FY2024 SENIOR **WORK OFF ABATEMENT PROGRAM** APPLICATIONS AVAILABLE UNTIL AUGUST 1

The applications for the FY2024 Senior Work Off Abatement Program are available and the deadline to apply is Monday, August 1 at 3:00 p.m. Applications will be collected and reviewed at the Rossetti-Cowan Adult Center at 25 Winthrop Ave in Revere only from 12:00-3:00 p.m. Monday – Thursday. This program provides the opportunity for 50 seniors to work for a \$750 property tax reduction and another 50 seniors to work for a \$500 water bill credit.

"We are so excited to welcome the seniors back for this year's abatement program," said Deb Peczka, Director of Elder Services. "My staff will be available from 12-3:00 p.m. to collect your applications and guide you through the process, so please reach out if you have any questions."

In order to qualify, Revere residents must be at least 60 years of age, an assessed owner of their property, and have an income lower than \$89,445 for individual applicants or \$109,322 for married applicants. Applicants must provide proof of age through a birth certificate, copy of driver's

License Commission approves 1-day licenses

The Revere License Commission held its regular monthly meeting on Wednesday, June 21, in the City Council Chamber in Revere City Hall. All three of the commission's members, Chairman Robert Selevitch, Linda Guinasso, and Daniel Occena were on hand for the ses-

The meeting was a fairly short (40 minutes) affair, with the commissioners addressing a myriad of routine matters. The commissioners granted a number of one-day licenses for an array of celebratory events taking place in the city in the coming months. Those included:

-- A request by American Legion Post #61 for six, 1-day Malt/Wine and Common Victualler Licenses to be exercised at Veterans Memorial Park (formerly the American Legion Lawn) at 249 Broadway from 5 p.m.-7 p.m. on the Sundays of July 9, July 16, July 23, August 6, August 13, and August 20 (with rain dates of August 27 and September 3) that will feature a beer & wine garden with hot dogs, hamburgers, sausages, and chips to accompany the city-sponsored Sunday night con-

William J. Chisholm, the event manager, presented the application the commission.

"We would like to hold a small beer garden that will be roped-off," said Chisholm, who added that members of the Post who are TIPS-certified will serve the beer.

Ward 2 City Councillor Ira Novoselsky spoke in favor of the application.

"This is something we have been doing for the past few years," said Novoselsky, who is a member of the Post. "This is a fundraiser for the group and everyone looks forward to it."

"These concerts are a great event that the city holds every summer," said Guinasso, who noted that she looks forward to attending them.

There were no opponents and the commissioners unanimously approved the application.

-- A pair of requests from the Revere Beach Partnership (RBP) in connection with the International Sand Sculpting Festival to be held on the last weekend of July at Revere Beach. The first was for a 1-day license for All Alcohol to be exercised on Saturday, July 29, from 6 p.m.–9 p.m. for the annual VIP Party with an expected attendance of 450. The second was for three, 1-day Licenses for Malt/Wine to be exercised on Friday, July 28, from 1 p.m.-8 p.m., Saturday, July 29, from 1 p.m.–9 p.m., and Sunday, July 30, 2023 from 1 p.m.-6 p.m.

MBC addresses coastal climate change impact

State and local leaders discussed the impact of climate change on beaches from Hull to Lynn as part of the state's Metropolitan Beaches Commission's (MBC) initial public hearing on Tuesday morning.

The meeting was expected to be the first of many to address flooding, sea level rise, and erosion along the metropolitan coastline.

"Our goal is to start the conversation from the goal of the Metropolitan Beaches Commission to

and protection of metropolitan beaches from Nahant to Nantasket," said Chris Mancini, the Executive Director of Save the Harbor, Save the Bay.

Mancini said there are three main questions that are the focus for the communities during the initial stages of the beach commission hearings. Those include actions that are working now in the communities to address climate issues at the beaches, what are the gaps that need to be addressed, and what the communities would

along their beach and waterfronts.

State Senator Brendan Crighton, who co-chairs the Metropolitan Beaches Commission, said that when he first came to the State House, climate change and climate resiliency was an issue but not one that was necessarily at the top of everyone's agenda.

