## FOUR MORE YEARS FOR ARRIGO

Mayor Brian Arrigo won re-election Tuesday, earning a second four-year term as the city's chief executive. Arrigo received 5,809 votes to claim victory over Councillor-at-Large Dan Rizzo who received 5,251 votes. The election was a rematch of their 2015 contest in which Arrigo, then a councillor-at-large, unseated Rizzo, then mayor, by 118 votes.

Arrigo celebrated his impressive victory at the Marina at the Wharf Restaurant, with his jubilant supporters, many wearing the familiar orange jerseys, chanting, "Four More Years, A-R-R-I-G-O, and BRIAN, BRIAN!" as the mayor and his wife, Daveen Arrigo, entered the main room.

It was Daveen who had the honor of introducing her husband, stating simply, "I would just like to take a second to congratulate my husband, Mayor Brian Arrigo," drawing roars of approval from the crowd.

Arrigo stood on a chair, obliging his supporters who wanted to see the mayor deliver his acceptance speech. "I was just reminded that I have a 6 a.m. sign holding so I can't fall off the chair,

### Mark Barden, AG Healey visit Garfield School

Mark Barden lived every parent's worst nightmare but has turned that nightmare into hope.

On the morning of Dec. 14, 2012 Barden's 7-year-old son, Daniel, was among the 26 children and staff that Adam Lanza killed at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Conn., in one of the most horrific school shootings in American history.

Since he lost his son

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

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# Revere awarded \$1million MassWorks Grant for infrastructure improvements on Ocean Avenue

Mayor Brian M. Arrigo announced this week that the City is a recipient of a \$1-million MassWorks grant for infrastructure improvements along Ocean Avenue.

“Since 2008 when the long-anticipated Waterfront Square development got underway, the Ocean Avenue area has undergone an historic transformation,” said Mayor Arrigo. “Empty lots and surface parking lots have become thriving new neighborhoods, and we are now seeing business development in the form of restaurants and a new hotel adjacent to the Wonderland MBTA station. As this work is approaching the end stages, it makes sense for the State to fund long-awaited infrastructure improvements such as the relocation of utilities and

major streetscape accommodations.”

Particular focus will fall on pedestrian and bicycle access along the way. “Sidewalk improvements have been set aside for years as we awaited the completion of much of the development in the area,” said the Mayor. “In addition to the private development along Ocean Avenue, we see the completion of the new DCR facility that sits between Ocean Avenue and Revere Beach Boulevard. Now, a next phase is bring the streetscape into conformity with the area’s new and modern appearance.”

The infrastructure improvements will help advance the long-term goal of a well-conceived Revere Beach Transit-Oriented Development District. “Thanks to the support of Governor Baker, Speaker

DeLeo, Senator Boncore, and Representative Vincent, this will fuel the momentum happening in Revere, benefiting residents, visitors, and businesses along Ocean Avenue,” said Mayor Arrigo. “The grant monies will support the growth of our local economy, creating walkable space between the mixed-use community, centered between two T stops. Infrastructure improvements that advance Transit-Oriented Development is key to a vibrant, sustainable, and attractive community that encourages residents and visitors alike to utilize public transit.”

“It is important residents and visitors are safe when walking the streets along Revere Beach,” said Ward 2 Councillor Ira Novoselsky. “These infrastructure improvements are long overdue, and this is welcoming

news for my constituents.”

The City will continue to pursue future consideration for Ocean Avenue improvements to address traffic flow. “These are tremendous improvements in the area,” said Mayor Arrigo. “We anticipate that this is only a beginning for major improvements to the Ocean Avenue infrastructure in the years to come. The MassWorks grant is a highly-competitive grant program across the Commonwealth and we are fortunate that our city’s progress has earned the approval of the state, manifesting is a very substantial grant this year. But, just as we envision continued improvement in the area, we envision continued cooperation and assistance—a real partnership—with the state.”

in the worst way possible Barden has made it his life’s mission to try to prevent another tragedy like Sandy Hook from ever happening again.

Barden co-founded Sandy Hook Promise, a national non-profit organization founded and led by several family members whose loved ones were killed at Sandy Hook Elementary School.

Barden, with the help of Attorney General Maura Healey, is bringing the program to the Garfield Elementary School. The partnership between Sandy Hook Promise, the Attorney General’s Office and Revere Schools will provide mental health and violence prevention programming to the school.

Last Wednesday Barden and Healey visited the Garfield and held a roundtable discussion with students at the school. Students at the school will take part in three different programs that are part of Sandy Hook Promise.

Barden said he’s hoping to train students here and

across the state on how to be an “upstander” in their school and community, as well as how to create a culture of inclusiveness.

At the Garfield students will take part in the Sandy Hook Promise’s Start With Hello, Say Something, and SOS Signs of Suicide training.

Barden told Garfield students last week that these three programs can help prevent violence before it occurs.

At the roundtable discussion Healey told students that the ‘Start With Hello’ component of the program is a very basic technique to help other kids feel less isolated.

“How do you get at the kid who’s left alone at the lunch table, or the kid who’s being bullied or the kid who’s feeling isolated?” she said.

Healey said by just saying hello to a fellow students that may be alone or look down in the dumps may have a long lasting impact on their day.

The mission of Sandy Hook Promise is to provide

programs and practices that protect children and prevent the senseless, tragic loss of life. Over the past five years, Sandy Hook Promise has trained over 3.5 million adults and students across the country and is deeply committed to preventing violence in schools. Sandy Hook Promise is already working in Massachusetts to train students in evidence-based violence prevention program

The program got a boost last year through a \$1 million grant through the Department of Justice Bureau of Justice Assistance’s School Violence Prevention and Mental Health Training Program, which is providing funding to implement training and education on preventing violence and effectively responding to related mental health crises.

The expansion of the program to the Garfield is part of this grant.

“With Sandy Hook Promise, our office applied for this grant to help students learn and grow in environments without violence,” said Healey. “We now have \$1 million dollars to invest in mental health training, suicide prevention, and school-based vio-

lence prevention programs, and to keep our students safe.”

This grant funding allows the Healey’s Office and Sandy Hook Promise to significantly increase the number of students and educators trained in evidence-based programs.

“The goal is to prevent school violence by focusing on training students and educators to identify the warning signs of violence and take action before a tragedy occurs,” said Healey.

Throughout the school year at the Garfield, Healey’s Office and Sandy Hook Promise will collaborate to train educators and students over the course of three years in the three “Know the Signs” programs that will teach youth and adults how to identify, assess, and intervene before a young person hurts themselves or others.

Those three Know the Signs programs are:

•Signs of Suicide is a universal, school-based prevention program for middle school and high school students, which uses a train-the-trainer model for personnel and students to identify the warning signs

and symptoms of depression, suicide and self-injury and take action when needed.

