#### MASSPORT TO **BEGIN RUNWAY SAFETY WORK AT BOSTON LOGAN**

The Massachusetts Port Authority (Massport) will be undertaking important runway safety work in September, where an Engineered Material Arresting System (EMAS) will be installed at the end of Runway 27. Maintaining and improving Boston Logan's runways is critical to the safety of all who use the airport. To accommodate the construction, Runway 9-27 will be closed for 75 days starting on September 2.

This project requires two 75-day closures of the runway over the next year. The first closure will begin on September 2, 2025, and the second will begin after July 1, 2026. While this runway is closed, there will be an impact on the number of planes that can land and take off at Boston Logan. This could cause delays, especially if there are other impacts due to the weather or diversions, among other situations.

The goal of this project is to enhance safety for air-

## City breaks ground on new high school

With piles of rubble and construction vehicles decked with American flags framing the scene, the groundbreaking for the long-awaited new Revere High School took place at the former Wonderland site last Thursday morning.

Mayor Patrick M. Keefe Jr, Superintendent Dianne Kelly, U.S. Congresswoman and Democratic Whip Katherine M. Clark, Executive Director of the Massachusetts School Building Authority Mary Pichetti, as well as city and school officials, community leaders, educators, families, and project partners came together to celebrate the groundbreaking of the new Revere High School, a state-of-the-art facility that will provide a modern and expanded campus for over 2,450 students. Upon completion, the school will accommodate the city's growing student population while offering a safe, modern, and inclusive learning

With updated science labs, collaborative learning spaces, technology-equipped classrooms, and areas for arts and athletics, this facility will reflect Revere Public Schools' commitment to excellence. The Massachusetts School Building Authority (MSBA) awarded the city of Revere a grant of \$233,889,807 for this project. The total cost of the project was initially tapped at about \$493 million, but the Revere High School Building Committee agreed to trim \$10 million from that amount. Current budget estimates have the project coming in at about \$483 million without the need to make any cuts to the original building proposal.

"This building, as we know, will stand long after most of us serve in our roles as administrators, educators, and elected officials," said Keefe. "In the design of the building and the intention behind it, we've left

Grandmaster Doreen Di-Rienzo, a 10th Degree Black Belt and founder of the Revere Karate Academy, has been named a recipient of the G.O.A.T. Martial Arts Award, one of the highest honors in the international martial arts community.

Although unable to attend the ceremony in person, Grandmaster DiRienzo was honored in absentia during the G.O.A.T. Awards Weekend, which took place August 14–16, 2025, at the Tanglewood Resort in Pottsboro, Texas.

Composting // CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1 scraps—including food meat, bones, dairy, seafood shells, and more—as well as food-soiled paper and certified compostables to the new collection bins. These materials will be composted at local farms, helping to reduce landfills and return nutrients to local soils.

Residents can choose between a 5-gallon bucket or a 12-gallon locking cart at sign-up. Complimentary starter kits will include sample compostable liners and a how-to booklet to make getting started easy.

"We've seen firsthand how much of an impact curbside composting can have in communities," said Tyler Frank, Founder and President of Garbage to Garden. "We're looking forward to helping Revere divert food scraps from the landfill and turn it into something that benefits local soils and future generations."

The City and Garbage to Garden are aiming to pre-enroll at least 250 households before service begins. Residents can help spread the word by talking with neighbors, sharing on social media, or picking up flyers at local events.

## Council approves early voting calendar

The city council approved early voting for both the Sept. 16 municipal preliminary election and the Nov. 4 municipal election during a brief regular meeting last week.

The only preliminary election on the slate for Sept. 16 is the Ward 1 which would feature incumso, Kathryn Schulte-Gra-

hame, and Michael Toto, Jr. The early voting dates and times at City Hall for the preliminary election are Saturday, Sept. 6 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.; Monday, Sept. 8 through Thursday, Sept. 11 from 8:15 a.m. to 5 p.m.; and Friday, Sept. 12 from 8:15 a.m. to 12:15

The early voting dates and times at City Hall for the municipal election are Saturday, Oct. 25 and Sunday, Oct. 26 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.; Monday, Oct. 27 through Thursday, Oct. 30 from 8:15 a.m. to 5 p.m.; and Friday, Oct. 31 from 8:15 a.m. to 12:15 p.m.

Election Commission School Committee race, Danielle Pietrantonio also fielded some general elecbent Jacqueline Monterro- tion questions during the council meeting,

Ward 1 Councillor Joanne McKenna, who is running for an at-large seat this fall, asked if there was a date when candidates could begin putting out their election signs.

