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## New DPW facility readies for opening

On Tuesday, Acting Mayor Patrick Keefe took a final walk through Revere’s new Department of Public Works facility before it is expected to open early next month.

For Revere’s Chief of Infrastructure and Engineering Don Ciamarella, the new 38,000-square-foot facility is a far cry from the DPW facility he and his fellow DPW workers tried to make the most of for decades.

“When I was first made superintendent of the water and sewer department, I came down here and I looked in and I saw everybody under blue tarps and umbrellas,” said Ciamarella. “I threw a ladder up against the side of the building and I went up to the roof, they had no roof. I came back down the lad-

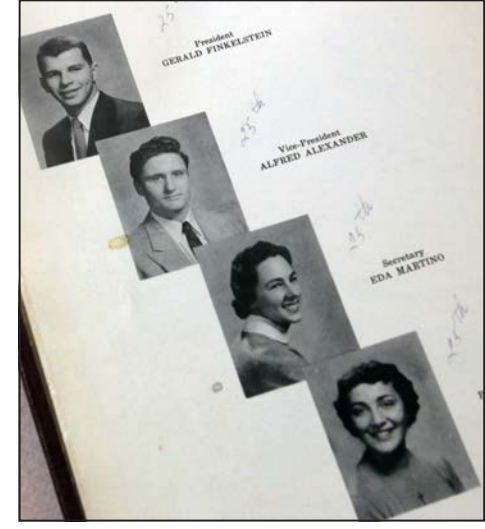

of the first people in my family to earn a college degree. In my day job, I work as an Analyst at an Investment Management firm in Boston. As part of

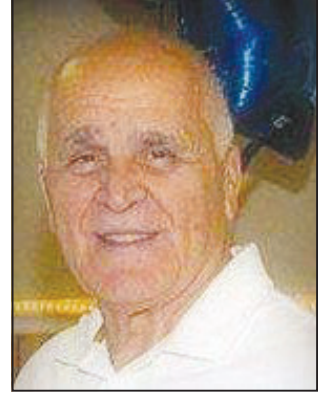

## AHTF approves contribution to project at 133 Salem St. to increase affordable units

The board of the Revere Affordable Housing Trust Fund (AHTF) held its regular meeting last Wednesday, October 11, in Revere City Hall. On hand for the session were chair

Joe Gravellese and fellow members Jan Dumas, Laila Pietri, Anayo Osueke, Claire Inzerillo, Deb Frank, and Dean Harris.

The meeting began with Osueke, the board’s treasurer, presenting his monthly update. He said

the board has a balance in its account of \$860,125.

The members heard of an opportunity to support additional affordable housing stock in North Revere from Mikael Vien-

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# Revere High School earns a place on the College Board’s AP Honor Roll for the 2022-23 school year

Last week, the College Board announced that Revere High School (RHS) was named to the Advanced Placement® Program (AP®) School Honor Roll, earning a Bronze Distinction.

The AP® School Honor Roll recognizes schools whose AP programs are delivering results for students while broadening access. Schools can earn this recognition annually based on criteria that reflect a commitment to increasing college-going culture, providing opportunities for students to earn college credit and maximizing college readiness.

In addition to achieving Bronze Distinction on the AP School Honor Roll, RHS also received the 2023 AP Access Award. This award acknowledges the school’s steadfast commitment to ensuring that AP coursework is accessible to all students, regardless of their backgrounds or circumstances. The school firmly believes that every student deserves the opportunity to pursue advanced coursework and strives to make this vision a reality.

“Revere High School’s honor of the Bronze Distinction and AP Access Award is a remarkable achievement that reflects the exceptional education our students receive,” said Revere Public School Superintendent Dr. Dianne Kelly. “We are proud of the Revere Public School’s steadfast commitment to academic excellence and equal access to educational opportunities. These achievements will not only benefit Revere today but also play a crucial role in fostering the next generation of leaders for a

brighter future.”

At Revere High, 48% of students in the graduating class took at least one AP Course and 27% of students in the graduating class scored 3+ on an AP exam and earned college credits.

