Seniors raise concern about overnight warming shelter

Mayor Brian Arrigo addressed concerns about the planned use of the senior center as an overnight warming center this winter at Monday night's City Council meeting.
Citing concerns from a number of local senior citizens, councillors Gerry Viconti and Dan Rizzo filed a motion asking the mayor and the health department about the warming center.
Arrigo noted that last January, the council approved a motion request-

ing that he establish a designated warming center in the city. He added that the senior center was also designated as the city's emergency shelter space about a decade ago, and the city received money to improve and upgrade the facility for that use.
"Ultimately, what we are doing is following through on the will of the council that was brought to us last year," said Arrigo. "We've used the senior center as a warming station and as a cooling station, but we haven't done it very well. To be honest, when we have done it, it has been poorly planned in the past and we scrambled to put it together."
Working with emergency services and public health, Arrigo said the city worked on a plan to improve those services.
"The warming center is not a shelter," said Arrigo. "There are no beds, this is simply a space to stay warm, as it has been for the last decade or so."
The mayor said the city is working with the organization Housing Fam-

Revere secures federal funds for RiverFront environmental efforts

Revere recently secured nearly \$2 million in federal funding to help alleviate current conditions and prepare the community for the impact of worsening risks of climate change and sea-level risks.
The funding will expand mitigation and adaptation efforts in the RiverFront area, and is part of nearly \$13 million in federal community project grants for nine resilience projects in the Mystic Watershed.
"As a community located outside the shelter of Boston Harbor, we get the brunt of increasingly intense winter storms," said Mayor Brian Arrigo. "This funding will help us manage coastal flooding in our RiverFront neighborhood."

The frequent flooding of the Riverside neighborhood due to sea level rise has reached a critical juncture, said resident Loretta LaCentra, who has been deeply involved in climate issues in the neighborhood.
"Our worst-case scenario has become a common event as we dread reports of upcoming flooding and King Tides," LaCentra said. "We need immediate attention and remediation to address the multiple flooding events we experience annually. We cannot wait any longer."
When President Biden signed the FY2023 Consolidated Appropriations Act into law on December 29, 2022, the \$1.7 trillion spending bill included nine grants for Resilient Mystic Collaborative (RMC) cities and towns totaling almost \$13 million.
These earmarks bring the total grant funding for RMC community projects to \$30.4 million since its founding in 2018.
For each of the last two federal budgets, Congresswomen Katherine Clark and Ayanna Pressley and Congressman Seth Moulton were able to secure multiple Community Project Funding for projects with demonstrated local support that fit within specific existing federal grant programs. These grants included four for RMC communities in FY2022, and nine in FY2023.

Keefe takes gavel as City Council President for 2023

Ward 4 City Councillor Patrick Keefe was the unanimous pick to serve as the council's president for 2023 at Monday night's meeting.
Keefe, who last headed the council in 2020, takes over for outgoing president Gerry Visconti. Ward 1 Councillor Joanne McKenna was the unanimous selection for vice president for the new year.
Keefe struck a chord of finding common ground with his fellow councillors for the good of Revere.
"I want to thank outgoing Council President Visconti for doing an outstanding job in this last year navigating the turbulence and helping to maintain and upkeep civility in this hallowed chamber," said Keefe. "Far too often, people on TV and social media see what's going on and think that's the normal way to act disrespectful to each other and think that's how they are going to get the job done, but that doesn't work in real life. Life is about finding common ground and making sacrifices at times when decisions are not always black and white."
Keefe said the council must be comfortable managing gray areas and be okay disagreeing respectfully.

"We represent our community with actions and our behaviors, and we owe it to the 65,000-plus residents of Revere to represent them with respect and proper decorum," said the new president. "This is how we operate in the City Council, and that will be my number one duty to make sure we continue to do so."

Keefe thanked his fellow councillors for having the faith and confidence in him to lead the council, and thanked his family for their support while he takes on public service.
"I've built my life, my family, and most of my living experiences around the city of Revere," said

“We couldn’t be more grateful to Congresswomen Katherine Clark and Ayanna Pressley and Congressman Seth Moulton and their staff for securing such robust funding for our communities,” said Patrick Herron, executive director of the Mystic River Watershed Association (MyRWA), which staffs the RMC. “These investments will make our cities and towns safer, more equitable, and more beautiful.”

Since its beginnings, the Resilient Mystic Collaborative has been focused on projects that make a difference for the people most affected by climate change, according to John Walkey, Director of Waterfront & Climate Justice Initiatives at local non-profit GreenRoots.

“It’s why GreenRoots is so excited to support and partner with the RMC and its members to help secure almost \$14 million in federal grants to fund these projects.”

Each of the municipalities that championed these climate resilient projects is a founding member of the Resilient Mystic Collaborative, a watershed-wide voluntary partnership focused on regional climate resilience. Convened by MyRWA in September 2018 and led by senior staff from 20 cities and towns and non-governmental partners, the RMC focuses on managing flooding and extreme heat on a regional scale and increasing the resilience of vulnerable residents and workers to extreme weather.

Mayor addresses high school project cost concerns

The first several months of 2023 will be a critical time for the future of the new Revere High School project.

While the City Council is united in expressing their desire to see a new high school, the end of 2022 saw the council questioning the price tag for the project and how the city will pay for it. At the last council meeting of the year, the council was presented with a price tag of about \$499 million, with a grant from the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) covering about \$160 million of that cost of a new high school at the Wonderland site.

Monday night, Mayor Brian Arrigo appeared before the council, promising that the administration, the school department, and the project manager will be before the council at every meeting through March to provide an update on the project. The mayor said the city’s chief financial officer, Richard Viscay, will be at the council’s next meeting on Jan. 23 to discuss the cost and funding for the project.