"No, so that is private property, people can do what they want there and

we can't enforce it," said Pietrantonio. "People can do what they want and we can't enforce any timelines or restrictions."

Ward 3 Councillor Anthony Cogliandro noted that the council should look at doing away with the political sign policy the city currently has on the books because it is unenforceable and confuses people.

Cogliandro said he has also gotten some questions about sign holding during early voting and the rules for holding signs around City Hall while the voting is ongoing.

"Technically, on the books, it's 150 feet from the entrance of whatever entrance you are going to use in a building for early voting," said Pietrantonio. "Usually, at City Hall, because all of the entrances are available, it would be the whole little island around (City Hall)" the same as it is on election day.

Ward 2 Councillor Ira Novoselsky asked about the time between when nomination papers were first made available this election season and when they had to be returned to the election department.

Pietrantonio said the election calendar was set this year before she took over as the commissioner, and that she would look at shortening that timeframe, with the approval of the election commission, for the next municipal election.

#### ACCURATE INFLATION DATA IS CRUCIAL FOR SENIOR CITIZENS

The controversy surrounding the recent firing by President Donald Trump of Erika McEntarfer, the former commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), who was a respected statistician (she was approved for the post by an overwhelming and bipartisan vote of the U.S. Senate) and who had worked with the agency for decades, and the announcement of her replacement by somebody who has no expertise or experience in this realm, should be of deep concern for every senior citizen for whom Social Security provides a significant portion of their income.

The reason is this: In addition to compiling employment figures, the BLS also reports inflation data. And as every senior citizen (and we are among that group) knows, the annual increases in our Social Security benefits are tied directly to the previous year's rate of inflation (specifically, the Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers) as determined by the BLS.

Social Security plays a crucial role in providing a basic level of income for our nation's seniors, as it has since its inception in 1935. When President Franklin D. Roosevetl signed the Social Security Act into law 90 years ago, it was estimated that 70-90% of America's elderly population lived in poverty. Social Security instantly provided a life-changing base income for millions of Americans.

Today, most seniors still rely on Social Security to live a life of dignity in their golden years. A survey conducted by the Senior Citizens League, a non-profit that advocates for increased Social Security benefits, found that 27 percent of older Americans rely solely on Social Security for their income and 67 percent of seniors said they depended on Social Security payments for more than 50 percent of their income,

The annual cost-of-living adjustments in Social Security benefits play a crucial role in ensuring that millions of senior citizens are able to maintain a life of dignity in their golden years. When inflation was running close to 10% a few years ago, seniors saw a timely and much-needed 10% boost to our benefits.

But even if the annual increases in benefits are small (say, two percent), they add up over time, enabling seniors to keep up with the ever-increasing cost of living.

With tariffs certain to raise prices on all sorts of necessary items (including food) in the coming months, it never has been more important that the inflation statistics are honest and accurate so that our Social Security benefits can keep pace with the cost of living.

To put it another way, if Trump's incompetent and unqualified hacks do not provide accurate inflation data, the vast majority of America's senior citizens will soon see a very real decline in our standard of living.

#### SCHOOL'S BACK -- DRIVE WITH CARE

With schools going back into session this week and next after the summer vacation, morning rush-hour commuters need to readjust our driving habits to ensure that we take into account the thousands of children who will be filling our streets during our morning commute.

We'll be the first to admit that school buses, school crossing guards, etc. are a pain in the neck, especially if we're running a bit late on our way to work.

But that is no excuse for ANY sort of driving behavior that does not take into account the safety of the children in our communities.

Every morning commuter needs to be a patient and defensive driver, especially in the first few weeks of school, when children are walking and biking to school to take advantage of the early fall weather.

Each of us is responsible not only for our own safety, but also for the safety of others when we are behind the wheel of a motor vehicle -- and that is doubly true when school is back in session.

#### **FUNDING CUTS** AND THE REVERE **PUBLIC LIBRARY**

Dear Editor,

The following is an open letter from the Revere Public Library (RPL) Board of Trustees to the citizens of Revere and our City, State and Federal elected officials about the current and future impacts on the Revere Public Library, your public library, of recent library-related funding cuts at the Federal level.

Many of you may not realize that your public library is funded in several ways: through the City of Revere budget, the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners (MBLC), and the federal Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). IMLS was recently defunded by Presidential Executive Order#14238 and this letter is about the impact on your public library of the loss of this agency and the funding it administered.

Why does this matter to you as a Revere resident? It's simple: No dollars from IMLS to MBLC means less funding to the Revere Public Library to help carry out its mission to meet the in-

formation and community needs of Revere's residents of all ages, economic, and educational backgrounds.

