ARRIGO CITES NATIONAL CONSUMER PROTECTION WEEK

Mayor Brian Arrigo acknowledged National Consumer Protection Week (March 3 through 9) by encouraging residents to make use of the Revere's Consumer Affairs Office when confronted with any type of consumer issue such as using credit, shopping for a used car, or dealing with problems resulting from ordinary consumer transactions.

"Our Consumer Affairs Office is always ready to help residents any time of the year," said Mayor Arrigo. "They not only can help with problems, but they are a great resource of information and guidance that can help everyone be a

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Councillors look at regulations for Airbnb

Ward 4 Councillor Patrick Keefe said there are more than 100 Airbnb rentals throughout the city. Keefe's goal is to enact legislation to regulate Airbnb properties and create revenue for the city.

"The issue is in [Council] sub-committee at this time," said Keefe. "We're reviewing the ordinance with the city solicitor and a couple of department heads in an effort to bring it forth."

Airbnb regulations in Boston, Cambridge, and New York City are being reviewed as Revere moves towards adopting similar procedures.

"We're trying to create a limit on Airbnb properties per year so there are not people

purchasing large properties just to use it for Airbnb," said Keefe. "We're also looking at the local tax options."

Keefe said while there are current regulations for rooming houses in the city, Airbnb falls in to a different category.

"There are over 100 units being used for Airbnb in the city," said Keefe. "What's happening is that the city is not getting any benefit from it. And we have very little ability to manage it, with no ordinance in place. This would give us the ability to help manage and regulate it, and give the true Airbnb users the ability to generate additional income, but pay the taxes would be due to the city. It

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MBTA seeks input on proposals

As part of its Better Bus Project the Massachusetts Bay Transit Authority (MBTA) is seeking opinions from bus riders on three new proposals for bus lines in Revere.

Proposals include changes to Route 411, Route 424 and Routes 455 and 459.

The MBTA is seeking comments through March 13 online at MBTA.com. Changes to the system are expected to take place Sept. 1. The goal of MBTA officials is shorter wait times on all lines.

If the proposed changes are implemented by the MBTA, Route 411 would provide only midday service to the Jack Satter House. There would be no change in service on Route 411 on Saturdays but there would be no service on Sunday.

For Eastern and Essex – Haymarket or Wonderland, Route 424 the goal is more reliable service between Boston and Lynn. The night service will route to Wonderland instead of Haymarket. These weekday changes allow for a shorter wait time. It would result in a local bus and subway fare instead of an express bus fare.

The MBTA states that there will be 21 new passenger trips and 20 passenger hours saved each weekday.

Realizing the importance

of linking Boston and the North Shore, the MBTA is also proposing to remove Route 459 and invest more resources in the Route 455. The changes would result in the reduction of a 20-minute wait time, but there would be added a 10-minute walk from Bell Circle to the Wonderland Station. There would be no changes for the weekend service on Route 455.

The Better Bus Project is the first step in efforts to improve bus service and the system as a whole. It is a key part of a \$8 billion modernization work, which includes replacing subway fleets, upgrading tracks, signals, and switches, reinventing our bus system to reflect changing demographics, replacing our fare collection system, and bringing all of our assets to a state of good repair.

“During the analysis period, we reached out to the communities most impacted by gaps in service and schedules. This included discussions at regional public meetings and meetings with community groups and stakeholders, through feedback submitted to our online survey, and by speaking with riders at bus stops and stations,” said MBTA spokesman Kenneth Green.

SENIOR'S PROPERTY TAX APPLICATION DUE APRIL 1

Mayor Brian Arrigo reminds everyone that the April 1 application deadline for the Senior's Property Tax exemption is fast approaching.

Seniors can receive a discount of \$502.06 on their April tax bill. Residents who turned age 65 as of July 1, 2018 have until April 1 to apply for the exemption.

To qualify, an applicant must have owned the property in Revere on July 1, 2018, used it as a principle domicile on that date, and have owned that property as a principle domicile for at least five years prior. Applicants may also have owned another property in Massachusetts as a principle domicile for the previous five years. Applicants whose income exceeded \$57,000 in calendar year 2017 are not eligible.

Applications for the Senior Tax Exemption program can be obtained at City Hall in the Mayor's and the Assessors' office, or can be downloaded from the City's website www.revere.org.

ARRIGO ANNOUNCES EXPANSION OF RECYCLING PROGRAM

Mayor Brian Arrigo announced this week that the City of Revere has partnered with Simple Recycling to provide free curbside pickup of discarded clothing, textiles, and small household items.

