrated his commitment to our city."


The Bell Circle bank building proposal will be going before the Site Plan Review Committee soon.





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

Ribbon-cutting ceremony held for veterans housing complex on Shirley Avenue

Gov. Charlie Baker and Massachusetts Department of Veterans' Service Secretary joined Mayor Brian Arrigo, Veterans Service Officer Marc Silvestri and city officials for a ribbon-cutting ceremony for the new veterans housing complex located at the corner of Shirley and Nahant Avenue.

Ward 2 Councillor Ira Novoselsky, co-chair of the Revere Veterans Committee, delivered the opening remarks at the Oct. 3 ceremony.

Novoselsky said the site was the former home to the Congregration Tifereth Israel synagogue.

"When the building was sold, I reached out to Lou Markakis of Lynnway Associates (of Revere), who searched to find the right people (to develop the property), and that is Rising Communities of Lynn," said Novoselsky.

"Today, we say Shalom [hello] to a 30-unit veterans preference housing complex with commercial space on the first floor," said Novoselsky. "We will have the Revere Police sub-station and a café with outdoor seating."

Mayor Arrigo congratulated Novoselsky, the other elected officials, Silvestri, Markakis, the Nakasian family and Rising Communities "for your efforts to develop this site into an attractive building that serves a noble purpose."

"To the veterans who live here and will live here in the years to come, the City of Revere thanks you for your valiant service to the United States, and we welcome you as residents of our city," said Arrigo. "This building continues the honorable legacy of its location. For 105 years, this corner of Shirley Avenue and Nahant Avenue was a centerpiece of Revere's thriving Jewish community. As the site of a neighborhood police station, it also represents safety and security for everyone on Shirley Avenue.

"And most important, this site will be home for men and women who wore the uniform of the United

States military in service to our country," said Arrigo.

Gov. Baker, who said that Massachusetts is second to none in the United States in its services, support and care for veterans, called the new housing complex for veterans "a great day for Revere, a great day for Shirley Avenue, and a great day for the Commonwealth's commitment to its veterans."

"This is a great example of having all sorts of folks who are a part of this community working together to come up with a terrific solution for what will be 30 homeless veterans who have a chance to live in this wonderful facility in this great neighborhood," said Baker. "To all of you, congratulations on behalf of the Commonwealth, thank you."

Urena, a United States Marine Corps veteran, said, "Today is a very special day, a way of saying and signifying that the commitment of Revere stands behind its veterans."

Urena thanked Novoselsky and the members of the synagogue's congregation for "standing by their commitment to standing behind veterans. I want to give all the members of this congregation a great round of applause."

"Permanent support housing is the key to ending veterans' homelessness," said Urena. "These 30 units of housing continue to set an example of how to do it right. These 30 veterans are now your neighbors, your friends, leaders of this community."

Markakis, president of Lynnway Associates a broker associate at Century 21 North East, thanked Mayor Arrigo for "his leadership and vision and understanding the rich history of Shirley Avenue and its importance to the overall quality of life in Revere."

He also thanked Bob O'Brien, director of strategic planning and economic development for Revere, Attorneys Gerry D'Ambrosio and Cory Rhoades and Sam Vitale, Gov. Baker, Sec. Urena, Novoselsky, and the Nakasian family for their efforts.

"I want to thank Ira Novoselsky for having the faith and confidence and trust in me to help pick these developers, and at the end of the day, it was really not hard - I looked for the guys who wanted to do something for their community, local guys wanted to do great things in a community that they love - the Nakasian family," said Markakis.

We promise that just being outside and taking in the natural world in the crisp air, away from the noise of our daily lives, will do wonders for our emotional and physical well-being.

We wish all of our readers a joyful - and stress-free -Columbus Day weekend.

NEW COORS AD GLORIFIES PROBLEM DRINKING

"The official beer of Saturday morning," is the reprehensible (and that's the only word that comes to mind) tag line for a new TV ad for Coors Light beer that appeared during the football games two weekends ago.

The ad depicts two roommates in their early to mid 20s who are preparing breakfast and then sit down on their couch to watch the football games while still clad in their pajamas.

They then break out the Coors Lights while eating breakfast and watching TV.

In our view, this ad represents a new low for a liquor in-

dustry that increasingly is targeting a younger and younger audience with messages that essentially equate having a good time with getting drunk. Right after the Coors ad came one for Budweiser's Plat-

inum Light beer. We did not know why it was called platinum so we looked it up. It turns out that regular Bud Light has an alcohol content of 4.2 percent, but Bud Platinum has an alcohol content of 6 percent.

Here's how Bud describes its Platinum product on its web site: "Platinum is back. And the memories are sure to follow. With a sleek new look and the same smooth, slightly sweet finish, it's time to kick your night off the right

way. The Platinum way." In other words, "kick your night off" is a euphemism for becoming inebriated faster. And what about this line: 'And the memories are sure to follow." Really?Drunken memories will be something to remember?

