BOSTON HARBOR **NOW ANNOUNCES** ANNUAL NEW YEAR'S EVE WATERFRONT ICE SCULPTURE STROLL

Boston Harbor Now has announced the return of the annual New Year's Eve Waterfront Ice Sculpture Stroll, with more ice sculptures than ever before in a variety of locations across the Boston Waterfront. The Waterfront Ice Sculpture Stroll will kick off on Sunday, December 31, starting at 1:00 PM and will continue until dusk.

The Waterfront Ice Sculpture Stroll is a part of Boston Harbor Now's "New Year's Eve on the Waterfront" programming and features a lineup of activities for guests of all ages to help ring in the new year. This year's event will showcase over 35 handcrafted ice sculptures hosted by businesses and cultural sites along the waterfront, making it the largest Sculpture Stroll in Boston Harbor Now's history and the Region.

Boston Harbor Now also announced that new locations have been added for guests to view these ice sculptures, which will span from Roxbury to Revere, just north of Boston. New locations include Boston Margaritaville, the Sam Adams Tap Room in Faneuil Hall, the Charlestown Navy Yard, and Wulf's Fish at the Massport Boxes at the Fish Pier.



A Year in

It was a year of major transitions for Revere in 2023.

As 2023 comes to an end, 2024 will see a new mayor and a reshaped City Council as many of the issues that dominated the headlines over the past year should continue to play out.

In April, Mayor Brian Arrigo resigned from office to take the top job at the Department of Conservation and Recreation.

Arrigo had already announced he would not run for a third term in office in 2023 when he stepped down to take the DCR job.

With Arrigo's departure, City Council President Patrick Keefe took the reins as Acting Mayor, while Ward 1 Councilor Joanne McKenna became Council President Pro

The resulting mayoral campaign set off the chain of events that would reshape the council, as three at-large councilors gave up their seats to challenge Keefe for a full term as mayor.

Keefe and Councilor and former Mayor Dan Rizzo bested Steve Morabito and Gerry Visconti in the September preliminary election, with Rizzo topping the ballot.

However, the general election saw Keefe come out on top by about 360 votes, a margin that survived a recount that was filed by Rizzo.

With Keefe, Morabito, Rizzo, and Visconti giving up their council seats, the council race saw a number of newcomers elected for the new session beginning in January. In the at-large race, incumbents Anthony Zambuto and Marc Silvestri will be joined by Robert Haas III, Michelle Kelley, and Juan Pablo Jaramillo.

One of the big issues the council will need to deal with in the coming year is the ongoing effort to build a new Revere High School.

It was a rollercoaster of a year for the school building efforts, as it initially appeared the city was moving forward with plans to build a new high school on the 30 acre-plus Wonderland site.

School Committee recognizes Ferrante

During its last regular meeting of 2023 on December 19th, the Revere School Committee recognized Michael Ferrante, who will be departing from the Committee after 18 years of service.

Back in August, the Revere Journal reported that Ferrante had not pulled or submitted nomination papers by the deadline, meaning he was not running for re-election on the School Committee. Fast Forward to the end of 2023, a Ferrante-less School Committee is now about to be a reality.

"It's not the end of the world, people - I'm still going to be here; I'll still be around," said an emotional Ferrante in comments made at last week's meeting.

Ferrante has been a stalwart member of the community, serving for four years on the City Council and, as mentioned, 18 years on the School Committee for a whopping 22

of service to Revere.

"I really want to thank residents because without them, I would not be here," said Ferrante.

In his address, which undoubtedly tugged at heartstrings, he your thanked his colleagues and saved the biggest thanks for his wife, Ellen.

"She's the one that had to deal with the meetings, the phone calls and I really can't thank her enough for what she's done," said Ferrante.

Parziale continues to have the back of Revere residents

Throughout the recent election, there was one constant supporting everyone's campaign. Anthony Parziale, a native of Woburn, has said he always wanted to put his attention towards other people.



