DAILY LANE CLOSURES SCHEDULED ON NORTH SHORE ROAD

The Massachusetts Department of Transportation (MassDOT) is announcing it will be implementing daily lane closures on portions of North Shore Road between Route 145 and Route 1A in Revere. The lane closures will be implemented Monday through Friday between the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. continuing to June 16 (excluding Weekends and Holidays). These closures will allow crews to conduct maintenance operations resurfacing safely and effectively. In addition, on-street parking will not be allowed within the areas of active construction.

The work will primarily consist of maintenance pavement resurfacing, including utility structure adjustments and pavement marking improvements. This maintenance resurfacing work is being done under a District wide resurfacing contract. The estimated value of this work assignment is approximately \$450.000. The anticipated completion date for all work is June 16, 2023 for all related work.

The schedule for this work is weather dependent and is subject to change without notice.

Drivers who are traveling through the area should reduce speed and use caution.

Appropriate signage, law enforcement details, and advanced message boards will be in place to guide drivers through the work area. For more information

Two Sunday shootings shut down Revere Beach in first incident of season

State Police closed Revere Beach on Sunday after three people were hospitalized following two separate shootings on the

Police responded to the first reported shooting at 123 Centennial Ave. around 7 p.m. on Sunday evening. A 17-year-old girl was taken to Massa-

chusetts General Hospital with a gunshot wound to her lower body. The injury was non-life threatening, according to state police.

The girl was apparently wounded when shots were fired into a group of people who were fighting. The girl was not the intended target, according to a preliminary investigation.

There was another shooting about an hour later in the area of the Shirley Ave. bathhouse. A 51-year-old woman was taken to Massachusetts General Hospital with gunshot wounds to her legs, and a 17-year-old boy who was grazed by a bullet declined treatment, according to the state police.

Councillors unhappy with Amazon warehouse opening delays

When Amazon swooped in to build a new logistics and delivery warehouse at the former Showcase Cinema site on Squire Road, some city councillors saw it as the best possible outcome for the location and the site.

But that was in 2020, and some of those same councillors now say they are disturbed and disappointed that the warehouse could sit unused until

At last week's council meeting, Ward 6 Councillor Richard Serino, read an email from Planning and Community Develop-

ment Director Tom Skwierawski about the current status of the facility.

"There have been a lot of rumors about the Amazon facility in Linden Square, and I had tried to get ahead of this in February, I believe it was," said Serino.

In his email, Skwierawski said he has been in communication with the Amazon team regarding the Squire Road project.

"At present, Amazon is not in a position to announce precisely when the Squire Road facility will be put into service, but we do expect that it will be well before 2026,"

Skwierawski stated. "In any case, we have been assured by Amazon that the Squire Road facility is a part of Amazon's future plans. That project is actually enhanced by the closure of other, older distribution facilities in the area."

In addition to being a newer, state-of-the-art facility, Skwierawski noted that Amazon owns, rather than leases the property, showing an additional level of commitment that the company has to the city.

"In discussing this project with the city council and members of the public, I have sometimes heard assumptions made about the site due to the closures and delays in other lines of Amazon businesses, for example, Amazon Fresh and Amazon Books," he added. "It is important to note that these lines of business are separate and quite distinct from the logistics facilities, so closures or delays in those areas do not necessarily relate to their logistics operations."

Skwierawski said Amazon has assured the city that it is committed to the continued operation of its facility on the American Legion Highway, as well as the eventual activation of the Squire Road facility. In the meantime, Skwierawski stated that Amazon

will continue to make sure there are adequate security and maintenance measures in place at the Squire Road building.

"We have this giant warehouse facility in the middle of Linden Square at the circle, and this says they are committed to opening it well before 2026, but we're in 2023," said Serino. "I just find it unacceptable that this is going to sit vacant for two years. Let's be real, as with anything else, they are committed right now to opening, but things change."