“We are immensely proud to receive the Bronze Distinction on the 2023 AP School Honor Roll. These achievements are a testament to the dedication of our students, teachers, and staff who continuously strive for excellence in education,” said Acting Mayor Patrick Keefe, who also chairs the Revere Public School Committee. “Our commitment to fostering a college-going culture and providing equitable access to AP coursework remains unwavering. We firmly believe in every student’s potential for success, and we are committed to helping them achieve it here in Revere.”

In addition, students who earned college credits through Dual Enrollment classes, brought the total to 77% of the class of 2023 leaving high school with at least three college credits completed. Amazingly, 15% of the class of 2023 left Revere High with at least 15 college credits completed, saving the full cost on a semester of college tuition.

Trevor Packer, head of the College Board’s AP program, added, “AP represents an opportunity for students to stand out to colleges, earn college credit and placement, and potentially boost their grade point averages. The schools have shown that they can expand access to these college-level courses and still drive high performance – they represent the best of our AP program.”

## Zoning subcommittee takes up changes to West Revere condo special permit

The City Council approved changing a special permit for a 72-unit condominium development at 133 Salem St. on Monday night.

During the zoning subcommittee hearing on the change earlier in the evening, Councilor-at-Large Gerry Visconti questioned the use of a \$100,000 affordable housing trust fund grant from the city earmarked for the project, but the council ultimately approved the permit change, which will see an increase in the number of affordable units at the former West Revere Health Center.

Several councillors pointed to the need for affordable housing in the city, and the developer

noted that the grant from the city was needed to show a commitment from the city as he applies for funding through the state’s Commonwealth Builders program.

The City Council initially approved the special permit, which included seven affordable units, for Broadway Capital in the spring of 2022.

In September, the developer was back before the council seeking support for an increase in the number of affordable condo units to 18.

The change in the permit also increases the number of veterans preference and senior preference units in the development from two to three each.

“We desperately need affordable housing in this city,” said Council-

lor-at-Large Marc Silvestri. “The developer came to the floor with affordable housing not just to rent but to sell.”

Ward 6 Councillor Richard Serino noted that the total number of units is not increasing from what was initially approved by the council, just the number of affordable units.

Serino also noted that the \$100,000 grant through the city was an issue with how the state goes about funding affordable housing projects.

Zoning subcommittee Chair Anthony Zambuto stated that the subcommittee was only making a recommendation on the change in the special permit, and not approving any city funding for the project.

In other business, the zoning subcommittee tabled a request for a zoning

changes from Veris Residential for the Overlook Ridge development that would affect the last two undeveloped parcels on the Revere side of the project.

Veris is seeking a change that would allow a casual dining restaurant rather than a hotel on the parcel near the fire station, as well as a change in the parking ratio for a larger residential lot.


Consultants also updated the zoning committee on long-awaited plans for intersection improvements at the Overlook Ridge entrance and a new Rte. 1 northbound ramp, stating it would be part of the final phase of development at Overlook Ridge.

The council also approved a change in the zoning ordinance that would give the city greater oversight for rooming houses.

neau of Broadway Capital Inc., which is developing the former, 140-bed Revere Nursing Home at 133 Salem St. into a condominium project consisting of 71 one- and two-bedroom units with a commercial space in the basement.

Vienneau told the board members that Broadway Capital, which has done three development projects in Chelsea and presently is doing one in Swampscott,

originally had planned to designate seven of the units as affordable, with two earmarked for military service members and two for seniors. However, Vienneau said that there now is an opportunity to increase the number of affordable units from seven to 18 pursuant to MassHousing's Commonwealth Builder Grant program, the purpose of which is to spur the construction of single-family homes and condomini-

ums that are affordable to households with moderate incomes, particularly in communities of color.

However, in order for a development to qualify for the grant, the local municipality must make a contribution to the project. Vienneau further said that there is an urgency to taking action because the project is nearing completion and the application for a grant from the state is time-sensitive. Vienneau asked that the city's contribution to the project come in the form of a 50% waiver of the Community Improvement Trust Fund Fee.