“We heard loud and clear that the council wanted to hear some more information about the high school project, so I’m planning on being available to the council on rolling opportunities, and as you have meetings, we will have a standing agenda item that will be an update of the high school project just so that there will be no miscommunication or any issues in terms of what is happening,” said

Arrigo. “We know this is a big, important project, and one that we don’t want to see lose momentum.”

The administration asked the council for a vote for a submission on the maximum cost of the project to the MSBA in December, but that didn’t happen.

“We are hoping that we can work on a timeline to get to March 1 to the MSBA,” said the mayor. “We know there are a lot of questions that need to be answered, work that needs to be done between now and then.”

While the bigger discussion of the project is likely to take place on Jan. 23 when Viscay addresses the council about project funding, Arrigo did bring some good news about the project on Monday night.

“Most importantly, there was actually an increase in the MSBA contribution level,” said Arrigo. “If you remember, in December, we said the project would cost on our side \$338 million. That has been reduced now down to \$324 million.”

While the \$14 million might not sound like a huge number in comparison to the overall cost, Arrigo said it is a positive sign as the city looks to reduce the cost of the project to Revere on several fronts.

“The numbers are going to be a moving target,” he said. “So there are things like this, the contribution increase from the MSBA, is going to have an impact on what our final numbers look like.”

In addition to the MSBA contribution increase, Arrigo said initial findings

from a geotechnical survey show there could be more cost savings in site and construction costs.

Arrigo also noted that the project team will continue with value engineering efforts to find ways to cut costs without impacting the educational programming at the new high school. As of now, the timeline for the project has the school opening in the fall of 2027.

A number of city councillors expressed their continued concerns over the cost of the project, while Arrigo said the focus should be on the overall cost to the city, rather than the imposing overall price tag that stands close to half a billion dollars. That figure includes about \$80 million in contingency costs, a number questioned by several councillors.

Arrigo noted that the project team was coming in with a worst-case, highest price figure so that there would never be a need to come back before the council to request additional funding.

“I think it is awfully ambitious that we are going to move forward by March, but I look forward to hearing from the CFO and seeing how we are going to afford this,” said Councillor-at-Large Anthony Zambuto. “I’m deathly afraid that we are not going to be able to afford this, but we’ll see. I can be convinced, I’m not close-minded, but I’m worried and I’ll say that publicly.”

Arrigo said he understood the concern over the cost and funding expressed by Zambuto and

several other councillors.

“I think it is very important for us to be talking about the Revere portion that we are taking on,” said Arrigo. “I’ve heard time and time again a half a billion dollars, I get that, but what we are on the hook for for what Revere is going to be paying is a moving target and what we want to do as much as possible is get that down to a reasonable cost. Most importantly, when we talk about a project of this magnitude, people can get scared if they hear a \$500 million or a half a billion dollars.”

But Arrigo said the city is already looking at a \$170 million-plus reimbursement from the state, along with other potential cuts to the city’s side of the cost.

“I’m not discrediting that at all,” said Councillor-at-Large Gerry Visconti. “My thought process is that when we first started all of this, we were under the impression that the entire project was going to cost roughly \$340 million, and in that half a billion, there is still 90 to 100 million of a cushion that we have to discuss.”

Councillor-at-Large Marc Silvestri said that while he was also concerned about the cost of the project, he noted that there is no doubt that Revere needs a new high school, and that the cost will only go up.

“The price is only going to continue to keep going up,” said Silvestri. “It’s a fact, it’s a fact with all businesses and all development. The major impact here is on the kids.”

“As much as we all enjoy the look and feel of Christmas trees in our homes, they’re large combustible items that have the potential to result in serious fires,” said Lorraine Carli, vice president of Outreach and Advocacy at. “The longer Christmas trees remain in homes, the longer they present a risk.”

Carli notes that fresh Christmas trees, which continue to dry out and become more flammable over time, are involved in a much larger share of reported Christmas tree fires than artificial trees.

According to the latest Christmas Tree Fires report from NFPA, 160 home structure fires began with Christmas trees, resulting in two civilian deaths, 11 civilian injuries, and \$12 million in direct property damage, on average each year between 2016 and 2020. Overall, fires that begin with Christmas trees represent a very small but notable part of the U.S. fire problem, considering that they are generally in use for a short time each year.

To safely dispose of a Christmas tree, NFPA recommends using the local community’s recycling program, if possible; trees should not be put in the garage or left outside. NFPA also offers these tips for safely removing lighting and decorations to ensure that they remain in good condition:

- Use the gripping area on the plug when unplugging electrical decorations. Never pull the cord to unplug any device from an electrical outlet, as this can harm the wire and insulation of the cord, increasing the risk for shock or electrical fire.
- As you pack up light strings, inspect each line for damage, throwing out any sets that have loose connections, broken sockets or cracked or bare wires.
- Wrap each set of lights and put them in individual plastic bags or wrap them around a piece of cardboard.
- Store electrical decorations in a dry place away from children and pets where they will not be damaged by water or dampness.

SAILOR ARRESTED AFTER TWO INCENDIARY FIRES

Bleeding Hand and a Sailor's Hat Were His Undoing, Attempted Arson Charge to Be Made

George A. Frechette, 19, attached to the U. S. S. Memphis, was arraigned in Chelsea district court, Wednesday on a drunkenness charge. Judge Stearns, after Capt. William E. Tappan of the Revere police related to the court, a series of unusual episodes occurring early in the morning, continued Frechette's case until Jan. 13. Bail was set at \$1000.

He was arrested by Sergt. John P. Starkey and Officer Robert Barry shortly after two fires of suspicious origin at 805 and 815 Winthrop ave.

The continuance was secured by Fire Chief Thomas McCarrick, State Fire Inspector Edward Horrigan and Captain Tappan of the local police following an investigation of the two fires.

Shortly before his arrest the fire department was called to two fires; one in the cellar of a house owned and occupied by John M. McKenna and family at 805 Winthrop ave. and the other under the porch of a house occupied by Francis Stensky and family at 815 Winthrop ave.

