CHA OPENS COMMUNITY BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CENTER IN MALDEN

Cambridge Health Alliance (CHA), a community health system serving Cambridge, Somerville, and Boston's metro-north communities, opened a Community Behavioral Health Center (CBHC) location today at its Malden Care Center, located at 195 Canal Street, Malden. CHA is one of 25 designated Community Behavioral Health Centers operating statewide as part of an initiative launched by the Commonwealth of Massachusetts earlier this year to expand access to routine, urgent, and crisis treatment for mental health conditions and substance use disorders.

Serino reflects on tenure on the City Council

After two full terms on the Revere City Council representing Ward 6, Richard Serino has made the decision to not seek reelection.

"In short and on the broadest level, I had determined that two full terms - or four years - was an adequate amount of time for me to complete the work that I set out to achieve as Ward Six Councillor. I ran for the City Council because I wanted to help

City Council closes out 2023

The City Council held its final meeting of the year on Monday night.

When the council reconvenes in January for its new session, it will have a markedly different look, as there will be six new councillors, more than half the body.

During Monday night's meeting, the six outgoing councillors - Patrick Keefe, Steven Morabito, John Powers, Dan Rizzo, Richard Serino, and Gerry Visconti were acknowledged and honored with the 2023 Legislative Bench Acknowledgments.

Keefe was also acknowledged as the 12th City Councillor elected to the office as mayor. Keefe, who has been serving at the Acting Mayor since earlier this year, will be official sworn in during an inaugural ceremony at the Susan B. Anthony School on New Year's Day.

acknowledged Also was outgoing Council President Pro Tem Joanne

McKenna. McKenna took over the president's position from Keefe when Keefe became the acting

"I would like to say thank you to my fellow councillors for voting me as Vice President back in January," said McKenna. "The experience of being later appointed Pro Tempore has also been a growth period in my career. I would also like to take this opportunity to Thank my Ward One residents for the vote of confidence in re-electing me to another term. It is truly an honor to be re-elected for

my fifth term. I promise to continue to work hard, be fair, and give it my all to the Ward One residents and the city of Revere."

Councillor-at-Large Gerry Visconti thanked his family and his supporters, as well as City Clerk Ashley Melnik for helping keep the council on track during the past several

School officials issue bed bug warning

School officials are urging families to check their children's backpacks for evidence of bed bugs after evidence of their bites was found on students in the past several weeks.

Last week, Assistant Superintendent of Schools Richard Gallucci sent a letter to staff and families stating that the school district had contacted the Revere Board of Health after evidence of bed bugs or bed bug bites had been found in three separate incidents over the previous

"In addition to providing support for the student and their family, we professionally treated any classroom (and adjoining classrooms) where bed bugs were present," Gallucci stated.

Those treatments were in line with state department of public health guidelines.

"We are asking that families closely monitor any bags or backpacks that your students take to school for the next several weeks to ensure that your

you have a conventional 9-to-5 full time job with limited flexibility, it becomes difficult to balance the duties of your professional work with a personal life while also doing the meaningful work of a City Councillor the right way for a prolonged period of time.'

When asked what he enjoyed most about his tenure, Serino added, "It may sound cliché, but I have most enjoyed getting to know the people of Ward Six. The residents of West Revere and North Revere are truly some of the best people you'll ever come across - good, decent, hardworking, passionate, people who are engaged in and care about their community, and who take immense pride in their homes, in their neighborhood, and in their city. I

have met a lot of amazing people through this experience who are neighbors that I didn't know before running for office, and I am grateful for those interactions. I have also thoroughly enjoyed working with my colleagues on the City Council as we have tried to grapple with and tackle the City's biggest issues."

When Serino was asked if he would run for office again, he replied "I suppose in politics, you never say "never." If ever there was a time down the road that I felt my experience or perspective could prove helpful in a forward-facing public service role, I would certainly consider running for office in the future. years as the council has navigated some major issues, including the high school building project, the budgets, and the proposed life sciences building at Suffolk Downs.

As this was the last council meeting of the term, the council voted to place a number of items that have been in council committees on file, meaning they will have to be brought forth with a new motion at a future council meeting if they are to be reconsidered.