"But climate resiliency certainly is now, particularly for those of us who represent communi-

I was present at the Revere Advocate headquarters to pick up copies of my big article release. I walked into a crying office shell-shocked and reeling by the breaking news that their beloved co-worker Mr. Mitchell, for over 18 years a staple of the Revere news community, had just passed away at the hospital.

his Dad wasn't there. They were both in hospice. Jimmy was by his father's bedside, his father the lat-Cautiously and softly, I

nodded to both Tara and Nancy that everything would be OK. Warmly and full of healing energy, I offered a group hug. Nancy's eyes popped open, surprised and bewildered. She shot a look back and forth at a teary-eyed Tara and the stack of newspapers and bills on her desk. I raised my hands and

arms wide apart, similar to my youthful days playing varsity basketball and holding a strong defensive stance. At that moment, I was defending our safe space from all negativity. Nancy kicked her rollie chair backward, ran over, and wrapped her arms around mine. Revere must lead on environmental sustainability

With the official start of summer, Revere will again showcase some of our beloved natural and open spaces -- Revere Beach, Belle Isle Marsh, the Pines River, and Rumney Marsh Reservation.

Revere's tremendous wealth of natural spaces is one of the many things that makes our city so special, which is why we need to prioritize preserving and protecting these jewels of Revere.

In recent decades, Revere has also felt the brunt of environmental impacts, from health and environmental impacts from Logan Airport, industri-

al dumping, and now sea level rise stemming from climate change.

Climate change is an existential threat to our planet and something we see firsthand in Revere, from storm surges breaching our seawall, flooding in Beachmont and Riverside, and massive waves forcing the closure of the Winthrop Parkway.

Climate action and resiliency starts at home. Locally, we must prioritize climate resilience measures to make residents less vulnerable to the impacts of storm surges and sea level rise. The City must immediately perform an environmental audit of the City to identify measures that lower our carbon footprint and save taxpayers money, including transitioning our vehicle fleet to hybrid and electric. Revere should pilot a curbside composting program and utilize composting at large-scale events to reduce solid waste. We must expand investment in our parks and green and open spaces. Revere should fast-track its street tree planting program to reduce urban "heat islands" that make

summers hotter in our city. On the City Council, I have led sustainability efforts, supported the creation of a community electricity aggregation program that delivers clean energy for lower prices to residents, lobbied for passage of the Decker-Garballey 100% Renewable Energy Act, and helped City Council advocacy efforts advocacy efforts against the Saugus Ash Monofill facility.

By protecting our environment, we also reduce the impacts of sea level rise, make our air and water cleaner, and enhance the health of our residents. It's time that Revere gets serious about environmental sustainability.

dicates rising sea levels and flooding are costing homeowners, who live near the ocean, thousands of dollars in home values, and more severe property losses due to natural disasters. This has led to a corresponding increase in Federal Flood Insurance

A lot of us can remember the damage and destruction caused by the Blizzard of 1978, when the sea level rose to an elevation of 15.10 feet, accompanied by a tidal surge and onshore winds gusting to 66 miles per hour, sending ocean waters crashing over Revere's beaches and seawalls flooding our coastal neighborhoods.

vere was slammed by two major Nor'easters. On January 4,2018 a "Bomb Cyclone" Nor'easter hit Revere with sea levels ris-

As recently as 2018 Re-

ing to 15.16 feet causing neighborhood flooding and the shutdown of many roadways, and again, on March 2, 2018, when sea levels reached 14.67 feet resulting in further neighborhood flooding and the closure of many of our city streets. Flooding and sea level

rise are major problems for Revere, which deserve emergency high priority status. That is why I propose, using federal and state funds, appoint an Experienced Professional Emergency Preparedness and Management Officer, whose primary responsibility will be to immediately secure more state and federal funding to protect our coastal waterfront neighborhoods from flooding. My commitment to public safety does not end with police and fire We must work actively and diligently as a coastal community to protect our residents most vulnerable to ever-increasing severe





ties along the coast," said such a critical issue that Crighton.

DCR recognized this and

Over the past weekend, Crighton said he went to the beach in Nahant and his son asked him if he could imagine the whole world covered in water, and Crighton said the idea wasn't that far-fetched.

"This is a serious issue, one that affects us not only now, but thinking about future generations and what exactly the beaches will look like," said Crighton. "Imagine Massachusetts with no beaches, it is certainly a troubling notion for all of us."

Julia Knisel from the state's office of Coastal Zone Management said there needs to be a collaborative effort among state and local agencies and organizations to address the coastal impacts of climate change.

Knisel noted that concrete seawalls line the Massachusetts coast, but that many of them are a century old.

"We need to look at the condition and height of the structures relative to current storm surge and conditions, and we need to look to the future, as well," said Knisel.

There also needs to be a closer look at the lowering of beaches in addition to beach erosion, as well, Knisel said.

Over the past decade, Knisel said the office of Coastal Zone Management has awarded over \$34 million in grants to local communities for coastal climate resiliency projects to retrofit current infrastructure and put in place shoreline and dune restoration projects.