At 805 Winthrop ave., clothing valued at \$75 was burned in the cellar. A box of papers and magazines were found burning under the house at 815. Both fires were extinguished before any damage was done to either home.

Evidence that the fires were set was found by Chief McCarrick who conducted a personal investigation. In the cellar of the McKenna home a sailor's hat, said at police headquarters to be claimed by Frechette, was found by the firemen covered with blood. Blood was also found on the cellar door.

Frechette, when arrested, was bleeding profusely from his right hand.

According to the story told the police Frechette escorted a Beachmont girl to her home and what happened afterwards he was unable to tell the police.

It is expected that charges of attempted arson and breaking and entering will be made against Frechette when his case is continued next week.

"FIRSTS IN '32"

The first marriage intention filed Jan. 2, was that of Mr. Virgil R. Veteree, 22, of 30 Payson street, Revere, and Miss Dorothy G. Watts, 19, same address. Mr. Veteree, a son of Michael Veteree, was born in Melrose and gave his occupation as electrician. Miss Watts, daughter of Frank E. Watts, was born in Malden.

The first wedding of a Revere person was that of Mr. Albert W. Lamothe, 46, a salesman, living at 169 Rice ave., Revere, and Miss Martha Hutton, 43, of 414 Crescent street, Waltham, a hairdresser. They were married Jan. 1, in Waltham at the Church of the Ascension by Rev. Edward A. Baker.

The first death recorded was that of John J. Kerrigan, 73, of 108 Walnut avenue, Revere, who died Jan. 1. Mr. Kerrigan was in the fish business for 55 years before his retirement and was known to all at the Boston Fish Pier.

TWO HOLDUP MEN ROB STORE ON PARK ST. AGAIN

Same Gang Looted the Ecco Store Last Week

Two holdup men walked into the Ecco store at 500 Park ave. shortly after 5 p. m. Wednesday evening and leveled their guns on Di Nundio, the manager, who was alone at the time and ordered him into the back room where he was frisked. They then robbed the cash register.

The men made their escape in a green colored sedan, driving towards Chelsea.

As soon as word of the holdup reached Revere police headquarters a squad of police officers led by Lieut. Cornelius Cronin and including Sergt. John P. Starkey and Officers Daniel Sullivan, Philip Gallo and Whitman Zwicker rushed to the scene of the holdup but were too late to give chase.

The description of the pair who walked into the store Wednesday night tallies with those given by Di Nundio for the pair who walked in on him on the evening of Dec. 31 and robbed him of \$50.

Man number one is described as 25 years old, 155 pounds, 5 feet 10 inches, medium complexion, black hair, and wearing a blue overcoat and gray cap. Man number two: 23 years old, 5 feet 7 or 8 inches, medium complexion, no overcoat and wearing a gray suit.

CITY TREASURER O'BRIEN EXPLAINS REVERE'S CRISIS

City Sound But Short of Ready Cash, Employees on Monthly Pay, Not Only City That is Short

City Treasurer James M. O'Brien in an interview, said that the city is perfectly sound but has run short of cash.

Wednesday's payroll was met and every man and woman who was due to get their pay from the city at that time was paid. Unless \$600,000 can be raised for current operating expenses of the next three months, city employees will receive no salaries and wages next pay day, a month away.

Mr. O'Brien, when asked just why the city employees were being put on monthly instead of weekly pay said that it would take at least two weeks to raise funds to meet the next payroll, probably longer. "I only want a little more time to see if it is not possible to raise money so that we won't have to pass any payroll. If we pay monthly we will have more time to look about for funds before the next pay day comes," he declared.

The city's lack of cash, Mr. O'Brien said, is due mainly to the refusal of banks to invest in municipal short term tax anticipation notes.

Another cause advanced by Mr. O'Brien for the shortage of ready funds in the city treasury was the closing of the Revere Trust Co., tying up \$48,000 of city funds ordinarily available to continue the weekly payroll.

Treasurer O'Brien also says that tax collections were so satisfactory last year that Revere did not borrow the \$200,000 more it might have when banks were ready to accept municipal paper. Had this sum been borrowed it would now be available for a cash account.

Mr. O'Brien declared that the reluctance of bankers to lend to Revere in no way reflected on the city but on the desire of the banks to keep funds liquid rather than in short term securities backed with unlimited tax resources as collateral.

Failure of Revere to float cash, the treasurer asserted, was no reflection on the credit or administration of the city, which, he pointed out by Jan. 1, had collected \$100,000 more of its 1931 taxes than last year. The prevailing "tightness" of money at any cost is solely to blame, he said.

He saw no chance of the city obtaining ready funds unless the Legislature compelled banks to accept municipal paper, guarantee the notes or order the state to become banker for the city.

One bright aspect of the situation is that on Jan. 1 the city had no accounts payable outstanding, and another is that there is little doubt that an estimated \$500,000 annual revenue derived from receipts for water, refunds from the commonwealth and other miscellaneous sources will be forthcoming as usual.

OIL FIGHT GOES THROUGH COURT, DECISION LATER

Defense Allows No Appeal Over Marshall

Final arguments before the full bench of the Massachusetts Supreme Court on the bill in equity brought by the taxpayers of Revere against John W. Reth, former state fire marshal, the Boston Port Development Co., and M. Thomas Green, trustee relative to the gas tank permits which were recently issued in this city were heard Wednesday.

The bill was presented to the court by Franklin A. Leach and other taxpayers of the city on the grounds that the tanks would constitute a fire menace and that Fire Marshal Reth had exceeded his authority in granting each permit with the attendant fire prevention clauses which roused so much disfavor in this city.

Counsel for the defendants maintained that the statute provides for no appeal from a decision of the fire marshal.

Reth in granting his permit for the erection of the oil tanks ruled that a fire menace would exist if certain preventive measures were not rigidly lived up to.

A decision will be handed down later by the bench.