“This is one more important step toward conservation and environmental protection,” said Mayor Arrigo. “There are zero costs to our city and residents, and meanwhile the program removes potentially hundreds of tons of materials from our ordinary trash disposal stream.”

Revere residents will soon receive two “pink bags” that they can fill with unwanted clothing, jewelry, shoes, toys, blankets, drapes, pillows, and assorted small household items. Residents simply place the bag next to their recycling bin during regular recycling weeks, and a Simple Recycling vehicle will pick it up and leave a replacement bag for future use.

Residents can obtain more bags, or notify the company of a missed pick-up, with a simple request through Simple Recyclings' website simplerecycling.com. The program provides dual financial benefits for the City. Since Revere pays “tipping fees” for trash disposal, reducing the amount of material dumped at the RESCO incinerator, the fees are reduced. Beyond

that, Simple Recycling pays a fee to the city for each ton collected.

It is estimated that nationwide, some 14.3 million tons of clothing ends up in landfills. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency estimates that across the country, an average of 85 pounds per person of textile items end up in the municipal trash. Through the Simple Recycling program, materials are sorted and either re-used or processed for raw material.

Resident can expect to receive their “pink bags” and informational fliers in the mail within the next two weeks. Anyone who has not received their bags can request them through the SimpleRecycling website.

Simple Recycling is based in Solon, Ohio. Currently, they serve more than 4 million households across the country. Revere joins 19 other Massachusetts communities where the program is in place, including Saugus, Medford, Somerville, Brookline, Burlington, and Natick, among others.

EASTIE MAN HITS, INJURES MASSDOT WORKER IN REVERE AFTER CARJACKING UBER DRIVER

Several minutes after midnight last Thursday, an Uber driver's car that had been carjacked a few minutes earlier crashed into the rear of a Massachusetts Department of Transportation pickup truck on Route 1 northbound near the Sargent Street exit in Revere. The DOT employee, a 52-year-old Revere man, was

stepping out of the truck at the time of the collision and suffered serious but non-life threatening injuries. The driver of the Civic tried to run from the scene but was apprehended by Massachusetts State Police Trooper Devon Surian.

At the time of the crash, the DOT pickup truck was pulling an electronic arrow board to support Troopers who were already at that location for a previous crash involving an impaired driver. Trooper Surian was backing up another Trooper at that earlier OUI arrest scene when the crash occurred and he apprehended the suspect, who was determined to be under the influence of narcotics.

The suspect, Matthew Ricco Tyra, 29, of East Boston, allegedly carjacked the Uber car, a 2017 Honda Civic, a short time earlier in the area of Route 1 at Route 16. The Uber driver was a 29-year-old Revere man.

Tyra was transported to State Police-Revere, where he was booked on numerous charges, including carjacking; OUI drugs; assault with a dangerous weapon; assault and battery on a police officer; and negligent operation. He was held overnight and arraigned in Chelsea District Court.

The DOT worker was transported to Melrose-Wakefield Hospital for treatment.

Neighborhood Developers to host Board Leadership Boot Camp

After having a successful debut in Chelsea last year, The Neighborhood Developers (TND) is bringing its Board Leadership Boot Camp to Revere beginning Thursday, March 7 at Revere High School.

Mayor Brian Arrigo and Sen. Joseph Boncore will be the featured speakers at the opening session.

Kyla Alterman, Revere community engagement manager for TND, and Vincente Sanabria, director of community engagement and collective impact, will lead the four Thursday night sessions where members of non-profit organizations and local residents can learn about fundraising, reading a budget, leadership, board functions, governance, and meeting skills.

The last session of Boot

Camp will include a networking night with local boards and organizations.

"We did the first Boot Camp in Chelsea and this year we're having it in Revere," said Alterman, noting that TND headquarters are on Gerrish Avenue in Chelsea, but there are TND office locations at all of its properties in Revere.

Alterman said more than 50 people attended the Boot Camp in Chelsea. Between 50-60 people are scheduled to participate in the Revere Boot Camp.

"The idea of the Boot Camp is to help train local residents to take a more active role in their community through leadership on non-profits board or in city government," said Alterman. "The goal is to inspire and also prepare them to seek out those opportunities. We also help connect residents to these opportunities. The purpose is to engage more local participation in non-profits in Revere."

