BOH TO DISCUSS INDOOR SMOKING

On October 5 at 6:30 pm, the Revere Board of Health (BOH) will hold a hearing to discuss whether to allow an indoor smoking bar. Smoking bars can include hookahs, cigars, and vapes. While Massachusetts passed a flavor restriction in November 2019, flavored tobacco is allowed in smoking bars. We have learned from the vaping crisis that flavors attract young people, leading to unintended addiction and negative health consequences. Tobacco use causes chronic diseases and shortens life. As a city and state, we have come a long way in reducing tobacco use in young people. As a community, we should strive to create an environment that makes the healthy choice the easy choice. The health of our citizens should come before busi-

National Guard bus drivers will be called into Revere to handle bus driver shortage

Ahead of the 2021/2022 school year, Revere Public Schools (RPS) made some changes to the transportation policy for middle and high school students.

After conducting a survey with parents over the summer, RPS and the Revere School Committee decided only those high school students who live two miles or more from RHS or Seacoast are eligi-

ble for school transportation and only those middle school students who live one mile or more from their middle school are eligible for public school transportation. This was done to free up some buses that serve not only middle school and high school students but also elementary school students in Revere.

However, once the school year began RPS administrators realized

the city was not immune to the bus driver shortage plaguing the rest of the state.

"We've experienced some challenges with transportation as we opened the school year that is not unique to Revere but a trend that has been experienced across the Commonwealth and across the country," said RPS Superintendent Dr.

Council discusses Rotondo's request to add more motions per meeting

The City Council sent to the Legislative Affairs Sub-Committee a motion by Councillor-at-Large George Rotondo that would expand the number of individual motions to ten per meeting.

"During summer months when we are not in session, sometimes we will have more than five motions that will need to be addressed and my thought is during that time period, if you would allow a certain amount - obviously you (Council President Anthony Zambuto) would dictate how many [motions] would be able to be spoken on depending on the president's discretion," explained Rotondo.

Ward 3 Councillor Arthur Guinasso asked

aloud, "You serious?"

"There's 11 councillors here," continued Guinasso. "Ten motions [per councillor], that's 110 motions. The public wants to know only the key issues of what's happening at the particular time. I think if you need 10 motions if we meet twice a month, no problem - I just think this is absolutely absurd. Ten motions? It's insane."

Rotondo responded, "Some of us get called one o'clock in the morning. There are times when you have to actually put in a motion to accomplish certain things. Being an at-large councillor and not a ward councillor and having people call you because they don't speak English."

Rotondo continued his response before Guinasso

interrupted him and said, "This is not a point of personal privilege."

"Well, you attacked me based upon the fact that I wanted to provide a service to people," said Rotondo.

Council President Anthony Zambuto sent the matter to the Legislative Affairs Subcommittee for further discussion.

City Council joins Arrigo in opposition to homeless center at Quality Inn

From the moment the story first surfaced that the Boston Public Health Commission was looking at the Quality Inn, Revere, as a potential site for a homeless transitional center, Mayor Brian Arrigo stood firm in opposition to the proposal.

Arrigo's efforts in fighting back and taking that fight to the public immediately did not go unnoticed by his colleagues in city government.

"The issue has received quite a bit of press over the last couple of weeks to the point where everybody in the city wants to talk about it," said Councillor-at-Large Gerry Visconti at Monday's Council meeting.

Addressing homeless individuals in Boston, Visconti added, "I am so deeply sorry that Acting Mayor Kim Janey, the

Boston City Council, and the Boston Public Health Commission has failed you. The fact that they have the audacity to put their heads in the sand for the past 10 years and then all of sudden want to push that problem over to the Revere area is inconceivable, it is unbelievable."

"We have our own problem of substance abuse that we are dealing with, and homelessness that we're dealing with in this city - and to try to push that on our city right now, we can't deal with that."

Visconti was interrupted by applause from the audience in the Council Chambers following his opening statement. The first-term councillor was forceful and eloquent in his opposition to the proposal. Observers said after the meeting that it may

State Rep. Jessica Giannino is leading a statewide effort asking other state representatives and state senators to join her in opposing the conversion of the Quality Inn in Revere to a homeless transitional center.

Giannino said she, Rep. Jeffrey Turco, and Rep. Donald Wong have collaborated their efforts and sent a letter to the Boston Public Health Commis-

sion asking Executive Dir. Dr. Bisola Ojikuto "to reconsider these ill-conceived plans immediately and initiate a dialogue with public health officials in adjacent communities to chart a new course that will have a real chance at creating comprehensive, inclusive solutions to these problems."

City awards \$660,000 of Community Development Block Grant to Community Organizations

Mayor Brian Arrigo and the Department of Planning and Community Development awarded Revere community organizations and municipal agencies a total of \$660,000 through Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding. Each awarded organization successfully demonstrates an ability to prevent, prepare for, and/or respond to the pandemic as well as service predominantly low to moderate income Revere residents.

“The pandemic has heightened the need for collaborative approaches to economic recovery,” said Mayor Brian Arrigo. “The CDBG program is an incredible opportunity for community partners and organizations. I am thankful for all the work they have done throughout the pandemic and know they will use this grant to better our community.”