When the movie theater closed and it was announced that Amazon would be taking over the property, Serino said he was initially excited that it would bring jobs and revenue to Revere.

"What jobs has it created in my three years as a ward councillor?" Serino asked. "It's an eyesore to my neighborhood ... and the bottom line is that it is unacceptable that Amazon is not saying when it intends to open this."

Councillor-at-Large Anthony Zambuto said he also believed the facility would bring jobs and positive economic growth to the city.

"Now we're talking maybe it opens before 2026," said Zambuto "It's insulting ... we were snookered."

Shirley Ave. TDI Partnership launches participatory budgeting hub to help prioritize public realm improvements in the neighborhood

The Revere Shirley Ave TDI Partnership announced this week a brand- new participatory budgeting website for both residents and business owners to help distribute \$275,000 in funding for improvements to outdoor spaces in and around Shirley Ave. The results of the online tool, and complementary in- person engagement, will directly inform the use of public funding for streetscape, greenspace, public art, and other outdoor improvements in the neighborhood over the next year.

"The public realm— including streetscapes, art, pocket parks and moreplays such a strong role in communicating a neighborhood's identity," Revere TDI Fellow Laura Christopher shared., "It's fitting that through this process, community members will directly select improvements and shape that identity."

The participatory budgeting process will be hosted on an online engagement platform called CoUrbanize. Whether you

are a resident, worker, visitor, or a member of the business community, you can add an idea to the map or share your vision at one of our in-person events. Those wishing to participate can do so at ShirleyAve.com/Ideas today. Here, participants can add their ideas for public realm improvements and later vote on eligible projects. While all are welcome to add ideas, TDI partners ask that only those who find themselves in the Shirley Ave neighborhood on a daily to weekly basis

neighborhood participation.

The online engagement will be complemented by in-person events, beginning with a pop-up at Shirley Ave's Mobile Farmers Market at Sandler Square the morning of June 10. This project is being led by Revere's TDI Partnership which includes Women Encouraging Empowerment, the City of Revere, The Neighborhood Developers, and MGH/Revere Cares. The \$275,000 in funding that will be spent according to communifeedback is coming

from the City of Revere. \$260,000 of that funding comes from the Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG) and \$15,000 of the funding comes from a regional arts grant, Make it Public, which the City received this past fall.

The Shirley Ave Participatory Budgeting process is being supported through MassDevelopment's Transformative Development Initiative (TDI). TDI is a program for Gateway Cities designed to accelerate economic growth within focused districts.

The program works with cross-sector partnerships engage community members in actionable planning, implement local economic development initiatives, and spur further public and private investment. Revere's Shirley Ave neighborhood began its three-year participation in the TDI program in September 2022. Revere Beach reopened on Monday morning.

"As we enter the warmer months, safety on Revere Beach is always a major priority for the City. The type of violence we saw over the weekend will absolutely not be tolerated in our community. We are actively working with public safety partners to ensure a family friendly environment at America's first public beach. Safety is our first priority, and we will continue to work with Mass State Police, Revere Police, DCR and other public safety stakeholders to ensure this weekend doesn't set the stage for the rest of the summer,' said acting Mayor Patrick Keefe in a statement. - tive assertion that, "Joe Biden let us down," is that some of their supporters might actually believe it -- when that is not even remotely the truth -- and in so doing, these Progressives only contribute to the sort of cynicism about government that brought us the outcome in 2016 when many Progressive voters either did not turn out to support Hilary Clinton or voted for Jill Stein.

The bottom line is that Progressive officeholders need to stop their constant stream of exaggerated negativism. It's bad for the country and ultimately is counterproductive to their own agenda.





Water department updates council on hydrant issues

The city's inventory of 875 fire hydrants are in good shape and undergo annual inspections and flushing, Acting Superintendent of the Water and Sewer Department Chris Ciaramella told the city council last week.

Councillor-at-Large Dan Rizzo said the council submitted the request for the hydrant update in the wake of a recent Oak Island brush fire where it appeared there was an issue with a hydrant. Rizzo added that the request was not a reflection on the ef-

forts of the water department, which he said works tremendously hard.