In response to questions from the AHTF members, Vienneau said that six of the 18 units will be sold to buyers with incomes of 70% of the area's average median income (AMI) and 12 will be sold to buyers at 80% of AMI. He further stated that there will be deed restrictions for the first 15 years of ownership. The units cannot be rented and AMI buyers today will have to sell to AMI buyers unless they own the condo for more than 15 years, after which time they can sell at market rates. Prices for the units are expected to range from \$219,000 for one-bedroom units for 80% AMI buyers and \$190,000 for one-bedroom units for 70% buyers, to \$265,000 for two-bedroom units for 80% AMI buyers. He said the market rate units

are expected to range in price from \$320,000 to \$500,000 for two-bedroom units of 1000 sq. ft.

He said that the income level for a single person at 80 percent of AMI is in the range of \$60-\$70,000. In addition, those buyers must have good credit scores in order to qualify for a mortgage.

However, AHTF member Deb Frank pointed out that because of the recent increase in mortgage interest rates, the necessary income level to qualify for "affordable housing" would be in the range of at least \$80,000 in order to purchase one of the "affordable" condo units.

Although all of the members agreed that the term "affordable housing" may be an oxymoron in the context of this project, Inzerillo, noting that Revere has not constructed any form of affordable housing, suggested that, "We should take what we can get."

Gravallese made a motion for \$100,000 of support from the AHTF on the condition that the City Council approve the necessary zoning changes for the special permit that encompasses the stated income levels and the number of affordable units. "We don't want to put in funds for a project that might not occur," he noted.

The members unanimously approved the motion.

## HAMAS ARE TERRORISTS, NOT FREEDOM-FIGHTERS

The demonstrations that have been occurring around the country, especially on college campuses, in apparent support of the Hamas terrorists who slaughtered 1400 Israelis, have been disappointing on many levels.

The Hamas organization is not composed of “freedom fighters” who are seeking to better the lives of the two million people of Gaza. Rather, Hamas is a terrorist group that proclaims only one goal -- the destruction of the State of Israel -- and has shown it will stop at nothing to achieve its ends, including the cold-blooded slaughter of 1400 Israeli civilian men, women, and children.

In addition, Hamas and its masters, the Iranian government leaders (who have funded and trained the Hamas terrorists), consider the two million residents of the Gaza strip -- of whom half are children -- essentially as cannon fodder to achieve their objective of provoking a response from Israel that, they hope, will set the Middle East, if not the entire world, aflame.

The massacre at the Israeli kibbutzim, dance festival, and villages on October 7 accomplished nothing, other than to bring about an Israeli military invasion of Gaza that the Israelis see as necessary in order to root out the military capacity of the Hamas terrorists, but which Hamas knows invariably will result in the deaths of hundreds of innocent Gazan civilians and children.

Peace in the Middle East will be achievable only when all Arab states and Iran are willing to acknowledge the right of the State of Israel simply to exist. However, given that Iran, Hamas, and others preach that Israel must be destroyed, peace will never be achieved and the endless cycle of violence only will continue for future generations, a sad state of reality that the pro-Hamas demonstrators conveniently ignore.

## WILL A PILL MAKE AMERICANS SLIMMER?

Americans have been overeating -- and eating the wrong kinds of food -- for a long time. It is estimated that 40 percent of Americans are obese and another 32 percent of us are overweight -- which means that three out of every four Americans maintain an unhealthy weight. American men today weigh 30 pounds more than they did 50 years ago and American women now weigh as much as that average American man of 50 years ago.

Americans currently rank in the top 10 among all countries for obesity in the world (those who rank higher than us for obesity mostly are small, developing nations) and we are the most overweight nation of every affluent country on earth.

Diabetes has become epidemic in the U.S. and the economic costs stemming from health issues related to our obese society runs in the billions of dollars, while bringing misery to hundreds of millions of our fellow citizens. During the recent pandemic, the biggest factor (aside from being over the age of 65) for developing a serious case of COVID-19 was being overweight.

However, it would appear that a miracle solution -- in the form of drugs originally meant to treat diabetes that also have been shown to tamp down patients' appetites -- is on the horizon.

These drugs already are being prescribed “off-label” for use as weight-loss drugs and the results thus far have been dramatic. In addition, these drugs also show promise for other medical conditions, such as improving blood pressure and cholesterol levels, improving blood sugar levels in patients with diabetes, delaying the onset of type 2 diabetes, and decreasing the occurrence of repeat heart attacks and strokes in those who have type 2 diabetes.