Anthony Parziale. He has described himself as having a plethora of careers including radio, trash, and real estate investing. "I began my radio journey at 18 or 19 years old, working at AM 680 WRKO. I secured my first full-time position at 20 on The Hill-Man Morning at 107.3 WAAF and remained on the morning show for about 15 years. My last radio job was at 93.7 WEEI for a few years. During my time in radio, I initiated a trash hauling business called Take Junk, which I still own. Additionally, I owned and operated two Homevestors real estate investment franchises (both sold around 2020). Currently, I am the host of "Spaz'n Out America's Podcast" and gradually winding down Take

Junk after 11 years." Growing up in a competitive house with a father who was an Italian immigrant and four brothers, he attended Woburn Public Schools from first grade through graduation

at Woburn High. During high school, he participated in sports such as football, wrestling, track and field. "I served as the captain of the wrestling team, known for my heart despite not being a stellar wrestler. Anthony holds a degree in communications from Middlesex Community College."

"While in college, pursuing my communications degree at Middlesex Community College, I dedicated much of my time to working in Boston at WRKO. Although my primary focus was on securing a full-time job in radio, I also wrote for the school newspaper and gained national recognition for an article on the expansion of Route Three. I started working full-time at WAAF just before graduating."

Married to his wife Kali and Dad to Noiram, 16, and Presley, 9, he decided to run for Revere City Council for one reason ... the people. "I ran for the people! Putting the people first, always. Everyone has the right to be heard and to take part in the decisions that shape their lives. The people of Revere deserve to have the best representation in the country. I love them all and I have their back 100%", added Parziale.

Despite narrowly losing a seat during the November election, Parziale hopes to run again in 2025 with the motto "Revere Have Your Back". He does offer hope for the newly elected administration. "I want the people to be first

Senator Lydia Edwards celebrated her 43rd birthday on December 13 at the Reel House. Supporters, as well as local and state officials, honored Edwards for her leadership, reflecting on her accomplishments in housing and LGBTQ+ pride.

"I have been honored to work in partnership with her," said Attorney General Andrea Campbell, introducing Edwards. "We have been in the trenches for a long time together, starting off as young, black, women lawyers trying to figure out our careers in a Burger King on Huntington Ave., talking about service and taking risks."

Campbell commended Edwards for prioritizing the diverse community. Campbell and Edwards have served the Boston City Council together, focusing on issues that protect the vulnerable.

"You cannot do the work of protecting the rights of citizens, consumers, or businesses if you don't have great partners. She is aligned in spirit and values; and understands the challenges it can be to be a woman of color serving an elected roll in this moment in time," Campbell described about her connection with Edwards. "She gets things done."

This year, Campbell and Edwards have been striving to build affordable housing, provide evicted residents with access to legal representation, and ensure people have wealth-building opportunities in their neighborhoods. They protect reproductive rights, and push for gender-affirming care.

"It is significant, and it is amazing," admired Campbell. "This is a beautiful thing and needs to be celebrated."

First Lieutenant in the Massachusetts Army National Guard Lydia Ed-

wards declared that she will lobby for gun reform, sustainable rent control, and civil rights for medical care.

"People are coming to Massachusetts, in many cases, to make sure that they are safer," acknowledged Edwards. "We're going to continue to make this a beacon of hope and safety. That's what we do at the State House."

Edwards is pushing for limiting the prices charged for prescription drugs, and for opportunities that al-

low seniors to remain in their homes as they age.

"We fight for everyone to have the dignity of choice in options where they're going to live. The baseline is that it is clean, affordable, inclusive, welcoming, and in a diverse neighborhood of income levels and racial backgrounds," said Edwards, an East Boston resident. "This is the neighborhood I'd be honored to live in,

love, work, and fight for." According to Edwards, 40% of housing units in East Boston are owned by outside investors who continue to increase rent. Edwards was saddened by the statistic, which she believes is shameful and

"Yes, we want to grow and see people come here. East Boston is second to Ellis Island, where people come to the United States to become Americans; but we want to grow a community, not buildings,' said Edwards. "We need to fight to make sure that our Constitutional rights come to fruition. We have a lot of good things to do together."