The following nonprofit organizations and City Departments will receive CDBG funding:

Cambridge Health Alliance: Cambridge Health Alliance will establish a Career Pathways program for Revere youth and young adults. The program will focus on exploring healthcare related career pathways and leadership development. A Youth Advisory Board will also be created to help guide curriculum development, overall structure,

and supportive services.

Cambridge Health Alliance: Cambridge Health Alliance will enroll 15 Revere residents in their Community Health Worker Training Program.

Community Action Programs Inter-City (CAPIC): CAPIC will provide rental or mortgage assistance Revere households that are facing eviction or housing displacement.

CONNECT: CONNECT, in partnership with Revere Works, will hire a bilingual job navigator to provide one-on-one job navigation services, including resume editing, interview preparation, application guidance, and soft skills training.

For Kids Only: For Kids Only will provide health and wellness-focused services to Revere youth affected by the Coronavirus pandemic. This includes the addition of an Inclusion Specialist and 1:1 aides to work with children in small group settings, train staff of therapeutic techniques, and communicate with families around support and additional resources.

HarborCOV: HarborCOV will hire a bilingual Domestic Violence Case Manager to provide intensive case management for survivors of domestic violence, hotline and on-call coverage, and comprehensive referrals to community resources.

City of Revere Awards \$660,000 of Community Development Block Grant Public Service Funding to Community Organizations

Services: Mystic Valley will provide transportation to Revere elders and a congregate meal program in partnership with the Revere Senior Center.

Revere Community Health and Engagement Department: The Revere Farmers Market will provide Revere residents with a \$20 shopping card, enabling them to purchase fresh, local produce at the market and provide Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) bags to residents facing increased food insecurity due to the COVID19 pandemic.

Revere Community School (RCS): RCS will provide scholarships for Revere residents to attend English and/or HISET classes for those who are looking to attend college, gain employment and/or obtain a better job.

Revere Parks and Rec-

reation Department: The Parks and Recreation Department will provide a Saturday enrichment camp for Revere youth. The camp will enable parents and guardians to work on Saturdays without worrying about the cost of childcare. Additionally, youth enrolled in the camp will be provided with additional educational supports to address any adverse impacts of remote learning over the past year.

Revere Substance Use Disorder & Homelessness Initiatives (SUDHI) Office: The SUDHI Office will hire a full-time outreach worker who will carry out a wide range of services with the unsheltered population in Revere. Services will focus on linking individuals to community resources, provide social and healthcare support, and facilitate continuity of

care by providing follow up and improved communication between partners.

The Neighborhood Developers: The Neighborhood Developers will expand resident services programming for residents living in their affordable housing units in Revere. They will focus their efforts in three areas: 1) offering part and full day on-site childcare to allow for residents to go back to work 2) tutoring program for youth who may need extra support/assistance as a result of virtual learning and 3) pilot rent reporting as a tool for increasing credit scores for individuals who took on debt during the pandemic.

“Given the adverse impacts of the pandemic on Revere residents, funding our community partners will yield exciting, innovative approaches to

struggles our community faces every day,” said Danielle Osterman, Community Development Program Manager. “By focusing on housing stability, pathways to good jobs, and increasing access to affordable childcare, these community partners draw upon key recommendations from Revere’s Workforce Development Plan. The CDBG Program in Revere continues to take steps towards establishing long-lasting, transformational benefits for our hard-working residents.”

This work coupled with the city’s overall master plan, Next Stop Revere, will create the tools and policies necessary for the next generation of success in Revere. Visit the Community Development Office’s webpage on revere.org for more information.

Arrigo announces launch of inclusionary zoning process for housing

Mayor Brian M. Arrigo announced the launch of the city’s inclusionary zoning process to preserve the affordability of housing in Revere. As part of the initial kick-off, the Mayor joined a meeting of local stakeholders including housing advocates, developers, community leaders, elected officials who have been appointed to inform this effort in partnership with Metropolitan Area Planning Council (MAPC), and the City’s Department of Planning and Community Development.

“In Revere, our diverse neighborhoods are the foundation of our city. Now we are growing faster than ever and it’s important that our housing production and policies keep up the pace to support all of our residents,” said Mayor Brian Arrigo. “We are excited to start our Inclusionary Zoning process and work to maintain and increase housing opportunities for all in our community.”

The newly-appointed

Inclusionary Zoning Advisory Committee (IZAC) will guide the policy creation from start to finish and lead efforts to seek input from a diversity of Revere residents. Community members will learn about and provide input on Revere’s housing needs, the market, and the residential development process. Working collaboratively through focus groups and two public forums, the advisory committee will be responsible for submitting a final recommendation to the city for adoption into the Revere Zoning Code.

“Our city has made great strides in promoting economic development that leverages Revere’s unique environmental and transit assets,” said Tech Leng, the City of Revere’s Chief of Planning and Community Development. “As part of our master planning process, it was clear that we needed to pursue new policies that ensure Revere remains a competitive and accessible place for residents to live, work, and raise a family.”

Inclusionary zoning is a powerful municipal planning tool that ensures

newly constructed residential development of a certain scale includes a percentage of units that are deed-restricted to be affordable to lower and moderate-income residents.