City Council Meeting

At the City Council meeting Monday evening, City Treasurer James M. O'Brien was called into the committee room to explain his action in putting city employees on monthly pay instead of weekly.

Mr. O'Brien advised that it is not his desire and he regrets very much to request and to place in effect the payments of city employees on the monthly basis. He gave a very concise and emphatic explanation of the money market and the inability of many city treasurers to borrow from banks or other individuals at the present time; that fortunately, the Suburban Gas & Electric Company had come forward and volunteered a loan; that it was impossible to go to the bank, as in previous years, and obtain any loans at the present time. The bank president advised him to "go back and collect your taxes." This is almost impossible at the present time; that a larger percent of the taxes on real estate had been paid this year than in previous years which is somewhat surprising under the present conditions; that provided the Council and the city employees did not co-operate in every way with the City Treasurer, there may be drastic measures taken. He then explained in detail some of the conditions.

Twenty-two jurors were chosen and of these 14 were for the Civil and the other eight for the Criminal Superior Court. The Council voted after a hearing to order removed the old dilapidated building at 698 Winthrop ave., which has been declared unsafe by the building inspector and had been objectionable to the residents of that section for a long time. The Traffic Commission and the Metropolitan District Commission recommended that Olive st. be made a one-way thoroughfare going into the Parkway. Mr. Thomas Green and the Boston Port Development Company, who were granted an oil storage permit on their land, accepted all the restrictions imposed by the fire marshal and the City Council.

WE MUST NEVER FORGET THE LEGACY OF DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING JR.

For those of us of a certain age, it is hard to imagine that 2023 will mark 55 years since the assassination of Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King in Memphis while he was standing on the balcony of the Lorraine Motel on April 4, 1968. Recalling how we felt when he first heard the news of Dr. King's murder still brings chills and a deep sense of sadness that never has subsided.

For those who are too young to have been alive in that era of American history, there are a few things that everyone should know about Dr. King that should provide inspiration to all of us.

First, Dr. King was fearless. He knew from the inception of his rise to prominence of the civil rights movement that he would become a target for those who opposed change. Yet, even though he often told others that he believed his death would be imminent, he did not relent in his fight to continue his work in the civil rights movement.

Second, Dr. King stood for the rights of all Americans, not merely those of color. Indeed, he was in Memphis working with striking sanitation workers whose pay and working conditions he was seeking to help improve. He was an outspoken critic of the Vietnam War because he knew it to be an unjust war, not only for poor Americans who could not get a college deferment for the draft, but also for the people of Vietnam, whose homeland was being bombed into oblivion at great profit for the American military-industrial complex.

To be sure, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. was not perfect. No person is or ever has been. Dr. King was just like any of us; he had his strengths and he had his weaknesses.

If Dr. King were alive in the present era, there is no doubt that he would have been in the forefront of the Black Lives Matter movement that highlighted the ongoing racism and economic inequality that oppresses Americans of all races today.

By any measure, Dr. Martin Luther King was a great man. His speeches ring as true today as they did two generations ago; indeed, his "I Have A Dream" and "I've Been to the Mountaintop" speeches are among the most powerful not only in American history, but in all of Western civilization.

All of us should realize from the example set by Dr. King that in each of us is the power to change the world. We may not be as gifted as Dr. King was with his oratory, but each of us has the capacity to inspire others, whether through our words or deeds, whether on a small or large scale, to make the world a better place.

Many of our fellow citizens have followed the path set by Dr. King and many more will do so in the years ahead. So as we celebrate Martin Luther King Day, let us recall not only his memory and the many things he accomplished, but the great things that his legacy is continuing to bring about more than two generations after his death.

GREAT JOB, KATHERINE CLARK!

If you were watching the drama (a/k/a the Theatre of the Absurd) that took place last week in the U.S. House of Representatives that culminated in the eventual election of Republican Kevin McCarthy as the new Speaker, among the Democrats who placed in nomination their candidate, Hakeem Jeffries, the Democrats' new leader, was Massachusetts Congresswoman Katherine Clark, who is now the second-in-command to Jeffries of the House Democratic caucus.

HOW WILL REVERE PAY FOR A \$499M NEW HIGH SCHOOL?

The proposed cost for the new high school is an issue every homeowner should be concerned about. Especially, since the approximate budget was recently requested to be increased by another \$120M, bringing the grand total to approximately just under \$500M or a half billion dollars! Where exactly will the money come from to pay for it?

Overall, the majority of residents in Revere are made up of blue collar working class citizens and do not fall in a high annual income bracket. With the increase of heating costs, electricity, food and the overall rising rate of inflation, I think we can all agree that almost everyone is feeling the squeeze on their finances. All of these increases are making it increasingly more difficult for homeowners to afford to stay in their homes. REVERE Through the Years

10 years ago January 9, 2013

The City Council chose its officers on Monday night prior to the State of the City Address, with Councillor Ira Novoselsky taking the reins as the new president in a 10-1 vote and Councillor Jessica Giannino taking over as vice president in a unanimous vote. City Clerk Ashley Melnik was unanimously re-appointed to a five-year term by the Council.

Speaking before a packed house, Mayor Dan Rizzo delivered his first State of the City Address on Monday night, using the time more for laying out upcoming plans than for revisiting last year's accomplishments. Virtually every City Department Head, Chief, and board member was in attendance, as well as the entire School Committee, Superintendent Paul Dakin, and state legislators Bob DeLeo, Kathi-Anne Reinstein, and Anthony Petrucci. Also in attendance was state Treasurer Steve Grossman.

By this time next week, everyone interested in the Expanded Gaming competition will know just who is holding them and who is folding them. The deadline for getting in the casino (or slots) game is coming next Tuesday, Jan. 15th, when all applicants are expected to submit their paperwork and their \$400,000 application fee to the Mass Gaming Commission (MGC).