Two dozen motions were placed on file, including ones related to water meter rates, the salaries for city councilors, a home child-care ordinance, and several requested appoint-

In other business, the council received correspondence from city finance director Richard Viscay updating it on the Community Improvement Trust (CIT) Fund amounts for each ward.

The CIT balance as of June 30 was \$891,497.95.

student does not have any signs of bed bugs," Gallucci stated.

Gallucci referred families to the department of public health's website for additional tips on monitoring, preventing, and treating the spread of bed bugs.

"Bed bugs are becoming an increasing problem in many cities and towns," according to the state department of public health's website. "This may be because more people are traveling out of the country to places where bed bugs are a problem. Public health and housing officials have encountered bed bug infestation in both

"In the past few years, there have also been reports of bed bugs in the workplace in the United States."

Bed bugs feed on the blood of people and animals, but unlike mosquitoes, bed bugs do not transmit diseases to people, according to the DPH They typically live in bedding in homes, and usually bite at night when people are sleeping. They do not have wings and cannot fly, but can be transported by "hitchhiking" on personal belongings.







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
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
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
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

Disabilities Comm. informed of grant for accessibility assessment

The Revere Commission on Disabilities held its regular monthly meeting last Tuesday, December 12, via Zoom. Chair Ralph DeCicco, vicechair Pauline Perno, and fellow members Jason Barone-Cichocki, Robert Brown, Ellie Pagan-Vargas, and Mario Grimanis were on hand for the ses-

DeCicco presented a summary of the December Zoom meeting of the regional Commissions on Disabilities Alliance (CODA) which he attends on a regular basis. He said the group held a discussion about the procedures of the Mass. Architectural Access Board (MAAB). The commissioners voted to approve a motion put forward by DeCicco to place on the commission's future agendas any

issues pertaining to local variances that invoke the iurisdiction of the MAAB. DeCicco also told the commissioners that he will be working with city officials on a plan to ensure that the city's municipal buildings are fully-accessible.

Perno presented an update of winter programs offered for individuals with disabilities:

-- The Massachusetts

Department of Conservation and Recreation (DCR) runs a Universal Access Program or https:// www.mass.gov/topics/ winter-recreation that provides opportunities for people with disabilities to participate in adaptive winter sports and recreation. Events begin this week and all are invited at specific locations to take a spin at the indoor ice rink with your wheelchair or visit the East Boston Porrazzo Rink website directly https://www.mass.gov/ locations/porrazzo-memorial-rink:

- -- Individuals can find more opportunities to participate in outdoor winter adaptive sports, as well as volunteer opportunities, with DCR's Universal Access Program at https:// www.mass.gov/topics/accessible-recreation;
- -- The Spaulding Rehab Hospital's Adaptive Sports Centers (SASC) offers recreational opportunities that individuals may be interested in trying this winter as well. Activities include indoor sports such as pickleball or wheelchair basketball that can be played on an indoor court, as well as ice rink sports such as sled hockey. For more information, visit the SASC online calendar https://sasc.spauldingrehab.org/default.aspx or call 877-976-7272; and
 - -- Perno noted that the

Boston Seaport area has opened its Winter Wonderland program and that it has full accessibility.

DeCicco reported that he is trying to ensure that all local playgrounds be equipped with rubber mats, rather than with wood chips (as some are), which are not ADA-com-

DeCicco also informed his fellow commissioners of what he termed the "great news" that a grant, for which he had applied, has been approved in an amount of \$18,000 from the Mass. Dept. of Public Health in order to provide funding for an assessment of the accessibility at some of the city's recreational centers.

In the open discussion section of the meeting, Barone-Cichocki mentioned that the recently-passed state budget requires that cities and

towns in the MBTA district must construct affordable housing in transit oriented districts (TOD), which he said could be of great benefit to individuals with disabilities.

However, as DeCicco noted, what constitutes "affordable," which is based on either 60% of 80% of the average median income (AMI), is not really "affordable" for many people. He also said that accessible-housing units should be considered separately from the quota of affordable units in a housing development.