Adopting inclusionary zoning was a key recommendation in the “Next Stop Revere” master plan, which was based on extensive public input gathered in 2019. As Revere continues to grow, this new regulatory policy will allow for the city to maintain and increase housing opportunities for all residents.

Revere is working with MAPC to conduct outreach, facilitate Committee meetings, analyze data and interviews with various stakeholders, and draft the inclusionary zoning ordinance. The Inclusionary Zoning Advisory Committee began its work this week and invites the community to an online citywide public engagement event in October.

Dianne Kelly at last Tuesday evening’s School Committee Meeting. “We’ve been working very hard with our transportation vendor to help iron out some issues.”

RPS Assistant Superintendent Dr. Richard Gallucci, who had been working with the RPS transportation department ahead of the school year, said the department figured 25 buses would be enough to cover transportation but learned very quickly during the first weeks of school the district would need close to 31 buses to cover all the schools and the riders at each school.

“When we kind of delve into the ‘why’? certainly there was some ridership increase,” said Gallucci. “The Extended Learning Time schools’ arrival and dismissal time now align with other schools and prevent us from having buses do a second run that they typically would have done in years previous. The big ticket item was that traffic in the city really prevented any type of double run within a 25 minute window. So, when we entered the year, we

had buses scheduled to service a middle school, drop all of the children off, circle back around to the elementary schools, which was getting out 25 minutes later, then drop all those children off to complete that double run but it was just not realistic.”

Gallucci explained that the buses were arriving very late at the elementary schools and children were arriving home too late.

“We quickly learned that we had to really expand the amount of buses,” said Gallucci. “So we went through an early expansion and after going through some personnel changes we were able to kind of tackle some of the issues that existed in terms of the planned routes.”

For example, by combining some routes RPS was able to go from four buses down to two buses for the Whalen School and two buses down to one at the Paul Revere and Lincoln Schools.

Revere also accepted help from the Massachusetts National Guard, who was called into cities like Chelsea and Lawrence by Gov. Charlie Baker to address the bus driver short-

age.

“You may have heard about this in the news about the National Guard offering to help support districts that are struggling with transportation,” said Gallucci. “We are at the very final stages of confirming that partnership. We’re actually going to be getting three licensed drivers from the National Guard. What this will do for us is give us some flexibility with drivers and monitors that are currently driving vans. We had two vans that were unoccupied so they’ll take over those vans and be able to provide further transportation support and complete runs within our school district. They will require a monitor and they will be wearing uniforms. We’re going to make families aware so they’re not surprised when those (National Guard) drivers arrive to pick up their children.”

While Gallucci said RPS will continue hiring efforts to further support the city’s school transportation needs Gallucci said the one thing he realized from this issue is that the process of preparation has to be a lot more extensive.

“It has to be a lot more tighter so that we go into the school year knowing what our ridership is, understanding who is taking what bus, and really giving families more information ahead of the school year,” he said. “Looking at our routes I think we’ve learned from this year that we may have had some routes that could have been consolidated had we known about ridership. We could have also been looking at maps and asking, ‘Okay these two buses are heading in the same direction, is this an instance where we can have children on the bus and not overextend ourselves in terms of the number of buses that we need for the district?’ I think these are all things that we are going to start now in preparing for next year as opposed to waiting until the end of the school year and then starting to prep. I think we got a good handle on our transportation needs this year and I think we’re going to use that data and certainly build upon it as we learn more.”

Petitioner withdraws application for single-family home on Agneous Ave.

The Revere Zoning Board of Appeals met for about three minutes last Wednesday to take up the petition from Cavallo Corporation of Somerville for numerous variances to enable Cavallo to construct a single-family dwelling on vacant Lots 5 and 6 on Agneous Avenue.

Chairman Michael Tucker and members Aklog Limeneh, Arthur Pelton, John Lopes, and new member Hazem Hamdan were present.

Lawrence A. Simeone Jr., the attorney for the petitioner, said that his client would like to withdraw its application without prejudice after having been unable to resolve matters with neighbors at the present time.

"There appears to be quite a divide as to what should and should not go on this lot," said Simeone.

Tucker said that the board had received numerous emails on the mat-

ter, including from Ward 1 Councillor Joanne McKenna and Ward 4 Councillor Patrick M. Keefe Jr.

The board unanimously voted to allow the petition to be withdrawn without prejudice, which means that the applicant could come back at a later time..

Tucker said the next meeting of the ZBA is set for October 27.

LET'S BUILD A DRUG TREATMENT AND HOMELESS FACILITY IN DOVER

Back in the 1970s and '80s, when there was talk of expanding Logan Airport to the detriment of residents in the communities of Winthrop, Revere, Chelsea, and South Boston, among others, then-State Senator William Bulger of So. Boston suggested constructing a second major airport for the Boston metro area in the town of Dover, the upper-class suburb west of Boston.

Bulger knew that his idea would never fly (pun intended), but the point he was making was this: Residents of low-income communities should not have to be the only ones to bear the burden of the noise and air pollution from Logan Airport.