Ciaramella said that over 400 of the city's hydrants have been inspected this year, and that the inspections of the remaining hydrants are underway. Currently, there are six hydrants that are out of service, he said.

"This year, we have replaced 29 hydrants and we have 21 going out to bid for this fiscal year, that will be 50 (new) hydrants," said Ciaremella.

Council President Protem Joanne McKenna

asked why there have been issues with some of the hydrants failing.

"To bring up the Oak Island issue and the hydrants all in that area, the one that appeared to be broken, there were no issues with the hydrant itself," said Ciaramella. "We tried to open multiple hydrants on one six-inch line, and you are not going to get the water pressure out of those hydrants."

Ciaramella said the city is working to address the undersized water lines in that area as well as in other areas in the city. In addition to the small size of the lines themselves, he said the old pipes often become blocked, limiting the water flow further.

"The issue is the big water main projects and the funding for them," said Ciaramella. "The hydrants, I think we have the hydrants well under control."

Ward 5 Councilor John Powers said he agreed that the issues are with the water lines, with maintenance being overlooked for years before the city began to make progress with addressing the issue.





The RHS Filmic Society was formed in 2014, along with the then Drama Guild, to its first fulllength film, which was something no high school had ever done. "Our first movie "PYG" (short for Pygmalion), was a remake of "She's All That". It was filmed over the entire school year and premiered that spring at the former

Revere Showcase Cinema to enthusiastic audiences for three sold out nights," said Amato.

The following year the club wrote another remake called "2:20" based on the film "3 O'clock High". After another successful premiere, the club decided remakes were not enough. so they began their journey of writing an original movie script. Their third

movie, "Heaven Lost", was a learning process in script writing. "Together we brainstormed several ideas and landed on one that dealt with loss and grief. Again, the process took two years. One year to write and one year to film. Next, the original screenplay, "I'm Q" was born. A film about a high school senior having to decide if dropping out was the answer or fighting to stay in school and being true to himself. We are now working on our next film called "A Strangeness in the Proportion". It's a horror movie but it involves a student dealing with the loss of a loved one. Casting will begin at the start of the new school year in September."

According to Amato,

an original film takes two years to produce with the first year working with students with varied cultural backgrounds. "They help provide ideas as we begin the brainstorming process. As the script writing progresses, fewer students are involved just by the nature of the writing process. During the script writing we often find opportunities to bring in additional students to provide input, i.e. current slang. In the second year is when we start filming. Typically the main cast is composed of five or more students plus staff depending on the script. Our settings always involve our high school in part of the storyline to allow for additional student and staff participation (as extras). This allows us opportunities to choose individuals who represent our entire student body." added Am-

There are two separate criteria for students who want to be a part of the club. "First are those who want to act. Our hope is to audition students with an ability to act and memorize lines, but who also have designated time for a serious commitment to the project. We are fairly tough when it comes to casting, but everyone gets

a chance to try out. Often those who do not become one of the leads have the chance to work as extras. In addition to those in front of the camera, we open up opportunities for students interested in learning how to operate the camera and sound equipment. It's an awesome experience when we get students that are unsure of themselves but we see something in them that tells us they can do it. With the right direction we often see these students do some amazing work in front of the camera, sometimes as good as

any professional out there

on the big screen." "When we take on a new film project we know it's a long process with many, many extra hours to get it done. We always get full support from Central Office and RHS Administration at Revere High. Getting their support is key for these projects and without it, we would never be able to complete them to this magnitude. When we work with these students, we are colleagues and not just teachers. It gives them a great experience working that way and it allows us to see what they are truly capable of when pushed."

Revere High Principal Christopher Bowen shared his excitement, "It's been so long since we have had the excitement of a Filmic Society film at RHS! So many of our current students were not in the building when the last film was released. I'm so excited for the student body and all the new faculty to see what a high quality production the RHS students and our directors put together!"