Nick Connors of the DCR addressed how that department has pivoted in the past several years to address climate change issues

"DCR's mission is to protect, promote, and enhance our natural, cultural, and recreational resources," said Connors.

Chief among those natural resources are 27 saltwater beaches, many of which are in the Greater Boston area.

"Climate change is already exacerbating natural hazards and extreme weather events leading to new impacts that will affect the Commonwealth," said Connors. "This is

such a critical issue that DCR recognized this and established a new office in early 2021 to develop and implement an agency framework that climate change considerations are included into the agency's initiatives and agency projects," said Connors.

The office works across the spectrum of federal, state, regional, and municipal partners to ensure that the DCR is implementing its core values and sustainable practices and resiliency across its infrastructure, assets, and resources, Connors said.

Catherine McCandless of the Boston Environment Department and Delaney Morris of the Boston Planning and Development Agency highlighted the recent planning efforts and proposed climate resiliency projects for Boston's beaches.

Those efforts include a project at Constitution Beach in East Boston, where officials are looking at a system of berms and dunes with a reinforced core that would reinforce the sandy beach and protect the Blue Line from flooding.

In discussing the Town of Hull's coastline resiliency efforts, town Conservation Director Christian Kahforst said it is important to listen to and understand local history.

"It really matters to get what locals understand and witnessed in the past," said Krahforst.

Mancini said the beach commission will begin to zero in on more specifics as it continues to meet in the coming months.

"This is really the first conversation, the first meeting," said Mancini.

Future meetings will take a deeper dive into individual communities and beaches, although he added that all of the communities and beaches will benefit from the more region-wide discussions.

Revere State Representative Jessica Giannino said the issues with flooding and resiliency in Revere stretch back to at least the Blizzard of '78. She also noted that as a city councilor, she would tour beach communities with the public works department as neighborhoods were flooded by storm surges.

HIGH BACTERIA LEVELS LEAD TO LOCAL BEACH CLOSINGS

It hasn't been the best summer so far for local beachgoers.

Following a rainy June and Fourth of July holiday, many popular local beaches, including Constitution Beach in East Boston and Revere Beach, were closed to swimming due to high bacteria levels.

As of Tuesday, July 11, Swim at Your Own Risk signs because of the high bacteria levels were posted at Kings Beach and Lynn Beach in Lynn, and Donovan's Beach in Winthrop.

The 53 beaches closed statewide early this week were actually an improvement over last week, when the heavy holiday weekend rains led to over 70 closures. Revere Beach and Short Beach in Revere and Constitution Beach in East Boston were closed to

swimming for a time last week, but were reopened to swimming this week.

"The Town of Winthrop conducts weekly tests of the water quality of 5 beaches in Winthrop for levels of Enterococci which is an indicator of fecal pollution and possible enteric pathogens," Winthrop health officials stated. "When the level exceeds 104 MPN (most probable number)/100 mL, the Town of Winthrop closes the beach. High levels are usually due to heavy rainfall and usually return to normal levels after a retest."

In Revere, DCR and Revere DPW test the water quality weekly during the summer for a specific type of bacteria; when bacteria levels get too high, the water can become unsafe for swimming or ingestion.

Swimming or ingesting contaminated water could result in symptoms like nausea, diarrhea, stomach cramps, chills or fever.

Revere officials stated that if anyone is concerned about their potential exposure to contaminated water when signage is posted to contact their healthcare provider.

To minimize illness and injury associated with swimming, and to notify the public about the quality of beach water, the state's Department of Public Health collects beach water quality data from local health departments and the DCR. All public and semi-public bathing beaches in Massachusetts are monitored for fecal indicator bacteria (FIB), and

Monitoring occurs during the beach season, which begins when the school year finishes in mid-June and ends during the weekend of Labor Day.



MERCURY REMAINS PROHIBITED IN THE MAIL

The Postal Service is reminding customers that metallic mercury and devices containing metallic mercury are always prohibited in the mail stream. includes antique items such as thermometers, barometers, blood pressure monitors and similar devices. However, compact fluorescent lamps, which contain small amounts of mercury in vapor form, are mailable domestically but not internationally.

Here's what you should

1. Review USPS Pub-

lication 52, Hazardous, Restricted, & Perishable Mail (https://pe.usps.com/ text/pub52/welcome.htm), to find out if your item is 2. Follow U.S. laws

and U.S. Postal Service hazmat guidelines. 3. Ship items securely with required labels

and markings. Customers can take their package to a Post Office location to make sure it is labeled correctly.