It is a common misconception that RPL is simply a large building full of books that can be borrowed. It is so much more. It is where you can bring your children for a story hour and programs that encourage their creativity and skill development, where they make some of their first friends. It is where you can join a book club, participate in a game night with other young adults and engage with other members of the community. It is where you build community across generational and cultural lines. It is where you can use a computer for free and access free wi-fi. It is where you can make photocopies, create your resume, apply for jobs, or make computer printouts for a small fee. It is where you can borrow a reduced cost pass to museums and other local attractions. It is where you can take an ESOL class. It is where you can take a citizenship class. It is where through free online databases a veteran can learn about VA and TRICARE benefits or a senior can learn about assisted living and other housing options, where you can read current news and popular magazines, use business research databases, learn a language, trace your family's history, download free music and movies, or learn about the job market and potential careers. These services and resources are made available to our community by federal funding through IMLS, which has recently been eliminated. Some resources have already been scaled back or of this funding.

cut entirely due to the loss So, what can you do about this loss of funding? First, you can contact your State and Federal Senators and Representatives (and their aides), testify how your library has impacted you and encourage them to defend the IMLS budget and support your library funding. Second, you can contact the members of the Labor, Health and Human Services, Education Committee (Labor HHS) to ask them to vote to stop these cuts and reinstate IMLS funding. Lastly, libraries and cultural institutions are on the chopping block with

the Museum and Library Services Act of 2018 coming up for reauthorization; we must protect these institutions. You can reach out to your legislators (and their aides) and demand they vote to reauthorise the Museum and Library Services Act of 2018. We have until September 30, when our legislators return from their summer recess, to vote on this crucial legislation. History has shown us that emailing and/or calling your legislator to share your concerns has a definite impact. reminders of who Revere with you." has always been, and who we aspire to be."

The 422,600-square-foot facility will be accessible via Wonderland Station, revitalizing the long vacant parcel and spurring additional investments in transportation solutions. The school is being designed as Net-Zero Ready, Fossil Fuel Free, and will achieve Passive House standards for energy efficiency. Highly efficient triple-pane windows, insulation, and a white reflective roof are proposed to achieve energy efficiency. Additionally, geothermal wells are proposed to provide a renewable energy source to heat and cool the school building. The subsurface geothermal wells will be installed beneath the athletic field located closest to the building.

"We know we face major challenges, but the answer is right here. It's right here in our backyard. It's building a city and a Commonwealth into a place that is worthy of our children, and this is how government is supposed to work," said Clark. "Today's groundbreaking represents a pact that we are making with the next generation, that no matter what is happening in politics, this community right here in Revere, we will always fight for education, for opportunity for everyone, for the resources and a fair shot that every single child deserves. It is a privilege to be in that fight

Dr. Kelly added, "Today, we break ground not just on a new building, but on a future full of promise-for our students, our educators, and the entire city of Revere. Our new high school will be more than bricks and mortar. It will be a space that empowers our students to think creatively, collaborate effectively, and learn in ways that meet the needs of a changing world."

The facility will feature advanced academic spaces, a performing arts wing, and a dedicated health and wellness complex that will support students and serve the community. Other amenities include a 1,000-seat auditorium, spaces for the JROTC and vocational programs, and a freshman academy designed to ease the transition into high school. Outside of the main building, there will be multisport athletic fields, tennis courts, outdoor classrooms, and designated drop-off zones.

"What we saw with Revere, as we partnered with Revere, was perseverance: Being willing to do the work, do the study, present the material, and perhaps do it again, and review it again, and verify that you're making the best decision for the community and the students," said Mary Pichetti, Executive Director of the Massachusetts School Building Authority.

The facility was designed by Perkins Eastman and pulls inspiration from natural geographic features in Revere, including the shape of the waves on nearby Revere Beach and the natural wildlife of the local Rumney Marsh. Construction is being led by Consigli Construction Co., Inc., and LeftField is the owner's project manager. Construction is set to be completed by the 2028-2029 school



## Jack Zimmerman's career is taking flight

All-Scholastic pitcher will play in the Division 1 University of Dayton program

Jack Zimmerman will leave his hometown of Revere tomorrow for Dayton, Ohio, where he will begin his academic and athletic career at the University of Dayton.

Zimmerman's scholar-ship in the Flyers' Division 1 college baseball program follows a sensational senior season on the mound for St. Mary's High School where the 6-foot-4-inch lefthander had a 9-1 record and save with 99 strikeouts.