Wall St. believes that these drugs will have a dramatic effect on our society. The two drug companies who make these drugs, Eli Lilly (Mounjaro) and Novo Nordisk (Ozempic and Wegovy), have seen their stock prices surge, while those in the snack food industry -- the makers of junk food such as Twinkies, Oreos, and Doritos -- have seen their stock prices plummet in recent weeks.

There are still many questions about the efficacy and side effects of these new drugs if they are to be prescribed for weight loss, but the future holds hope that America may have found a “cure” for our obesity epidemic.

der and I yelled in, ‘Hey guys, I know why your roof is leaking, you don’t have one.’”

Both Ciaramella and Keefe said those days are over, with Revere set to open the new state-of-the-art facility they said will enable the DPW to serve the community more efficiently and effectively while ensuring a sustainable and resilient future.

“The opening of our new DPW facility is a significant step forward for our city,” said Keefe. “It reflects our commitment to providing high-quality services to our residents and ensuring the long-term sustainability of our infrastructure. This modern facility will enable our DPW team to work more efficiently and safely, ultimately benefiting the entire community.”

During the walk through, Ciaramella highlighted a facility that boasts a modern administrative headquarters equipped with the latest technology to streamline operations and communications. He said this will enable the DPW to respond quickly to resident needs and manage resources more effectively.

The new DPW facility includes dedicated areas

for vehicle maintenance and repair, ensuring that the city’s fleet of vehicles and equipment are always in top condition and ready to tackle any task, Ciaramella added.

Currently, even the most basic maintenance tasks are difficult to handle on site.

The new 38,000-square-foot building is about twice the size of the old DPW building, providing more room for equipment storage and improved stormwater management systems. This will enable the DPW to respond to emergencies promptly and maintain the city’s infrastructure more effectively, according to Ciaramella.

Between the increased storage area and maintenance area, the city will be able to better maintain its investment in trucks and equipment, with all its major pieces of equipment in one place.

Keefe pointed out Revere’s commitment to sustainability in the facility’s design, with energy-efficient lighting, and eco-friendly building materials.

Safety is also a top priority, and the new facility includes improved safety features for DPW employees, such as updated lock-

eroding and is about twice as large as the city’s previous salt shed.

Ciaramella praised the efforts of the contractors and the city in getting the

project completed, noting that construction went off without a hitch, and with the city maximizing the use of space on Charger Street.

ment unit mixed use project presently under construction. He voted on this without imposing any significant development conditions or restrictions on the developer. I was proud to be the sole “no” vote due to the city’s lack of mitigation and planning. Had we done so, we could have controlled the conditions of the proposed Bio-Lab, addressed affordable housing and job training, and limited the number of

vehicles by limiting the number of units projected to travel in and out of the site, now said to be 32,000 at full build out. There is no doubt in my mind that we will experience catastrophic traffic congestion problems unless we enter into serious discussions now. The residents in Beachmont and along our oceanfront deserve no less.

With regards to mitigation, if you compare what

was agreed to with regards to Revere and East Boston, it’s not even close. The City of Boston imposed major conditions and will be receiving substantial mitigation from the developer for their portion of the project.

And, as if that’s not enough, another 296 apartment units are now nearing completion in the Point of Pines, and last month, ground was broken for nearly 400 new apartment units along Revere Beach Boulevard!

As the Ward 4 Councilor, Patrick Keefe supported and voted for knocking down a three-family home to construct a new three-story mixed-use development consisting of twenty-two residential micro-units and four commercial units-built lot line to lot line! This to me is not progress.

Now, he must share the responsibility for all of these misguided apartment overdevelopment policies with the past administration. Unless we choose a

different direction, there is little doubt that what we see today will continue into the future.

The key question that all voters must ask themselves now is whether they want to elect an experienced leader whose accomplishments have benefited the residents of Revere, and whose focus will be on how to make our schools better, our neighborhoods safer, and our taxes more affordable; or, whether to elect a candidate like Patrick Keefe, who con-

tinues to demonstrate that he puts the interests of the wealthy apartment developers ahead of the interest of all of the residents of Revere. We’ve said this from the beginning of our campaign- it’s your vote; it’s our future.