Revere High athletic program will leave the Northeastern Conference

Fourteen years ago Revere Schools left the Greater Boston League for the Northeastern Conference (NEC), something many coaches past and present thought was a mistake.

Less than two years later the GBL was a shell of its former self with only four teams making up the entire league after Revere's departure.

"It was left with only Malden, Medford, Somerville and Everett," said Revere School Athletic Director Frank Shea. "Four schools really doesn't make a competitive league. The teams and kids that were left were forced to play against one another, had a hard time filling schedules and attracting players."

Two years ago the NEC principals decided to allow the GBL teams into the NEC through a pilot program with some provisos. One proviso stated that the four teams

would be accepted but the NEC principals would reconvene in four years and decide whether or not the pilot program was working.

However, Shea said administrators at some of the NEC schools who were replaced with principals that were not in favor of the pilot program caused a stir.

"Instead of waiting the four years they pushed the vote up to this past January and voted 7 to 5 to throw the schools out of the league," said Shea.

Shea, with the backing of Revere School Superintendent Dianne Kelly, drew a line in the sand. After the ousting of the four GBL schools, Shea submitted a letter to the NEC principals stating Revere desire to leave the NEC.

Last Friday the NEC principals voted to allow Revere to leave the NEC on June 30. The only proviso placed on Revere's departure is that the football program will have

to remain in the NEC for the next two years.

"Many in the community were well aware that we (Revere Schools) have been contemplating departing the NEC to rejoin some of the districts we use to compete with in the Greater Boston League and establish a re-envisioned GBL," said Supt. Kelly.

Shea testified at the last Revere School Committee meeting that in the short time that the GBL teams were part of the NEC, something became very clear.

"Over the course of those two years as our teams competed against one another I noticed that we shared many things in common," said Shea. "In terms of the size of the (sports) programs, the types of programs offered, the enrollment, the diversity, the culture, it was all very similar to our schools and our programs. So I had discussions with current and former Revere coach-

es about leaving the NEC and the one thing they kept saying was 'we should have never left'."

As for the proviso that Revere football has to stay in NEC, Shea said that was something he expected.

"The biggest problem with the move was football because football schedules are made six to nine months in advance," said Shea. "It's very difficult to get non-league football opponents. So when I met with the NEC athletic directors, I said, 'if you let us go with the GBL we'd be willing to keep our football program in the NEC for one more year.'"

In the end the NEC athletic directors took Shea's proposal to the NEC voting principals, but the voting members decided it was best for Revere to remain in the NEC for not just one, but two full years.

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

Revere fares well in first major snowstorm

The month of March truly came in like a lion as Revere residents faced late-winter snow in the form of back-to-back storms over the weekend and into Monday.

After getting 5 inches of snow on Saturday, Mother Nature brought close to a foot more of the white stuff during a storm that started late Sunday and continued through Monday afternoon.

Revere Supt. of Schools Dianne Kelly heeded the forecasters' warnings and made the decision to call off school for Monday, making the "no-school" call early Sunday.

From all reports, the Revere DPW drew high marks for their snowplowing and street-clearing efforts. The amount of snow exceeded the predictions of most TV meteorologists' who looked for 6-9 inches of snow in the Boston area.

Mayor Brian Arrigo said he was proud of the DPW, 311, and public safety personnel for their efforts in keeping Revere residents safe and getting the streets ready quickly for vehicular traffic.

"As our students enjoyed their first snow day of the year, our DPW, 311, and public safety personnel were hard at work during the snowstorm,"

said Arrigo. "I'm proud of our team's diligent effort, working tirelessly around the clock to make sure our roadways were clear and safe for residents."

Mayor Arrigo also acknowledged the efforts of Revere 311, an instrumental department during snow events. "Our 311 Call Center received a record number of calls on Monday, responding to 334 calls," said Arrigo. "It's important residents continue to utilize this service so we can accommodate the needs of as many residents as possible. More importantly, it helps us identify areas in the storm that may need more attention."

Ward 4 Councillor Patrick Keefe lauded the DPW's efforts, stating that their efforts throughout the storm were "terrific."

"Like most seasons, that

first major snowstorm always catches everyone off guard, but they [DPW] did a terrific job with this storm," said Keefe. "I live on the hills and the plows were here early and often. You can always judge by the number of calls you get, and I didn't receive one negative call on this last storm, and

this was the biggest storm of the season."

Spring is just around the corner with its official start on March 20. Another sign that the seasons are changing is the start of Daylight Savings Time this Sunday (March 10) at 2 a.m., with residents set to move their clocks ahead one

hour.