20 years ago January 15, 2003

The goal of building new schools in Revere is becoming ever more elusive in light of the state budget crunch. It was two years ago that the City Council Chambers filled with applause and Mayor Thomas Ambrosino, the School Committee, and

City Council were celebrating the announcement that the city was embarking on a plan to construct five new school buildings. However, former Mayor and City Councillor George V. Colella said the city is no closer to building new schools than it was two years ago and should re-evaluate the direction in which it is heading in terms of new school construction.

Two men have been arrested in connection with a string of robberies and home invasions in this city. The duo were apprehended separately in Danvers and Chelsea and are believed responsible for three robberies in Revere and a home invasion in which they posed as Revere police officers.

With new Governor Mitt Romney requesting the legislature to give him expanded powers to address the state's worsening fiscal crisis, city officials are concerned that any further reductions in local aid from the state could result in cutbacks in services.

Four Revere police officers were promoted last week at swearing-in ceremonies last week. Lieut. James Guido was promoted to Captain; Sgt. David Callahan was promoted to Lieutenant; and patrolmen Ted Michalski and John Burke were promoted to Sergeant.

30 years ago January 13, 1993

About 20 homeowners on Roughan's Point may get the chance to have the federal government buy their homes through the National Flood Insurance Program buy-out plan operated by the Federal Emergency Management Agency. Residents have been hit hard by three major storms in the past 16 months, leaving many wondering where

they will find the money to repair their homes and whether it is even worth the effort.

State Senator Thomas Birmingham, who is in only his second term, has been named the Chairman of the powerful Senate Ways and Means Committee by Senate President William Bulger.

The Revere school community was saddened by news of the sudden passing of Revere High Mathematics Department head Ugo Evangelista, 57, at his home in Everett over the weekend. Evangelista had been a teacher at Revere High since 1963.

The local Post Office was just one of the many Post Offices nationwide who were flooded by fans of the King, Elvis Presley, upon the issuance this week of a 29 cents commemorative stamp in Presley's honor.

DPW Supt. John Barrett said that the first week of curbside recycling in the city was a big success, with 14.34 tons of paper and 10.2 tons of other recyclables being collected.

40 years ago January 12, 1983

The School Department has requested the School Committee to name two Southeast Asia bi-lingual aides to positions in the local schools. The federal government will pay for their salaries.

A Suffolk County grand jury has indicted former School Dept. Business Manager Andrew D'Eramo on 10 counts of larceny of school funds totaling \$16,000. D'Eramo had held the post for 10 years until an external audit into a \$1 million school budget shortfall exposed some of the department's business practices. Details of how D'Eramo allegedly stole the funds have not been made public.

George Punch, Director of the Revere public library, has made a plea with the City Council to restore some of the funds

cut from the library's budget since the implementation of Prop. 2 and 1/2.

The City Council unanimously has approved a license for eight pool tables at Nat's Recreational Parlor on Shirley St., which is under the new ownership of Peter Felt and William Butler. William Kenny of 56 Fenno St., who said that he and a group of friends preach the Bible weekly on Shirley St., asked the Council to restrict access to the premises to patrons over the age of 18.

50 years ago January 11, 1973

One era ended and another began in the Chelsea District Court this week with the retirement of long-time Presiding Justice John W. MacLeod, who had served on the bench for 32 years. MacLeod was forced to retire pursuant to the new law approved by voters that requires judges to retire at the age of 70. MacLeod was replaced by Revere resident Salvatore Aloisi, who has been a special justice for the past few years after serving as an attorney and in various city offices in the city for many years.

The Arthur D. Little accounting firm has given the Revere School Department failing grades for its poor business and financial practices. The firm's report also criticized the School Committee for interfering in the day to day operations of the School Department.

Mayor William G. Reinsteine, speaking in his State of the City address, said that his main goal in the year ahead is to ensure the redevelopment of Revere Beach, saying that this represents the last hope for the city to turn around its dire financial

Inaugural Address

Good evening. It's so wonderful to see everyone gathered here. I'm truly honored and humbled to stand before you for my inauguration and swearing in as the elected District Attorney for Suffolk County.

There are some thank you's I need to offer up at the outset. First, thank you to all my supporters. Whether you volunteered on my campaign, made a contribution, put a sign on your lawn, or simply voted for me and encouraged others to do so, I thank you. I thank you for believing in me and for believing in a vision of what's possible in Suffolk County.

Thank you to my Transition and Community Advisory Committee for your support. I look forward to the important foundational work we'll do together.

Thank you, Ralph Martin for hiring me way back in 1997 and for your many years of mentorship, support and friendship.

Thank you, Governor Baker for the confidence you had in me to appoint me as the interim D.A. and for your guidance and leadership.

Thank you, Senator Collins and Representative Tyler for your incredible support.

Thank you, Chief Justice Budd for doing the honor of swearing me in this evening.

Thank you, all our police officers in Boston, Chelsea, Revere and Winthrop, and at the MBTA and State Police, for your selfless service.

Thank you to all of my

staff at the District Attorney's Office for your tireless commitment to justice, public safety and the welfare of our Suffolk County residents. You are the greatest group of public servants working for the best D.A.'s Office in the Commonwealth, and perhaps even one of the best in the nation. For all my A.D.A.'s here I look forward to the honor of swearing you in at the conclusion of this program.

Thank you to all of the elected officials here today, my partners in government. I look forward to continuing to partner with all of you as we work to make Suffolk County even greater.

Thank you to all the residents of Suffolk County and your commitment to what is right...good...fair...and just...and your concern for public safety and the support of those impacted by crime.

Thank you to my mom, Charlene Roberts-Hayden, for your unconditional love and constant prayer. All my life you've been faithful, all my life you've been so so good.

Thank you to my wife Michelle and my sons Jordan and Carson. I love you more than words can express. To my beloved Michelle, I am nothing without you, and to my 2 sons you make me so proud every day.

I want to start by sharing a story of a chance meeting I had with a young man just before Christmas, and a card I received on the first day back in the office in 2023.