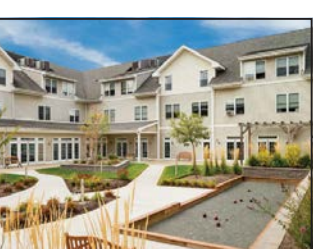
## USS CONSTITUTION MUSEUM HOSTS FREE, PUBLIC BIRTHDAY PARTY FOR “OLD IRONSIDES”

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# Disabilities Commission holds monthly meeting

The Revere Commission on Disabilities held its regular monthly meeting last Tuesday, October 10, via Zoom. Chair Ralph DeCicco, vice-chair Pauline Perno, and fellow members Jason Barone-Cichocki, Ellie Pagan-Vargas, Robert Brown, and Mario Grimanis were on hand for the meeting.

The meeting began with a moment of silence for Revere firefighter Stephen M. Ferrante Jr., who passed away on October 4 and whom DeCicco recalled as a "tremendous first-responder in the city of Revere."

The commission made mention of the recognition of October as National Disabilities Employment Awareness Month, noting that the Mass. Commission on the Status of Persons with Disabilities is hosting a series of events this month which started on October 4th. The commission will be discussing key topic areas related to employment, benefits, and the workforce shortage impact. More information is available at its website which is: <https://www.mass.gov/orgs/permanent-commission-on-the-status-of-persons-with-disabilities>. The commissioners also noted the city's promotion and

acknowledgment of October as National Disabilities Employment Awareness Month.

The commission additionally acknowledged that October is the 50th anniversary of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973. The Massachusetts Commission for the Blind was scheduled to hold its annual celebration event for the first time in four years last Friday, October 13, in the Great Hall at the State House.

DeCicco made a brief presentation of the CODA (Commissions on Disabilities Alliance) monthly Zoom Meeting that he attended on Wednesday, October 4. He said that

the group discussed legislation pending before the Mass. House and Senate that will benefit those with disabilities.

DeCicco then spoke to the group about a potential grant from the state that he will be seeking. "As chair of the Revere Commission on Disabilities & ADA Coordinator, I am in the beginning stages of applying for a grant in conjunction with the Revere Department of Public Health through the Mass. Department of Public Health," said DeCicco. "This grant is to improve community accessibility for individuals with disabilities. The area that I am focusing on for this grant would be the pool

and amenities associated within it at the Community Center in the Garfield School.

"There are a lot of benefits associated with access to a pool for persons with social, emotional, and physical disabilities," DeCicco added.

Perno concluded the meeting by reading the commission's monthly reminder to residents:

"The Commission on Disabilities' office number is 781-286-8267. Residents can also call Revere 311 directly and speak to their staff Monday through Friday. They will be able to answer most questions but if they are unable to or if you would like to speak

to our department directly, please ask to be transferred to the Disability office. If we are unavailable, please leave a detailed message and someone will get back to you as soon as possible.

"As always please let us know if you would like something discussed or brought up and added to our monthly meeting agenda. You can let us know if you would like to speak on any issue or concern. The Commission is here to help and assist all the disabled residents and families of Revere."

The commission then adjourned until its next meeting (via Zoom) on Tuesday, November 14, at 6:00 PM.

# Councillors concerned about school parking on Election Day

Several City Councillors continue to have concerns about plans for professional development activities in the schools during the Nov. 7 municipal election.

At Monday night’s meeting, Councilor-at-Large and mayoral candidate Dan Rizzo introduced a motion asking that a professional development day scheduled for the Susan B. Anthony School for that day either be postponed or be held virtually. The school’s gymnasium is the polling location for all three precincts in Ward 3.

“Once again, it has been brought to my attention that on election day, the superintendent of schools has called for a professional development day at the Susan B. Anthony School,” said Rizzo.

Following the preliminary election in September, Rizzo and several

other councillors raised concerns about professional development being held on that day. Rizzo stated that it led to a loss of parking spots making it more difficult for residents to vote at the school polling locations.

During the debate on Monday night, there were some questions about what was actually planned by the school department for the Nov. 7 election.

Election Commissioner Paul Fahey said his last conversation with Superintendent of Schools Dr. Dianne Kelly indicated that the professional development would take place remotely.