Revere Housing Trust hears from Habitat CEO

The Board of Trustees of the Revere Affordable Housing Trust Fund (RAHTF) held its regular monthly meeting on Wednesday, May 10.

On hand for the meeting were chair Joe Gravellese and fellow members Jan Dumas, Laila Pietri, Anavo Osueke, Claire Inzerillo, and Dean Harris.

The principal portion of the meeting consisted of a presentation from Jim Kostaras, the President and CEO of Habitat for Humanity Greater Boston. The RAHTF has been discussing a potential partnership with Habitat and Kostaras presented the members with an outline of Habitat's mission, its ongoing projects in Boston-area communities, and how it might work together with the RAHTF to develop affordable housing in Revere.

"Our mission is to build homes and create home ownership opportunities for low-income families, which we accomplish primarily through the generosity of donors," said Kostaras, who noted that the group does not receive any government subsidies and relies on volunteer labor for up to 70% of construction costs.

"We believe that home ownership is the way to break the cycle of poverty because of the benefits that come with home ownership," Kostaras continued. He said that families have to meet certain income requirements, which currently is below 80 percent of the area median income (AMI), though Habitat is attempting to go as low as 40 percent of AMI.

He said owners pay a modest monthly mortgage and agree to work 300 hours on the construction of the home. They also have to attend a 12-hour home ownership course, which, he said, "Prepares them to be homeowners better than a typical homeowner," and further noting that Habitat families have a lower mortgage default

erage.

"They are a better risk for a bank than the typical homeowner," Kostaras said. Habitat owners receive a no-interest mortgage that is tailored to ensure that their housing costs are no more than 30% of their income.

He also pointed out that there typically is a deed restriction in order to keep the property as affordable.

"We maintain an ongoing relationship with our homeowners," Kostaras added. "We get many more applicants than we have homes. In Malden, for five homes we had 82 applications. We cannot afford to buy land in this market and we rely on cities and towns to convey property at little or no cost. We're competing with real estate developers. Rarely do we build single-family homes and occasionally we do rehab. In order to build more, we will have to seek financial assistance from city, state, and federal governments. We need to do so because we cannot simply rely on charitable giving."

Habitat presently has ongoing projects in Boston, Malden, and Weston, where they are undertaking a "friendly" 40B project. Kostaras offered to bring the board members along for a tour of its projects in the Boston area.

"We are a bank, a developer, and a social service agency all under one roof," said Kostaras in conclusion before taking questions from the board

"This has been incredibly helpful," summed up Gravallese of Kostaras's presentation. Prior to Kostaras's ap-

pearance, Gravallese opened the meeting with a brief update about potential sources of funding for the board's work. "Our scope remains

wide in terms of what we're looking at," he said, noting that the board's four areas of emphasis are on affordable home ownership programs, first-time home-buyer assistance programs, assistance for seniors to allow them to age in place, and emergency rental assistance.

The board also heard a presentation from Lorena Escolero, who is the city's new Community Development Planner. Escolero touched on potential funding opportunities for homeowner and rental funding rehabs administered by the North Suburban Consortium, which consists of eight communities (Winthrop, Everett, Malden, Medford, Melrose, Chelsea, Arlington, and Revere).

The consortium administers the Home Investment Partnerships (HOME) program that provides funding for communities to acquire, rehabilitate, and construct affordable rental and homeownership opportunities. HOME funds also can be used for the operating costs of community housing development


organizations (CHDOs). down payment assistance for first-time homebuyers, and homeowner rehabilitation assistance. HOME is a federally-funded program that assists in the production and preservation of affordable housing for low and moderate-income families and indi-

viduals. Escolero told the members that the Gateway Housing program, which is administered by Mass. Housing within a Gateway City (of which Revere is one), might be suited to partner with Habitat. The program is limited to 1-4 unit buildings and homeowners are eligible to receive up to \$125,000 in grants.

