Ways and Means budget hearings get underway

City finance director Richard Viscay presented a balanced \$294.6 million Fiscal Year budget to the city council during the first night of ways and means committee budget hearings on Monday night.

The council will be asked to appropriate a total of \$274,420,435 for the budget. The majority of the remainder of the budget figure is for state assessments that do not have to be appropriated by the council, but are netted against the amount of state revenue the city receives, according to Viscay.

Last year, the council appropriated just over \$262 million for the FY25 operating budget.

"This represents to the council that you have a balanced, responsible budget for FY25,"

said Viscay. "No one-time revenues are used for general fund operations and they are very reasonable revenue estimates and a spending plan we are proposing here on behalf of Mayor (Patrick) Keefe. I think these are responsible but realistic revenue requests and I encourage you to vote on the budget as submitted."

The biggest source of revenue for the budget comes in through property taxes.

For FY25, Viscay said Revere will have an estimated tax levy of just over \$120 million. This includes \$2.8 million in natural Proposition 2-1/2 growth, as well as an estimated \$3.5 million in new growth from new construction in the city,

Wonderland site moves ahead before Conservation Comm.

The Revere Conservation Commission (ConsComm) held its regular monthly meeting last Tuesday evening, June 4, in the City Council Chamber. Chair John Shue presided over the session that was attended by vicechair Nicholas Rudolph and fellow members Joseph Lavalle, Brian Averback, and Bernardo Sepulveda.

The first matter on the agenda was a continuation of the hearing regarding the city's Abbreviated Notice of Resource Area Delineation (ANRAD) to confirm wetland resource

boundaries involving bordering land subject to flooding and isolated wetlands at the former Wonderland Dog Track site, which is where the city plans to build a new Revere High School.

According to the Mass. Dept. of Environmental Protection (DEP) website, the purposes of an ANRAD are two-fold: First, the ANRAD provides a procedure for an applicant to confirm the delineation of a Bordering Vegetated Wetlands (BVW). If an ANRAD is filed for a BVW delineation, confirmation of other resource areas may

AHTF to expend \$520,000 to subsidize two condos

Last Thursday's meeting of the board of Affordable Housing Trust Fund revealed that the net cost to the AHTF for the purchase and resale of two condo units at the 133 Salem St. condo development project in order to create two units of affordable housing in the city will be \$520,000.

Last fall, the AHTF contributed \$100,000 to a state program that unlocked funds resulting in 18 units at 133 Salem St. becoming designated as affordable housing. Thanks to the AHTF's \$100,000 contribution, together with the state funds, the 18 units will be sold at well-below market rates to eligible buyers through a lottery process (to be administered by an independent firm used by the state), thereby increasing the number of much-needed affordable housing units in the city. Those units will be deed-restricted, which essentially means that the buyers cannot rent them and if they resell them in the future, they must do so at the then-existing price for affordable housing.

Then in March, the brokers for the project came before the AHTF with the suggestion that the board purchase two additional units at full market prices and then resell the units at the subsidized rates through the same lottery process.

AHTF Treasurer Anayo Osueke noted at Thursday's meeting that the \$520,000 represents more than 40% of the AHTF's total available funds in its bank account. It also far exceeds the \$366,597 that was allocated to the AHTF by the City Council for this year.

The two units purchased by the AHTF will bring to 20 the total number of subsidized units at the 133 Salem St. project, which consists of 72 units in total. Of

those 20 units, 12 will be designated for qualifying Revere residents and two for qualifying veterans. The other six will be available to all Mass. residents.

According to the website for the property, "The condos are designated under the following Greater Boston Average Medium Income Restrictions (AMI): Six (6) Condos at the 70% AMI level and fourteen (14) Condos at the 80% AMI level.

"Restricted Community Wealth Builder Housing Units must be sold to first time homebuyers as defined: First-time homebuyer means an individual or household, of which no household member has had an ownership interest in a principal residence at any time during the three (3)-year period prior to the date of qualification as an eligible purchaser, unless such ownership was by (i) any individual who is a displaced homemaker (as may be defined by the Massachusetts Executive Office of Housing and Livable Communities) (ii) any individual who is a single-parent who has only owned a house with a former spouse while married or (iii) any individual who has owned a dwelling unit whose structure is not permanently affixed to a permanent foundation in accordance with local or other applicable regulations or is not in compliance with applicable building codes, or other applicable codes, and cannot be brought into compliance with the codes for less than the cost of constructing a permanent structure.