Towards the end of the meeting, Ward 3 Councilor Anthony Cogliandro read an email Kelly sent during the council meeting to clear up the situation.

In the email, Kelly stated that there would be custodians, administrators, secretaries, and a handful of teachers working at the

school on election day.

In addition, in the email Kelly stated that about 35 secretaries and parent liaisons would be taking part in a training at the West Revere school complex on election day. Kelly stated that those people would be parking on the side of the building away from the polling location in the gym.

Cogliandro said he appreciated the quick response from Kelly on the situation, but added that he didn’t understand why there had to be any activity taking place at the school on election day. He said the city can’t have a situation again where parking lots are full on election day at the schools.

“Why does anybody have to be coming in on that day other than maybe a couple of custodians,” said Rizzo. “What is the urgency when she knows that thousands of people are going to be showing up? It’s unnecessary.”

# Council wants answers on ambulance service

Ward 3 Councillor Anthony Cogliandro wants the council to meet with Acting Mayor Patrick Keefe and a representative from Cataldo Ambulance to discuss issues regarding adequate ambulance service in the city.

“I would like to say that this is in no way, shape, or form to say that the people working for the ambulance companies who save lives every day are doing a bad job,” said Cogliandro at Monday night’s council meeting. “This was prompted when a 10-year-old boy at the Paul Revere School experienced a head injury and the School Resource Officer had to drive him to the hospital because there were no ambulances available. I know we have had our share of issues with having ambulances arrive on time.”

Cogliandro said he would like someone to give the council an update on what the issues are, if

there needs to be more hiring for the ambulance company, and if there is anything the city can do to expedite the process.

“At the end of the day, we all know that we need more, and we can’t have what happened to that little boy happen again,” said Cogliandro.

Councillor-at-Large Marc Silvestri said he agreed with Cogliandro, adding that he witnessed a recent event on Malden Street where a man fell in his home and the fire department responded immediately, but it took an ambulance 18 minutes to show up.

“That’s unacceptable; that’s someone’s life and we need to fix that,” said Silvestri.

Councillor-at-Large Dan Rizzo said he has heard a lot about issues with ambulance response times over the past several months.

“I think a lot of it has to do with not keeping up with the demand of our in-

creased population,” said Rizzo. “The services just aren’t there the way they used to be. It’s common sense that the more people you have, you need to increase your services to coincide with that.”

Rizzo said he recently met with an ambulance service that covers communities around Revere, and that there were issues with that service spending too much time providing mutual aid in Revere.

“This needs to be corrected one way or the other,” said Rizzo. “We can’t have our own residents in a time of need have these long wait times.”

Councillor-at-Large Anthony Zambuto said he believed some of the issues stem from the staffing issues many companies have had since the Covid pandemic, adding that the city should work with Cataldo any way it can to help bring in more drivers and EMTs.

Colella has called for a special bargaining session between the teachers and the School Committee this Wednesday, which will be the first meeting between the groups since August.

Dobbyn himself said he recently attended a show by a performer known as Busty Russell, who within five minutes had exposed the most intimate parts of her body.

The City Council ended three weeks of bickering over whether Fire Chief Anthony Mastronardi acted legally in purchasing a new chief’s car by voting 9-1 to approve a payment of \$3500 to Bell Olds for the vehicle. Mastronardi had acted on his own to purchase the vehicle when the previous chief’s car, a 1964 Olds, broke down. The lone dissenting vote was cast by Councilor Edward O’Hara, who had brought up the issue three weeks ago. O’Hara said, “Every other department head drives a Ford or Chevy -- who does Mastronardi think he is?”

In the School Committee contest, political newcomer William G. Reinstein topped the balloting with 4658 votes, with another newcomer, Felix J. Zollo Jr., in second spot. Of the four incumbent members of the School Committee, only two finished in the top six, one was tied for ninth, and the fourth, Vincent Cammarata, was not nominated.