[Tell story of meeting young man from Power Corps Boston on the steps of West Roxbury District Court – Career development program paying and preparing young adults in need of support for a career in the green industry].

[Read card from survivor.] Over the years I've witnessed many testimonies like this and I'll touch upon them again later in my address.

When I returned to the office about a year ago it was exciting and surreal.

The honor of returning to where my career began... to an office and county that has always had my heart...to a calling to serve as leader of this great office...was extraordinary and is still somewhat difficult to even put into words.

But I CAN put into words some of the things we've done already.

We created the Boston First Program to focus on firearm violence, gun trafficking and unsolved shootings.

We created a new Civil Rights Unit with prosecutors in the district and superior courts.

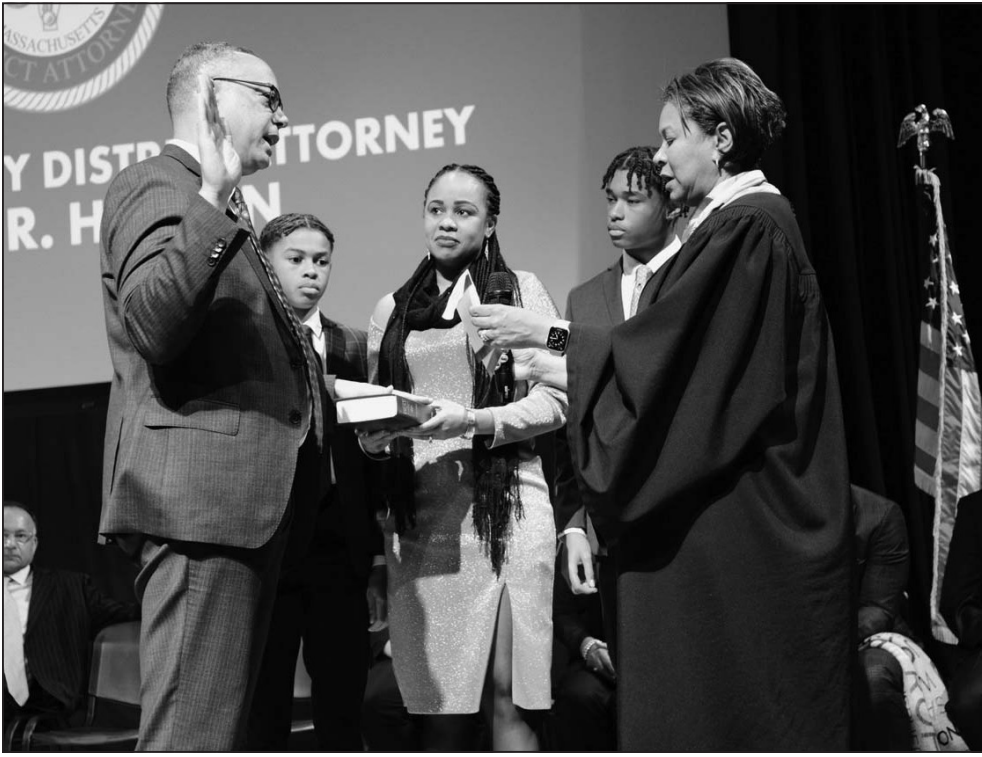
We established a community engagement team to create neighborhood partnership, collaboration and trust that will achieve a level of community-based prosecution never seen before.

We launched our Services Over Sentences Program to provide true assistance and real alternatives to prosecution for those battling with substance use disorder at Mass and Cass and even beyond.

And while I believe we're off to a great start, there's much left to do. The statistics for last year showed a continuing drop in serious crime in Boston, but an increase in gun arrests involving youth and an alarming spat of violence this fall. I believe we must deal with crime comprehensively and collaboratively to get to the root of the problem.

We will create the Suffolk County D.A. Youth Engagement Council, made up of young people from throughout Suffolk County, to gain a deeper and better understanding of the factors at play in youth violence, and how to create effective prevention strategies.

We will also create the Emerging Adult Alternative Resolution Program in collaboration with the Center for Law, Brain & Behavior at M.G.H. and Harvard Medical School. This program will offer real, comprehensive alternatives to prosecution for

Suffolk County's young adult population.

We'll be seeking additional funding to expand our Services Over Sentences program to tackle the opioid epidemic. We've already seen great outcomes since we launched last summer, and we want to help even more people in their paths to recovery.

Our Transition and Community Advisory Committee will assist in the development of our strategies to address crime intervention and prevention, and enhance community trust and operational transparency and accountability.

The Suffolk County District Attorney's office has been nationally recognized for decades now thanks in large part to the incredible work of my predecessors. Ralph Martin gained country-wide recognition for bringing the office out of the courts and into the neighborhoods. Dan Conley built on that while creating the Juvenile Alternative Resolution program and establishing specialty courts to help veterans and others with sentencing alternatives. Rachael Rollins added data-driven outcomes and historic accountability with the Crime Strategies and the Integrity Review

Bureaus.

And I declare here today that our best and brightest days of community safety...and neighborhood security...and systemic reform still lay ahead. When we unite in faith and hope... when we work together in faith and hope...we can achieve amazing results.

Faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. Even when we can't see it we must know that our hope is never mere nor meager. When all other senses sleep our eye of hope is the first to awaken and the last to shut. Today more than ever, we must hold unwaveringly to hope. But hope for what? Well one main hope for me is the multiplication of overcomers.

If you've heard me speak at all recently you already have a flavor of what I'm about to say. But I'm determined to speak this message into existence. An overcomer is defined as someone who prevails over opposition, difficulties, conflict, or attack. An overcomer is someone who knows weeping may endure for a night but joy comes in the morning. An overcomer is someone with a spirit who won't allow themselves or others to be defeated by tragedy or adversity...and

thus ultimately triumphs.