•Say Something is a violence prevention and education program, with a focus on social media, that teaches students in Grades 6-12 how to recognize the warning signs and signals of individuals who may be a threat to themselves or others, and to “say something” to a trusted adult before the person hurts themselves or others.

•Start With Hello is a violence prevention program for students in Grades 5-12 that teaches students how to be more inclusive and connected to one another.

“All you students started this discussion knowing that it is the little things that

make a difference in people’s lives,” said Barden last week. “That’s what this (Sandy Hook Promise) is all about. Take Start with Hello. We have learned that something as simple as walking down the hallway and looking another student in the the and engaging them, letting them they are there, that they exist is sometimes all someone needs during the day.”

All incumbents were returned to office in spirited races for the council and school committee. A new face on the Council, but not to the voters of Revere, School Committeeman Gerry Visconti was elected to fill the vacant seat left by Councillor Dan Rizzo who returned were top vote getter Jessica Ann Giannino with 5,684 votes, followed by Councillors Steven Morabito, Anthony Zambuto and George Rotondo. In the School Committee

race, newcomer to Revere politics, Anthony D'Ambrosio handily topped the School Committee race with 5,243 votes. Incumbent Carol Tye finished second with 4,997 votes followed by incumbents Michael Ferrante, Stacey Bronsdon-Rizzo, Susan Gravellese and Frederick Sannella. Two closely watched races were in Ward 5 and Ward 6. In Ward 5, Councillor John Powers again faced Eric Lampedecchio. Pow-

ers won re-election with 1262 votes to Lampedecchio's 932 votes. In Ward 6 Richard Serino easily won with 1,451 votes to Nicholas Moulaison's 486. Both candidates were running to fill the seat left vacant by the retirement of popular Ward 6 Councillor Charlie Patch. In the other contested Ward race, Ward 2 Councillor Ira Novoselsky easily won re-election with 632 votes to challenger Robert Bent with 187 votes.

Arrigo added, "starting tomorrow, there's a lot of work to be done and I know you've all bought in to the vision that we have for the city, but there are still 5,252 people who did not necessarily buy in to that vision. The work begins tomorrow

to start to heal the city, make sure that the negativity and the divisive way that people campaigned and that way that things were done over the last couple of months doesn't happen again. "I want to say congratulations to all of you, thank you for all your love and support and have a fun night," concluded Arrigo. The triumphant scene continued inside the restaurant as supporters personally congratulated Arrigo, with many requesting Election Night photographs with the mayor.

## BE SURE TO THANK OUR VETERANS

It was 101 years ago on November 11, 1918, that World War I formally came to a conclusion on the 11th hour, of the 11th day, of the 11th month.

Americans observed the first anniversary of the end of the war the following year when the holiday we now know as Veterans Day originated as Armistice Day in 1919.

The First World War was referred to at the time as "the war to end all wars." It was thought that never again would mankind engage in the sort of madness that resulted in the near-total destruction of Western Civilization and the loss of millions of lives for reasons that never have been entirely clear to anybody either before, during, or since.

Needless to say, history has shown us that such thinking was idealistically foolhardy. Just 21 years later, the world again became enmeshed in a global conflagration that made the first war seem like a mere practice run for the mass annihilation that took place from 1939-45.

Even after that epic second world war, America has been involved in countless bloody conflicts in the 74 years since General Douglas MacArthur accepted the Japanese surrender on the Battleship USS Missouri. Today, we still have troops fighting -- and dying -- on front lines around the world.

"Peace is at hand" has been nothing but a meaningless slogan for most of the past 101 years.

Armistice Day officially became known as Veterans Day in 1954 so as to include those who served in WWII and the Korean War. All of our many veterans since then also have become part of the annual observance to express our nation's appreciation to the men and women who bravely have answered the call of duty to ensure that the freedoms we enjoy as Americans have been preserved against the many challenges we have overcome.

The recent capture and killing of the leader of ISIS demonstrated both the precision and bravery of our troops, who are the most dedicated and lethal fighting force in the world.

Although Veterans Day, as with all of our other national holidays, unfortunately has become commercialized, we urge our readers to take a moment, even if just quietly by ourselves, to contemplate the debt we owe to the veterans of all of our wars and to be grateful to them for allowing us to live freely in the greatest nation on earth.

If nothing else, Veterans Day should remind us that freedom isn't free and that every American owes a debt of immeasurable gratitude and thanks to those who have put their lives on the line to preserve our ideals and our way of life.

## We need health care reforms that help patients, families

This summer, we saw remarkable, bipartisan progress on addressing rising health care costs -- an issue voters have consistently ranked as most important.

The challenge for lawmakers right now is twofold: find effective solutions that make health care more affordable for all Americans without reducing access to treatments.

While our health care system often seems like a tangled knot of misaligned incentives and bureaucracy, there are most certainly bipartisan solutions that Congress can implement to achieve this dual goal.

The issue is of particular concern for the mental health community. Millions of Americans confront mental illness each day and approximately one in six use some form of psychiatric medication. And for those battling addiction,

medication can sometimes mean the difference between success and failure.

Medication is not a one-size-fits-all solution. Prescriptions must be monitored and adjusted as treatment progresses. It's why organizations such as Mental Health America consistently oppose policies that would restrict access to new medications.

Fortunately, many practical solutions have already been explored and are waiting for a champion to take them over the finish line.

Reforms like passing on some of the rebates in Medicare Part D will realign incentives throughout the whole system to bring down prices -- all while providing actual savings at the pharmacy.

The plan is simple enough -- forcing insurance companies and pharmacy benefit managers (massive private "middlemen" between drug companies and

insurers) to pass on drug rebates to patients at the point of sale.

For patients, passing on rebates would provide immediate relief. It is estimated that sharing a portion of rebates with diabetes patients on Medicare could save up to \$20 billion over the next 10 years.

Most importantly, this plan addresses the rising cost of prescription drugs.

Currently, pharmacy benefit managers pocket rebates, claiming they spread the cost of drugs throughout premiums and other patient fees. So not only are patients not receiving the savings intended for them, but the cost of medicines are rising.

Pharmacy benefit managers and insurers are incentivized to maximize the number of rebates they can receive. And since rebates are used for the most expensive drugs, this means benefit managers are also

incentivized to keep drug prices high -- or steer patients toward high-priced drugs.

Both practices increase costs for families across the nation. Removing incentives would help patients find effective and affordable treatment options.

I look forward to members of Congress from both sides of the aisle addressing this problem. Rebate reform is the best place to start.

## REVERE THROUGH THE YEARS

### 10 years ago Nov. 4, 2009

Interest was high for yesterday's city election. In the contest for City Council at Large, incumbent Dan Rizzo topped the balloting. John Correggio was the lone incumbent not to one returned to his seat, which was taken by George Rotondo, who moved up to the City Council at Large spot from his Ward 4 City Council seat. Stephen Reardon will take Rotondo's place in Ward 4.