The meeting concluded with Perno reading the commission's regular monthly announcement:

"The Commission on Disabilities office number is 781-286-8267. Residents can also call Revere 311 directly and speak to their staff Monday through Friday. They will be able to answer most questions but if they are unable to, or if you would like to speak to our department directly, please ask to be transferred to the Disability office. If we are unavailable, please leave a detailed message and someone will get back to you as soon as possible.

"As always please let us know if you would like something discussed or brought up and added to our monthly meeting agenda. You can let us know if you would like to speak on any issue or concern. The Commission is here to help and assist all the disabled residents and families of Revere."

The commission then adjourned until its next meeting, which is scheduled (via Zoom) for Tuesday January 9, 2024, at 6:00.

REVERE Through the Years

10 years ago **December 18, 2013**

The investigation into a fatality involving a 52 year-old Revere woman struck by an MBTA bus continues this week, with drug and alcohol tests on the driver of the MBTA bus that hit her coming back negative late last week. Based on evidence developed after the accident, investigators believe the victim was struck somewhere in the vicinity of the Central Fire Station shortly before 7 p.m. by an MBTA bus that had been travelling along Broadway. She was dragged nearly one mile down the road, becoming dislodged from under the bus at the intersection of Broadway

and Olive Street. The City and Mohegan Sun are in the midst of intense negotiations this week on the new host community agreement, with all indications pointing to the agreement being unveiled early next week. The new host community agreement is expected to be much more lucrative than the first version of the agreement, which compensated the city as a host community without having any buildings on Revere soil. Now, under the new Revere-only effort, the agreement is expected to contain much more.

Just five years ago, America seemed to be at a crisis point when it came to its energy needs, but the United States has flipped the script and become the top producer of oil and natural gas in the world by using the new drilling techniques of hydraulic fracturing (known as fracking), using that technique to tap into previously unattainable oil reserves in the Dakotas, Texas, and Pennsylvania.

20 years ago **December 23, 2003**

Gov. Mitt Romney visited the Wonderland MBTA station this week to announce his administration's support for Transit Oriented Districts, a combination of housing and commercial developments that are close to public transportation in order to reduce the use of automobiles to lessen traffic congestion and air pollution and urban/suburban

sprawl. City officials have revealed that the Prospect Assisted Living Home on Reservoir

Avenue owes the city \$167,169 in back taxes.

The city's Menorah lighting ceremony is set for this evening at City

Three men who left a Notary Public office on Shirley Avenue were assaulted by a group of 10 youths, estimated at ages 13-17, first by snowballs, then by knives.

30 years ago **December 22, 1993**

The State Executive Office of Communities and Development has informed the city that it will be the recipient of a grant of \$789,000 that will be used to fund a number of projects, including housing rehabilitation and a water pressure study in the Shirley Ave. area.

A joint raid by Revere and State Police resulted in the seizure of 80 grams of heroin worth \$50,000 in what police described as the biggest drug seizure in city history, according to Police Lieut. Dennis Collyer. A Dorchester man was arrested after officers executed two search warrants, one for his vehicle and the other for his apartment on Revere Beach

The city has offered teachers a new contract that will extend the school day by 30 minutes and give teachers a raise of two percent per year for the next three years.

Mayor Robert J. Haas said this week that the city will hire seven new police

officers. He said two will be women and two will be minorities.

40 years ago December 21, 1983

A federal jury has found former Northeast Vocational School Committee member James Sorrento guilty of attempting to extort \$12,000 from the Fiore Bus Company in exchange for a three-year bus contract. Sorrento did not deny taking the money from a Fiore Bus official, but asserted at his trial that he had been conducting his own investigation into a possible drug connection between the company and school students. Sorrento has been suspended from his job as the Title I director of the Revere public schools since his indict-

The City Council awarded contracts for the purchase of the closed elementary schools this past week to a variety of developers. The Chilton-Ralston Company won the rights to purchase the Barrows School building for \$21,000, even though there was a high bid of \$65,051. Chilton intends to demolish the former school and construct 14 condo units. The high bidder said it would renovate the present structure, but residents were opposed to that plan. However, the council rejected Chilton's high bid of \$97,000 for the Shurtleff School and instead awarded that sale

Like the Cambridge location, the Malden CBHC site offers Behavioral Health Urgent Care daily, with same-day evaluation and referral to treatment. It also provides outpatient services in person and through video visits. There is a 24hour phone line (833-222-2030) for people in crisis. CHA will also continue to

provide 24/7 mobile crisis services in individuals' homes, schools, or other community locations throughout Cambridge, Somerville, Malden, Everett and Medford.