Similarly, we view the ongoing controversy regarding the growing problem of homeless and drug-addicted persons at the Mass. and Cass intersection in the same light. The extraordinary statement released last week by Revere Mayor Brian Arrigo in response to the suggestion that a hotel in Revere be converted into a homeless shelter and treatment facility highlights the unequal burden being placed upon the communities of the immediate Metro Boston area of dealing with the scourge of drug addiction, which goes hand-in-hand with homelessness.

As Mayor Arrigo's statement points out, this is not NIMBY-ism. Revere and Boston already shoulder a huge share of the burden. But he states quite frankly -- and truthfully -- that the problem is a regional one and requires a regional solution. Indeed, it has been reported that 70 percent of those who live on Boston's streets are not Boston residents.

However, we think that truly solving the problems of drug addiction and homelessness has to be even more systemic in order to address their root cause.

First and foremost, we must end the war on drugs. The best evidence that our Forever War on Drugs (now more than 50 years old) has been a total failure is this: In 2020, there were more than 93,000 drug overdose deaths in the United States, a number that shattered the previous record. The U.S. now has one of the highest rates of drug-related deaths in the world. Indeed, it is fair to say that it is the War on Drugs itself that is directly responsible for the deaths of tens of thousands of Americans.

Massachusetts spends about \$60,000 per inmate per year in our prisons. For those whose sole "crime" was simple possession of a drug or a failed urine test with a Probation Officer, incarceration is merely a revolving door that accomplishes nothing, either for the individual or society, at a great financial cost to all of us.

We call upon our state's political leaders to show a little bit -- just a bit -- of courage in order to enact legislation similar to what the voters in Oregon approved in 2020 when they decriminalized the possession of all drugs.

Second, the state should establish clean injection sites with appropriate mental and physical health capabilities. Portugal has been doing this for 20 years and has by far the lowest rate of drug-overdose deaths in Europe at six per million of its population. By contrast, Scotland has a rate of 335 drug-related deaths per million for persons ages 15-64 -- which is about the same rate as we have here in the U.S. -- and which is 15 times greater than the rate for the rest of the nations in Europe (and exponentially more than Portugal's).

Clean injection sites in Portugal (and Switzerland) provide addicts with drugs that are not dangerously-laced with fentanyl or other substances, while also offering services for their physical and mental health. In addition, safe injection sites avoid the problem of dirty needles, which still ranks as one of the chief causes for the transmission of AIDS and other serious diseases which, by the way, seep into our population as a whole.

There presently are bills pending before the legislature to establish clean injection sites and we call upon our legislature to pass this legislation expeditiously.

Third, we need to get creative in order to build affordable housing for those who presently live on the streets. Our present policy of doing next to nothing for the homeless is a tragedy that is played out every day at Mass. and Cass.

There will be a large cost at the outset for any housing program for the homeless. But in the long run, there will be huge savings of tax dollars when we abandon our present failed model of arrest-prosecution-incarceration, as well as finally making progress in addressing the problem of substance abuse that afflicts so many.

Oh, and we also suggest that our state officials look into placing drug-treatment and homeless shelters in hotels and other potential sites in the areas of our wealthy suburbs, such as Dover, Wellesley, Weston, etc., so that those communities can do their part to solve the twin crises of drug addiction and homelessness in our state.

On September 6, I was able to visit Haiti to meet with Cardinal Langlois of Les Cayes, to survey the challenges now confronting the Haitian people and to express the solidarity of the Archdiocese, home to one of the largest Haitian communities in the United States, with the Church and the nation of Haiti. I was delighted to spend time with a fine young priest in Haiti, Fr. Louis Merosné, who was raised in St. Angela Parish in Mattapan and then returned to Haiti to pursue a vocation to the priesthood.

Even a brief visit two weeks ago vividly illustrated the threefold crisis now in Haiti. First, the political crisis catalyzed by the assassination of the President with far-reaching consequences for governance. Second, the social-legal crisis, created by the control that gangs exercise in parts of the country. Third, all this is complemented by the devastating poverty and dislocation caused by the second massive earthquake along with a hurricane suffered by Haiti and the COVID health crisis,

Willingness to try and to learn new skills is imperative to navigating life. There is always more to learn.

Learning happens in school, through trial and error, personal research and time spent with others who already know what you need to learn.

You can learn a lot from listening to others. Listening is one of the greatest tools of financial and life security. If you will listen you will know what you know plus what you are hearing.

The ability to listen and focus in a class is essential for a student's success. Listening to your workplace boss, or someone who is training you is imperative. When someone is telling you how to do something you have potential to grow as a person. Someone is giving you

all occurring in the span of ten years.

Remarkably, the Haitian people and the Church in Haiti manifest great faith and resilience in the midst of such suffering and chaotic conditions. I am grateful for their witness.

The United States has exercised pervasive influence in Haiti for over a century, often a history marked by mistaken policies and ill-conceived ideas. Once again, the United States is inextricably involved with Haiti and its crisis. Once again, U.S. policy seems to be a mix of very helpful and also some very concerning measures. The present Administration has committed significant funding for humanitarian assistance and disaster relief after the hurricane. These steps respond positively and directly to the request made by Cardinal Langlois to the international community. In addition, our government has extended the Temporary Protective Status (TPS) for Haitians in the United States, a crucially important measure.