The School Committee contest also proved highly-competitive, drawing 10,000 more votes than for the City Council race. All of the incumbents won re-election with the exception of Ann Raponi, who was knocked off the committee by newcomer Stacey Rizzo.

The controversial ballot question that would have reversed the School Committee's decision to permit health officials to disperse contraceptives at Revere High with parental permis-

sion was handily defeated, by a vote of 3404-2695.

Derek Lodie, one of the defendants on trial for the murder of Revere police officer Daniel Talbot, accepted a plea deal last week in which he pleaded guilty to reduced charges and received a prison sentence of 8-to-12 years. Lodie admitted that as he was walking through the parking lot of Revere High School on the night of September 29, 2007, he responded to derogatory statements about the Bloods street gang by a group of off-duty Revere police officers, who were drinking by their cars. Lodie said he was unaware that those yelling the comments were police officers and that he called Robert Iacoviello Jr., whom Lodie knew kept a gun, to the scene. However, Lodie did not admit to knowing who fired the weapon that killed officer Talbot. Iacoviello, 21, who is alleged by the prosecution to have been the one who shot and killed officer Talbot, and two oth-

ers are slated to go on trial in January. Lodie, who originally was charged with being an accessory before the fact of first degree murder, had been facing a possible sentence of life imprisonment if convicted. He now will be eligible for parole in six years after accepting the reduced charges.

Gov. Deval Patrick announced this week that he will not be making further reductions in local aid, which would have been devastating for cities such as Revere. Instead, Patrick laid off 2000 state workers, State revenues have not even come close to reaching projections as the Mass. economy and the nation in general still are recovering from the national recession that struck the country in late 2008.

A large crowd was on hand for State Rep. Robert DeLeo's annual Comedy Night that was held at the Winthrop Yacht Club.

Two Revere police officers received the state's highest awards for brav-

ery last week at the State House from Gov. Deval Patrick. Officer James Rose received the Medal of Honor and Lieut John Azzari received the Medal of Valor for their efforts on February 25, 2008, when they stormed a house on Fernwood St. after a young man had stabbed his mother and taken his younger siblings into the basement as possible hostages. Rose entered the building and fired two shots at the suspect, who had refused to drop his knife, and Azzari then subdued him.

Police are seeking an 18 year old Wakefield man in connection with a stabbing at a Halloween party on Dedham St. The victim was injured in his hand as he tried to fend off the knife-swinging assailant during the altercation.




### Carmen Laura, Sr.





### Patriots torpedo the Middies; set to host Wayland Friday

The Revere High football team combined ruthless efficiency with a dash of high-octane excitement to romp to a 42-6 victory over the Dracut Middies in a quarterfinal round contest of the Division 4 North Sectional of the MIAA state playoff tournament Friday night before an ecstatic, standing-room-only crowd of predominantly Patriot partisans at Harry Della Russo Stadium.

Revere now will advance to the D-4 North semifinals this Friday at Harry Della Russo Stadium when they will host Wayland. The opening kickoff is set for 6:30 p.m.

As they have throughout the season, Coach Lou Cicatelli's crew once again excelled in all three phases of the game -- offense, defense, and special teams -- to record their eighth victory of the 2019 campaign.

Revere entered the contest as the second seed in the D-4 North with a perfect 7-0 record against a seventh-seeded Dracut squad that came in at 3-4, but which had dropped its preceding four encounters by an average score of 40-10. Though the Patriots on paper appeared to be a solid favorite, RHS Coach Lou Cicatelli and his crew were mindful that in last year's state playoffs, the Middies were the eighth seed in the D-4 North, but knocked off undefeated and top-seeded Marblehead in the first round.

However, any hopes that the Middies may have harbored of pulling off a major upset in the state playoffs for the second year in a row were dashed from the opening kickoff when Patriot Billy Ginepra hauled in the pigskin and raced 76 yards for a touchdown.

Ironically, Dracut, as have other teams this season, was trying to kick the ball away from Revere's star ballcarrier, Joe Llanos, who has run back two kickoffs for touchdowns this season. But for the second straight week, Ginepra foiled the Patriots' opponent's strategy by taking the opening kickoff to the house for six quick points.

The Patriot defense then rose to the occasion on the ensuing Dracut possession, forcing a three-and-out, turning the ball over to the Revere offense for the first time of the evening.

With quarterback Calvin Boudreau at the controls, the Patriots marched 60 yards, capped by an 18-yard run by Jonathan Murphy, upping the count to 13-0 after the successful PAT kick by Rayan Riazi.

The next Dracut possession and repossession by Revere followed a similar pattern -- three-and-out for the Middies and an 80-yard drive by the Pats -- with Joe

Llanos running in from 19 yards out. A pass from Boudreau to Lucas Barbosa for the two-point conversion left Revere sitting in the driver's seat, 21-0, midway through the second quarter.

Though the lone breakdown by the Revere defense on the night resulted in a 44-yard run by the Middle quarterback on a broken play, the Patriots stuffed Dracut's two-point conversion to leave matters at 21-6 as the teams headed into the locker room.

The second half was almost an identical replay of what had transpired before the intermission. The Revere defense took over on downs on Dracut's opening drive of the second half at the Patriot 40, from where the Pats once again went into ball-control mode with the capper coming on a 22-yard jaunt by Llanos into the Middle end zone.

With the successful kick by Riazi increasing the lead to 28-6, the contest was all but over. Revere added two more touchdowns, on a 16-yard run by Zach Furlong and a 35 yard burst by Adetayo Atitebi, before the night was out to account for the 42-6 finale, giving Cicatelli ample opportunity to use his reserves.

"Our defense controlled the game for us," said Cicatelli, noting the major contributions of defensive ends Augusto Goncalves and Alaa Attoui, who led the Pats in tackles.

Revere's next opponent, Wayland, which plays in the Dual County League (Small), promises to be more of a challenge. The Patriots were able to scout the Warriors at their quarterfinal game with Wakefield on Saturday and were impressed with their next opponent.

"Wayland is the best team we will have played all year," said Cicatelli of the Warriors, who stand at 7-1, with their lone loss of the season, 21-20, coming to a Concord-Carlisle team that is undefeated and that advanced to the D-3 North semifinals this past weekend.

Wayland has outscored its opponents by an average of 31-12 and boasts an outstanding quarterback in Mason Bolivar, who tossed a pair of touchdown passes and ran for two more in Wayland's 27-14 victory over Wakefield.

"We know we will have our work cut out for us and that we'll have to play to the best of our ability in order for us to win Friday night," said Cicatelli.

If the Patriots are successful, they will face the victor of the other semifinal battle between Melrose-Marblehead for the D-4 North championship next Friday evening.