Dr. Kalise Wornum, RPS families discuss becoming a culturally proficient caregiver

Workshop focuses on equity and inclusion

Revere Public Schools Assistant Superintendent of Equity and Inclusion Dr. Lourenço Garcia is pleased to announce that a group of caregivers, community members and teachers recently engaged in a discussion on cultural proficiency with wellknown speaker Dr. Kalise Wornum of KW Diversity,

Dr. Wornum, a nationally sought-after keynote speaker, educational leader, workshop facilitator, and author in the area of anti-racist education and cultural proficiency, led the December workshop that emphasized the importance of being open-minded and accepting when it comes to cultural proficiency.

"The minute we start talking to each other, we realize everybody brings something different to the table," said Dr. Wornum. "If we're trying to be a more equitable school district, we all need to be on the same bus and learn from each other's experiences, trauma or diversity."

Using the National Education Association's definition of 'cultural pruriency,' Dr. Wornum said, "It's the ability to successfully teach students who come from cultures other than their own. It entails developing certain personal and interpersonal awareness and sensitivities, developing certain bodies of cultural knowledge and mastering a set of skills that, taken together, underlie effective cross-cultural teaching."

Dr. Wornum said that while she gets what the definition means, it doesn't tell us enough. To break down what we're really talking about, she pointed to the words of Ralph Ellison, author of the 1952 novel Invisible Man.

The Invisible Man reflects on the various ways

in which the nameless main character has experienced social invisibility during his life and begins to tell his story.

"He wrote, "Show me how I can claim that which is real to me, while at the same time teaching me a way into the larger society. Then and only then will I sing your praises and help you to make the desert bear fruit," said Dr. Wornum. "If the first thing we say to kids is to learn this, but we are not curious about who they are, then we're seeing them as a deficit instead of lifting them up. It has to be relationships before rigor. Relationships before rules. What does that demand of the educator? What does that demand of the teacher? What does that demand of you, the parent? It demands that we first see the child, understand the child and learn about the child before we can teach the child. We have to learn about the child in front of

This strategy, Dr. Wornum argues, challenges us to be more curious about cultures other than our own. For educators, it's natural to see students' vulnerabilities and work with them to support their differences, but Dr. Wornum wants educators and caregivers to learn more and dig deeper into all the various cultures of students.

"The anatomy of an inequitable classroom is curriculum without windows and mirrors," explained Dr. Wornum. "When our schools have a curriculum that does not have a window for students to see a world larger than themselves or a mirror for them to see themselves in the curriculum, it is not equitable. Every lesson you put in front of the child, you need to say, "This is for you, and I designed this for you."

Dr. Garcia echoed Dr. Wornum and said, by nature, we are the place where we're born and raised and will carry that history and culture with us for the rest of our lives.

"We are a school system where you have close to 70% of students from different countries," said Dr. Garcia. "So, it's our vision and our mission to build an environment that is diverse, that's anti-racist, and one that really understands where people come from and the history and culture they bring.

The group met with District Attorney Hayden and several of his staff to learn about the mission of the DA's office and the various roles of the people working there. They also visited a courtroom and met with Superior Court Judge Adam Sisitsky, Chief Court Officer Richard Linehan, and staff from the Suffolk Superior Court. Students enthusiastically asked questions about the role of juries and how cases proceed through the system. They also voted on a mock case and found the defendant (a staffer from the DA's Of-


with community leaders.

Late in 2022, the council approved a \$30 million taking of the Wonderland property by eminent domain to build the new school and potentially develop a smaller portion of the property, as well.

Early in 2023, the owners of the Wonderland property filed a lawsuit against the city seeking additional compensation for the land.

Late in February, the council voted 6-4-1 against approving the Revere High School project's schematic design submission to the Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA), ending most hopes of building the school at the Wonderland site.

The High School Building Committee was tasked with coming up with options to build a new high school on the current school site.

Early next year, the School Committee and the council could be faced with choosing an option for the new school at the current site and approving funding for the project.

Currently, the building committee is looking at four-, five-, and six-story building options for a new high school with an estimated cost in the range of \$550 million, with the MSBA grant potentially picking up about \$220 million of that cost. If the proposal stays on track, the new school could open for the 2028-29 school year.

Residents took the initiative on several issues facing the neighborhoods over the past year.