With these new services in place, CHA has two main outpatient psychiatry locations designed to get people connected to behavioral health treatment more quickly. Patients will also have access to additional support as needed, including specialty care, case management, recovery coaches, and peer spe-

cialist services. The Cambridge Health Alliance CBHC serves the communities of Cambridge, Everett, Malden, Medford, and Somerville. Since January 2023, there have been more than 6,500 visits by individuals in crisis at the Cambridge CBHC site who received immediate evaluation and treatment and over 1,000 mobile visits to individuals in crisis in community locations.



The All of Us Research Program has a simple mission: to help advance research so we can learn more about what makes us sick and what keeps us healthy. Apologies for not being able to deliver this at our regular meeting of the Revere City Council on the 18th of December, but as I thought about what I wanted to say at our last meeting as I conclude this tenure as Ward Six Councillor, first and foremost, I wanted to say thank you to the people of Ward Six. Reflecting back, I am truly humbled. It has been the greatest honor of a lifetime to have been twice elected by my neighbors to collectively represent them at City Hall, and I'll fondly look back at this journey for the rest of my life.

The residents of West Revere and North Revere are truly some of the best people you'll ever come across - good, decent, hardworking, passionate, people who are engaged in and care about their community, and who take immense pride in their homes, in their neighborhood, and in their city. I've met a lot of amazing people through this experience who are neighbors that I didn't know before running for office, and I'm grateful for those interac-

I ran for the City Council because I wanted to help people and do some good for our little corner of the city. Contrary to what some might have thought when I was first elected, I did not intend to stay many terms, and I was never one of the ambitious ones who aspired to higher office in the city. I was a Ward Councillor - here to serve the people and make a bit of an impact.

And an impact, I believe I made. Be it by providing support to the veterans of Revere, allowing the public citizens a greater opportunity to participate in the public process, ensuring diligent guardianship of taxpayer dollars, or completing the mundane tasks of getting streets repaired, sidewalks replaced or "Stop" signs and speed tables installed, there were some successes during my tenure.

It can also be objectively measured where there was more that could have been done or in hindsight to see how things could have played out differently. There might have been an issue here or there that I was unable to resolve for reasons beyond my control, and some residents may not have agreed with some of the decisions that were made along the way, or how I handled a particular matter. However, I want the residents of Revere, especially in Ward Six, to know and understand that I did my very best and that I gave this job my heart and soul.

While on the topic of giving 110% to this job, I also want the people of Ward Six to know that I always had their back, even when they weren't looking or may not have realized it, because I love my city and I would always go to the wall to protect the quality of life of my constituents.

The residents of this city who watch these meetings or call or email us as elected officials know us, but most times, they know us superficially. Every one of us up here, in some way, make sacrifices in our personal and professional lives to serve in this role. It sometimes gets lost in the noise of Revere politics that we are all regular people, and we balance this role with everything else going on in our lives. The unseen time and dedication that many of these people have to this work is remarkable and admirable.

I say all of this because tonight, I want to share a story that I have never really publicly shared before regarding a sacrifice that I made in my professional life to protect the quality of life for the people of my Ward, particularly the North Revere neighbor-

Two years ago, as many know, I left my position in the office of Revere's State Representative. I went into the private sector to work for a regional healthcare system - and

no, it was in no way a lobbyist role.

The job, however, was life changing for me professionally, in terms of opportunity and salary. When I was interviewing for the position in the Summer of 2021, I disclosed that I was a member of the Revere City Council, and I inquired if that would present an issue or a conflict, as that would have ended the process right then and there. I was told multiple times throughout the hiring process that my service in my community would not be an issue.

Fast forward to a little more than a month into my new role, I determined that the job was not the right fit for me. Why was that? Because I would have had to compromise my morals and I would have had to sell my constituents down the river if I chose to stay.