But the liquor industry is not the only one to blame. Universities also are now part and parcel of the problem of drawing-in underage drinkers. As the Wall Street Journal recently reported, a growing number of colleges are striking deals for in-stadium beer sales and sponsorships, in part to combat declining ticket sales.

The opioid crisis rightly has attracted national attention because of the number of overdose deaths attributable to drug abuse. However, the harm to individuals and society in general caused by drugs, legal and illegal, still pales in comparison to the harm caused by alcohol abuse.

It is clear that the big liquor companies, aided and abetted by our universities, are trying to attract young people to their products. Given that the research definitively has shown that drinking before the age of 25 can harm the still-developing brain, and that drinking while in the teen years can increase the risks of alcoholism by five-fold, the time has come for our government to step in and regulate alcohol advertising similar to what occurred in the 1990s when the tide was turned against Big Tobacco, which clearly was targeting a youthful

audience with its Joe Camel and other advertising campaigns. If encouraging "Saturday morning" drinking is considered acceptable in liquor ads, what's next?

Our partnership with the State is vital for transportation relief

On Tuesday, Oct. 8, I submitted a testimony to the legislature's Joint Committee on Transportation to advocate for state funding and support for the construction of a commuter rail stop at Wonderland station, along with a "people mover" to shuttle commuter rail passengers to the Wonderland Blue Line station. I also advocated for a Blue Line - Red Line connection.

The legislature will act on Gov. Baker's multi-billion dollar transportation bond bill. Everyone, at every level of government, understands the reality that traffic and congestion is a regional problem driven to the greatest extent by the booming regional economy. Every community knows there is no quick fix, and we, along with the Massachusetts Department of Transportation, and the MBTA, are committed to thoughtful, effective measures to address traffic.

Our city's growth indicates that Revere is keeping pace with the region's growth. This is imperative, lest our city becomes little more than a pass through to Boston or a collection of surface parking lots.

Addressing congestion requires innovative ideas along with maximizing the efficiency of existing infrastructure. As a hub of public transportation, Revere is uniquely situated to promote ideas that enhance public transit and offer some relief to the region's traffic issues.

To this end, my submis-

As Mayor of the City of Revere, I urge you to favorably consider two significant proposals that, when implemented, would conform to our objectives to reduce congestion and, simultaneously, improve public transit access from the North Shore to Boston/ Cambridge, Logan Airport and the future substantial advancements that are planned for the site of the former Suffolk Downs race track. These are 1) a commuter rail station at the Wonderland site, with an accessory "people mover" connection to the MBTA's Blue Line station at Wonderland, and 2) an MBTA Blue Line - Red Line link in downtown Boston.

As the Governor's recent study indicates, vehicular traffic in the Route 1A corridor and other major roadways that traverse the City of Revere are among the most congested in the Commonwealth. A traffic study commissioned earlier this year by my Administration determined that upwards of 95 percent of traffic travelling through Revere during peak hours enters from outside the City. This is

the northern terminus of the Blue Line-are situated in Revere. Commuters headed into Boston, and to Logan Airport, inevitably enter Revere.

The commuter rail from Boston to Rockport, with its stem to Newburyport, already passes directly through Revere. The advantages of constructing a station at Wonderland that will give thousands of North Shore residents convenient, single-transfer access to the MBTA Blue line are readily apparent. Future development in Revere at the former Necco site, at Wonderland, and Suffolk Downs will magnify both the demand for, and the wisdom of, a Wonderland commuter rail stop. By extension, the Blue Line - Red Line link augments the practical value of the Wonderland commuter rail

Boston's thriving economy generates countless benefits for the region. With that, however, come the hardships of long and frustrating commutes and enormous demands on the roadways. The measures I advocate today will allow more commuters to rely on public transportation, and that will produce a commensurable reduction in vehicular traffic along the clogged Route 1A corridor will ensue. These are "winwin" proposals that justify public investment for the future good of the Commonwealth.

Climate change is causing increased flooding in Revere's coastal neighborhoods and jeopardizing your home value

Recent research has shown that because of global temperature warming, the rate at which ice has melted in Greenland and Antarctica has tripled between 2012 and 2017. If this melting continues at its current rate, sea levels could rise dramatically in future years increasing flooding in the coastal areas of Revere. In Revere's coastal anytime neighborhoods, sea levels rise above 14.5 feet, with strong onshore winds and tidal surges, flooding occurs in many of the low-lying areas of our city. Furthermore, a recent study indicates that rising sea levels and flooding are costing Revere homeowners who live near the ocean thousands of dollars in lost home value due to costly and often times required, flood insurance, and the expectation of much more severe property losses likely to come.