And finally, another sign spring is approaching: the Red Sox open their regular season on March 28 in Seattle, while the real sign that spring is here: Opening Day at Fenway Park is April 9.

Affordable housing units are slated for Revere

Last week, Gov. Charlie Baker, Lt. Gov. Karyn Polito, Housing and Economic Development Secretary Mike Kennealy, and Housing and Community Development Undersecretary Janelle Chan announced support the creation of 643 new rental housing units in the Commonwealth, including 397 units of affordable housing.

Some of those units will be built in Revere by The Neighborhood Developers (TND) at 571 Revere St.

The planned development is a 51-unit, mixed-income new construction project located near the beach and Waterfront Square.

"These will be the only affordable housing units in that area," said Rafael Mares, executive director of TND. "We feel this is a nice compliment to Waterfront Square."

The Neighborhood Developers currently has 86 housing units in Revere. Department of Housing and Community Development is supporting the project with federal and state low-income housing tax credits as well as subsidy funds.

The City of Revere also is supporting the project with lo-

cal funding. When completed, the project will offer 32 affordable rental units and 19 workforce rental units. Units will range from one-three bedroom units.

The awards represent an investment by the administration through more than \$45 million in direct subsidy, and the allocation of more than \$22 million in state and federal low-income housing tax credits.

"We will continue investing in the production and preservation of affordable housing here in Massachusetts to meet the needs of residents across the income spectrum and support the continued growth of our economy," said Gov. Charlie Baker. "Since 2015, we've infused more than \$1 billion in the affordable housing ecosystem, from new production to the rehabilitation of existing private and public housing stock, and we look forward to working with our partners in the Legislature to pass our Housing Choice Legislation into law, which will help communities advance new housing production and facilitate long-term, forward-thinking planning."

LET'S CLOSE THE LOOPHOLE IN STATE LAW TO END HUMAN TRAFFICKING

The recent national news stories concerning a massage parlor in Jupiter, Fla., have brought to light what is nothing less than a national abomination: The trafficking of women that reaches into every corner of the United States.

The news stories about this 21st century version of human bondage have made it clear that huge numbers of women, mostly Asian, are being trafficked in a multi-billion dollar sex trade operation under the guise of legitimate massage parlors.

Here in Massachusetts, it is estimated that there are 200-300 of these illicit "business" entities -- almost one for every city and town in the Commonwealth. Just this past week, police in the well-to-do community of Norwell came upon one of these places (which was located in an otherwise-ordinary mall) and, upon executing a search warrant, discovered conditions almost identical to what authorities found in Jupiter.

There were mattresses on the floor and other indicia of living that made it clear that those who worked there also were residing on the premises as prisoners of the operators of this establishment.

How can this situation -- sex slavery in which women from all around the world are being trafficked in our hometowns -- exist so openly in America in 2019?

It seems to us there is a fairly simple solution to the problem that can be accomplished with a small change in the law, at least here in Massachusetts, which is as follows:

The signage on the front window of the Jupiter establishment lists the following services: "Massage therapy, facials, waxing, table showers", and this one: "Body treatments."

Massachusetts tightly regulates the massage therapy business pursuant to chapter 112, section 228, which requires massage therapists to receive training and obtain a license.

However, the last line of this statute exempts from the licensing requirements "those who use the terms 'bodywork', 'body-worker', and 'bodywork therapist'."

It's as if the traffickers themselves wrote this loophole into the law. The women who were found in the Norwell establishment (who, similar to the women in Jupiter, were Chinese citizens and spoke no English) when the police conducted the raid identified themselves as "bodyworkers" and as such did not require any licensing requirements either from the state or local authorities. It's as if they did not exist.

In our view, the solution is straightforward: Require every person (including receptionists) who works in these establishments to obtain a permit (as opposed to a license) in order to work there. Such persons would be required to register at the local Board of Health where they would have to appear in person, produce a valid ID, and provide their place of residence in order to get their permit.

Routine spot checks by the local boards would ensure that everyone working there has a valid permit from the local authority. If anyone is found working there without a permit, the business would be ordered closed forthwith and the managers, as well as the owners, would be subject to arrest and criminal penalties for employing persons without permits.

In our view, this small change in Massachusetts law, if emulated across the country, could go a long way toward ending the human trafficking business that is a national disgrace.