### VOLLEYBALL, FIELD HOCKEY TEAMS FALL IN TOURNAY

The Revere High volleyball and field hockey teams came out on the short end of their contests in the opening round of the MIAA state tournaments this past week.

Coach Briana Scata's field hockey squad, which qualified for the state tourney for the first time in almost 30 years with the best-ever record, 12-2-2, in the program's history and its first-ever GBL title, dropped a 6-0 decision to Chelmsford last Thursday.

Revere was seeded fifth in the Division 1 North Sectional, while Chelmsford was seeded 12th. Chelmsford then defeated North Andover, 3-2, in the quarterfinals to advance to the sectional semifinals.

Coach Lianne Mimmo's RHS volleyball squad, the sixth seed in the Division 1 Central-East Sectional with a 13-7 record, came up short by a score of 3-0 at King Philip, the number three seed, this past Monday.

### RHS BOYS RUN WELL AT COACHES MEET

The Revere High boys cross country team participated in Saturday's State Coaches Meet at the Wrentham state training facility.

"The team ran very well," said RHS head coach Mike Flynn. "All of the races were incredibly crowded and I'm very proud of how well the boys competed against the best runners in the state."

In the senior race, Christian Madrid was the top Revere finisher, coming across the line in the 5K race in a clocking of 18:02, which was good for 58th place among the field of 239 runners.

Fabio Tran was next for the Pats in 78th position in a time of 18:22. James Carpinelli, who ran his best race of the season according to Flynn, came across in 93rd spot in 18:41 and Antony Arias finished in 185th in 20:11.

In the junior race, Carlos Quintanilla came across the line in 162nd place in a time of 19:22.

Sophomore Victor Pelatere ran the 5K course in 19:05, which placed him in

122nd spot among the 403 sophomore runners who competed.

Brayden Shanley ran in the freshman contest and finished in 218th position in a clocking of 12:50 in the 3K distance.

"Brayden has done unbelievably well this season," said RHS head coach Mike Flynn. "He never had run a cross country race prior to coming out for the team in August and his improvement has been dramatic."

"The entire team ran very well," said Flynn. "What I like about this group of boys is that they never are satisfied with their performance and they're always pushing themselves to run faster."

Flynn will bring a contingent of six boys to the Division 1 State Meet this Saturday, which also will be held at the Wrentham facility.

### RHS GIRLS CROSS COUNTRY AT STATE COACHES

The Revere High girls cross country team traveled to Wrentham Saturday to participate in the Frank Mooney State Coaches Invitational.

Four members of the Lady Patriot squad competed in the meet in three separate races.

"While we didn't take home any medals, the girls ran strong and raced against the top competition in the state," said RHS head coach Katie Sinnott. "Each girl ran their target paces and raced smart."

Participating in the junior 5K race was Soleil Young, finishing 111th with a time of 23:27. Participating in the sophomore 5K race was Carly Bennett, finishing 107th with a time of 24:05.

Two Revere freshmen, Butayna Amine and Maria Ferreira, participated in the freshman 3K race, the first time-ever that both girls participated in such a large race.

"There were nearly 200 girls in that race," noted Sinnott. "While nervous and a bit intimidated, I'm proud of them for sticking to their plan and racing well."

Sinnott and her crew next will head to the EMass Divisional Race next weekend, which also will be held at the state training facility in Wrentham. Taking part in that race will be senior

Salome Gezehagn, juniors Soleil Young and Yulissa Santana Baez, and sophomore Carly Bennett.

### RHS GIRLS SOCCER HOSTS TOURNAY GAME TOMORROW EVENING

The Revere High girls soccer team will host Acton-Boxborough tomorrow (Thursday) evening at Harry Della Russo Stadium in a quarterfinal contest of the MIAA Division 1 North state soccer tournament. The opening kickoff at HDR is set for 6:30.

Coach Megan O'Donnell's squad concluded its regular season last week with a 1-1 tie with Haverhill. Carolina Bettero, assisted by Sofia Chroqi, netted the Patriot goal at 25 minutes of the first half, but Lowell brought the contest back to level before the end of the first half.

Revere controlled the play in the second 40 minutes after the intermission, but could not find the back of the Lowell net.

"Coming off a loss from Haverhill, we struggled to get started," said O'Donnell. "We had great defense and goal-playing by Allison

Revere is the top seed in the D-1 North after compiling a sterling 14-1-3 overall record. The Patriots were the co-champs of the Greater Boston League with Somerville, with both teams sporting 6-0-2 records in the GBL.

Acton-Boxborough is the eighth seed in the D-1 North Sectional with a 10-4-6 record. A-B defeated Chelmsford in the first round of the tourney by a score of 2-1.

The winner will advance to the sectional semifinal at Cawley Stadium in Lowell next Monday against the winner of the Andover vs. Lexington contest.

"This season has been so successful because the girls have put in the work and they have always played whistle to whistle and they do not give up," O'Donnell noted. "This year's team always has each other's back on and off the field, and that's the key to a successful season."

## GBFB honors CHA Revere Care Center with Community Champion Food is Medicine award

On Oct. 17 at its seventh annual "Food is Medicine" event, the Greater Boston Food Bank (GBFB), the largest hunger-relief organization in New England, honored the CHA Revere Care Center, part of academic community health system Cambridge Health Alliance, with its Community Champion Food is Medicine Award and a \$5,000 grant. The award is given annually to a GBFB partner that is advancing the awareness, understanding and implementation of food as a health intervention. In 2018, the CHA Revere Care Center began working with GBFB, Good Measures and Tufts Health Plan to establish a free monthly produce-only market that provides nutrition education and health information to patients on site. The mar-

ket offers 25-30 pounds of fresh produce per household each month; 90,402 pounds of produce have been distributed to more than 1,500 CHA patients and community members since its inception. The CHA Revere Care Center and its partners are also conducting research on the health outcomes of their patients. The collaboration was funded by a social determinants of health grant from the Massachusetts Attorney General's Office. "We are truly honored and extremely grateful for all of the support from the Greater Boston Food Bank, Good Measures and Tufts Health Plan to help us address a critical need in the Revere community and beyond," said Mary Cassesso, CHA's chief community officer. "Food insecur-

ity affects a wide range of families across our region, including many children, and our monthly market plays an important role to fill that gap and, as a result, profoundly affect the health and well-being in the community." "Research proves the link between nutrition, childhood development and overall health," said GBFB CEO Catherine D'Amato. ## Research reveals demand for bike share in Greater Boston communities

New research by the Metropolitan Area Planning Council (MAPC) analyzing over 300,000 bike share trips reveals demand for bike share in Greater Boston communities, as well as opportunities for improvements to suburban cycling infrastructure within communities and between cities and towns.