We only have to look to the damage and destruction caused by the Blizzard of 1978 in Revere when the sea level rose to an elevation of 15.10 feet accompanied by a tidal surge and onshore winds gusting to 83 miles per hour, sending ocean waters crashing over Revere's beaches and seawalls flooding our coastal neighborhoods.

Between the years 2000 and 2017 the average frequency of high tide flooding in the United States has increased by 50 percent! In 2018 Revere was

slammed by two major Nor'easters. On January 4,2018 a "Bomb Cyclone"

feet causing neighborhood flooding and the shutdown of many roadways. Again on March 2, 2018 sea levels reached 14.67 feet resulting in further neighborhood flooding and the closing of many streets in Revere. Flooding and sea level

rise are a major problem for Revere, which deserves high priority status. I propose that the City of Revere establish an Office of Emergency Preparedness and Management whose primary responsibility will be to secure funding from the \$1.3 billion dollar GreenWorks Resilient Communities Investment Plan proposed by Speaker of the House Robert De-Leo and supported by Gov. Baker, to protect the Point of Pines, Riverside, and the adjoining neighboods of Revere Beach Boulevard and Beachmont.

While neighboring Cities and Towns have recently received over \$760,000 in state grants to protect their neighborhoods, Mayor Arrigo's administration is just getting started with a first stage-planning project, four years after he was elected mayor.

More distressing is the fact that Mayor rigo's administration has approved over 3,000 new apartments in flood prone area of our city, which will result in further problems for our community. When I served as Mayor, I proposed a 2-year moratorium to stop the construction of all new apartments until the City could evaluate the impact of new apartments on flooding, traffic congestion, new school construction and real estate taxes. Mayor Arrigo disregarded my proposal to stop new apartment construction and now, with over 3,000 new apartments about to be constructed in Revere, and upto 34,000 new vehicle trips each day about to flood and clog Revere's already overcrowded roadways, Mayor Arrigo now wants to develop a

"master plan" for Revere. When Mayor Arrigo had the opportunity to stop apartment development in Revere and conduct a master planning process back in 2015 by approving my moratorium proposal to stop apartment development, he ignored it.


The fact is, Mayor Arrigo's administration has supported and endorsed every apartment development proposed by the apartment developers and, his administration has given the apartment developers everything they wanted at the expense of Revere's neighborhoods.



RHS football team smothers Saugus; at English Saturday

The Revere High football team rolled to its fourth straight victory to remain undefeated with a runaway 40-13 romp at Saugus Saturday afternoon.

The Patriots asserted control of the contest from the outset -- the first play from scrimmage, to be precise -- with senior captain Jonathan Murphy taking a pitch-out on a jet sweep and rumbling 55 yards for a touchdown to make it 6-0 just seconds into the game.

Revere reached the Saugus end zone on the Patriots' next possession, with Murphy once again running to pay dirt, this time on a 35 yard inside isolation play.

Before the first quarter ended, Revere put together a long scoring drive, keyed by passes from quarterback Calvin Boudreau (who turned in another stellar effort with 10-for-16 passing for 130 yards) to captain Lucas Barbosa and Dillan Day, that was capped by a five yard TD burst by Joe

The Patriots upped their advantage in the second quarter when Llanos -- who once again turned in a monster game that added to his credentials for the NEC's Player of the Year honors -- ran back an interception 80 yards for a pick-six. The INT was set up by a big hit by RHS linebacker Bill Ginepra on the Saugus quarterback just as he was releasing the football. Llanos made a nice grab of the floating pigskin to stay inbounds and then scooted the length of the field up the sideline.

The Patriot defense accounted for its second touchdown of the game before the half ended when, after a sack by RHS linebacker Jonathan Tran put Saugus in a hole inside its own 10 yard line, Ginepra burst through for another hit on the Sachem quarterback, forcing a fumble that was recovered in the end zone for Revere's fifth

Saugus' lone moment of glory in the first two quarters occurred when a Sachem returned a kickoff for a touchdown, leaving matters at 34-7 at the intermission.

The second half proved more of the same. The Revere defense forced Saugus to turn the ball over on the initial possession of the second half and the offense embarked on a long drive, paced by strong running by Barbosa and Adetayo Attebbi, that culminated with Llanos scoring his third touchdown of the day from a few yards out.

RHS head coach Lou Cicatelli then turned to his reserves for the remainder of the contest. Saugus scored a meaningless TD late in the game for the 40-13 finale.

"Our offense put a lot of points on the scoreboard, but it was our defense that dictated the tempo of

Revere High School's Louis Cicatelli named Patriots High School Coach of the Week

With a 43-26 victory over Lynn Classical High School at Harry Della Russo Stadium, Revere High School's Louis Cicatelli has been named the New England Patriots High School Coach of the Week.