Neighbors opposed a proposed 24-bed homeless assistance facility on Arcadia Street, bringing their opposition to City Hall and to the streets. The neighborhood, city officials, and the developer were able to work together to rescind the plans for the development and come back with a proposal for townhouse units at 84 Ar-

While a new high school is still in the planning stages, there was some major news this year on other municipal building projects

A new public works facility opened on Charger Street, with nearly twice the square footage of the old facility and indoor storage for the department's vehicles.

Housing leaders celebrate 12 out of 12 MBTA Rapid Transit communities adopting new zoning ahead of year-end deadline

Leaders of housing advocacy groups celebrated the Chelsea City Council, who unanimously voted to pass new zoning to create more homes near transit in line with the MBTA Communities Law. With this vote, all 12 Rapid Transit Communities have met the year-end deadline to adopt new zoning – a historic feat.

The communities who have voted for new zoning (or had existing zoning they believe complies with the law) are Braintree, Brookline, Cambridge, Chelsea, Everett, Malden, Medford, Milton, Newton, Quincy, Revere, and Somerville. Their districts combined allow for a capacity of over 83,000 homes in the future.

While all of the rapid transit communities' zoning plans still require certification by the Executive Office of Housing and Livable Communi-

ties, advocates nonetheless view this moment as a milestone in solving the Commonwealth's housing

"This is a major first step taken by the urban communities Boston to allow zoning for more homes. Local advocacy was and will continue to be key. This is ultimately a pledge towards building more equitable, inclusive, and environmentally sustainable communities. AHMA was proud to support advocates in 7 of the 12 rapid transit communities (Brookline, Malden, Newton, Cambridge, Somerville, Milton & Medford). Grassroots organizing and advocacy was pivotal in the adoption of these new zoning bylaws. There is a continual need for education and organizing and we are proud to spearhead these efforts in collaboration with local pro-housing advocates," said Jesse Kanson-Benanav, Executive Director of Abundant Housing Massachusetts.

"These communities are leading the way in saying yes to more housing. Zoning alone will not solve our housing shortage, but it is a critical tool for eliminating barriers to creating more housing in the places people want to live. By allowing for more housing to be built in transit-orineighborhoods, we are moving closer to meeting our goals for housing affordability and sustainability across the Commonwealth. CHAPA is proud to have played our part in these victories through our Municipal Engagement Initiative and our 3A Technical Assistance Program, which have supported planning and organizing efforts in Braintree, Brookline, Cambridge, Chelsea, Milton, Medford, Newton, and Revere," said Lily Linke, MBTA Communities Engagement Manager at CHAPA.

In addition to the Rapid Transit Communities that faced a 2023 deadline more than a dozen additional communities have passed new zoning or had existing zoning they believe complies with the law – a year or more in advance of their own dead-

The MBTA Communities Law was passed in 2021 with the intention of creating more housing options for people in 177 cities and towns served by the MBTA system. While new zoning won't require homes to be built, it will streamline the process for approval of multifamily housing - such as duplexes, townhouses, and small apartment or condo build-

ings – near transit stations In 2024, 130 additional communities will be required to adopt new zoning, followed by 35 communities in 2025 to reach the full 177.

RHS SPORTS Through the Years

10 years ago **December 24, 2013**

The Revere High hockey team improved to 2-0-1 on the season with a 5-0 triumph over Swampscott last Wednesday and then scored a goal in the final 11 seconds of their game with Lynn Saturday evening to earn an exciting 3-3 tie. The contest with Lvnn saw a dramatic turn of events in the closing minute for both teams. Lynn initially took a turn to celebrate when the visitors lit the red lamp with 1:13 to play to break a 2-2 deadlock. However, the Patriots refused to fold. RHS head coach Joe Ciccarello pulled goalie Adam Comeau at the first opportunity in favor of a sixth skater, Joe Ristaino. As the clock ticked down to the final seconds, Patriot Rich Polignone had control of the puck in the corner and sent a centering pass to Ristaino. The sophomore made a nifty move around two Lvnn defenders and tucked the puck past the Lynn goalie for the equalizer with just 11 ticks left on the clock. In Wednesday's 5-0 blanking of Swampscott, Marco Mazzarelli potted two goals and sophomore Maxx Anderson recorded the shutout, making 20 saves.