"This is an exciting program and I want us to get started," said Osueke, who suggested that the board undertake an exploratory committee to find eligible properties. Osueke noted that a property presently for sale on Revere St. might fit the criteria.

Escolero also said that her office is looking at city-owned tax title properties as potential sites for affordable housing projects. She said that the city has hired the firm of JM Goldson Community Preservation + Planning, LLC, to develop a housing production plan for the city, with a goal of having a plan in place by January, 2024. The RHATF's next

meeting is set for Wednesday, June 14.





Massport announces schedule for summer runway work at Boston Logan

The Massachusetts Authority (Massport) announced the Runway 15R-33L Safety and Pavement Rehabilitation Project schedule for this summer. In collaboration with the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), Massport will begin work on Runway 15R-33L in August, with construction planned for approximately 100 days.

Serving as the longest runway at Boston Logan, Runway 15R-33L is primarly used by the FAA during northwest winds, which are typically prevalent in winter and spring months, and is the preferred late-night over Boston Harbor runway for noise abatement purposes. Runway 15R-33L was last rehabilitated in 2012.

Beginning August 14,

Runway 15R-33L will be closed to all aircraft arrivals and departures. Consistent with FAA requirements, the project will improve runway safety by enhancing the lighting and the surface conditions. Work will be done in several phases to include the following: · Replacing pavement

- and improving runway and taxiway intersections; • Upgrading electrical
- infrastructure; • Converting runway

lights to energy efficient

LEDs. In addition to the runway rehabilitation elements, FAA recommended safety improvements will be made to several taxiway intersections to

During the first few weeks of the closure, pavement will be removed and electrical elements will be installed. The majority of the pavement installation will occur in September and October..



DECROSTA IS DOUBLE CHAMP AT GBL MEET; EL-ASRI IS 400 DASH KING; **CUNHA EASILY** WINS 800; CLOSE WINS HIGH JUMP

The Revere High boys outdoor track and field team turned in a strong performance at last week's Greater Boston League (GBL) Meet.

Four Patriots won GBL championships in their respective individual events, led by their standout hurdler, Isaiah DeCrosta, who was a double champion, winning both the 400 and 110 meter hurdles races.

Isaiah handily won the 400 with a clocking of 58.84, which was almost three seconds faster than his closest rival, Nate Nadow of Chelsea, who came across in a time of 1:01.74.

In the 110 event, Isaiah sped to victory in a time of 15.50, which was 1.41 seconds faster than his closest rival.

Teammate Sami El-Asri claimed a GBL title with a first-place finish in the 400 dash with a time of 52.91, edging an Everett opponent by a margin of just 0.48. Sami also took fourth in the long jump with a leap of 19'-.25".

Patriot standout trackman JV Cunha defended his GBL title in the 800, winning the race ing away with a time of 2:01.61, which was more than four seconds faster than the runner-up.

Javan Close reigned supreme in the high jump with a leap of 5'-4" to claim a fifth individual GBL crown for the RHS

trackmen.

The Patriots also won first-place medals in both the 4 x 800 relay with a time of 9:15.64 and the 4 x 400 in a clocking of 3:36.35, as well as a fifth place in the 4 x 100.

Bellemsieh Medy scored eight points in two events. Medy finished third in the 400 dash with a clocking of 53.41 (which was a scant 0.50 behind the winning time of teammate Sami El-Asri) and took fifth in the triple jump with a landing of 38'-5.5".

Youness Chahid scored four points with a fourth place finish in the twomile run in 11:11.78. Kenan Batic earned a

sixth-place medal in the mile with a clocking of 4:56.87. Allen Hou earned a rib-

bon with a sixth place effort in the shot-put with a throw of 37'-5.5". Kevin Purcifull also

took home a sixth place medal in the discus with a toss of 109'-3.5". Erick Mayorga scored a point and a medal for his

is also the head Unified Track and Field coach.