Cicatelli's Patriots remained undefeated and improved to 3-0 on the season behind a dominant offensive performance that featured touchdowns from five different players. The Patriots jumped out to an early lead after scoring on each of their first two possessions with 10-yard touchdown runs by both Jonathan Murphy and Zach Furlong. Following a fumble by Classical, quarterback Calvin Boudreau, who finished 8-of-15 for 104 yards, found Lucas Barbosa for a 22-yard touchdown strike to give Revere a commanding 20-0 lead.

While the Rams were able to cut that deficit to six early in the second half. Patriots senior running back Joe Llanos, who finished the night with 22 carries for 202 yards, took over with touchdown runs of 54 and 35 yards to keep Revere out front through the remainder of the game. Junior Rayan Riazi added to the scoring firepower with a 44-yard field goal, and iced the game by returning an onside kick attempt 55 yards for a touchdown with two minutes to play.

With the win, Revere sits atop the Central Division of the Northeastern Conference as the lone undefeated squad. They'll look to continue their winning ways next week with a matchup at Saugus next Saturday.

Patriots and Pro Football Hall of Fame linebacker Andre Tippett, now the team's executive director of community affairs, met

with the Revere players and coaching staff Tuesday afternoon to present the football program with a \$1,000 donation on behalf of the Patriots Foundation, in honor of Coach Cicatelli. The visit and check presentation will be featured on the Patriots weekly television show, "Patriots All Access," which airs on Friday night at 7 p.m. on WBZ-TV in Boston and will be available immediately after on Patriots.com.

This is the 24th year in which the Patriots have joined the National Football League in conducting the High School Coach of the Week program, which recognizes outstanding high school coaches and promotes youth football throughout New England. The 2019 season marks the ninth year that Tippett has taken the award on the road to visit the schools that ben-

efit from the program. "Coach Cicatelli's Patriots lived up to their namesake by displaying that type of offensive firepower on their way to remaining undefeated at 3-0," said Tippett. "They never let their foot off the gas throughout that game and showed the poise needed to close out a tough Classical squad. We wish the program the best in 2019 as they continue their pursuit of excellence.'

At the conclusion of the fall, one of the weekly winners will be named the New England Patriots High School Coach of the Year and will receive an additional \$2,000 contribution towards the school's football program.



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



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State Police forming Unresolved Case Unit

Massachusetts State Police Colonel Kerry A. Gilpin announced the creation of a statewide Unresolved Case Unit to investigate unsolved homicides and other violent crimes to seek justice for victims and their families

The new unit will be comprised of five Troopers who are experienced homicide investigators who will work in conjunction with the state's district attorneys, to maintain jurisdiction over homicides in their counties, and to identify open cases in which a renewed investigative focus may prove helpful. The Troopers will carry individual caseloads but will also work together frequently as a team, as warranted, to pursue leads and further investigations under the direction of the district attor-

ney of jurisdiction. "There are many cases over the years that, even in light of the outstanding and tireless efforts of police and prosecutors, have not been resolved for any of a variety of reasons. I hope that by creating a dedicated unit to focus the investigative skills of these experienced troopers, backed by forensic and other resources of the Massachusetts State Police, we will build upon the excellent work already done on these cases and, in conjunction with the district attorneys, achieve the breakthroughs we need to secure justice for these victims and their families," Colonel Gilpin said.

Creation of an Unresolved Case Unit has been a priority for Colonel Gilpin, who formerly served for many years in the Department's Crime Scene Services Section documenting and preserving evidence critical to homicide and other major crime prosecutions. Today's announcement follows numerous discussions Colonel Gilpin initiated with the state's district attorneys and victim advocacy professionals to explain her goals for the new unit and build a foundation for collaborative ef-

"After a homicide, surviving family members spend a lifetime seeking to understand their new existence without their loved one," said Liam Lowney, Executive Director of the Massachusetts Office for Victim Assistance, "Families whose cases remain unsolved struggle with additional questions about what happened to their loved one and who was responsible. While these families lives will remain forever changed, the dedicated

State Police detectives assigned to this unit will allow them an opportunity to learn answers to these unsettling questions."

The Massachusetts District Attorney's Association, through its president, Plymouth County District Attorney Timothy Cruz, also has expressed support for the new unit.

"This initiative was made possible through the ongoing support of the Baker-Polito Administration and the Executive Office of Public Safety and Security in our efforts to bring offenders to justice and support victims and survivors," Colonel Gilpin said.

The Department postopenings for sworn-members today and will interview interested applicants later this month. The unit's members will have investigative experience and professional relationships in different regions of the state to further the goal of a true statewide unit and ensure smooth integration with various prosecutorial offices. The Unresolved Case Unit will be part of the Department's Division of Investigative Services.

Former president of Revere League for Special Needs organization indicted for embezzlement

The former president of the Revere League for Special Needs has been indicted in connection with an embezzlement scheme in which she stole thousands of dollars from the organization for personal use, Attorney General Maura Healey announced.