"At the time eligibility is determined, homebuyers must have assets, excluding qualified retirement plans, of less than \$100,000.

Additionally, homebuyers must (1) qualify for a FHA, VA or Fannie Mae or Freddie Mac-conform-

ing fixed-rate mortgage loan, (2) provide a minimum 3% down payment or qualify for an approved Down Payment Assistance program, (3) pay closing costs, and (4) complete homeownership counseling by the time of pur-

chase. A full breakdown of the \$520,000 expenditure was not provided at the meeting, though Osueke touched briefly on the issue at the start of the main discussion on the AHTF's agenda. "This (transaction) is quite complicated," said Osueke. "That's why I wanted to have a separate talk because there are transactions that are happening simultaneousboard returned to the main topic of the evening and concluded that discussion, the meeting adjourned without revisiting the matter. The board is holding another meeting this evening (Thursday) when Osueke presumably will provide the details of the transaction, such as the price paid by the AHTF for each unit, the resale price (including commissions), and the size of the units (i.e., 1-bedroom, 2-bedrooms, etc.) that the AHTF is subsidizing. In addition it is unclear whether the two units being purchased and resold by the AHTF will be available to Revere residents only, or whether they will go into the lottery of units available to non-residents.

AHTF begins process of developing a 5-year plan

The board of the Revere Affordable Housing Trust held a special meeting last Thursday, June 6, in the City Council Chambers. Chair Joe Gravallese, vice-chair Claire Inzerillo, treasurer Anayo Osueke, and members Laila Pietri, Lori Manzo, Matthew Wolfer, and Dean Harris were in attendance for the session. Mayor Patrick Keefe also was in attendance, as were Tom Skwierawski, the city's Chief of Planning and Community Development, and Lorena Escolero, who also works in the Department of Plan-

ning & Development. The meeting consisted principally of a presentation by consultants from JM Goldson, the firm hired by the city to provide recommendations for the city's Housing Production Plan (HPP).

Gravallese said that the

primary purposes for the AHTF to meet with Goldson were to formulate a five-year plan and a budget.

Jenn Goldson, along assistant Noah with Harper, gave a Power-Point presentation that led to breakout sessions in which members of the AHTF partnered with city officials and others in the audience in order to share and formulate ideas.

Each breakout group then reported back to Goldson with their recommendations, which she in turn will put together for full consideration by the AHTF board members at a later meeting.

Goldson said there will be another working session within a week (which is tonight, June 13), followed by meeting in July to discuss a draft plan, with the goal of adopting a final plan for the AHTF's approval in August.

according to viscay.

Just over three-quarters of the property tax revenue is from residential property, and the remainder is from commercial and industrial property.

Local receipts such as motor vehicle excise, hotel room, and meals taxes account for just over \$20 million of the estimated revenue.

Viscay said the city has not contemplated any revenue increases for FY25, but that it does plan to do a survey of fees over the summer.

"This budget is balanced with no one-time revenues for the general fund operating budget and very reasonable revenue estimates on local receipts," said Viscay.

The city is slated to receive about \$117.5 million in state aid, with the majority of that, just over \$102 million, going toward the education budget.

There are also two enterprise funds, for water and sewer as well as solid waste, that total just over \$35 million for FY25, Viscay said.

The education budget is the largest slice of the overall FY25 spending, coming in at \$126,284,616 for the Revere public schools. In addition, the regional vocational school district budget in Revere is \$3.28 million.

The proposed public safety budget, which includes the police, fire, 911, and parking departments, has a budget of \$32.8 million.

Viscay said this in-

cludes two new police officers and two new firefighters.

In addition, Viscay said the city is hoping to get grant money to hire five new firefighters who will help staff the new Point of Pines fire stations, which is scheduled to open in the fall.

Viscay added that the parking department budget is larger this year, since that department absorbed the city's 40 crossing guards from the school budget.