The interactive report uses detailed trip-level data from the Lime system, which operates in 16 cities and towns in Greater Boston, to map trip patterns and pinpoint the most-frequented routes over the 18-month period from April 2018 through September 2019.

The data, which includes individual trip routes without tracking information about the habits of individual users, revealed that connections to transit were a relatively small share of Lime bike trips: only 15% of trips began or ended within 100 meters of a subway, trolley, Silver Line or Commuter Rail station.

Instead, many trips took place within communities, to and from points of interest or between municipalities where transit connections are limited. City or town centers and commercial districts have the highest density of activity, but trips spread out into residential neighborhoods, which tend to be the end-point of trips more than the start. The average trip length was just over one mile and the highest frequency of trips took place between 4 p.m. and 7 p.m.

"This analysis shows how new forms of so-called 'micro-mobility' can be quickly adopted by all kinds of communities and serve a unique role in the transportation system," said MAPC Transportation Director Eric Bourassa. "It also shows how important it is for public agencies to have access to detailed data that can inform planning and policy."

Analysis of the trip data demonstrates that in many places, Lime users were riding on roadways with limited or no existing bike infrastructure, such as bike lanes, physical separation from traffic, and

easily-navigable turns and crossings. Sweetser Circle/Revere Beach Parkway in Everett, Commercial and Centre Streets in Malden, Washington Street in Newton and Arsenal Street in Watertown are all examples of roadways that saw high volumes of Lime ridership but are currently stressful for bicyclists.

"We're looking forward to using this new data resource as another piece of information to plan for new bike infrastructure that will make people feel safe and comfortable biking around Newton so they don't feel the need to drive for every little trip," said Nicole Freedman, director of transportation planning for the City of Newton.

The information comes as a result of a data-sharing agreement between Lime and MAPC, which created the regional framework that allows Lime to operate in over a dozen communities in the Greater Boston region.

"Greater Boston currently suffers from the worst traffic congestion in the nation, affecting everyone who lives, works or studies in the region. Yet while nearly 50% of trips in the region are less than four miles, people still overwhelmingly choose to drive," said Scott Mullen, Lime Director of Northeast Expansion. "MAPC's unprecedented analysis of data from our regional bike share system will enable cities and towns to prioritize safe, inviting infrastructure, which will entice people out of their cars for those short trips and help to ease congestion for all."

The 16 municipalities served by Lime and included in the data analysis are Arlington, Bedford, Belmont, Chelsea, Everett, Malden, Medford, Melrose, Quincy, Revere, Waltham, Watertown and Winthrop.

The report is being published in an online, interactive format that will allow municipal staff, cycling advocates and interested residents to select specific corridors and intersections and download detailed information for further analysis.

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## NEWS FROM AROUND THE REGION

### TAX BILLS TO RISE SLIGHTLY

**CHELSEA** - Chelsea property owners will see a modest increase on their property tax bills for Fiscal Year 2020, with owners of commercial and industrial properties and apartment complexes of nine or more units shouldering a larger burden of the City's overall tax bill.

Monday night, City Manager Thomas Ambrosino presented an overview of the FY2020 tax rates and the valuation of Chelsea properties.

The City Council's annual tax rate classification hearing is scheduled for Nov. 25. At that time, the Council is expected to vote on two recommendations from Ambrosino, including a 175 percent tax burden shift onto commercial and industrial properties, and a 31 percent residential property tax exemption for Chelsea homeowners who live in the city.

If those recommendations are approved by the Council, the residential property tax rate would be \$13.46 per \$1,000 of valuation, while the commercial tax rate would be set at \$27.18.

While both those rates are lower than for FY19, there will be an increase in the average tax bills because of the recent revaluation of Chelsea properties that saw assessed property values increase across the board. The average increase in assessed values ranged from 11.5 percent for single family homes to nearly 40 percent for apartment complexes of nine or more units. The averages ranged from 12 to just over 15 percent for 2, 3, and four-family homes and condominiums.

"With adoption of the maximum 175 percent shift and the ability to increase the residential exemption, the City Council will be able to keep tax increases reasonably modest for all owner occupants," said Ambrosino.

While the Council can increase the residential exemption to as much as 35 percent, Ambrosino is recommending it increase only 1 percent from the current 30 percent rate.

"This remaining 5 percent is the most effective tool for lowering residential property taxes and should be reserved for years with high increases," he said.

Cutting to the chase, if the Council approves the two recommendations, the FY20 tax bill for a single family home at the median assessed value of \$357,500 will be \$2,645. That is down 1.6 percent over the average FY19 bill.

For condo owners, the average bill will go up 6.5 percent to \$1,937.

Owners of two-family homes will see a 4.3 percent jump to \$4,191, and owners of three-family homes will see a slight decrease to \$5,553. Four-unit owner occupied properties can expect a .5 percent increase in the tax bill to \$6,688 for the median assessed value of \$659,241.

Ambrosino said City Hall will be open late for

several nights before the City Council votes so that property owners can check the new assessed valuations of their properties.

Ambrosino noted that in addition to the residential exemption rate, Chelsea does offer other assistance on property taxes for residents, especially for those 65 and older.

District 1 Councillor Bob Bishop noted that one of his pet peeves about the assessment process is that owners of large apartment complexes are taxed at residential rates, while owners of smaller commercial properties face the burden of the 175 percent tax shift.

"I've advocated that income producing apartments of more than four units should be taxed at the commercial rate," said Ambrosino. "But that would take a Constitutional amendment."

### CHELSEA SCHOOLS SHINE BRIGHT AMONG URBAN DISTRICTS

**CHELSEA** - It's an across-the-city success story, a cause for celebration for parents of Chelsea schoolchildren, a nod for a "great job" by the hard-working principals and teachers at all the schools - from the John Silber Early Learning Center to Chelsea High School - and a final tribute to the exceptional leadership of retiring Supt. of Schools Dr. Mary Bourque - and her administrative team at City Hall.

Here are some of the noteworthy accomplishments for a school system that has, for one reason or another, not received its due recognition statewide for what Dr. Bourque called, "this little scrappy school district, the Chelsea public schools and how it is really pushing and redefining urban education":

Chelsea achieved the highest categorization earned by the state's urban districts, that of "Substantial Progress Toward Targets"

Grades 3-8 English Language Arts average student growth percentile exceeded the state target

Chelsea's criterion Reference Target Percentage increased 12 points and is the highest in the District 5 Partnership

Chelsea High School's mathematics average student growth percentile increased 14 points and Advanced Placement Calculus scores outperformed the state and the globe

Chelsea English Language Learners improved 13 points showing "Substantial Progress"

Chelsea's "Lowest Performing Students" improved 22 points in elementary and middle schools and 19 points in high school.

Dr. Bourque said the road to today's successes began in 2011.