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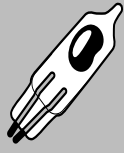

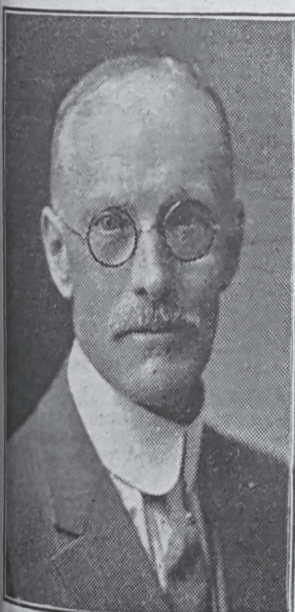
One of Most Brilliant Street Parades Ever Features Local Columbus Day Celebration

# Massport, elected officials celebrate modernization of Terminal E and 100 years of connecting Massachusetts to the world

The Massachusetts Port Authority (Massport) today joined Governor Maura Healey, Boston Mayor Michelle Wu, airline partners and other stakeholders to celebrate the completion of the Modernization of Terminal E as well as Boston Logan's 100-year anniversary.

Massport recently completed four new gates in Terminal E, the airport's international terminal, along with respective amenities to support the increased operational demands and create a better and more efficient travel experience for passengers. Once through the new security checkpoint, passengers flow into an open space with high ceilings drenched in natural light where they will find a number of new concessions, departure lounges and can access new airline clubs on the fourth level. The project included construction of approximately 390,000 square feet and renovations to the existing Terminal E structure to create a unified building.

Throughout the last century, Boston Logan has grown from a small field with two runways to a world-class transportation hub with more than 120 nonstop destinations, providing people and businesses with a gateway to opportunity. Opened in September 1923 for the military, the airport quickly grew in response to advancements in aviation technology and the demand for commercial flights. The Commonwealth and City of Boston both managed the facility for a period. Massport has owned and managed the airport since 1956. Terminal E was first built in 1974 with 12 gates; these new gates bring the total number to 16.

These fantastic new upgrades at Terminal E are going to supercharge that engine and help to elevate our image on the world stage," said Governor Maura Healey. "We are thrilled with the completion of this new step forward at Logan, and we are grateful to Massport, the Biden Administration and our Congressional delegation for their leadership and partnership on this critical project."

Project details include:

- New, state of the art TSA 7-lane security checkpoint;
- An expanded Arrivals Level curb;
- Expanded ticketing area;
- Over 100,000 sq. footage of modern hold room and concession space;
- Enhanced outbound baggage handling system and baggage claim capacity; and
- Advanced amenities and diversified seating options to enhance the passenger experience.

"Logan Airport is a gateway to opportunity and fosters connections for residents, businesses, universities and organizations in the global economy," said Mayor Michelle Wu. "We look forward to the continued partnership with Massport and investments into our communities."

**Sustainability Benefits**

The goal of this project was to create a sustainable, high-performance, resilient, and resource-efficient terminal building that is comfortable for passengers and employees. The design will achieve energy efficiencies at a minimum 20% better than the MA Energy Code. Upgrades to the HVAC system will improve the terminal's overall energy efficiency and help achieve LEED Gold certification.

The project integrates several innovative environmental features including photovoltaic window glazing, glare controlling View® glass and an ener-

gy efficient displacement ventilation system. Other benefits include:

- Lower energy and greenhouse gas emissions;
- Water conservation;
- Additional waste management and recycling;
- Air quality improvement; and
- Reduced energy consumption.

**Amenities and Concessions**

This modernization responds to diverse passenger needs by providing various amenities within the departures level including a mothers' room and sensory room. The addition of the Sensory Room makes Boston Logan one of the few major airports in the U.S. to provide this type of experience to passengers of all ages. The space has various interactive stations that focus on balance, light therapy and cognitive/memory improvement, including a room that replicates an airplane cabin to help passengers acclimate themselves with the often stressful experience of flying. This initiative is a continuation of Massport's efforts towards creating more inclusive spaces for passengers.

Passengers will also have access to a number of new dining options including sit down restaurants as well as grab-and-go including Sal's Pizza, Boston Harbor Distillery, Legal Sea Foods, Boston Market Grab and Go, Hudson Grab and Go and a Marketplace food court. The new security checkpoint will include seven new Analogic Computed Tomography (CT) lanes, which create 3-D images that can be rotated 360 degrees for thorough visual image analysis by a TSA Officer. Because of their enhanced imaging capabilities, travelers will enjoy the added benefit of keeping their laptops and other electronic devices in