MARCH: IN LIKE A LION

Just when all of us were counting the days to the beginning of spring -- known as the vernal equinox, which this year falls on Wednesday, March 20, at 5:58 p.m. -- Ol' Man Winter struck with a vengeance, bringing a double-snow storm this past weekend followed by frigid temperatures to start the week.

Up until the past two weeks, this winter season had been mostly underwhelming in the Greater Boston area in terms of both snowfall and temperature. However, in our lifetimes, this often has been the case: A January and February that have been fairly easy to take, only to be followed by a March that begins with brutal weather.

A quick peek at the 10-day forecast revealed that after the brief appearance of cold weather, temperatures will return to normal for this time of year through St. Patrick's Day.

The weather always has fallen into that category of what former Secretary of Defense Donald Rumsfeld famously referred to as "known unknowns" -- that is to say, we know there are some things we do not know."


However, in this era of climate change, the other part of Rumsfeld's quote, "But there are also unknown unknowns -- the ones we don't know we don't know," is applicable.

To put it another way, who knows what Mother Nature has in store for us these days? Perhaps more than anything else in our lives, we just have to take the weather one day at a time.

10 years ago March 4, 2009

The unemployment rate continues to climb locally and nationally as the deep recession continues to hit America and the world. The unemployment rate locally increased by 1.1 percent in December to a new rate of 7.6 percent, which is greater than the national unemployment rate of 7.2 percent. This figure is two full points more than the unemployment rate a year earlier.

It is unclear to city officials and residents how the recent acquisition of Bank of Boston by Fleet Bank will affect Bank of Boston's local branches.

30 years ago March 8, 1989

Francis X. Cotter, a 1960 graduate of Immaculate Conception High School, will be ordained into the priesthood in the Order of Discalced Carmelites in St. Theresa's Church this Sunday by Cardinal Bernard Law.

Community Development Director Frank Strong said this week that the city has a tentative plan to move the police from their present dilapidated station on Pleasant St. to the P.F. O'Connor building on American Legion Highway.

40 years ago March 7, 1979

A 19-year-old Everett man and a 23-year-old Everett mother are being held on charges of first-degree murder and robbery for the slaying of Leo Miller in Revere last Oct. 25.

Sixteen RHS students and a teacher are headed to Washington, D.C., to take part in the Close-Up program for one week.

Police Chief Goerge P. Corbett has announced his retirement, effective April 1. Corbett has served in the local department for 30 years. Corbett, 54, said, "The job is getting on my nerves." Corbett has served as chief of the 117-man department since 1970. He said the biggest change he has seen in his 30 years with the department is the rapid turnover of police officers, of whom too many, he said, go out with injuries and disabilities.

50 years ago March 5, 1969

Chaos, name calling, and shouting erupted at the School Committee's meeting this week when the committee took up the matter of naming Whelan School Principal William S. Hill as the Acting Superintendent of Schools.

The Revere Housing Authority held a hot session, taking up the matters of electing William Petrilli as the new chairman, raising monthly rents at the veterans housing from \$40 per month to \$48 per month for a three-bedroom unit, and approving legal bills submitted by Exec. Director Carl Hyman for the legal battle he recently fought to prevent his attempted removal from office last April by certain RHS members.

60 years ago March 5, 1959

The annual report of the Planning Board asserts that the future prosperity of the city hinges on the City Manager and City Council adopting the Master Plan submitted last year that calls for the

The construction of the Ward 4 elementary school, for which the City Council approved a \$575,000 bond last week, has a target completion date of April, 1960.

The New England Telephone and Telegraph Co. is installing modern dialing telephone equipment in the new phone company building on Beach St. opposite the library. The automatic dialing system is scheduled to go into effect in Revere in November. New conductor phone lines that will handle the new system will amount to 108,000,000 conductor feet.

70 years ago March 10, 1949





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Goldberg releases new unclaimed property listings

Massachusetts State Treasurer Deborah Goldberg today announced the latest grouping of names that have been added to the state's list of unclaimed property owners. Over 45,000 new properties worth millions of dollars are owed to individuals and businesses throughout the Commonwealth.

"We currently hold over \$3.4 billion in unclaimed property at Treasury and it could be yours," said Treasurer Deborah Goldberg. "One in ten Massachusetts residents are owed money. Call our office today to begin the claims process."

Unclaimed property includes forgotten savings and checking accounts, uncashed checks, insurance policy proceeds, stocks, dividends, and the contents of unattended safe deposit boxes. Most accounts are considered abandoned and are turned over to the state after three years of inactivity. Last year, Treasury processed over 123,000 claims and returned over \$125

million in property to its rightful owners.