The general government budget, which includes executive and financial divisions of the city, is proposed at \$10.7 million. That budget includes \$1 million reserved in the mayor's budget for collective bargaining purposes, and reorganized human resources and 311 constituent services departments.

The proposed public works budget is \$4.8 million, the health and human services department comes in at \$2.4 million, and the culture and recreation budget is \$2.1 million.

School will be the primary focus of future debt service expenses in the city.

JUNE IS A MONTH OF FREEDOM

June marks the first month of the summer season, the period on the calendar when we take vacations from school and work to travel and enjoy the company of our friends and family members. It's our personal time, that sweet spot each year when we take a break from the humdrum of our daily schedules and we have the freedom to do whatever we want,

But June also uniquely celebrates a number of events that brought true freedom to Americans who had been unable to experience the promise of America -- "all men are created equal" -- that we take for granted today.

June 12 is known as Loving Day. It was on that day in 1967 that the U.S. Supreme Court struck down a Virginia law that forbade interracial marriage and made it a criminal offense to do so. The Lovings, an interracial couple, were convicted under that Virginia law and, to avoid jail, they agreed to leave the state. Similar laws existed throughout all of the Southern states until the Supreme Court's ruling.

June is observed as Pride Month by the LGBTQIA+ community to mark the date of June 28, 1969, when gays protested arrests at the Stonewall Inn (a gay bar in New York City's Greenwich Village) at a time when police routinely arrested of gay men on phony morals charges. The riots lasted for a number of days and are widely-recognized as the beginning of the modern gay rights movement that culminated more than 50 years later with the Supreme Court decision of Obergefell v. Hodges in 2015 that struck down state laws forbidding same-sex marriage.

June 14 is Flag Day, marking the adoption of the flag of the United States on June 14, 1777, by resolution of the Second Continental Congress, which read as follows:

"Resolved, That the flag of the thirteen United States be thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation." In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation that officially established June 14 as Flag Day and in 1949, National Flag Day was established by an Act of Congress. Ever since its inception in 1777, the American flag has been universally recognized as a symbol of freedom around the world.

Finally, Juneteenth, which is now a national holiday, marks the day when the Union army entered the city of Galveston, Texas on June 19, 1865, and freed the slaves in Texas pursuant to President Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation, which had gone into effect more than two years earlier on January 1, 1863. Texas had been the last state to be occupied by Union forces and where slavery still existed.

MBTA, City announce extension of bus lane on Broadway to Revere Beach Parkway Interchange

The MBTA and the City of Revere announced the extension of the existing morning peak-only bus lane along the southbound side of Broadway from Revere Street to the Revere Beach Parkway Interchange. The extension is made possible through funding from the Mass-DOT Shared Streets and Spaces grant. Installation of the extension is scheduled to begin June 10 with completion anticipated within the following few days (weather depending). The project includes an inbound lane from Page Street across the southwest ramp and under Revere Beach Parkway, extending it to the Chelsea line. This road segment serves MBTA Routes 116 and 117, carrying 11,600 riders a day, along one of Revere's busiest corridors and lays the groundwork for future permanent capital reconstruction of the interchange. The project fulfills a critical need for bus priority improvements identified by the MBTA in their Transit Priority Vision and uses design guidance from the MBTA's Transit Priority Toolkit. "We are pleased that the funding from the Shared Streets and Spaces grant program will be going toward a permanent dedicated bus lane in Revere as one of the program's goals is to improve connections to make it more efficient for residents to travel on transit, on foot, or on bicycles," said Transportation Secretary and CEO Monica Tibbits-Nutt. "Strong partnerships with municipalities have improved travel options state-wide as the Shared Streets and Spaces Program has awarded a total of \$52 million to 492 projects since it was launched during the pandemic." "We know dedicated

bus lanes provide quick, cost-efficient solutions to speeding up travel times for our riders, and I'm pleased to see this morning peak-only lane extension move forward," said MBTA General Manager and CEO Phillip Eng. "The 116 and 117 are critical bus routes for thousands of bus riders traveling through the Revere community and making connections to the Blue Line. Extending this lane will improve their commute while also encouraging more folks to get out of their cars and take public transit. We thank our partners at MassDOT for funding these kinds of important projects, the City of Revere for their continued collaboration, and the MBTA Transit Priority Group for their diligent work on improving our network."