As a junior, Zimmerman began to show his college potential, compiling a 5-1 record with 75 strikeouts in 51 innings while becoming a CCL All-Star and Massachusetts Baseball Coaches Association All-Star. He was also the MVP of the Spartan Invitational Tournament, getting the 'W' in the championship game.

Entering his senior season this spring, Zimmerman displayed a live fastball that now touches 89 miles per hour, a curveball, and a changeup. His overall season was off-the-charts terrific, leading the Spartans to a ranking as high as fifth in the state and a No. 1 seed in the MIAA Tournament. Zimmerman won in his only start (a 13-strikeout gem in a 3-2 victory over Martha's Vineyard) in the tournament before Apponequet Regional upset the Spartans in the second round.

He credits his three years of off-season workouts at NPA East in Ipswich under the direction of former Texas Rangers draft pick Gardner O'Flynn as being instrumental in his development as a pitcher.

She lived a life full of love, loyalty, and thoughtful generosity



## Is it worth spinning the wheel?

Weighing the pros and cons of legalized gambling

Not every pull of the slot machine ends up with a match.

Now that slot machines are a step closer to reality at Revere's two pari-mutuel tracks, the human cost of expanded gambling is an issue warranting further thought.

Currently, the Senate has passed slot legislation and a House committee heard testimony yesterday, (Tuesday), and will most likely vote

is expected to veto the bill, and many are now postulating whether the measure has the steam to survive an override vote.

Revere has had legalized gambling in the form of greyhound and horse racing for years, and the lottery here has been an immensely popular item for almost as many years. Many in the community have used them responsibly, but those same gambling venues have also wreaked havoc on hundreds of fam-

soon. If it passes, Gov. Mitt Romney ilies in Revere over the years. than already exists. They also point Problem gambling here has caused many broken marriages and child neglect and the outcome has oftentimes been drug and alcohol abuse. Some have even committed suicide

as a result of gambling problems. With that in mind, is slot machine gambling (known in the gaming world as the "crack cocaine" of games) the best thing for Revere? City officials, community members and track officials believe that it would bring no further problems

at the tremendous amount of resources that slots would bring into the city - money that could be used to fix potholes, further improve the schools and pay off debt.

But are those resources worth the fact that some families and individuals will suffer at the arms of the new slot machines? It's a question only the community can answer.

"It's a tough question," said

## Life Saving First Aid

Would you know how to save your dog's or cat's life if the animal were choking or had stopped breathing? We know you would want to give your companion the lifesaving first aid needed in these severe circumstances.

While prevention is always the best place to begin, it's better to be ready to step in and act if something should happen. We recommend a local or online pet first aid course for all pet guardians. If organized training doesn't fit your schedule, consider training yourself.

Fortunately, there are veterinarians and first aid instructors who have produced careful Heimlich maneuver and CPR videos. We suggest you watch a few, pick a favorite, and put a link to that one on your phone. While you have the phone out, add a Pet First Aid app. We use the Pet First Aid app from the American Red Cross.

With any video or app, it is better if you practice the skill before you need it. In the panic of watching the emergency unfold, you

want to take immediate action. You should even practice finding the instructions on your phone quickly so that others nearby can help, coach you, or take over if needed.

These aids are not a substitute for a trip to the vet. However, they're good to have on the way to a professional or as a last resort.

#### **Our Experience**

Our first dog, Sassy, gobbled a piece of celery, and it became stuck. She was breathing but struggling to do so between her gagging efforts to get it up or down. We rushed her to an emergency animal hospital, where the veterinarian was able to remove it.

There's a difference between struggling to get something up and choking. With actual choking, the animal is not breathing, and the Heimlich maneuver is your only hope.

Our Poppy once tried to swallow the stub of a bully stick and managed to get it halfway down. She was flailing and struggling, but breathing. Penny knew how to perform the Heimlich maneuver on a dog, but we

decided not to do that. We didn't know if pulling out the object might do more harm than good, and Poppy was getting air. On our way to the animal ER, she gagged it up.

The final scare involved a friend's dog who was choking on a stick. In this case, Penny had to do a Heimlich, which brought up the obstruction. However, the dog was bleeding and needed a trip to the ER. There, a vet removed a piece of wood jammed in the roof of the dog's mouth.

#### **Choking Hazards**

Many dogs are obsessed with sticks, and some love to pick up and carry stones. Both of these are high on the list of choking hazards.

And, choking is not the only danger. Small bits of wood can become embedded in the gums and teeth without vour notice. Any piece swallowed could perforate part of the digestive tract and require major surgery. Always let your veterinary team know if your dog has been chewing a stick or is stone-obsessed when any strange GI or mouth symptoms appear.