This newly released list includes only individuals and businesses with unclaimed property over \$100. Treasurer Goldberg urged all citizens to check the comprehensive list for all amounts at www.find-massmoney.com or call our live call center at 888-344-MASS (6277).

The full list of the new individuals and businesses added to the unclaimed property list will be published in the Boston Globe on March 3 and the Herald on March 10. In addition, the list of names will be published in over 30 regional and local papers.

The Treasury releases an updated list of unclaimed property assets every six months as the new accounts are turned over to the Commonwealth. There is no time limit for a person to claim this property and, in many cases, claimants will receive interest.

would also insure that they're running a proper establishment."

Keefe said that there are five new hotels coming to Revere "and to say we want to have a hotel industry in our city and then allow anyone to circumvent that with an Airbnb - that doesn't really protect

"It's hard to court the hotel business and tell them to spend millions of dollars to construct new hotels and say, 'oh by the way, we're going to allow someone to pay no taxes to operate [Airbnb properties] near you with zero regulations.'"




have strong ties to the local youth soccer community, will also host two regular season matches, at Hormel Stadium.

HIGH RENTS DRIVING STUDENTS FROM SCHOOLS

CHELSEA - Supt. Mary Bourque said that for the first time in decades, more students are leaving the Chelsea Public Schools (CPS) than are coming in - an exodus of students that seems to be heading mostly to Lynn.

"We've always had more students coming in from certain communities than students leaving Chelsea for those communities," said Bourque this week. "Since July, we're seeing the inverse. We have more going out to the four communities of Lynn, Revere, Everett and Boston...A few years ago, we were seeing an influx of students from outside of the country. We're seeing the reverse. We're not seeing that influx from out of the country, and we're actually seeing the exodus of our families more to the North Shore communities. The movement is more to the North Shore. I think it's linked to housing and affordability."

According to CPS data, from July 1, 2019 through Feb. 14 - 257 Chelsea students left for other communities in Massachusetts. Of the 257, the largest pattern saw 29 going to Boston; 35 going to Everett; 44 going to Lynn; and 34 going to Revere. Those are places that, historically, Bourque said usually leak more students to Chelsea than Chelsea loses to them. That trend has changed now.

The root cause could come for multiple reasons, but Bourque said she firmly believes it all comes down to the drastic rise in rents and housing costs in Chelsea.

"I do believe it's the rising rental properties around the community," she said. "Right now, Chelsea is experiencing it just like, if not more so, than other communities. We're losing many, many families. I'm seeing documents of many, many families going to Lynn in particular. Lynn seems to be the most popular destination for families being able to find rental properties. Secondly, they are going to Revere, Everett and Boston."

Bourque, who has studied student mobility in depth during her career, said many studies have indicated over the years that student population is a bellwether for the changes that are coming to a community.

In Chelsea, she said she believes this latest trend in student population could be sounding an alarm for the community to try to take ac-

tion. "This is definitely something we have to pay attention to," she said. "The demographics in our schools are telling of what is coming to the community at-large. We're the canary in the coal mine for community shift. I see it as a positive though because we can look at it and get out in front so we can be prepared to meet the needs of that shift."

A consequence of that loss is that the CPS budget is likely going to shrink due to the smaller enrollments.

"We already have an issue with the Foundation Budget at the state level being broken, and it still needs to be fixed," she said. "We still need to advocate for that. At the same time, we have a confounding situation where we're losing student enrollment that results in a natural decrease in staffing and resources due to that lower student enrollment. The challenge will be keeping those two budgetary issues separate and not allowing them to blend together. They are two different issues."

Bourque said the situation reminds her of what Somerville Public Schools went through some years ago as it gentrified on the back of Cambridge's successes. At one point, she said she recalled they had somewhere around 6,000 students enrolled in the public schools, but as that City changed, the numbers dwindled down to around 4,000. She said Chelsea should fight to keep that from happening here.

Looking for a wave from Venezuela, Brazil

Chelsea has always had a reputation and a practice of having open arms to refugees and new immigrant populations.

Now, as new immigrant families seem to be migrating a bit towards the North Shore, Supt. Mary Bourque said they are keeping an eye on Brazil and Venezuela as potential sources of incoming students.

Bourque said immigrant groups from crisis areas of the world typically begin showing up in Chelsea schools about 10 to 15 months after the crisis in their countries.