"We've been underfunded all these years, that's why the Mass. Student Opportunity Act (that would add \$1.5 billion to education funding over the next seven years) was so important," said Bourque. "But

during these years of underfunding, we've always gone after grants and the grants helped us to do the turn-around work in our schools."

Bourque said Chelsea is seeing "a march towards deep transformational change" in the schools.

"Our AP schools have been slowly increasing, our overall criterion reference scores increased in 2018 and 2019 and our English Language proficiency scores continue to increase," said Bourque.

Chelsea High students are making their mark with their excellent scores in Advanced Placement tests, particularly in Calculus, which certainly illuminates the superb mathematics department at CHS. Eighty-six seniors took AP exams last year.

"We've been working hard year in and year out toward these achievements," said Bourque. "The last four years we've had about seventy-two percent of students going on to two-or-four-year colleges. The last three years, we have had over \$4 million given in scholarship and awards. That goes beyond what other districts do."

#### Being able to overcome challenges

There are challenges in the school district. As Bourque notes, for every 100 students who enter in the Chelsea school system, approximately 25 leave within 12 months for various reasons.

"Yet, we're able to move the needle on opening the doors of opportunity for the students," said Bourque.

The superintendent said that classroom size "is in a good, reasonable 22-25 student-to-teacher ratio. There are 6,400 students in the district. The school system is seeing an influx of parents with school-age children moving here from East Boston, where rents for apartments have been soaring.

#### Superintendent says a team effort is producing great results

What does Dr. Bourque attribute to the improved scores system wide and the increasing number of graduates going on to excel in college? One of many shining examples is 2018 CHS graduate Deedee Hernandez, who is now a freshman

at prestigious Dartmouth College.

"It's our teachers, our administrators, our academic coaches, our district coordinators, our assistant superintendents - everybody is just working coherently, everybody is in the boat rowing in the same direction. I'm very proud of our schools."

Assistant Supt. Kent said, "I would just stress the fact it's a progression - our students do come and go and we do have a lot of mobility - the high school does have wonderful scores but it's coming from a whole system of employment. The success is being built from the ground up."

Superintendent-Elect Dr. Almi Abeyta will be succeeding Dr. Bourque at the helm of the Chelsea school system. She is ready to carry on the excellence and pursue even greater heights for the district.

"There are a lot of systems and structures in place," said Abeyta. "The academic work on the instructional side is strong so my job will just be to carry it to the next level. My goal is to continue to work and to make sure we're steering the ship in the right direction that it's already been going in."

### O'DONNELL FAMILY HOSTS ANNUAL FUNDRAISER

**EVERETT** - The Cystic Fibrosis Foundation and Joe and Kathy O'Donnell hosted the Joey O'Donnell Film Premiere at the Natick Mall and AMC Theatres Framingham last week.

The O'Donnell family has raised hundreds of millions of dollars in support of the Foundation and the Joey Fund, which is named in memory of the O'Donnells' son, Joey O'Donnell, a courageous fighter and victim of cystic fibrosis.

Joe O'Donnell spoke about the tremendous progress that has been made toward finding a cure for cystic fibrosis.

O'Donnell personally thanked Dr. Preston Campbell III, CFF president and CEO, and Dr. Jeffrey Leiden, chairman, president and CEO of Vertex Pharmaceuticals, for their outstanding work in their respective fields.

Dr. Leiden said, "It's still sort of sinking in - this is really the culmination of a 45-year dream to make a single medicine that can treat up to 90 percent of all patients with cystic fibrosis."

He singled out Joe O'Donnell for his leadership and generosity in the cause of finding a cure for cystic fibrosis.

"There's one person in particular that I want to recognize and that is Joe O'Donnell - this absolutely would have never happened without Joe O'Donnell," said Leiden. "Every mission has a visionary who

### GREENWAY NAMED FOR MARY ELLEN WELCH

**EAST BOSTON** - The godmother of East Boston community activism, the late Mary Ellen Welch, was not much for adulations, awards or honors. Instead, Welch preferred to quietly go about her daily commitment to improving the lives of all who called Eastie home and inspiring generations to become community leaders.

Sure, in her earlier years she was on the front lines protesting airport expansion. She joined the legendary Maverick Mothers and blocked Logan construction trucks that were disrupting the quality of lives for hundreds that lived on the street in the 1960s.

Yes, she was a force to be reckoned with at community meetings when her beloved community was threatened in any way.

And there are countless beautification and open space projects that dot the entire neighborhood that have her fingerprints all over them.

But when it came to honors or hero worship she shrugged them off as silly, especially in her later years when she preferred to work behind the scenes - writing hundreds of letters to decision makers expressing her opinion or offering sage advice to those who sought it.

So those who gathered at the East Boston Greenway Caboose last Saturday afternoon to officially name the Greenway after Welch were in an awkward situation.

On one hand the friends, family, elected officials and residents who gathered and benefitted from her decades of activism needed to honor her after her unexpected passing in March at the age of 77.

On the other hand, those who knew and loved her knew she would have been embarrassed by the whole affair and the fact everyone was making such a fuss over her.

Her longtime friend and collaborator Fred Salvucci had a solution.

"I see a cloud moving in and at any minute Mary Ellen is going to send a lightning strike down because she did not want to be recognized (for her accomplishments)," said Salvucci Saturday at the dedication.

Salvucci said there is still a lot of unfinished work to be done in Eastie, work that inspired Welch everyday.

So Salvucci looked up to the clouds and told the heavens, "Mary Ellen, this is not a memorial, but a rally to organize support and keep going!"

For over a half century Welch was the steward of social, political and environmental activism in the neighborhood.

Welch, a longtime community activist and school teacher, helped bring a neighborhood with the least

amount of open space to a community with award winning sprawling parks and greenways.

Sadly, on Thursday, March 7 Eastie lost Welch after she battled an illness for several months.

As one of the founding members of the Friends of the East Boston Greenway, Welch worked for decades to take a neglected stretch of the old Narrow Gauge Railroad and transform it into a system of lush landscaped park so residents could enjoy a stroll from Jeffries Point to Orient Heights.

Welch was one of a small group of Eastie residents who believed the trash filled, abandoned freight tracks could become a welcoming, safe Greenway would remove years of contamination in the midst of the neighborhood.

At Saturday's dedication Welch's lifelong friend Roberta Marchi, whose children fondly called Welch "Auntie Mary," spoke of her commitment to the neighborhood - even in failing health.

"One of Mary's major priorities was always the creation of more green space in East Boston," said Marchi. "She became an active member and supporter of the Piers Park Initiative and the Greenway Council, where she served as Chairwoman for years until poor health prevented her from leaving her home. Even then, she continued to attend meetings via phone conference calls. She never gave up networking with hundreds of contacts and personal friends that she had made along the way with whom she could work to create new initiatives and promote more opportunities. She influenced many politicians and power brokers by her amazing powers of persuasion, using poetry, home-baked cookies and visits at her home to share a glass of wine with reporters, authors, activists, analysts and university students who were interested in promoting the causes that were dear to her heart."