Disabilities Comm. hears about tourism in the city

The Revere Commission on Disabilities held its regular monthly meeting on May 9 via Zoom. On hand for the meeting were chair Ralph DeCicco, vice-chair Pauline Perno, Asmaa Abou-Fouda, Robert Brown, Elle Vargas, and Mario Gri-

Charlie Giuffrida, the Director of the Office of Travel & Tourism for the City of Revere, was the guest speaker and told the commissioners of the city's rosy present -- and even rosier future -- as a tourist hub.

"It's our job to sell the city," said Giuffrida of his office's mission. "We live next to the eighth most-visited city for tourists in the world, and when they come to Boston, they're sleeping in Revere. We had a banner year for

occupancy tax revenue and a banner year in meals tax revenue. We're looking at hospitality as the next double-digit growth sector for the city and there's a lot of opportunity to keep reinvesting this money in growing our community as a destination.

"Tourists are finding Revere is a great place to make their home base for their visit to the Boston area," Giuffrida continued. "We also have a ton of families who stay here for their college visits to Boston.

"We presently have 1600 hotel rooms and will have up to 2000 within the next three years," Giuffrida said, adding that he is seeking to collaborate with Boston tourism officials for the upcoming World Cup in 2026.

He said the special events this summer at Revere Beach will include the recently-held Kite Festival; the Revere Beach Music Series that will start June 1; the second annual Revere Beach Pride event on June 25 at Waterfront Square that will include a fireworks display in the evening; the annual Sandcastle Festival from July 28-30 that will include fireworks; and an end-of-summer fireworks show on August 30.

He said L.L. Bean will be partnering with DCR and the city this summer to provide free-of-charge beach chairs, beach umbrellas, and beach toys for youngsters and their families to use (and hopefully return) during the day.

He also noted that the city is looking to achieve some degree of independence from the DCR in the operation of the beach and is considering an art installation at the beach, among other things, and cited the impending completion of the rebuilt Sullivan Park that will provide a welcoming space for visitors to the beach.

DeCicco suggested that

to-be completed bike path in the city.

"I couldn't agree more," said Giuffrida, adding that grants may be available from the Better Beaches group to fund a program.

Perno asked about accessibility to the beach itself for persons with disabilities. Giuffrida said that the Revere Beach Partnership, of which he is a board member, will attempt to get together with DCR to discuss accessibility.

DeCicco also raised the possibility of "quiet zones" on the beach that would provide reserved spaces on the beach for persons with disabilities and senior citizens.

"It's incredible to see how far Revere Beach has come. People want to come here and spend their money here," Giuffrida concluded, adding that he recently hosted a group of about 20 travel agents from England and all were amazed that Revere Beach is located so close to Boston and Logan Airport, which makes it unique among major city tourist destinations.

Vargas made an appearance at the meeting via a FaceTime call from Wash-

DeCicco updated his fellow commissioners on the recent CODA (Commissions on Disabilities Alliance) monthly Zoom meeting that he attended on May 3. He said that the issue of hybrid Zoom meetings, which would be of immense value to persons with disabilities, was discussed.

DeCicco noted for members of the public that handicapped placards are issued solely by the Registry of Motor Vehicles, not by the city. He also urged applicants to make sure they send their applications and paperwork to the correct address at the RMV.

Perno suggested, and DeCicco agreed, that a future issue for the commission to tackle is the lack of programs for those who have recently graduated from the school system for whom there are few programs available to them as young adults when they transition out of the school

transition out of the school system.

The meeting concluded with the commission's







Cummings Foundation awards Malden Catholic grant

Cummings Foundation's intention is to give back in areas where it owns commercial real estate and therefore sup-Massachusetts nonprofits based in and serving Middlesex, Essex, and Suffolk counties. The nonprofits are spread across 46 different cities and towns, and this year's grant recipients represent

With warming weather, NFPA offers grilling safety tips to help reduce fires and injuries

Often considered the unofficial kick-off to summer, Memorial Day weekend is synonymous with outdoor celebrations and cookouts. With the holiday just around the corner and the warmer months upon us, the National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA®) is working to ensure that people understand where potential grilling risks exist and ways to minimize them.