Improper, undeclared, or prohibited hazmat (hazardous material) shipping can have serious consequences for everyone involved. Full responsibility rests

with the mailer to comply with all Postal Service and non-Postal Service laws and regulations in the mailing of hazardous material. Anyone who mails,

or causes to be mailed, a nonmailable or improperly packaged hazardous material can be subject to legal penalties (i.e., fines and/or imprisonment), including but not limited to, those specified in 18 U.S.C. The transport of hazardous materials prior to entry as U.S. Mail and after receipt from the Postal Service is subject to Department of Transportation regulations. If a person knowingly

mails items or materials that are dangerous or injurious to life, health, or property, they may face a civil penalty of at least \$250, but not more than \$100,000 per violation, the costs of any cleanup associated with each violation, and damages. They may also face criminal penalties.

The Postal Service is HAZMAT or DG.

committed to the safety and security of its employees, its customers, and its transportation networks and will remain vigilant in safeguarding the mail stream against any article that might pose a hazard to health, safety, property, or the environment.

Reminder: Effective July 9, USPS will require Electronic Indicators when shipping Hazardous Materials (HAZMAT) and Dangerous Goods (DG). Publication 52, Hazardous, Restricted, and Perishable Mail (Pub 52) will be revised to incorporate new requirements for mailers to use unique Service Type Codes (STCs) and extra service codes (ESCs) within the tracking barcodes and electronic data submission for package shipments containing

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State officials encourage residents to take free transportation on the 'T'

With the Sumner Tunnel closed for repairs until Aug. 31, state officials are encouraging area residents to use the MBTA's Blue Line, which is free of

Transportation Secretary Gina Fiandaca, an East Boston resident, Lt. Governor Kim Driscoll, State Sen. Lydia Edwards, and Rep. Adrian Madaro appeared at a July

6 news conference outside Orient Heights 'T' station in East Boston, asking commuters to "ditch the drive" and take public transportation during the tunnel's closure to traffic.

"We really want people to know the best way [taking public transportation] to get into Boston during the Sumner Tunnel closure is not only good for their wallet, but for the planet," said Driscoll. Fiandaca said officials

have been monitoring traffic patterns daily, including in the cities of Revere and Chelsea. "We know that a lot of folks will choose to take the Tobin Bridge, as opposed to the Ted Williams [Tunnel]," she said. "We think all of those alternatives are out there to help people plan their trip on the Mass511 App. If you do need to get to points south of the city, that App is also there to help you."

Driscoll said she usually takes public transportation at least once a week. "I think I'll be doing it more. This is a great way

to get into Boston. If you have not taken the ferry in to Boston - either from Lynn, Salem, Winthrop, or East Boston - there's no better way, and we hope that people will do even after the Tunnel is [reopened]."

Rep. Adrian Madaro said, "With the Sumner closed for the next several weeks, traffic is as bad as it's ever been, and it won't get better unless we limit the number of cars on the road. As Eastie residents, this is the time to take advantage of the free Blue Line and Ferry whenever possible. The tunnel closure comes with certain unavoidable paints, but together, we can reduce congestion on our streets. Ditch the drive and choose public transit when you can."

Following the news conference, Driscoll, Fiandaca, Edwards, and Madaro boarded the Blue Line train for the ride to the Government Center 'T' stop.





New England (now NBC Sports Boston). Following her first experience in the sports networking world, she landed part-time promotional work with the Red Sox and Celtics and interned with the Revere Journal after graduating college in 2011.

At the Journal, Mazzarelli focused on becoming a "jack of all trades," learning the ins and outs of reporting, sales, and sports writing to continue being a part of the sports media space.

Even without the mainstream sports media education that exists today, Mazzarelli put her all into making a career out of an important element of her life. She grew up as an athlete and sports enthusiast, playing soccer in her childhood and continuing with the sport at RHS where she became team captain as an upper-classman. She was a member of the indoor and outdoor track teams as well, realizing she loved the excitement of learning a new sport.

Entering the sports industry, Mazzarelli grew to love the excitement of working directly with teams. In fact, she shocked herself when she packed up and moved to Colorado to work for the U.S. Olympic Committee (now the U.S. Olympic and Paralympic Committee).

Starting out, she worked in the Committee's communications department. In this "overarching umbrella role," Mazzarelli attended the Rio Games in 2016. She then applied her skills to work with one of the national governing bodies, USA Hockey working specifically with the U.S. Women's Hockey

"Getting to work with Team USA... it was really an eye-opening [and]... enriching experience,' Mazzarelli said.

With the team, she traveled to Brazil, Korea, Canada, and Finland, working as the team's communications manager and main public relations contact.