With the recent political upheaval in Venezuela with its leadership, she said the federal government is considering giving Temporary Protected Status (TPS) to Venezuelans. That, she said, could result in more students arriving from that country soon.

"It will be interesting to wait and see if we get an influx from Venezuela," she

said. "It usually happens 15 to 18 months after a crisis. We'll watch to see if this summer enrollments begin to come in from that country."

In Brazil, she said a down economy has already brought a trickling of new Brazilian students to the district.

CITY MANAGER OUTLINES ACCOMPLISHMENTS

CHELSEA - Fresh off of a new contract, City Manager Tom Ambrosino gave an enthusiastic opening to city council meeting during his State of the City Address, where he talked about Chelsea's accomplishments in 2018, as well as its goals for 2019.

"I feel confident in saying that the state of our City of Chelsea is very good indeed," he started.

Among the achievements of the past year, Ambrosino noted that the City ended 2018 with an excess of \$28 million in its coffers.

"There's not another city our size in the entire Commonwealth with that level of reserves," he said. "That is a testament to the shrewd financial planning of City Council."

In 2018, Chelsea was also one of only 35 cities in the country to be awarded a Bloomberg Challenge grant for their vision to reduce crime with preventative care.

"Because of that award, our model of predicting harm and then engaging in cross-sector collaboration to address the harm got national attention," said Ambrosino. "It's gaining interest and it has people seeking to replicate that, not just in Massachusetts, but outside as well."

Ambrosino cited the City's increased development in 2018, such as the construction of two new hotels and the multi-million dollar expansion of a pharmaceutical company. He also mentioned the \$10 million grant by the state to reconstruct Broadway from City Hall to the Revere Line, as well as a \$3 million federal Economic Development Administration (EDA) grant to renovate Chelsea's waterfront, one of the largest grants given by the EDA to any municipality in the country in 2018, and one of the grants issued in Massachusetts.

"We kept our promises to our residents in 2018 by doing good services," Ambrosino reflected. "I think we can achieve the same level of success in 2019 if we have the same level of collaboration

from City Council."

In terms of goals for 2019, Ambrosino highlighted the effort to renovate the downtown Chelsea area, building on the foundational work done in 2018.

"We added police, social services, more lighting, decorative banners, public art," he said. "We've created an atmosphere and foundation for success, so what we need to do now is finalize the work that remains."

Ambrosino outlined four areas of improvement for downtown Chelsea: finalizing the design for the infrastructure improvements for one-way schemes, adopting the necessary zoning permissions to improve the facade of the corridor, offering a rich array of cultural and artistic activities, and submitting a request for proposal (RFP) for the redevelopment of the former Salvation Army site.

The City Manager threw his support behind the Forbes Proposal, which is up before the City Board of Appeals next month for the redevelopment of the Chelsea waterfront, claiming that it will include affordable condominiums for Chelsea residents looking to become homeowners.

Ambrosino also mentioned the planned infrastructure and capital improvements for 2019, including work to the Chelsea Greenway, the Chelsea Garden Cemetery and Veterans' Field. This would all be in the context of a master plan, the first of its kind in Chelsea since the 1970s.

The City Manager emphasized the importance of investing in affordable housing as well as in education,

specifically for grants to allow high-achieving, low-income high school students in Chelsea to attend Bunker Hill Community College free of charge.

"This idea of public funding for education beyond just high school is gaining momentum in this nation," he said. "We can feel a sense of pride that Chelsea is in the forefront of that movement."

FORESTEIRE LEAVES HOUSING AUTHORITY

EVERETT - With the charges against former Supt. Fred Foresteire leveled last week, new attention immediately was brought to his service on the Everett Housing Authority (EHA) board, and news traveled fast that Foresteire quietly had resigned from that seat recently.

In a letter dated Feb. 13, Foresteire indicated he would resign from the Board effective Feb. 15.

Foresteire has been on the EHA board as the governor's appointment for some time, and has served for many governors, including Gov. Charlie Baker.

In conversations earlier this year, upon learning of the allegations against Foresteire, the Independent inquired of Foresteire's EHA seat. The governor's office at the time said they have heard of the investigations into Foresteire, but they cannot unilaterally remove Foresteire.

"Gov. Baker believes there should be zero tolerance for sexual harassment, especially in our schools, and the admin-

istration supports a full and thorough investigation of the matter in a timely fashion," said Brendan Moss of the governor's office.

The legal process for removing someone from a local Housing Authority board calls for several steps before one can be removed. The responsibility for getting the process started and removing members lies with the City Council and the mayor.