Michelle DeMauro, 48, of Revere, was indicted last week by a Suffolk County Grand Jury on Larceny Over \$1,200 by Single Scheme (2 counts), Tax Evasion, Failure to Collect or Pay Tax, Keep Records or Supply Information (1 count), and Obtaining a Signature Under False Pretenses (2 counts). She will be arraigned in Suffolk Superior Court on October 16.

The AG's Office alleges that between March 2016

and April 2019, DeMauro used her position as president of the organization to embezzle more than \$42,000 in charitable funds that she used for personal expenses, including home improvement projects, electronics, concert tickets, cash withdrawals, and gift cards. The AG's Office also alleges that DeMauro made some personal purchases using the charity's tax-exempt status to avoid paying

sales tax to the state.

These charges are allegations, and the defendant is presumed innocent until proven guilty.

proven guilty.

The Revere League for Special Needs is an organization that aims to "promote the general welfare of children and adults with special

needs in the home, church,

school, or community." All staff of the Revere League are volunteers who donate their time to hold events and activities for members of the organization and do not receive any compensation for their work. The Revere League's other board members fully cooperated and assisted with the AG's investigation.

This matter is being prosecuted by Assistant Attorney General Gretchen Brodigan, of AG Healey's White Collar and Public Integrity Division, and Sallyann Nelligan, Chief of the AG's Financial Investigations Division. The Massachusetts State Police provided valuable assistance to this investigation.

MYSTIC BREWERY CLOSES DOORS

CHELSEA - The Mystic Brewery's entrance into Chelsea was as sudden and unexpected as its exit - which was announced suddenly by owner Bryan Greenhagen on Friday, Sept. 27.

The Brewery was one of the first in what has become a popular movement of local beer brewers hosting customers in tap rooms. Mystic blazed a trail in that movement in Chelsea, and so it was with shock that many absorbed the news from the City's cornerstone establishment.

"We are sad to share the news today that Mystic Brewery has decided to discontinue brewing operations and intends to wind things down over the next few weeks," wrote Greenhagen on Facebook Sept. 27. "During this time we will be celebrating what our brewery has accomplished by releasing some final batches, special beers, and selling off our beer archive as well as selling off all of our barrels to the public ... All of us at Mystic extend our eternal gratitude to everyone who helped us and supported us in our mission to change beer culture for the better in Boston and beyond...Personally, I am very proud of the many Mystic alumni going on to their own success as well as the incredible team of great people we have now. We are sad to wind down our

work here, but we are proud of what we accomplished and know in our hearts that the impact of Mystic will remain long after the doors are closed."

Greenhagen didn't respond to an inquiry for further explanation from the Record, but let the Facebook post stand on its own.

City Manager Tom Ambrosino said it was a place for Chelsea residents to come and be social, and it would be missed.

"I was saddened to hear about the closing," he said. "It was a place many residents and visitors enjoyed, myself included."

Edson Coimbra, one of the founders of Ciao! Pizza, said his store and Mystic Brewery were aligned closely - from serving one another's products to being on the same page for the renaissance of Chelsea.

"No doubt this a big loss for Chelsea," said Coimbra. "It added tremendous value to our community. It is/was a meeting point for many community-focused events, bringing us all together. Their customers became

our customers and vice versa. Ciao! Pizza and Mystic Beer were a love story made in Chelsea. Mystic will be missed."

One of the revelations regarding breweries that first became apparent in Mystic was that people not only wanted their beer, but also they wanted to come to the brewery to drink it. That gave birth to the tap room idea that started in the area at Mystic, and then like wildfire spread to each and every new brewery in the market.

And beyond the tap room concept, Mystic was one of the first to discover that customers wanted to hold special events and functions at the brewery - something Greenhagen once said he could have never predicted, but certainly was ready to embrace.

Dog rescue events, political times, economic development showcases, and even wedding parties took place at Mystic.

However, one key event for Chelsea was the Chel-Yea! Meet-up group that formed more than five years and found a monthly home at the Brewery. Dan Cortez and Matt

Frank were two key figures in the Chel-Yea movement, and both were shocked to see that their home base was no longer.

"Mystic Brewery has hosted Chel-yea for close to five and a half years," said Cortez. "It is not just the place where the event happens, it's integral to its success. I think Chel-yea could be successful in other places, but it's going to be very difficult to replicate the charm, the generosity, and the overall good vibes from not only the venue, but also its staff, management and ownership."

He added that Mystic became a place for people to gather, and it will be hard to find another place like that.

"Mystic is not only a great brewery, but also it has become a favored community spot, something really important to a lot of people," he said. "We started Chel-yea partly because there was a lack of those types of spaces. If you met someone that you hoped to run into again, this became the place that made that possible. Now it's not uncommon to hear someone say, 'Meet me at Mystic.' It's sad that soon we will no longer be able to do that."