"Thousands of Revere residents rely on MBTA bus service to access work, appointments, and other critical needs," said City of Revere Mayor Patrick Keefe Jr. "By improving the efficiency of bus operations, this project will set the stage for a successful launch of the Bus Network Redesign Phase 1, a system-wide transformation of the MBTA bus system that starts in Revere later this year."

The initial one-mile bus lane was launched in October 2020 as part of a pilot lane will support faster, more reliable bus service, providing an improved experience for thousands of riders. Additionally, Route 116 will receive significant improvement as a Frequent Bus Route in Bus Network Redesign Phase 1, expected in December 2024.

The MassDOT Shared Street and Spaces Grant funds quick-build projects to help transit authorities and municipalities quickly implement improvements to public spaces. These include sidewalks, curbs, streets, bus stops, and parking areas to support public health, safe mobility, and strengthen commerce.

We recently were shocked to learn of two statistics that were noted at a recent meeting of the Revere Board of Health.

The first is that about 4500 Americans die from drowning each year. To put that into perspective, that figure is about 50 percent greater than the total number of victims who died on 9/11.

The second number, which was even more surprising -- and even sadder -- is that drowning is the leading cause of unintentional injury-related death among children ages 1-4.

What is stunning to us about that statistic is that we cannot imagine that whenever a parent is with a small child near the water -- whether it be the bathtub in their home or at the beach -- the parent is not watching over their child like a hawk without even a second's worth of distraction, including texting on a cell phone.

Young children are especially susceptible to drowning because of their small lung capacity, which means that once they slip under, their tiny lungs can fill with water almost instantly.

Even if a child is saved from death by drowning, the lack of oxygen to the brain can result in a serious brain injury that will have lifelong implications.

The bottom line is that a young child never should be left unattended for even a moment when near the water. And it goes without saying that every parent should be 100% sober whenever they are near water with their child, whether on a boat, at the beach, at a pool, or in their home.

where the money would come from.

Both Kelley and Councillor-at-Large Anthony Zambuto said it was a small amount of money in the overall budget to help take care of the city's senior citizens.

"This is a nominal amount, if we can't do this, something is wrong," said Kelley.

Arcadia Street resident Anthony Parziale said he did not like the fact that senior citizens would have to work in the first place to get some kind of discount on their property taxes.

"I'd like to see this go away, and I'd like to see the seniors get the discount so that they can enjoy their retirement," said Parziale.

Kelley noted that the city was following state law by allowing income eligible senior citizens to take part in the abatement program. thing other than what's prescribed under that Massachusetts statute, we would have to take it up as special legislation and ask our state legislation ... to help us get this done," said Kelley. "I would happily work with them to try to get something done. I understand that that would take longer and it wouldn't be something for fiscal 2024."

After several proposed amendments to the ordinance were put on the floor, the measure was on the verge of going back into subcommittee before the council did take a vote to approve the changes to the ordinance.

"We are trying to increase some money for the seniors, at least for fiscal year 2024," said Kelley. "If we don't move on this now, I don't think anything can get done for the seniors for the next cycle."

I have the privilege of standing before you tonight as we celebrate a milestone that you and those close to you will remember for years to come. As a group, you have a lot to be proud of. How did they do that? How did you react? Do you still talk to them? Do they still talk to you? Did you have an awkward phase with them and now things are ok? Or are things still not ok? And are you ok with that? Why is that? How have you changed since this failure? We all have answers to these questions, but we don't always want to answer these questions.

To the Class of 2024, I encourage you to embrace



failure as your personal mentor. My greatest wish for you is that you fail, and that you fail in the best possible way - over and over again for the rest of your lives. I hope that your failures teach you, that they guide you, and most importantly that they push you closer to achieving the dreams that I know you have for yourself. Every mistake is a challenge for you to be better, for you to grow. Surround yourselves with people who love you, who support you and who will challenge you directly to be the best version of yourself you can be. You need people who call you out when you mess up. Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The RHA Board of Commissioners, Chairperson including Anthony Perrone, Vice Chairperson Fatou Drammeh, Treasurer Richard Viscay, and Member Kathi Reinstein appropriated the funds for the project.