An overcomer won't suffer alone and seeks to find refuge, solace and peace in the sharing of fellowship with others. Whether you're a homicide survivor who has lost a loved one to violence, or a survivor of rape, human trafficking or sexual assault who now ministers to others, someone who's gotten sober and triumphed over substance use disorder who now mentors or sponsors another, or are a returning citizen who has turned your life around and is now helping others do the same, YOU ARE AN OVERCOMER! You will help transform Suffolk County. It is by and through the spirit of overcomers the curse of violence in Suffolk County will be broken. I believe when the power at work in restored overcomers is poured out and multiplied, miracles will happen, deliverance from the clutches of crime and violence will become manifest. The mission of this office will be to always fight for you and stand with you each and every day.

I thank all of you, I am humbled by the opportunity you have given me, and I stand ready to lead this wonderful office. Thank you.

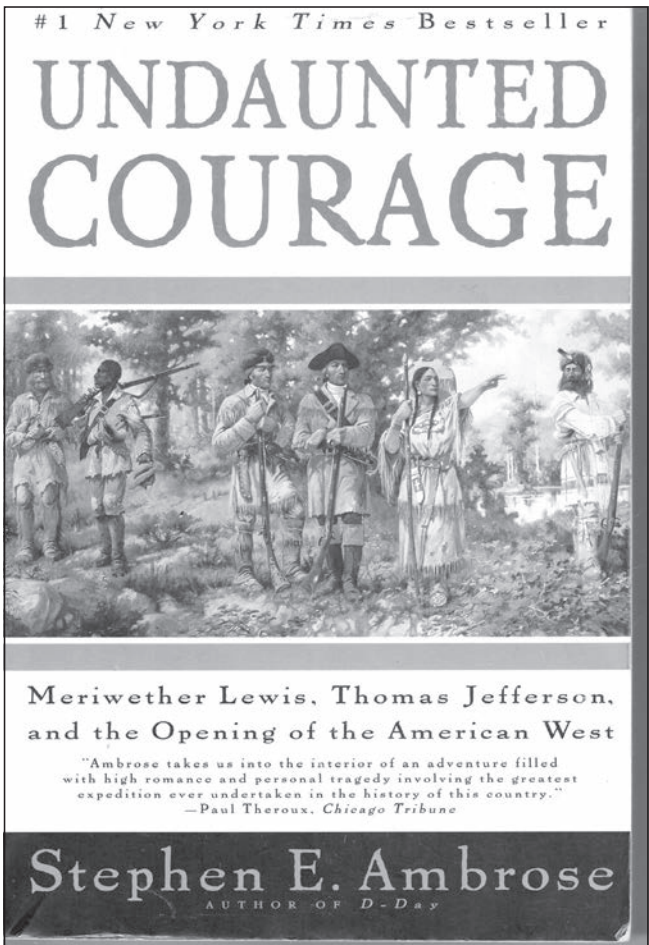
'UNDAUNTED COURAGE: Meriwether Lewis, Thomas Jefferson and the Opening of the American West'

“Undaunted Courage” is a history of the famous Lewis and Clark expedition into the Heartland and West Coast of America. A national bestseller, the book details the travails and trials of the cross-country trek. Meriwether Lewis was a Virginia gentleman who was acquainted with Thomas Jefferson since his early youth; Jefferson took Lewis under his wing, and it was the former president’s tutelage and guidance that provided the impetus for the expedition. Lewis never married, instead he turned to a life of soldiering which caused him to become friends with his cohort on the expedition-William Clark.

Together they were to embark on a journey that had been hashed over for years. Earlier, unsuccessful forays had come up short, but Lewis and Clark, with a heavy compliment of military aides and civilian volunteers had more resources, and hence more success. In addition to this, they were also abetted in this endeavor by friendly Native Americans tribes, to whom they promised the enticement of future barter for food, apparel, guns and ammunition. They made their way across rivers and plains, and they were treated to the sight of herds of buffalo, deer and antelopes. Thomas Jefferson had instructed Lewis in the sci-

ence of botany, and Lewis was taught to collect samples of herbs, plants and flowers. He followed Jefferson’s instructions faithfully, and he collected a wide range of flora and fauna. The skilled marksman in the group would venture forth and hunt for the stated animals which provided ample sustenance for the members of the mission. The expedition was a huge success, and Lewis and Clark were hailed as conquering heroes. Unfortunately, though, matters took a turn for the worse for Meriwether Lewis, who had always heavily imbibed. In a lonely inn by the side of the highway leading to Virginia,



he tragically ended his life by dint of suicide. Stephen Ambrose, the author of the book was a prolific artisan. He penned many a book before his death in 2002. Among his works are books on Nixon and Eisenhower (Ambrose was an avid Republican) He also wrote “Duty, Honor and Country: A History of West Point.” He was apparently agog at military history. Ambrose is an inept chronicler of historical events. “Undaunted Courage” is a must read for perusers who want to stay well informed. It is an enthralling piece of work and the reader will be impressed by it. I recommend it heartily!

Aging) on a regular basis were under the impression this was going to be a homeless shelter with people living there,” said Rizzo. He said there is a need in the center for a warming shelter, adding the senior center has been used for that purpose in the past. “I’m sure it is still unnerving for people who go there because it has never been talked about openly before,” said Rizzo. Visconti said he also thought it was a good idea to address the issue of a warming center, but like Rizzo, he said he didn’t get much notice about the proposed changes beforehand. “I think it is a noble goal, and I feel a little better hearing Homeless Families is involved, because I’ve had some experience with them over the years,” said Councilor-at-Large Anthony Zambuto. Like Rizzo and Visconti, Zambuto said he would have liked to have had more of a heads up about the plan. In the past, Arrigo said the warming shelters were only open if there was a

storm or particularly cold temperatures forecast, while the new plan calls for a consistent opening through the winter months. Still, several local seniors said they were still worried about the plan and the lack of communication from the city. “We’re not against the homeless, we just don’t believe the venue is the elderly center,” said Frank Schettino. Schettino also asked what happened to people in the shelter when 7 a.m. hits and the temperature is still extremely cold. “What if it’s five degrees? We don’t want to put them out there again,” he said. Arrigo and Public Health Director Lauren Buck also noted that the warming shelter is a pilot program, and can be changed or adjusted if there are aspects of it that don’t work out. Buck also noted that the warming center is not exclusively for homeless people, but could be used by residents who are housed, but have an issue where they do not have heat.