You see, the healthcare system was based in the City of Boston, and in September, 2021, the Acting Mayor of Boston came out with a plan to plop people from Mass and Cass and put them up at the Quality Inn Hotel in North Revere. On its face, the plan was cruel, as there was no plan to provide any kind of needed services to these folks; and of course, the neighborhood was very concerned.

To his credit, Mayor Arrigo strongly opposed this plan, and the entire City Council backed him - to my recollection, this was the one time in my four years up here that the Mayor and the City Council were 100% on the same page - We were not going to let the City of Boston steamroll over our city.

As the Ward Councillor, I came out strong, and said that the "City of Boston ought to have been ashamed of itself" for shifting the issue onto a neighboring municipality without productively trying to find a collaborative solution to help these folks. My employer, however, took exception that I was taking a stance on this issue because the company had a working relationship with officials in City of Boston, and they feared political consequences against the company if someone from Boston City Hall connected that a Revere City Councillor was in their ranks.

My superiors at this company urged that I issue a public apology to the City of Boston for my opposition to the Acting Mayor's plan for Mass and Cass AND that I do not seek re-election to the City Council in 2021 in order to minimize potential negative impacts on the company's end. I was faced with a di-

lemma – do I shut up and do what my bosses are asking to preserve my fulltime career at a job which provided significant opportunity for professional growth, or do I continue to stand with my constituents and my city? For me, it was a no-brainer; I had been elected and I had

taken an oath to stand up for my constituents. I resigned from my full-time position in that company because I felt I could not turn my back on the people of Ward 6. I forewent that professional opportunity because it wasn't the right fit for me.

I chose not to personally tell that story until I was ready to leave public office because I didn't want it to seem like sour grapes I have no animosity toward the situation, but at the end of the day, this is what it's all about - this is why we are elected. We are elected to serve and protect the people, even if that means personal and professional sacrifices or political retribution. We are to do what we feel is right by our electorate and

our City. As I look back on my brief tenure up here, there is almost nothing I would do differently if given the chance. When I came on at 27 years old, people thought "This kid is naïve and going to be a 'yes' man; a rubber stamp.' One of the most gracious compliments that I received from anyone after I announced that I wasn't seeking re-election was that I never adjusted to the proverbial and idiomatic "back room" of Revere politics. I'm proud that I never went along to get

To my residents in North Revere and West Revere – I never lost sight of why you elected me to represent you up here in this Council Chamber. In fact, many of the stances I arrived at were due to taking the temperature and listening to you, the people, of Ward 6 - my constituents.

On some issues, we might have disagreed hell, we might even have had passionate arguments - but each and every decision that I made on this Council was made after careful consideration and reflection. The decisions I arrived at, though difficult and unpopular with some, at times, were always made with the intent of being what I sincerely felt was right and best for the City of Revere, Ward 6. and its people as a whole.

some of the votes I took up here, and I'm sure some of you have cursed the TV when I've spoken at Council meetings saying you'd never vote for me again - and that's perfectly ok. It's politics and we can't take this work personally. All I can say is that it's been a hell of a ride, and I will treasure this experience. As we look to the future,

I wish our Mayor-Elect and the new City Council the best of luck. I won't say "goodbye," because this is still my hometown and I plan on remaining engaged in the community. As the Italians say, I say "ci vediamo," - we will see each other. Thank Sincerely.







RHS TRACK GIRLS EARN DRAMATIC WIN IN SEASON-**OPENER**

The Revere High girls indoor track and field team earned an exciting victory over Greater Boston League (GBL) rival Somerville, clinching the triumph in the final event, the 4 x 200 relay, this past Friday afternoon at the Reggie Lewis Track and Athletic Center in Boston in their season-opening dual meet.

As the teams entered the 4 x 200, the Lady Patriots held a narrow 46-44 lead, which meant that the winner of the five points at stake in the relay would claim the meet.

However, the Revere quartet of Ashley Cabrera Rodriguez, Giselle Salvador, Danni Hope Randall, and Gemma Stamatopoulos sped around the track in a time 2:03.95, outracing their Somerville counterparts, who finished with a time of 2:05.61, by the slim margin of 1.66 seconds.

In the individual events, Lady Patriot Liv Yuong led the way with 13 points. Liv captured the high jump with a leap of 4'-7" and the 55 meter hurdles with a clocking of 10.25, while taking second in the long jump (which is a new event in the GBL's indoor season in 2023) with a flight of 14'-1".