At the same time, however, the United States is

now carrying out an airlift of Haitian men, women, and children back to Haiti. The decision affecting some 14,000 Haitians now at the Texas border is a surprisingly and shockingly inhumane policy. The Administration has the legal authority for its policy, but the policy is blind to the moral and human consequences of this action. Haiti, the poorest country in the Western hemisphere, is incapable of absorbing this influx of young and older Haitians, all traumatized by the journey to the U.S. border. To be sure, many made this journey under mistaken assumptions about U.S. policy. But this fact does not absolve our country's policy choices. Some cases of human suffering are sufficiently overwhelming to change the logic of existing policy. In this case, there is the need for a review and recasting of U.S. policy. The airlift should be halted while this review is conducted. Only then will it be possible to shape a short-term policy worthy of the U.S. role in the world and appropriate for the crisis Haitians now face.

In the encyclical "Fratelli Tutti", Pope Francis appealed to humanity to set aside conflicts, resentment and quests for power, in favor of solidarity, collaboration and mutual support. The Holy Father shared his hope that, "by acknowledging the dignity of each human person, we can contribute to the rebirth of a universal aspiration to fraternity between all men and women." These sentiments are evident in his call for the international community to provide relief for the tragic situation the Haitians are facing. In addition to the collection for Haiti taken up in our parishes, the Church in Boston will continue to call for a more compassionate policy from the U.S. government for Haitians at the border. I ask all to pray for the nation of Haiti and the Haitian community there and in our country, and to be generous in supporting efforts to raise funds to help those suffering in this humanitarian crisis.

Jesus understood this. He told his followers the greatest commandment is to love the Lord your God with all of your heart, soul, mind and strength. That is focus. Focus is what anything worth doing normally requires.



Happy to see Human Resource Professional – Two years ago, I campaigned for a human resource professional to be added to the staff for Revere Public Schools. Thankfully, one was hired this year and I was very happy to see this position created.

McKenna reflects on life as a teacher, artist and child of a veteran, Olympian and an immigrant

Joanne McKenna is one of Revere's most well-known residents. The Ward One City Councillor and popular retired teacher, also has a life that is rich in history that extends beyond teaching and politics.

McKenna was the daughter of a World War II veteran and Italian immigrant who met in Florence, Italy during the German invasion. "My father, Walter, met my mother, Anna, in Florence, Italy during World War II. Her father, my grandfather, was out after curfew and was taken by the Germans, put in a Polish Concentration Camp for 3 years to be used for slave labor. My grandmother stepped on a landmine crossing a field to get food for her daughters. She was hospitalized for over a year. Losing her home and all her possessions to the destruction of the war, Anna survived with her sister, Liana, living in train stations, staying in convents with the nuns and living in the woods. She would meet my father with only a coat made from an Army Blanket that covered her from the cold weather."

"In her younger years while in Italy and under the regime of Mussolini, my mother took up swimming, became an Olympic long distance swimmer and won a Silver Medal at the 1936 Berlin Olympics. My parents were later

children and settled in Beachmont so my mother could continue to swim. The first time my father took my mother to Revere Beach, my mother decided to go for one of her normal swims which led her to Nahant. Not knowing my mother's athletic abilities, my father called the Coast Guard and they followed her until she completed her swim."

Joanne's father taught Music and English at the McKinley School for over 25 years. He also played trumpet for the Ruby Newman Orchestra. Her mother was a server for Boston University. "Growing up, my parents struggled financially providing for my older brother Gilbert, my sister Liana and myself. We never knew of their struggles because we always had plenty of food on the table. We were constantly told to be kind, portray good morals and values and help thy neighbor. We were exposed to art and music

every weekend, where we played instruments, drew and sang."

After high school, Joanne continued her education at Berklee College of Music for one semester. She then attended Montserrat College of Art where her interest in photography started. She would continue her education at Massachusetts College of Art and received a Bachelor's Degree in Art Education. From there, she received two Master's degrees in Psychology and Education, and a licensure in School Administration. Despite her extensive education, Joanne was diagnosed with dyslexia in 2005 after failing the MTEL Test.

During her 32 years as a teacher with RPS, Joanne had many memorable moments. "My most memorable moments as a teacher in 32 years were in 2007 and 2014 when the Senior class dedicated the yearbooks to me. In 2007 and then again in 2015 they voted for me to be the Commencement Speaker at their graduations. Being the class advisor for 19 years, I really got to know each student on a personal basis. We would fundraise, and I would run all the events for each class. In 2009, I realized the desperate need for clothing in high school. I solicited new prom dresses from the Ultimate and tuxes from Russo's Tux to help the kids that couldn't afford them. My students and I then started the first clothing bank at Revere High School where so many kids came and took advantage of clothes that were donated by high end consignment stores. I also helped to establish "Adopt A Student". Teachers throughout the entire school district donated, helping so many needy kids."