The larger facility replaces the former playground located on site that has been converted into a new parking lot for residents.

The playground, distinguished by its simplicity, spaciousness, lighting poles, and mulch flooring, is providing much recre-

ation and fun activities for children. The tall "Mega-Tower" has been an instant hit while The Whirl (also known as the Mega-Spin) is also proving to be immensely popular.

There are also four brand new benches situated at the edges of the playground. Harris said new picnic tables, fencing and covering will be added at the facility, "so families will be able to use the playground."

also be requested provided the other resource area boundaries are identified on the plans which accompany the BVW boundary delineation. The second purpose of the ANRAD is to serve as the application for a Simplified Review for projects in the Buffer Zone.

The Wonderland site is a complicated one. There are six separate parcels on the site per the city assessors' maps and all of the legacy wetlands areas within those parcels essentially were destroyed by the track when it was built in the 1930s (long before there was even a thought of a Wetlands Protection Act). In addition, the site has become overgrown and allowed to deteriorate since the track closed about 15 years ago. Further, the so-called County Ditch drainage creek is adjacent to the site. The ditch is part of an ecosystem that flows into Diamond Creek, which in turn drains into Rumnev Marsh.

The ConsComm hired its own wetlands expert, Fleetwood Environmental Solutions LLC, for what is known as a peer review study in order to provide an independent evaluation of the many environmental issues that were identified by the city's own outside experts, LEC Environmental Consultants LLC. "This is not about the high school," noted Shue at the outset of the hearing. "This is solely about the wetlands and the wetlands delineation and whether the isolated wetlands deserve protection per the city's ordinances." Claire Hoogeboom, a Wetlands Scientist with LEC (the firm hired by the city), made a presentation to the commissioners. Hoogeboom noted that she had walked the site with representatives from Fleetwood and that she had incorporated some changes that the firm had proposed. David Cameron, a Wetlands Scientist from Fleetwood, then spoke to the commission. "The site is almost completely level and very disturbed," said Cameron. "It appears to have been a tidal marsh until the late 1930s (when the track was built) based on old maps going back as far as 1892." Cameron also said he viewed aerial photographs from 1938 to the present and commented that he was surprised to see no standing water in the photographs. "Delineating the wetlands boundaries can be very challenging and LEC overall did a good job, though I made some minor revisions which LEC adopted," Cameron said. "All the questions I had

were answered." Cameron then explained that he had five recommendations, including that the ANRAD, as amended with his suggestions, be approved and that the commission issue an Order of Resource Area Delineation (ORAD).

Cameron pointed out that the land is within the 100-year flood plan for purposes of federal flood insurance and that this is one of the only areas in Revere that has open space that provides wildlife habitat -- he noted that he observed a breeding pair of mallards in a puddle on the asphalt -- and, if possible, floated the idea that steps could be taken during construction of the high school to provide ecological enhancement.

In response to a question from LaValle, Cameron said there was no evidence of vernal pools on the site.

Mayor Patrick Keefe briefly addressed the commission, noting that the city "has every intention of preserving the wetlands and making sure that it is an ecological-learning environment."

The commissioners then had to consider a series of chusetts Bay Transportation Authority to confirm Wetland Delineation along the MBTA's right-of-way in Revere as part of the T's new Vegetated Management Plan (VMP).

After hearing briefly from T representatives, the commission unanimously approved the boundaries of the VMP as delineated by the T.

The next matter was a request for a Notice of Intent (NOI) by Stephen Lakis, 102 Summer Street, for the removal of an inground pool, and garage and the replacement of a retention wall. The ConsComm is requiring approval of the project from the neighbors, who must grant access to Lakis onto their property in order for him to do the proposed work. In addition, the city's Building Dept. has required Lakis to submit an engineered plan to replace the existing retaining wall.

A trustee from the neighboring condo association told the commissioners that the association has a number of questions about the project and is not ready to give its approval for the project. With that, the ConsComm further continued the hearreplacement from Revere to Winthrop.