Frank said it was a community spot the City was lucky to have while it last-

"They did so much for the community and the community has embraced them," he said. "They were at the top of the movement before there were so many breweries. In my opinion, the brewing scene is now oversaturated. I think of respect them for notifying everyone in advance. It's not often you have 19 days advance notice when your favorite business is closing...I think the completely would have been completely devastated if they had just hung up a closed sign. We at least get to say good-bye. They weren't just people brewing beer. They were part of the com-

munity. "I think a lot of Chelsea pride is being lost, but it's pride we were lucky to have in the first place," he continued.

CITY COULD BUY POPE JOHN HIGH SITE FOR HOUSING

EVERETT - Mayor Carlo DeMaria said late last week that he intends to pursue the idea of buying the shuttered Pope John High School on upper Broadway for the purpose of turning it into affordable senior and veteran housing.

The mayor said the property would have to be purchased with City funds, and he would need to win Council support, but the opportunity is one he doesn't want to pass up.

"Pope John is on the market," he said. "We have a lot of charter schools who may try to buy it and expand. Charter schools are good for education, but they also hurt cities and towns. There is an opportunity here for us...I look at it as a neighborhood to build senior and veteran housing. We're in the early stages right now."

DeMaria said the area is just right for such a proposal, as it's not a heavily commercial area and it's near existing senior housing and open space. He said there aren't many opportunities to purchase large amounts of land right on Broadway, and this could be a good

He said the way it would work is the City could purchase the property, and then put out an RFP in the hopes that community development corporations - such as TND or others - would respond with a project. He said he hopes that they can put an Everett preference on the units in any such development, perhaps as much as 100 percent Everett preference.

"A lot of seniors want to get out of a larger house and stay in the city," he said. "Maybe this could be an opportunity for them."

Councilor Michael Mc-Laughlin said he would support such a project and expenditure, similar to his early support for the TND St. Therese Church project.

"I strongly believe any action we as a community can take to bring affordable housing into our community and help keeping our seniors and middle-income residents living in our community is something I am fully committed to doing," he said. "When I heard of Mayor DeMaria's plan to buy Pope John High School on Broadway and turn it into a fully affordable housing development, I was 100 percent in favor of the idea. Mayor DeMaria can count on my vote for this development."

There are few details, but DeMaria said the opportunity is there now, and he would be bringing the idea around soon.

"It could be significant City dollars spent to preserve it, but I think it would be money well spent to house veterans and seniors," he said.

COUNCIL SEEKS MORE ACTION ON RAT PROBLEM EVERETT - On Mon-

day, Sept. 23, the Council heard from the Assistant City Solicitor Keith Slattery regarding the City's approach to managing the rodent problem in Everett. By and large, councilors were disappointed with the response and urged the City to do more. Council first raised the

issue at their meeting on Sept. 3, where they called for a representative of the City to appear at their next meeting to provide an update on rodent control ini-

Slattery said that in the wake of complaints to the Inspectional Services De-

partment from residents

and Summer streets, the City had utilized a seasonal information campaign to educate the public. This included passing out fliers emphasizing the importance of properly storing garbage outdoors, sealing bins, and managing overgrowth that could lead to nesting. The Assistant City Solicitor reported that complaint calls have since de-

on Devine, Ferry, Irving

However, councilors expressed that the problem was larger in scope than just the streets mentioned and that it warranted a citywide strategy. Councilor Wayne Matewsky cited Bolster, Elm, Estes, George and Paris streets specifically, saying a neighbor on George Street "couldn't let his grandchild into the yard to play" for fear of a rat encounter.

Councilor Michael Mc-Laughlin added that he has received calls from residents on the hills opposite the hospital, like Alpine, Richdale and Rosedale with "concerns of increase in rodent activity over the last few months.'

"It is something that we've all received calls on," echoed Councilor Fred Capone. Councilors also suggest-

ed that managing the rodent problem at the level of residential garbage disposal wasn't getting to the root of the problem. "This is a problem that

giving out fliers to residents isn't solving," said Councilor Peter Napolitano. "Keeping barrels closed is not going to do a thing. We're not doing anything physically to curb the rodent population."

"In 62 years of living in the city, I've only seen an excess of rats in the past four years," he continued. "The City is not fixing this problem."

One possible explanation for the rise in rodents is the increase in new construction projects in Everett over the past half-decade. Digging into the earth displaces underground rodent populations, forcing them to the surface.

Slattery mentioned the ordinance proposed by Councilor John McKinnon that requires all contractors to set rat traps around any new construction sites. However, councilors wondered what the oversight process was to ensure that developers were complying with the ordinance. They also suggested that the City should take on baiting and not leave it up to contrac-

"We have to do something," said Councilwoman Rosa DiFlorio. "We have to get rats under control and then we have to educate people what to do. Are we going to wait until a child gets bit before we move on

The Councilwoman suggested transferring money into a special department to take on the situation.