“We can put a warming center wherever we want, this is our city,” said Rizzo, noting the city could get an emergency generator at another location if that was what was needed to run a warming shelter. “I don’t understand why we are so reluctant to look at another location.” Visconti asked Buck and Arrigo if there were any contingency plans to have the warming center at a different location. “The concerns are not going to go away after this meeting, and if they are not comfortable a week down the line, then they are going to be uncomfortable the entire stay of this,” said Visconti. Buck said the city has reached out to multiple faith-based organizations about housing the program, but did not receive any organizations or congregations willing to take it on. Rizzo offered up a motion Monday asking that the mayor review the feasibility of an alternative location for the warming center. That motion was approved by a 9-2 vote by the council.

Revere High sophomore track standout Liv Yuong brought home medals in two events at this past Saturday's MSTCA Freshman/Sophomore Championships at the Reggie Lewis Center in Boston.

ROBINSON TO LEAD COUNCIL

CHELSEA - Councilor-at-Large Leo Robinson, the body’s longest serving current member, was elected Council President at the organizational council meeting.

Robinson prevailed by a 6-5 vote over acting President Calvin Brown.

Councilors Damali Vidot, Enio Lopez, Todd Taylor, Giovanni Recupero, and Brian Hatleberg sided with Robinson, while Councilors Judith Garcia, Melinda Vega Maldonado, Tanairi Garcia, and Norieliz DeJesus cast their votes alongside Brown.

In brief remarks Tuesday night, Robinson thanked outgoing acting president Brown for his leadership, and noted that as the council moves forward, there will be votes the council will have to take in the best interest of the city and its residents.

“I would like to quote the Isley Brothers: We have work to do,” said Robinson. “This council has plenty on our agenda for the next couple of months, such as the budget, capital improvement plan, and more importantly, appointing an acting city manager and start the process and search for a new city manager. I will guide and show leadership when we deal with the above issues to the best of my ability.”

Robinson said the well-being of a community is the sum of its physical, economic, and social matters.

“It is easy to see a community as a place – homes, schools, streets, parks, shops,” he said. “These make up the infrastructure of a community, the soundness and attractiveness is essential for a great community. A good community also includes economic development, jobs, businesses, education, and sources of capital investments.”

Without economic life and opportunity, Robinson said a community cannot meet its material needs and a good quality of life cannot be enjoyed.

Robinson closed with a quote from W.E.B. DuBois stating that “We should never forget to urge corresponding duties upon our people: the duty to vote; the duty to respect the right of others; the duty to work; the duty to obey the laws; the duty to be clean and orderly’ the duty to send our children to school; and the duty to respect ourselves even as we respect others.”

District 6 Councilor Giovanni Recupero was elected as the council’s vice president for 2023, and District 6 Councilor Tanairi Garcia was elected as the council’s representative to the School Committee.

The document responds to all requirements of the Draft Environmental Impact Report Certificate issued by the Secretary of the Massachusetts Executive Office of Energy and Environmental Affairs on August 29 of last year, and was prepared in accordance with the Federal Aviation Authority’s National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requirements, according to Massport officials.

An electronic copy of the document is available on the Massachusetts Port Authority’s website at <https://www.massport.com/logan-airport/about-logan/environmental-reports/> and printed copies are available for viewing at the Winthrop Public Library.

“As was outlined in the June 30, 2022 Draft EIR, Massport has a continuing program of enhancing airfield safety at all its air-

ports, including enhancing the Runway Safety Area (RSA) at the Runway 27 End at Boston Logan International Airport (Logan Airport),” stated Stewart Dalzell, Deputy Director Environmental Planning & Permitting Strategic & Business Planning Department for Massport. “Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) policy requires that Massport enhance the RSA, to the extent feasible, to be consistent with the current FAA airport design criteria for RSAs and to improve rescue access in the event of an emergency. This Project would not extend the usable length of the runway nor have any effect on normal runway operations, runway capacity, or types of aircraft that use the runway.”

To minimize environmental impacts to Boston Harbor, in 2019, FAA determined the preferred option to enhance the Runway 27 End RSA is an approximately 650-foot-long by 306-foot-wide RSA on a pile-supported deck with an Engineered Materials Arresting System (EMAS) installed on the deck, Dalzell stated in the cover letter to the nearly 500 page report.

“Because of the unique environmental setting and the extraordinary cost of the type of structure proposed, FAA approved the narrowing of the pile-supported deck from the required 500-foot-wide deck to a 300-foot-wide deck (the actual width of the deck would be 306 feet to allow for safety rails) as

past FAA projects have shown that this would provide an equivalent level of safety as a full-dimensional RSA,” he continued. “An EMAS is constructed of collapsible concrete blocks with predictable deceleration forces. In an emergency, if an aircraft rolls into an EMAS, the tires of the aircraft collapse the lightweight concrete, and the aircraft is slowed down in a way that minimizes damage to the aircraft.”

Because of the irregular shoreline in this area, it is expected that the 306-foot-wide deck would extend approximately 450 feet over Boston Harbor.

“Through use of EMAS and the narrowing of the deck, the Project would minimize coastal impacts while enhancing safety for Logan Airport’s air passengers,” Dalzell stated. “Since the Project, once completed, would not change how Logan Airport operates, this Draft EA/Final EIR focuses on measures to avoid and minimize construction-period impacts and associated mitigation.”