The next item on the agenda was a Request for Determination of Applicability from the city for demolition work at McMackin Field, the former fabled Little League field that had served the city's youth for generations starting in the 1950s, but which has fallen into a state of disrepair and neglect over the past decade. The ConsComm unanimously rejected the determination of applica-

bility, which means that it no longer will retain purview over the project.

The commission heard another Request for a Determination of Applicability from Boston Gas to install a new natural gas pipeline along Lee Burbank Highway. The pipeline will replace the current pipeline that serves the properties located at 101 and 51 Lee Burbank. The commission unanimously approved a negative determination.

The final matter was a

request for a Certificate of Compliance from the city for its installation of a new drainage pipe from Avon Street through two rear and side yards to connect to the storm drain system on Bay Road. The ConsComm unanimously approved issuing the certificates of compliance for the three properties affected by the work.

The next meeting of the commission is set for July 10.

commission-The ers next approved the determination that one of the four areas on the site (Area B) is an isolated wetland not subject to the Wetlands Protection Act. but that does fall within the city environmental ordinance (Title 16) for protection, and that three other areas (C, D & F) on the site do not fall within Title 16. The commission then voted to approve the delineation of the other two parcels on the site (A & E) that do fall within the Mass. Wetlands Protection Act.

Next up was a vote to approve the delineation of the Eastern County Ditch and the riverfront area.

The next motion was the approval of the extent of the site elevations (4.55 feet) for bordering land subject to flooding.

The next motion approved was to delay a determination of the extent of mitigation for the filling-in of Area B until construction of the school is closer. The final motion approved by the commission was a determination that Area B (the old race track) is not isolated land subject to flooding.

The next item on the agenda was a continuation of a Request for Determination of Applicability (RDA) from the Massaing to its next meeting on July 10.

The commission next quickly approved a Request for a Certificate of Compliance from Mass. Electric for a 23kV cable

If I did that, I would "make it." I vividly recall completing an extra credit question for my third grade teacher, Ms. Randall, on Mitt Romney and later doing a project on Jacqueline Kennedy. Those experiences both fed into me becoming a politics nerd and I love Ms. Randall for it!"

A rising senior at Wesleyan University majoring in Government and

Government confirms what we have long known: Revere Beach is a national treasure

he fond memories of generations of sun worshippers converged into one historical occasion on Monday morning when Revere Beach Reservation was officially designated a National Historic Landmark by the U.S. Department of the Interior.

For most of the 11 speakers on the program, the theme was a rebirth of the beach. For decades, as most around here know, the place was left to rot while other beaches in more affluent areas were kept up nicely with funds that should have gone partially to Revere Beach.

That fact alone makes the beach's history more ironic. Today, the beach's sand is laden with debris, but years ago, Charles

Superintendent of Schools Paul Dakin and the School Committee have agreed to weather the consequences from state agencies and use money destined for fulfilling bureaucratic requirements to bring back 10 new teachers to the public schools.

"We've redone grants and squeezed out professional development requirement areas and we're saying it's more important to have teachers," Dakin said last week.

He said some letters have already gone out to laid-off teachers and more are going out soon.

"I'll just defend it if they want to School officials don't care about criticize us," said Dakin, who figures they will re-route about \$500.000 to make way for the teachers' salaries.

> At the high school, Principal David DeRuosi said he has been busy hiring a few new teachers.

> "You can't lose 20 to 25 staff over two years and expect the same performance," he said.

> The new hires, he said, will help him to reduce class size in math and English especially.

> Dakin explained that during education reform of the 1990s, teachers were required to take a certain amount of seminars and classes (called opportunities) to keep their

license current. If they don't get that "professional development," they lose their teaching license.

The catch comes with the fact the schools must pay for and provide these "opportunities" to the teachers, which comes at a great cost to most urban districts.

Dakin said he is cutting out some of the "opportunities".

"This will be helping out every building," he said. "We'll be living with a very, very, very tight budget, but I think parents and students deserve lower class sizes."

Despite another tight budget year, Dakin said he wouldn't consider cutting sports and after-school