Slattery suggested that Council speak to the Everett Board of Health about initiating a public eradication effort and to research rodent control options in neighboring urban areas. "Based on the calls

we're getting, the common remedies are effective right now," he said. "You're not going to see a [total] absence of rats." Councilor Capone said

that the City could come up with some ways to curb the rodent population that would not cost the city money, such as putting more pressure and oversight on construction sites and increasing dumpster

pickups. Overflowing dumpsters are known to attract rodents. Residents in Rome,

Italy, are currently dealing

with a dumpster overflow

crisis, which has led to rats invading people's homes.

The Council asked the Assistant City Solicitor to return at the second meeting in November with a report outlining the City's options for getting to the root of the rodent problem.

EAST BOSTON - The Boston Centers for Youth & Families, and the City of Boston's Public Facilities Department hosted a community meeting at the Paris Street Community Center regarding the upcoming renovations to the Paris Street Pool.

Mayor Martin Walsh earmarked \$8.9 million for the rehab and construction of the Paris Street Pool across from the Paris Street Gym. The Gym recently underwent a \$14 million overhaul and the pool's rehab will compliment the new state-of-the-art gym and community center. When the pool was first

built, it featured a glass roof, sliding doors that looked out onto the Paris Street playground, as well as a veranda so residents could enjoy a swim and then sit outside during the hot summer months. The pool underwent an overhaul under then Mayor Kevin White due to constant vandalism of the glass roof and glass doors. The pool was encased in cement blocks and now looks more like a bomb shelter than a community pool.

The plan, according to the city is to restore the pool back to its original glory and strengthen the connection between the pool building and the adja-

According to city officials at the meeting, the pool will close in January 2020 and renovations should take about 14 months to complete.

At the meeting BCYF and Public Facilities officials unveiled pictures of what the pool would look like once construction is completed.

There were numerous 'oohs and ahhs' from pool members that use Paris Street for exercise on a regular basis.

The pictures show that the exterior of the pool will be fitted with new siding panels. An addition of the pool's foyer will allow for more room and make the entrance more modern and inviting. There will also be an addition to the back of the building to make room for a family changing room--a feature that is absent from the current pool's

The side of the building that houses the pool that abuts the Paris Street Playground will be changed from a wall to windows. This will allow more light into the pool and better connect the facility to the playground. The building's roof will also be transformed and will include skylights to bring even more natural light into the pool and make it feel more 'open.' The investment to the

pool will also include a new pool filter room, mechanical and electrical upgrades, modified main entrance and lobby area, building interior and exterior repairs and other upgrades necessary to make it a more inviting and user-friendly space. At the meeting, longtime

East Boston High School swim coach Dave Arinella wondered if the city could delay the start of construction by one month. This, said Arinella, would let the swim team finish their season at Paris Street before having to relocate to the Mario Umana pool next

The city said they would explore that option but cautioned that the city is eager to get construction started as soon as possible. Paris Street Director Ni-

cole DaSilva added that her team has been working closely with the Umana School and the East Boston YMCA, who runs the pool there, to transfer as many swim programs to the Umana's pool while construction is ongoing. However, DaSilva said because the Umana pool is housed inside a school building there will be limits on swim times, lap swims, aquatics, etc. and these programs most likely won't be able to start until late afternoon, evenings or on the week-

honor the historic group of brave East Boston woman that kick started a tradition of community activism in the neighborhood, City Councilor Lydia Edwards founded an annual scholarship that will pay tribute to the Maverick Street Moth-

The Maverick Street Mothers organized community protests in the late 1960s against Logan Airport expansion construction. The protest was widely publicized as women, mostly mothers, formed a blockade using baby carriages to stop construction and delivery trucks on Maverick Street.

Now, the Edwards Empowerment Fund is seeking applicants for the new scholarship. The Edwards Empowerment Fund is a registered non-profit established by the District 1 Councilor to uplift, amplify, and empower residents by providing equitable access to educational and skill-building opportunities. The annual scholarship will be awarded to parents wanting to further their education or are attending Boston-area colleges.

"To honor the Maverick Street mothers, we celebrate the legacy of leaders whose shoulders we stand on and helped shape the history of East Boston," said Edwards. "Scholarship recipients will be shining examples of what it means to be involved and engaged members of the community. They are individuals who continue the important work of the original mothers by advocating for a better East Boston.'

All scholarship applicants must be residents of East Boston; have at least part-time custody of minor child/children, or guardianship of children/adult child, demonstrated hardship, demonstrated dedication to the community in the spirit of the Maverick Street Mothers--i.e. attend PTA or civic association meetings, fundraisers, volunteer, or attend any accredited institution. The committee will

The Maverick Street Mothers protest was in response to the construction trucks bringing fill for a Logan expansion project. The ON APPEAL trucks drove very fast down

the densely populated Mav-

erick Street, creating an un-

safe situation for children,

the elderly and the mothers that took their children out for walks or to run errands.