The Revere High boys indoor track team claimed first place in six of the nine individual events to run away with a 51-35 victory over Lynn English last week. Tarik Maddrey was a double winner for the Patriots, taking home first place honors in the high jump with a leap of 6'-2" and in the 50 yard hurdles in a time of 7.1. Other first place finishers for Revere were Anthony Destefano in the shot-put with a toss of 40'-6"; Younes Hartout in the 50 yard dash with a sprint of 5.8; Salah Barhoum in the mile in 5:20.8; and John DellaRusso with a two mile run of 11:46.

The Revere High girls indoor track team won eight of nine individual events and swept three to cruise to an easy 67-15 victory over Lynn English last week. Brenda Rudecindo was the top

point-scorer for Revere with 10 points, winning the high jump with her leap of 4'-6" and charging over the 50 yard hurdles in 8.3. However, the other big news from the meet was the new school record set by Comfort Toglan in the 50 yard dash with a time of 6.5 seconds. Comfort now holds two Revere High School records, having established the school mark in the 300 last year. The other first-place finishers for Revere against Classical were: Janice Destefano with a shot-put throw of 30'-3"; Vanessa Leone in the 300 in 53.4; Danielle Fortuna in the

on a few tough drives and a baseline floater. Ethan's offensive outburst propelled Revere into a 28-19 advantage as the teams went into the locker room at halftime.

The Revere defense came out swarming after the intermission, led by Mercado (five steals) who was asked to cover a much bigger player in GBL allstar Justin Marino of Medford. Marino, who averages 22 points per game, was held to just 11 points.

Day (18 points, six assists) continued with his hot hand and Leone, Lung, and El Babor all sank baskets in the run to extend Revere's margin to 40-27 heading into the final

The Mustangs however, would not go away easily. Medford picked up its intensity on defense and cut the Patriots' lead down t five points, 42-37, with just over three minutes remaining in the contest.

Revere got a huge lift off the bench from junior forward Erick Mayorga (four points), who made a tough shot in the lane and a jump shot from the elbow to give the Patriots a little breathing room. Day then drove for two layups (off great passes from Leone and Mercado) and Leone then pulled down an offensive rebound and put it back in to close things out, 50-43.

RHS head coach David Leary was pleased with his team's effort, but stressed that there is a lot to improve on. "This was a nice team win and we got contributions from a lot of guys," said Leary. "I thought the key to the game was Mercado's toughness on defense trying to contain Marino. Ethan and Andrew really carried us on offense and

Two nights later Leary and his crew hosted GBL archrival Chelsea in yet another epic battle between the two fierce foes before a packed Merullo Fieldhouse featuring boisterous fans on both sides -- and as always, the two teams gave the large crowd quite a show.

Revere senior co-captain Luke Ellis (five points, six rebounds) got the Patriots' offense going with a three-pointer from the top. Senior co-captain Andrew Leone (five points, seven rebounds) had a strong drive to the basket and despite the aggressive and physical Red Devils' defense on junior guard Ethan Day (18 points, eight rebounds), Day got to the basket twice to give the Patriots a slight 9-7

edge at the first buzzer. The second quarter was back-and-forth. Revere junior guard Josh Mercado (nine points, three steals) hit two jump shots. Day got to the basket and made two tough floaters in the lane and sophomore forward Sean Burnett (nine points, four rebounds) sank a fast-break layup and a pull-up jumper.

But the Chelsea pressure defense was the story in the first half. The Red Devils caused Revere to commit 15 turnovers and the visitors took a 23-21 lead into the half.

"I knew we were going to have a tough time against a very aggressive Chelsea defense and they really controlled the second quarter," said Leary.

"We needed to get the ball inside, but we could never

get it there." The third quarter started off with the same trend, as Chelsea forced four straight

turnovers, scoring on all of

them, to build a 31-21 lead

just two minutes into the frame. Leary called a timeout and tried to settle down his young squad, but the Red Devils scored again to go up by 12.

However, the Patriots found their rhythm. Day reversed the game's momentum when he got to the basket, scored, was fouled, and made the free throw. Burnett then made a very athletic catch-andfinish on the fast break and hit a jump shot at the top of the key. After Day made two more tough shots in the lane, Revere had cut the Chelsea lead to 40-35 to end the third.