When the team competed in the 2018 PyeongChang Olympic Games in South Korea, she witnessed national history firsthand. At those Games, the

"We did Ellen DeGeneres, we did Jimmy Fallon, we did a number of things. We made so many [television] appearances," Mazzarelli remembered. "It was just an absolute blast to be a part of that group and be able to elevate the profiles of those women after having, essentially, made history."

The team made a special place in her heart for women's hockey and strengthened her appreciation for women in sports - professional and amateur.

Despite the excitement of Team USA, Mazzarelli thought it was time to head back to Boston.

There was a desire to move closer to home and... settle [down], I had just gotten married and thinking about starting a family," she said. "The idea of moving back to the Boston area was really attractive to me."

So, she packed up again and headed back to the Bruins, calling it her "second stint" with the organization. From 2013 to 2015, Mazzarelli started out as their promotions and marketing activation coordinator. In 2020, she was named the Bruins' marketing director.

"I love my role [as their marketing director]... I have a wonderful team, a wonderful atmosphere," she said. "It's very work hard, play hard."

With the Bruins, Mazzarelli developed meaningful connections with her coworkers and the brand. She said being able to represent a team she's been a fan of since a young age has been an incredible experience. The organization gave her a "second family," seeing her own team through nights, weekends, games, and all brand events. In other words, it was the culture that kept her coming back to the Bruins.

In her first year working in professional sports with the Bruins in 2013, "I felt like I was on top of the world... I was hooked from then."

That year, the Bruins made it to the Stanley Cup Finals in a sprint of a season. Even though they came up short, losing to the Chicago Blackhawks in six games, Mazzarel-

li grew passionate for

the brand she has always loved. Ten years later, she experienced another historic season.

"This past season was incredible; it was obviously incredibly historic. I felt like every single night we had an opportunity to make history... we were just riding the high, it was definitely a ton of fun and I would say morale was incredibly high – everyone was super excited to get to the playoffs," she said. "Obviously, it didn't go the way that we all hoped in Round 1 with the Pan-

With little fanfare, the fences came down and, finally, the pedestrian bridge and plaza at Wonderland Station opened to the public last week.



Summer is a great time of year to enjoy a dog-friendly wander along the Greenway in Boston. Dogs are welcome in this linear park if their humans abide by simple rules. The park conservancy explains, "To ensure clean, safe spaces for a wide variety of users, strict on-leash and clean-up policies will be enforced within The Greenway. 'Clean up after your pet' practices are required. Dogs and other pets are not permitted in any of the park fountains, water features, or planting beds."

You know how your dog reacts to crowds and loud music. Check the calendar of events in the park before choosing a day to visit. Larger events might make the park too congested for a relaxing dog

Features Along the Way

The Greenway website (http://www.rosekennedygreenway.org) offers an interactive map that helps you find features, restrooms, public art, and transit. For this walk, start at the sculpture and labyrinth at the Armenian Heritage Park location and make your way to Dewey Square.

We know that dogs are happy if they have new aromas to sniff, some water and shade as needed,

a small treat from time to time, and you by their side. Our dog Poppy loves to people-watch from a bench. She enjoys the carousel and people playing at the ring fountains. She adores the aromas from the food trucks.

Enjoying Trillium with Your Dog

On some days of the week, you'll find a food truck at the Trillium Beer Garden, where dogs are welcome, and you can bring your own food to enjoy with your beer. In addition to the food trucks, you can also pick up takeout from places along Atlantic Avenue. We suggest a lobster roll from James Hook & Company. This year the beer garden is open from 3 to 10 p.m. on Wednesdays and Thursdays and from Noon to 10 p.m. on Fridays and Saturdays and Noon to 6 p.m. on Sundays.

Poppy has a lot of experience behaving in restaurants because she's had a lot of practice in Provincetown. As more restaurants obtain permission from the City of Boston to have dog-friendly seating in their outdoor spaces, many guardians will need to work on training their dogs to behave in these situations. Beer gardens like this one are a great place to start.

As in all other Greenway spaces, leashes are

required. Since we will be eating and need our hands, we use a carabiner on Poppy's leash to attach her to one of our legs or a sturdy table or chair. She's a small dog, so we try to keep her under our table. If you have a big dog, try to get him to settle near

A visit to a beer garden is a great activity for a group of friends who often dog walk together. With extra humans, if one dog needs to step outside for a quick walk or a time-out, the rest of the group can hold the table and mind the food.

If you arrive by car, onstreet parking in this area is scarce, but plenty of public parking lots exist. You can also do a combination, drive to an MBTA station with parking, and finish the journey on the