Stamatopoulos earned five points with a firstplace effort in the 600 dash with a clocking of 1:53.29, easily winning the race by six seconds over her clos-

est Lady Highlander rival. Gemma's time is only five seconds off the qualifying mark for the State Meet at the end of the season.

The Revere shot-put trio of Ashley Chandler (26'-5.5"), Françoise Kodjo (26'-3.25"). and Angelina Montoya (20'-8.75") contributed nine points to the RHS side of the scoresheet with a sweep over their Somerville foes.

Olivia Rupp won the mile event with a time of 6:15.86 to score five points for the Lady Patri-

Adding three points for Revere with second-place performances were: Randall in the 300 dash; Hiba El Bzyouy in the 1000; and Yara Belguendouz in the 55 hurdles.

Contributing key thirdplace points in a meet where every point mattered were: Rodriguez in both the 55 dash (in which Ashley sprinted to a new personal record (PR) with a time of 8.01) and the long jump; Basma Sahibi in the high jump; Danielle Santana Baez in the twomile; and Genevieve Zierlen in the 300 dash.

"The girls had a great first win versus Somerville in an exciting meet that came down to the final event," said RHS head coach Racquel Mac-Donald. "It was definitely a new format and a bit hectic having a dual meet at Reggie Lewis, but the girls adapted super well and brought great energy. They set the standard for an exciting season







Braising can save time and money

You might ask, "How can I save time by braising? Those recipes can take hours to cook." A braise may take a long time to simmer away. However, it doesn't need much attention while that's

happening. An occasional peek, turn, or stir is all that's required. Moreover, the aroma drifting from the kitchen reminds you that something delicious is cooking and invites you to check on it.

A Braise Can Wait Many braised dishes

are better after the flavors have had an opportunity to meld. That means you can prepare a meal for family or a gathering ahead of time and pop it in the oven to warm when needed. That also makes braises great leftovers or, in some cases, meals to freeze for later use.

If you're entertaining, a braise makes timing easy. While a roast leg of lamb has a rosy moment when the meat is perfect, a braise can sit in a warm oven and wait until your friends and family are seated at the table. This ability to improve from reheating makes braises great dishes for potluck meals or buffets. A crockpot or warming tray can keep this dish at a safe temperature.

We often double a braising recipe to have ingredients for a different meal. We might braise a big batch of chicken thighs and freeze some meat for another day. Braised pork butt, when shredded, makes fabulous pulled pork sandwiches. Our favorite braised lamb shank recipe becomes an amazing lamb chili later in the week.

Homey, Comfort Food Many classic braises are

comfort foods that use this long cooking process to tenderize and stretch less expensive cuts of meat. Our favorite braises include lamb shanks, short

ribs, chicken thighs, whole chicken, and beef or pork pot roasts. These simmer away in delicious stocks and share the pot with lots of vegetables to balance the meal and stretch the

While earlier generations learned to braise by helping the family cook, today, we may have to do a bit of self-education. That said, braising is a very forgiving technique. You can substitute a similar ingredient or more vegetables if you don't have everything a recipe calls for. (The exception to this rule is powerful flavors like chilis.)

If you're watching your budget, you can reduce the ratio of meat to vegetables or serve your braise over a filling side dish like rice, polenta, beans, or legumes.

Another way a braise is excellent for your budget is that very little special equipment is needed. You need a big pot and a heat source. You can braise on the stove top, an induction burner, in the oven, crockpot, or Instant Pot. You can combine stovetop

and oven as long as your pot (and its handle) can go into an oven.

How to Braise

For a Braising 101 course, we recommend Michael Ruhlman's book "How to Braise: Foolproof Techniques and Recipes for the Home Cook." Rhuman has a way of breaking down cooking concepts into step-by-step lessons with photos and a selection of recipes that invite you to follow his lead.

While we braise all year round, winter is the perfect time to braise. A bubbling pot of comfort food will add warmth and humidity to your home in this dry season. When the forecast indicates you might want to work from home and stay close to the hearth in the days ahead, add something to braise to your grocery run for milk and



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