Aside from teaching, Joanne also has a background rich in the arts. "Although I have been commissioned to have done many murals, works of art, and paintings, I al-

ways considered myself more talented in photography. My memorable moments as a photographer throughout the years was working undercover with the Massachusetts State Police, taking surveillance photographs of drug deals that were happening at Logan Airport. I have also worked with the Revere Police-Forensics Unit. One of my exciting moments was when I was hired by a construction company to track their development progress. I took aerial landscape and construction photographs — while I was harnessed outside of a helicopter. In 1985, A photograph taken with my telephoto lens was crucial to assist the Somerville Police in identifying and capturing a rapist sitting in the bleachers at a football game. I was grateful and proud my camera and skills could help make a difference. I was also honored to photograph all of the RHS sports events, political advertisements, and fundraisers for elected officials in Revere."

Joanne has also worked with private detectives, photographed many weddings, shot portraits, and

worked as a photojournalist. "I was also very fortunate to sit with the sports photographers on the parquet floor at the former Boston Garden, capturing the Celtics during the Larry Bird era. In 1989, I started a sports photography business called Lo-Mack Studios that lasted for fifteen years."

Joanne continued to take photos and do freelance work throughout these years however her love and passion was always teaching art and photography within Revere Public Schools. "For 32 years, I taught my students how to be creative, imaginative, and confident. Teaching high school was the best years of my life. I could not have picked a more gratifying and rewarding profession. I enjoyed going to work everyday as a teacher and loved every student that I taught."

Mayor Brian Arrigo appointed Joanne to the newly formed Revere Public Arts Commission where she serves as Chairwoman. According to their website, the Commission's mission is to support, expand, and build a vibrant arts community for Revere's past, present, and future. They envision a city where the arts are thriving and the community is engaged by uniting, and creating an arts and cultural awareness.



Revere football rushes past Medford, 34-6

Revere High football players have grown accustomed to winning the past four seasons. After an appearance in the North sectional finals versus Melrose in 2019, the Patriots won three of their four games during an abbreviated season in the spring

of 2021. In 2018, Revere had a 7-4 record. The winning is continuing in the fall of 2021 as Revere is off to a solid 2-1 after defeating Medford, 34-6, Friday night at Hormel Stadium. What looked like a rebuilding year on paper is now turning into a play-off-contending season for

have been Visconti's most powerful address in what has been a successful first term for the popular legislator. "I'm sorry, Mayor Janey, Revere is not and will not be your dumping grounds for your problem," said Visconti. "The residents of North Revere don't want this. The residents of West Revere don't want this. The entire city doesn't want this. To Mayor Janey, I leave you with one message - not now, now ever." Ward 6 Councillor Richard Serino said the property in question is in Ward 6. "Obviously a lot of people are not only concerned, but they feel terrible that the plan calls for taking homeless people who are in the City of Boston and just placing them in this hotel," said Serino. "The location of the Quality Inn - people just see it's on Route 1 and say there's nothing around them - well right behind the Quality Inn, there are homes and residents in North Revere," said Serino, noting there are no adequate resources available at the hotel. "You're taking people who need our help and you're only making their bad situation worse because you

just want to bring them to another community and bring the problem and have us solve it." Council President Anthony Zambuto spoke about the unity among Mayor Arrigo and his colleagues on the City Council. "We're all on the same page in this issue - the mayor, the administration - we're working cooperatively, and I've never seen such unity. I've been here a long time, and I've never seen this kind of unity. This is something in which we are standing for what's right. As my colleague said, we will not be steamrolled, and we will not be forced, especially to do something that's not coordinated, as the COVID-19 thing was very coordinated with the state and all our partners, and it was done properly." Ward 4 Councillor Patrick Keefe said, "We are a growing city, but we can't handle it [the homeless transitional center being placed in Revere]. We've been a very good neighbor [to Boston]. Revere has done its part through the COVID-19 pandemic. Revere will continue to do its part to serve its residents. There are homeless issues in the city of

Revere. We have to take care of our problems first before we can take on one of the richest economies in the world in the City of Boston. Before we take care of that, we need to take care of Revere. We're continuing to fight on this issue together. It's not going to happen. Period. The end." Councillor-at-Large Steven Morabito said, "The City of Boston is not going to put the finger at us, and make us look like we have no empathy and that we're turning the homeless away. "Boston basically tried to calm their political storm by relocating their issue to Revere - and it's not going to happen," said Morabito. "It's very important that we, one Revere, we're united. Together we stand and we're going to fight this, because we need to take care of our own before we can even think of helping anyone in a neighboring city." Morabito said that "Revere is not backing down," and with Mayor Brian Arrigo getting out quickly and vigorously on the issue, the unified approach between the Arrigo administration and the City Council is working well.