Eastie's Karen Maddalena was a young mother when she made the decision to stand up against Massport's expansion of Logan Airport. Her choice then to fight for the quality of life for herself and her neighbors ignited a lifelong career in community activ-

On Sept. 28, 1968, and led by local legend the late Anna DeFronzo, Maddalena joined a group of mothers in what was to become a historic protest against the Port Authority and airport expansion.

The became group known as the 'Maverick Street Mothers' and their protest became the true beginning of environmental justice in Eastie that marked the opening salvo and first victory in the neighborhood's famed transportation justice struggles.

"As a young mother, my involvement as a community activist started," said Maddalena during a Massport dedication of a plaque honoring the mothers in 2015. "I joined my friends and neighbors to protest the huge trucks carrying fill along Maverick St. to the bird island flats section of the airport."

After a series of meetings with Massport officials there was no relief in spite of the residents simply asking the Port Authority to use another route to haul the fill.

Frustration was growing in the neighborhood and former State Reptresentative, the late George DiLorenzo, met with the Maverick Street residents and the group decided to meet on the street the next day and block the trucks. People felt this radical 'sit in' approach could be effec-It was decided that only

women and children would participate in the demonstration because many felt if men were involved it might lead to fights and violence. The group notified the media, put out a simple press release and on the next day, September 28, the demonstration began.

As the dump trucks arrived the mothers, most pushing their children in baby carriages, blocked the

"When the first truck arrived there was a lot of noise with the drivers yelling and cursing at the mothers," Maddalena remembers. "The trucks began to roll closer and closer to the protesters and someone called the State Police."

The State Police arrived to restore order to the street and when the Maverick Mothers refused to back down the State Police began to drag and push the mothers to the sidewalk so the trucks could continue. However, former Mayor Kevin White, who was being kept abreast of the situation, sent in the Boston Police to counter the State Police's use of force.

The Boston Police made the trucks stop and ordered the protest to continue. That night the event was

all over the evening news. When Massport caught

wind the protests would not end and continued the next day, Eastie's elected officials pointed out that there were several other viable truck routes on Massport property that could be used. After negotiations, Massport agreed to use the alternative truck routes and the Maverick Mothers scored a major victory during the era

of Logan expansion. **ZONING DECISION**

Somerset Ave. have filed a complaint in Land Court in Boston concerning a decision made by the Winthrop Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA).

The complaint seeks to appeal the decision of the ZBA made on June 27 as it pertains to the proposed development of 10-26 Somerset Ave., which is owned by Envelo with Joanna Schwartz serving as chief executive officer. The Zoning Board of

Appeals decided that the

boundary of the Center Business District includes the adjacent property on 20 Cottage Park Road. Therefore, the development site does not abut a Residential Zoning District and consequently may build to a maximum of four stories. According to the town's

municipal code, the maximum number of stories allowed in the Center Business District -if it does abut a residential district – is two and a half stories.

The scope of the project includes demolishing an existing commercial building and constructing 30 apartments with four stories in a mixed-use building. But Schwartz was told she needed variances for the maximum height limitation and minimum rear yard setback by Building Inspector Al Legee. The Zoning Board of Appeals did not vote on Envelo's applications for variances, believing 20 Somerset Ave. was within the Center Busi-

ness District. Tom and Donna Reilly, along with other neighbors on Cottage Park Road and Somerset Avenue, formed the Winthrop Neighborhood Association after they attended numerous meetings of the Planning Board, the Zoning Board and Town Council meetings regarding the boundaries of the Center Business District. A major issue the group they wanted addressed is that 10-26 Somerset is in the Center Business District and directly abuts 20 Cottage Park Road, which is zoned Residential A and is the home of Rosina Fer-

"Consequently, plaintiffs current appeal pertains to the board's incorrect decision regarding the zoning boundary lines of the Center Business District," wrote attorney Jacqueline Doherty, who represents the

neighborhood association.

also

Doherty

that there has been "overwhelming evidence submitted demonstrating that the 20 Cottage Park Road has always been zoned residential and no part of the parcel of 20 Cottage Park Road is within the Center Business District. A count in the appeal also brings out a concern over spot zoning which occurs when one single lot is singled out for different treatment.

According to the com-

plaint, the new 2014 Center **Business District ordinance** allows four-story, multiunit buildings, three-quarters of a parking space per unit, and multi-unit buildings within 15 feet of an adjacent residential property. Additionally, inadequate parking could be avoided by the developer paying the town \$2,000 for each required space. Members of the neighborhood association believe the 2014 ordinance gave every advantage to the developer and did not safeguard the neighborhood, Doherty wrote in the appeal. On May 27, 2018 a pe-

tition from the residents sought to amend the 2014 zoning ordinance: a density standard of one residential unit per 2,000 square feet as required throughout the town; side and rear distances of 50 feet between a