Mayor Martin Walsh called Welch a hero.

"Often times we use 'hero' when dedicating things after sports figures or political figures and those are nice," said Walsh. "But it's when we recognize a great Bostonian like Mary Ellen Welch who loved her community as a teacher, a mentor and an activist is when the word 'hero' means a little more. Mary Ellen represented the best values and dedicating the Greenway to her is the perfect way to honor this local legend. When we think about heroes, when we think about true heroes Mary Ellen Welch is at the top of that list."

**Well groomed is healthy**

If you want a healthy dog or cat, you have to pay attention to grooming. With dogs it is mostly things you have to do. Once upon a time, we groomed our own dogs and dogs we fostered. Today we turn the bathing and hair cuts over to a trusted groomer in a shop owned by neighbors. However that does not let us off the hook for regular touch-ups and attention to problem areas.

**Daily Routine**

We have a West Highland White Terrier. This breed comes with lots of grooming issues. First, Poppy is pure white and every spec of dirt shows up on her coat. We've found that a quick paw bath after her

walk keeps her feet clean. Then we brush her teeth, clean around her eyes, check her ears, and follow up on any signs of a coat problem we may have noticed when petting her.

You can pop a small dog in a sink or take a big one to the shower or bathtub. If it's just a case of muddy feet and wet coat, you can dip each paw in a bowl of water and give a big rub-down with a towel.

**Tips and Toolkit**

If you plan to do any procedure with your dog, start early and do it often until the animal becomes comfortable and you both begin to relax into a routine. This is especially important with brushing teeth, coats, and trimming nails. The dog will

come to understand that this doesn't hurt all the time and lots of times it is simple stuff that happens on a regular basis.

In an interview on TheBark.com website, groomer Robyn Michaels provided some great grooming tips for pet owners. She recommends, "For just about any breed, a slicker brush is the best choice, and just about any will do."

She suggested having the dog up on something rather than on the floor. This could be a counter, table, or ottoman. We use an inexpensive, non-slip bath mat to give Poppy secure footing and protect the surface.

We have a collection of tools we use all the time. For a quick check on Poppy's coat, we grab a rotating com-

fort pin comb that will help detangle her double coat. When we run into a mat, we use a matt breaker to slowly and gently cut through the tangle. Curved bandage scissors help us safely do a sanitary trim around her anus. And, finally, one of those headlamp flashlights is great when you want hands-free light on a specific spot on the pup.

**Cats Are Natural Groomers**

With cats your job is monitoring what they are doing and helping them out with chores like brushing teeth that they can't do on their own. Remember cats spend a lot of time grooming. An article on the website CatTime.com says, "In fact, on average, cats clean

themselves during half of their waking hours."

dentical problems.

While grooming will not only make your animal look great, it might also keep them healthier, avoid skin issues, and let you do a daily well-being check to catch problems early, when they are easier to fix.

southeast corner of the development, following along Bennington Street and Walley Street. The move is in line with the goal of making Suffolk Downs a walkable, multimodal transit-served, and better-connected neighborhood.

"The Friends of the East Boston Greenway are excited about the Greenway extension, and we're glad to partner with HYM on this initiative," said President of the Friends of the East Boston Greenway Karen Maddalena, "We look forward to a continued process to create new permanent open space."

The Greenway extension will create an improved biking, running and walking experience with designated pedestrian and bicycle crossing at Bennington Street and Walley Street with appropriate traffic safety measures. This extension will combat traffic congestion and create a more connected and easily accessible East Boston by allowing for more bike-friendly connections from city to city.

In addition to extending the EBG, the HYM Investment Group has announced a flagship partnership with the East Boston Social Centers with plans to integrate the EBG into the Suffolk Downs redevelopment.

"This collaboration will play a critical role in developing an enduring facilities strategy for years to come," said Executive Director of The East Boston Social Centers Justin Pasquariello. "Securing the highest quality facilities enables us to focus on delivering on our mission—ensuring that all children served by the EBSC -- and all children in East Boston—enter Kindergarten ready to learn, joyful and thriving."

The EBSC is an integral part of the East Boston community, effecting change not only in East Boston but also throughout Greater Boston for over 100 years. Serving members of the community through childcare, public health, and social work, the EBSC's programs are empowering the community and will continue to do so and extend its reach with an additional location at Suffolk Downs.

HYM Founding Partner Thomas O'Brien said these commitments to support the East Boston Greenway and East Boston Social Centers are consistent with "The HYM Investment Group's MISSION of creating an extension of the existing, vibrant neighborhoods around Suffolk Downs as the redevelopment moves forward".

However, the Lawyers for Civil Rights (LCR) submitted extensive comments to the Boston Planning and Development Agency (BPDA) outlining legal and equity concerns with the proposed redevelopment of the Suffolk Downs site.

"Cities that are diverse and inclusive thrive," wrote LCR in a statement. "That is why development must be carefully planned, to avoid displacing long-time residents and businesses, communities of color, and low-wage workers. Housing in particular must be affordable to a broad range of families and individuals."

Sprawling over two cities and more than 150 acres, Suffolk Downs is one of the largest projects in Boston's history and includes the creation of an entirely new neighborhood that will feature public spaces, residences, and extensive retail and commercial units.

"We do not want East Boston to become another Seaport," wrote the LCR. "The last thing Boston needs is another predominantly affluent space that both fails to reflect the rich diversity of this city, and that lacks basic community amenities. We are not anti-development. We are pro-growth — smart and equitable growth. Our work is motivated by contemporary race-and-class dynamics, and the legacy of housing and economic segregation in Boston. As the city becomes one of the most expensive in North America, our goal is to ensure that it thrives by retaining its vibrant socioeconomic and racial diversity."

**LACK OF INTEREST FOR UNIFORM PILOT**

LYNN - A uniform pilot that was set in motion during the 2017-2018 school year, has come to a close due to lack of interest. The pilot was launched at Callahan and Aborn Elementary Schools in the fall of 2017, to gauge the interest from both students and parents. Consisting of a uniform t-shirt, the pilot was initially met with some energy and enthusiasm, that later expired at both schools.

School Superintendent Tutwiler met with both school principals and confirmed that there was a lack of interest in the school communities. There was also not enough requested orders of shirts and other uniform items to meet the minimum requirement to place an order last year as well as this fall. It was determined that there were a few factors leading to the waning interest, including the lack of flexibility in ordering options, as there were only certain points in the year when students could opt to order additional shirts. The fact that wearing the uniform T-shirts is an option made it less of a priority for families, and legally, uniforms cannot be mandated, as there is always an opt-out preference. "At this point, I'd recommend ending the pilot, although it has ended on its own," said Tutwiler. "Personally I do not have

a problem with uniforms in schools if it's that school community's wish. If we do rethink this and pursue it in the future, I'd advise to gauge interest and commitment beforehand."