Revere junior forward Erick Mayorga (five points, four rebounds) made two nice baskets in the paint to start the fourth quarter. Day once again drove to the basket and Leone sank a three-pointer from the wing to give Revere its first lead since the opening period. The Revere defense was really tough during that stretch as, after a Mercado hit corner jump shot, the Patriots turned a five-point deficit into a five-point lead.

However, Chelsea junior guard Edwin DeJesus got hot, making a nice layup and two three-pointers to put the Red Devils ahead, 48-45 with 1:48 remaining in the game.

The next sequence was very intense. After a missed shot, Leone fought for an offensive rebound, dove on the loose ball, and tipped it to Mayorga up top. The junior forward then swung the ball to the corner to Josh Mercado, who calmly drained the game-tying trey with 1:08 to go.

The Revere defense caused a turnover and the Patriots brought the ball up the court to take the lead. Revere moved the ball around and with the shot clock winding down, it got into the hands of Luke Ellis. The senior forward banked in a Jack Sikma-like fadeaway to put the Patriots up 50-48 with 33 seconds remaining.

Chelsea pushed the ball up and a Revere player blocked a shot out of bounds under the Red Devils' hoop with 14 seconds to go. Revere called their last timeout to set up their defense. Chelsea got the ball inbounds and swung it up to their senior point guard, Brauli Quezada, who swished a deep three-pointer to put Chelsea ahead, 51-50.

Revere pushed the ball up, but Day's desperation shot at the buzzer came up short.

"Well, that was an excellent atmosphere for a high school game, but it always is when we play each other," said Leary after the tough loss. "We did not take care of the basketball -- 24 turnovers will not lead us to many wins. We just have to be better. We will work on it, but I was proud that the kids did not quit and fought back. We almost stole that one."

Revere, now 1-3 after having dropped its season-opening games two weeks ago at GBL foes Lynn Classical and Lynn English, will host a Holiday Tournament starting tonight (Wednesday) with a contest against nonleague opponent Lynnfield at 5 p.m. Depending on the outcome, the Patriots will play in either the championship or consolation game tomorrow (Thursday) against either East Boston or Medford.

The Patriots will travel to GBL foe Malden next Wednesday.

KENAN BATIC WINS 600 IN **SEASON-OPENING MEET**

Kenan Batic won the 600 meter dash with a clocking of 1:38.62 for the Revere High boys indoor track and field team in their season-opening dual meet with Greater Boston League (GBL) rival Somerville two weeks ago at the Reggie Lewis Center in Boston.

Kenan's time was the second-fastest of the day, just 0.70 off the fastest time, among the GBL teams, all of whom competed at the Reggie where all of the GBL's dual meets will be held this season. Two other changes this year for the GBL's indoor season include the relay, which this year will be a 4 x 200 instead of the 4 x100, and the addition of the long jump event. The RHS 4 x 200 re-

lay quartet of Oliver Escobar, Randi Rodriguez, Danny Hou, and Jeremy X came up short in their race, falling short by 2.03 seconds to the Highlanders, but their clocking rated second-fastest among the eight GBL teams (the other six GBL schools competed in a pair of tri-

meets). A number of Patriots scored three points for the RHS side of the scoresheet vs. Somerville: Allen Hou in the 55 meter dash (6.93); Youness Chahid in the 1000 in 2:48.68 (a time that was just 0.70 behind the top Somerville runner); Danny Hou in the long jump (18'-6.75"); and Allen Hou in the shot-put (39'-9"). The duo of Lucas Jimenez and Allen Hou tied for second place in the high jump with a Somerville opponent with leaps

COUNCIL HONORS OUTGOING MEMBERS

CHELSEA - It was a bittersweet meeting for the City Council last week, as four departing members were honored for their time in office.

Damali Vidot, Judith Garcia, and Enio Lopez all first came to office in a historic 2015 election that saw a wave of Latino and female candidates. Councilor-at-Large Brian Hatleberg, who had served as a councilor in the past, was appointed to an empty seat earlier this year when former Council President Roy Avellaneda resigned.

All four councilors did not run for reelection, although Garcia will continue to serve on Beacon Hill as the state representative for Chelsea.