Wong's letter:
Dear Dr. Ojikutu,
It is with great urgency that we write to you today regarding the untenable position that your agency has put vulnerable residents, the City of Revere and Town of Saugus in. More specifically, we are appalled by the lack of transparency, communication, accountability, or even basic courtesy that the Boston Public Health Commission has displayed in concocting and attempting to execute a "regional" plan to address the disaster within its own jurisdiction on Melnea Cass Boulevard by converting the Quality Inn Hotel at 100 Morris Street, Revere, to a homeless transitional center. We, the undersigned Representatives of communities that surround the City of Boston, are deeply concerned about the chaotic & cryptic nature of both this process and the dis-information that has resulted from it being spread across the region. As a result, we have lost a great deal of confidence in the Boston Public Health Commission's ability to take any kind of a leadership role on an issue of such regional public importance. People experiencing homelessness and battling substance use disorder deserve the resources and intervention efforts necessary for them to lead stable, fulfilling lives. Regrettably, the actions taken by the BPHC thus far place the City of Revere's commitment to these neighbors in jeopardy while at the same time frustrating efforts for

stakeholder buy-in and collaboration necessary to combat this regional crisis. If the City of Revere can be forced into such an adversarial position on an issue that it has previously shown true commitment to solving, it leaves all surrounding communities wondering if they are to be the next victims of the BPHC's callousness. The City of Boston has adequate hotels and the funding necessary to provide for the unhoused individuals from Melnea Cass Boulevard without transferring the burden onto the communities that surround Boston. Given the immense challenges of supporting a population marginalized by high rates of substance use disorder, mental health challenges, and trauma, every public health measure concerning the unhoused ought to establish clear lines of communication and readiness protocols with all involved stakeholders. The actions of the BPHC, therefore, currently pose an imminent threat to all the communities that surround Boston which jeopardizes their ability and willingness to work together. It is clear that little to no planning was undertaken in advance of the relocation of unhoused individuals from Melnea Cass Boulevard. The BPHC has continued to insist that the Quality Inn initiative is just one instance of a larger regional approach to the crisis on Melnea Cass Boulevard, yet they have not been able to provide the City of Revere or Town of Saugus with any

examples of other municipalities joining this effort or converting facilities for displaced residents. This information gap is particularly frustrating, as Revere believes that an initiative that could bind several municipalities together in solidarity to root out homelessness in the Commonwealth is one worth undertaking. This effort cannot be solely focused on our Gateway Cities, but rather a true collaborative approach across our region. Beyond the logistical and communication challenges, the BPHC has set the stage for fierce, adverse reaction against the interventions our homeless neighbors need, ultimately undermining the public health improvements we all agree are necessary. We join as colleagues in expressing our deep concern and wish to be very clear: any scenario in which BPHC continues to abuse homeless men and women by evicting them from their city and into surrounding communities like this is an unacceptable one and will be met with fierce opposition. We hope that you will reconsider these ill-conceived plans immediately and initiate a dialogue with public health officials in adjacent communities to chart a new course that will have a real chance at creating comprehensive, inclusive solutions to these problems. Thank you for your prompt consideration of these matters. Jessica Ann Giannino

RHS SPORTS *Through the Years*

10 years ago September 28, 2011

Just as the New England Patriots failed to make it to 3-0 this past weekend after their bizarre loss in Buffalo, so too, did their Revere High namesakes prove unable to get off to a 3-0 start of their 2011 campaign, dropping a 28-0 decision to Swampscott Friday evening under the lights at a wet Harry Della Russo Stadium. The visitors grabbed control of the contest from the outset, marching 70 yards to paydirt on their first possession of the night. A Swampscott interception in Revere territory on the ensuing Patriot possession led to a 40 yard TD drive for a 14-0 Swampscott lead in the first quarter. However, there were some bright spots for the Pats, who now are 2-1 on the season, amid the gloomy night. The Revere defense held firm in the second half against Swampscott, which continued to play its first-line players until

the waning minutes of the game. Although Revere did not put up big numbers on the offensive stat sheet, quarterback Joe Ritchie and captain Drew Lauria both turned in solid efforts in the rushing department with 75 yards apiece.

20 years ago Oct. 3, 2001

The RHS football team almost pulled off a huge upset over Waltham, but an illegal shift call by a ref nullified a 23 yard TD run by Mike Silvestri in the final minutes, allowing Waltham to hang on for a 23-18 win. Quarterback Bryan Marino, who rushed for 115 yards on 22 carries, scored one TD for Revere and Peter Graziani reached the end zone twice for coach Mike Casano's Patriots.

Ba Tran ran to first place in a time of 15:34 over the 2.86 mile course at Pine Banks to lead the RHS boys cross country team to an easy 16-47 win over Malden.

30 years ago Oct. 2, 1991

The RHS boys soccer team improved to 3-1-1 with wins over Arlington and Waltham.

Mike Mucci rushed for 116 yards on 24 carries and quarterback Karl Bussey connected on a 56-yard TD pass to Brandon Vasapoli to lead the RHS football team to a 19-7 win over defending Super Bowl champion Peabody. Carl Aloupis also scored for Revere on a 29 yard run.

40 years ago Sept. 30, 1981

Junior halfback Ron Lusso rushed for 178 yards and scored two touchdowns to pace the RHS football team to an 18-0 win over Arlington. Ed Doris gained 71 yards on the ground and Mike Sigorini scored a TD on an interception return.

Coach Frank Gallagher's RHS boys cross country team raced to its 32nd straight win, 23-32, over

what had been a favored Medford squad. Paul Curreri won the race in 16:11, followed by David DeMatteo in 16:20, Kevin Hill in 16:23, Ed Corso in 16:26, and Paul Bulas in 16:56. The Patriots have won four straight GBL titles.