Tutwiler shared that the broad survey that was sent out to Callahan Elementary School, only captured half of the families of the 430 students, and not all who responded were in favor. When reviewing the data to see if any notable changes took place with those who opted for the uniforms, there was no difference in attendance and while there was a slight difference in discipline, it did not reflect a trend. The principals also reported that the cost of the uniform shirts did not seem to be an issue with parents, as there was no feedback alluding to this.

"I want to thank the principals who implemented the pilot, the PTO members, and parents who were a huge help running surveys and getting the pilot off the ground," said School Committee Member, Jared Nicholson. "When we have a district of this size, it gives us a great opportunity to try new ideas and do a pilot like this. When you do a pilot, you are testing to see if something works or doesn't work, and that is data and feedback that we have now. When I started working on this it was driven by parent interest and if the interest is no longer there, there goes the program. The other things are all things we can address and are fixable, but if we don't have the original parent interest, I can't imagine it would be successful."

**LOCAL SCIENCE TEACHER TAKES PART IN PROGRAM**

WINTHROP - Local science teachers, including Winthrop High School's Meghan Dooley, learned how to edit genes using CRISPR during a free professional development workshop by Acera Education Innovation (AceraEI). The goal is for participants to bring this curriculum to their own public school classrooms.

Short for "clustered regularly interspaced short palindromic repeats" CRISPR is a family of DNA sequences found within the genomes of organisms such as bacteria. The technique is considered to be at the leading edge of scientific research.

The teachers went through the first of a two-day intensive workshop on Oct. 18 Michael Hirsch, AceraEI's Life Sciences Specialist and Curriculum Lead. Hirsch's curriculum included conducting hands-on experiments using a CRISPR-based molecular biology assay and detecting bacterial transformation.

The workshops are funded through recent \$50,000 grants from both the Am-

gen Foundation and Bristol-Myers Squibb. In addition to the training, teachers have access to ongoing support to assist schools in creating science labs that teach 21st century skills, engaging students in cutting-edge biology and fostering the next generation of innovators and scientists.

Winthrop High School biology teacher Meghan Dooley sees a benefit in introducing the unit as early as ninth grade. "It is easy to scaffold the units to be able to build skills at a lower level, so that when students reach AP or upper level biology electives they are able to focus more on the content versus the techniques," she said.

AceraEI trained its first group of high school biology teachers in gene editing earlier this year, and participating teachers began applying the curriculum in their own classrooms with

students. As a result of this training, more than 3,000 public school students will soon apply CRISPR to edit a gene in their high school science classrooms.

"All students should be able to link classroom learning to real-world innovations; the CRISPR toolkit is the first step in our plan to collaborate with schools to reinvent high school biology," said Courtney Dickinson, founder and director of Acera. "Working with breakthrough technology that is in the news, and engaging in deep discussions to understand these innovations, including how they work and why they matter, makes science labs meaningful and enable students to see a pathway for themselves as future scientists and innovators."

AceraEI exists to transform STEM education in public schools and develop the next generation of

scientists, innovators, and leaders. AceraEI works with public school districts to develop a plan for transforming STEM education. Founded in 2010, Acera's lab school is a nonprofit STEM school serving students in Grades K-8. The school and its enrichment programs function as an educational innovation hub to invent new curricula with evidence-based pedagogy, founded with the mission to help catalyze change in public education. Acera pedagogy engages students to learn habits of mind like systems thinking, problem-solving, emotional intelligence and collaboration skills within projects aligns with each student's capacities and interests, in an inquiry-based approach. 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

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# City honors Joseph A. Festa Sr. at pole dedication ceremony

The City of Revere dedicated a memorial pole in honor of World War II Navy Veteran Joseph A. Festa Sr. during an impressive ceremony Sunday afternoon.

Family, friends, and city officials gathered at the corner of Ann Road and Malden Street where the pole in "Joseph A. Festa Sr. Square" was unveiled.

Mr. Festa was a successful real estate developer whose company, Joseph Festa Construction Company, built more than 200 homes in West Revere. He was a founder and past president of the Revere Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Festa and his wife, Camille, raised their children at their home on Ann Road.

Marc Silvestri, director of Revere veterans services and master of ceremonies for the speaking program, said, "Today we're here for a special occasion. Joe was a Navy veteran and did some amazing things at a young age for this country. He came back and literally laid a foundation for this city. His children have continued to go on and do amazing things for the city.

"They are a great family, a well-known family who are very well respected in

this city," said Silvestri. "I couldn't think of a more special dedication or memorial to be able to do for the Festa family and for Joe Festa."

Mayor Brian Arrigo said he is always inspired by individuals like Mr. Festa – not just for their brave and dedicated military service – but by the years of devotion to Revere that continued throughout their lives after their military service had ended.

"While he was a World War II veteran and part of the Greatest Generation, we remember him as one of the Revere's most distinguished residents," said Arrigo. "A lot of the Revere we know today is the achievement of Joe Festa's life."

Lauding Mr. Festa's

enormous contributions to the city as its foremost developer and to several local organizations as a leader and philanthropist, Arrigo said, "Yet, for all that Joe Festa did for and in Revere, he never outgrew his youthful enthusiasm for this city and especially, for his greatest accomplishment – his family."

Arrigo said Mr. Festa "carried himself as the consummate gentleman, always well dressed in a shirt and tie and greeting every person he met with a handshake that sent a wave of friendship.

"Joe Festa loved this favorite little corner of the world here where Ann Road intersects Malden Street," continued Arrigo. "It was where he was happiest: at his home. Beginning today

and for the years to come, the name Joseph A. Festa will fittingly adorn this corner."

John Festa said his father's time in the U.S. Navy

"really structured who my dad was."

"When my dad got out of the Navy, he had a such fierce work ethic – he just worked hard, so today is so fitting and especially pleasing to have the pole at this location that he developed, and the house that my family grew up in, and the street named after my sister (Ann).

"My father would always say he was so dedicated and proud of building the neighborhood with my mom who sacrificed a lot as well," said John Festa. "But they were both especially proud of living in the community that they built, and their reputations were so important to them.

"One of the things my parents always stressed to their children was to always


give back to the community. When I look back at some of the things my dad and mom did, like starting the Revere Chamber of Commerce, the Civic Club, and St. Mary's ballfields – that's what was important to them. They weren't materialistic people, they were just hard-working that just loved their family.

"And we're so proud today to have this and I can't thank all of you enough – on behalf of the Festa family, I want to thank you for taking this opportunity to be here today and be a part of this. You're good friends and we truly appreciate it.


"And lastly, I want to thank God for giving my family the best mother and father we could have ever asked for," said John Festa.