"I think that being a leader is knowing when to hang up the gloves and pass the torch," said Vidot.

Vidot's initial run in 2015 was a product of her community activism and desire to see greater representation and diversity on the city council. When she first decided to run, she said she did not realize at first that other candidates such as Lopez, Garcia, and former councilors Luis Tejada and Yamir Rodriguez would also be on the bal-

"We made history when we came in in 2016; finally, we had representation," said Vidot. "When I say representation, I don't just mean ethnicity or culture, but diversity in thought and diversity in ability."

Vidot said she can look back at her eight years on the council, including back-to-back terms as Council President, and know that she built relationships with every person with whom she served.

"People like me don't typically make it to spaces like this," said Vidot, adding that she wanted to make sure she could help create a world where her daughter and all young people can thrive.

Lopez said he began his journey eight years ago when he became the first Guatemalan-born city councilor.

"It has been an honor to serve Chelsea, and it has brought me great joy," said Lopez, who thanked his wife, family, and friends for all of their support. "I especially want to thank the voters who elected me and gave me the opportunity and the trust they gave me over these years. To my colleagues, it has been a pleasure working with you.

"We haven't always agreed, but our main focus has been always to make Chelsea a better place."

Hatleberg thanked the people of the city and the council for supporting him during his time in office.

"I appreciate you trusting me with the role, and I hope I served as you would like," he said.

Garcia noted that every councilor has taught her something and helped to make her a better leader.

"It's been eight years and it's very difficult to reflect and highlight the accomplishments throughout these eight years, but I can say if there is anything that this city has taught me, it is that we are more powerful when we work together in partnership," said Garcia.

Each outgoing councilor was presented with a plaque in acknowledgment of their service to the

VAN CAMPEN HAS THE VOTES TO BE THE NEXT PRESIDENT OF CITY COUNCIL

EVERETT - Robert Van Campen, who made a triumphant return with his election as Ward 3 councilor in November, reportedly has the votes to be the next president of the Everett City Council.

Van Campen will be one of six new members of the City Council. The others who will take office at the Jan. 5 inauguration ceremony are councillors-at-large Guerline Alcy and Katy Rogers, and ward councillors Anthony DiPierro (Ward 3), Holly Garcia (Ward 4), and Peter Pietrantonio (Ward 6). The five returning officials are Councillors-at-Large Michael Marchese, Stephanie Smith, and John Hanlon, Ward 1 Councilor Wayne Matewsky and Ward 2 Councilor Stephanie Mar-

The new City Council will vote for president at its first meeting of the year on Monday, Jan. 8.

Matewsky, 65, had the inside track on the presidency, but he decided not to pursue it due to "recent health issues." Matewsky proceeded to deliver his support to Van Campen.

"Robert is fair, knowledgeable, and an outstanding attorney," Matewsky. "I think he'll do an excellent job as council president.'

Van Campen, 49, previously served for 14 years in city government, one term on the Everett Common Council and six terms on the Everett Board of Aldermen. He was president of the Board of Aldermen three times, last serving on the Board in 2014. Van Campen asserted

that nothing will be official until his colleagues cast their votes on Jan. 8, but he did acknowledge that there is talk that he will be the next president of the 11-member Council. "At the end of the day,

if I get elected and have the votes to become president, I'm looking forward to serving in that capacity," Van Campen told the Everett Independent. "My goal would be to bring a stable voice to the debate, and I hope I can do that. I look forward to working with the new members, existing members, the administration, and all the stakeholders in the community to keep things moving in the right direction and to try to get some stuff done."

A former deputy mayor and city solicitor for the city of Melrose, Van Campen is currently the general counsel for AFSC-ME Council 93, a labor organization. He is a graduate of Melrose High School, Suffolk University and Suffolk Law School and has law offices on Beacon Street in Boston.

Van Campen and his wife, Lisa, have been married for 18 years, and they have two children, Lily, 17, and John, 14. Robert is the son of Marie (Ranelli) Van Campen of Everett and the late Richard Van Campen.

Van Campen said he will be attending the final meeting of the current City Council on Tuesday, Dec. 26 at which time the outgoing councilors will be recognized.