50 years ago Sept. 30, 1971

Joe Festa rushed for 78 yards on 16 carries and quarter back Charley Anderson scored one touchdown and hit Rich DeChristoforo with a 10-yard TD pass for another, but the Patriots dropped a 14-12 decision to No. Quincy.

The Immaculate Conception High football team defeated St. Columbkille, 20-0.

60 years ago Oct. 5, 1961

The newly-formed Revere Pop Warner football program is off to a good start with two wins. Founding members of the

local group are Michael Bucciero, Pico Myers, Pat Tata, Ralph Ferragamo, John Marino, and Jim Cole.

Brian Rebholz and Ron Lanza scored touchdowns to lead the RHS football team to a 16-6 win over St. Mary's of Lynn.

Ed Ferragamo scored two TD's and tossed a pass to Bruce Dodson for another, but the Immaculate Conception football team dropped a 30-18 decision to St. Clement's.

70 years ago Oct. 4, 1951

The Revere High football team scored two touchdowns in the final quarter to earn a 13-13 tie with Brockton before 4000 fans at Paul Revere Stadium. Andy D'Eramo and George Dunn scored the touchdowns for Revere.

The Immaculate Conception High football team crushed St. Charles of Waltham, 30-0, before 1500 fans at Paul Revere

Stadium Sunday afternoon. Billy Fothergill, Bobby Cahill (2), and Johnny O'Connor scored the IC touchdowns.

80 years ago October 2, 1941

The RHS football team was outclassed by Chelsea High 14-0 last Thursday evening under the lights at Chelsea Stadium. The local team will host a powerful Lynn Classical squad this Friday evening in the first-ever home night game in RHS grid history at the new Paul Revere Stadium thanks to a portable lighting unit obtained by Faculty Manager Charles Doherty.

Legislation filed to support transferring military families

The Baker-Polito Administration filed legislation to improve the occupational licensing process for certain professions for military families transferring to Massachusetts. The legislation would help facilitate license portability for military families transferring to military installations in Massachusetts by entering the Commonwealth into a series of interstate licensure compacts and other agreements.

"This legislation will help the Commonwealth further improve and streamline the process for military families who are looking to transfer their professional licenses to Massachusetts," said Governor Charlie Baker. "Our administration is committed to helping these military families successfully resettle in the Commonwealth, and these steps will ensure that military families who are making Massachusetts their new home will have an easier time in keeping their professional licenses and maintaining that source of income."

"Massachusetts has a long history of supporting the many military veterans and their families here who have made difficult sacrifices during their service," said Lt. Governor Karyn Polito. "That support includes prioritizing professional licenses for incoming families, and this bill removes additional barriers to household stability and civilian careers for those transferring to military installations in the Commonwealth."

The legislation would implement recommendations made by the Division of Occupational Licensure (DOL), formerly the Division of Professional Licensure, in accordance with Executive Order 593, signed by Governor Baker in February 2021. The Executive Order directed the DOL to study interstate compacts and similar agreements relative to licensure for professions licensed by five boards under DOL's purview. The professions covered by this order were identified by the Air Force and Department of Defense and include physical therapists (and physical therapy assistants); accountants; engineers; psychologists; and barbers and cosmetologists.

Upon implementation of this bill, Massachusetts will be able to participate in the Nurse Licensure Compact, the Physical Therapy Compact, and the Psychology Interjurisdictional Compact (PSYPACT). The participation in these compacts allows qualified practitioners from member states to obtain the ability to practice in Massachusetts via a streamlined process, which reduces regulatory burdens for these

professionals while also enhancing access to care for the consumer. In turn, Massachusetts licensees would also benefit from the ability to practice in other states that are part of the compacts.

"Behind each of the Commonwealth's six military installations are dedicated men and women serving their nation and providing for their families," said Housing and Economic Development Secretary Mike Kennealy. "These military installations drive significant economic activity, and by simplifying the process of transferring professional licenses, we can increase our support for military families relocating to Massachusetts by making it easier for those family members holding professional licenses to continue their careers."

"The DOL continues to prioritize professional licenses for military personnel and their spouses and is committed to improving the licensee experience," said Division of Occupational Licensure Commissioner Layla D'Emilia. "The addition of interstate compacts, streamlined DOL web resources for military-connected applicants, and appointment of dedicated staff to support these applicants helps to further ease the process for military family relocating to Massachusetts."

"This effort reflects the mission and effectiveness of the Commonwealth's Military Asset and Security Strategy Task Force (MASS-TF) in protecting and strengthening our military installations," said John Beatty, Executive Director of the MASS-TF. "Led by the Governor's team, we have worked across the Baker-Polito Administration and with our state legislators, installation leaders, our Mass National Guard, and directly with the Department of Defense, the Air Force, and Army to ensure we arrived at the right initiative that will ensure Massachusetts remains a welcoming place for service members and their families."

This bill seeks to build on previously enacted laws, including Valor Act I (2012) and Valor Act II (2014), that assist and support military families returning from active duty, or relocating to Massachusetts.

The Commonwealth remains a leader in professional licensure, ensuring that licensees receive proper training to practice in their field safely and competently. This legislation to join interstate compacts will not only assist the military community and licensees, but the citizens of the Commonwealth will have increased access to the best health-care available.