"Because outdoor grilling involves the use of a fuel source to generate an open flame, it inherently presents potential fire risks that needs to be taken seriously," said Lorraine Carli, vice president of Outreach and Advocacy at NFPA.

NFPA data shows that between 2017 and 2021, U.S. fire departments responded to an annual average of 11,421 home fires involving grills, hibachis, or barbecues, including 5,763 structure fires and 5,659 outside or unclassified fires. These fires caused an annual average of two civilian deaths, 176 reported civilian injuries, and \$172 million in direct property damage. July was the leading month for grilling fires (16 percent), followed by June (14 percent), May (12 percent) and August (11 percent); grilling fires in November through February accounted for 4 percent or less

each year. According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), for the same fire-year period, an annual average of 22,155 patients went to emergency rooms because of injuries involving grills. Nearly half (47 percent) of the injuries were thermal burns, including both burns from

fire and from contact with hot objects. These burns typically occurred when someone, often a child, bumped into, touched or fell on the grill, grill part or hot coals. In fact, children under five accounted for an average of 2,820 of the contact-type burns (46 percent) per year.

"These numbers reinforce that grilling fires can and do happen. However, there's no need to avoid grilling during Memorial Day or in the months ahead," said Carli. "Instead, by following simple safety precautions, people can greatly reduce the risk of experiencing a grilling fire."

of tips, recommendations, and resources for grilling safely, including these key messages: • For propane grills, check the gas tank for

NFPA offers a wealth

- leaks before use in the months ahead. (Watch NFPA's video on how to check for leaks.)
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Place the grill well away from the home, deck railings, and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grilling area.
- If you use starter fluid when charcoal grilling, only use charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire. When you have or are finished grilling, let the coals cool completely before disposing in a metal con-
- tainer. • Never leave your grill unattended when in use.

Major budget wins this week in the Massachusetts State Senate

The Massachusetts State Senate convened last week to debate and finalize the Senate budget package. Tenancy Protections Secured through **Eviction Sealing and** Preservation of RAFT

Among the most impactful achievements in the Senate's budget package is the passage of Senator Edwards' Tenancy Protection Amendment. This amendment to the budget assures that those who qualify for Residential Assistance for Families in Transition (RAFT) and pay their landlord the amount of money owed can avoid eviction, dismiss their case, and seal their record. This achievement also means that tenants who are waiting on approval of RAFT will not face a judgement on an eviction case. Importantly, this accomplishment allows a tenant to petition to seal their eviction record in certain situations, such as no-fault evictions, RAFT approval, or where the

eviction case is dismissed. The Tenancy Protection Amendment delivers the infrastructure necessary to prevent unfair treatment based on eviction records and improve access to safe, affordable, and dignified housing.

Investment in the Urban League of Eastern Massachusetts

Senator Edwards secured \$400,000 for the Urban League of Eastern Massachusetts (ULEM), which supports adults of Eastern Massachusetts in accessing employment and economic development opportunities by providing support to overcome racial, social, economic, and sexual and domestic violence barriers. Their programs and services offer an array of crucial skills-training classes and workshops at no cost.

Winthrop Ferry Funds Add a Stop at Logan **Airport and Aim for**

Affordable Fares An incredible win for the Town of Winthrop includes \$1 million allocated to subsidize ferry services while the Sumner Tunnel is closed July 5 – August 31, 2023. Notably, the Winthrop Ferry will now make a stop at the Logan Airport Ferry Terminal, making travel from East of Boston to Downtown Boston more accessible and dependable. Investing funds in these ferry services will provide a much-needed alternative method of transportation for residents and is set to

Friday Night Supper is located at Arlington Street Church on Boylston Street. Funds for these incredible services promises the community that we can meet one of their most