They are empowered to "make and receive... written charges against any member of a housing or redevelopment authority in such city or town appointed by the department [of housing and community development]," read the state law.

If there are written charges, it lies upon the mayor and City Council to refer those charges, which now exist in the Foresteire case, to the Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD), as well as the governor's office.

The law says the standard for which a member must adhere to include: "inefficiency, neglect of duty or misconduct in office."

The member must also be given notice and opportunity for a hearing on his or her removal.

However, with the resignation, none of that process was necessary.

MIDDLESEX DA CHARGES FORESTEIRE WITH SEVERAL COUNTS

EVERETT - Former Supt. Fred Foresteire has been

charged with seven counts of assault and battery for allegedly inappropriately touching three female Everett Public Schools (EPS) employees.

Middlesex District Attorney Marian Ryan and Police Chief Steven Mazzie announced the charges last week, noting that Foresteire, 75, will be arraigned on April 4 in Malden District Court.

The charges were born out of a controversy that surfaced around Thanksgiving last year when Foresteire was accused of sexual harassment by a former EPS employee, Andrea Garay. Garay filed a complaint with the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination (MCAD). That launched an investigation into that and other incidents, and led to the sudden retirement of Foresteire in December after more than 50 years on the job in Everett.

DA Ryan stated that Foresteire was charged with the following crimes:
 •Indecent assault and battery on a person over the age of 60.
 •Assault and Battery.
 •And, five counts of indecent assault and battery on a person over the age of 14.

The seven counts were focused on three victims, Ryan said, all of whom were EPS employees who were known to him.

An attorney that represented Foresteire before the School Committee, from Spruce Law, did not return a phone call seeking comment.

Mayor Carlo DeMaria declined to comment on the charges.

School Committee Chair

Tom Abruzzese said he couldn't comment immediately on the charges, but said they would be "stunning" if true. He said they would likely be calling a special meeting in the near future to discuss the next steps.

That came quickly, as the City's website had posted at 11:53 a.m. an emergency meeting for Tuesday at 8 p.m., beyond Independent deadlines, for an executive session "to investigate charges of criminal misconduct."

That meeting was not expected to be in open session, and it was called for by Interim Supt. Janice Gauthier.

Attorney Tara Swartz, who represents some of the victims, including Garay, did not return a phone call seeking comment.

The Massachusetts Teachers Association, nor the Everett Teachers Association, were immediately available for comment as well.

DA Ryan reminded these charges are allegations and the defendant is presumed innocent until proven guilty.





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

sumer programs helped secured more than \$3.7 million in relief for consumers. Some examples of consumer assistance provided by the AG's Office in 2018 include:

- Assisting an elderly consumer facing foreclosure. CARD staff successfully got the foreclosure date postponed and provided the consumer with time to apply for a loan modification.

- Helping to clear a consumer of a fraudulent wireless phone bill totaling nearly \$5,300. The consumer was contacted by the carrier for more than a year even though he repeatedly told them that he never had an account with them. With CARD's assistance, the carrier confirmed that the consumer did not owe the debt and corrected his credit.

- Assisting in getting an auto purchase rescinded after a consumer discovered within days of purchasing it that her car was a lemon. CARD contacted the finance company that originated the auto loan, and the company unwound the deal, offered to correct the consumer's credit report, and ceased doing business with the dealership.

- Coordinating the delivery of 100 gallons of oil, paid for by Elder Services of Cape Cod and the Islands Inc. and delivered by Guard Oil, to a senior without heat. Guard Oil also serviced the furnace at no charge.

- Working with a hotel chain to compensate consumers after a spa in one of their Boston locations closed abruptly. Consumers who filed complaints with the AG's Office received credits at the spa slated to replace the one that closed or at the hotel for a total value of \$6,158.

In addition to direct assistance, the AG's Office investigates and litigates violations of the state's consumer protection laws. In 2018, the AG's Office secured refunds for 20,000 consumers from Comcast, \$4 million in relief from a national mortgage servicing company, \$450,000 in restitution and penalties from used auto dealership in Westport, and nearly \$50,000 for student borrowers from a student loan "debt relief" company that charged unnecessary and unlawful fees.

Consumers with problems are encouraged to contact CARD's consumer specialists at 617-727-8400 or file a complaint on the AG's website. The AG's Office also has an Elder Hotline at 888-243-5337, which operates as part of CARD and is staffed by trained specialists who are knowledgeable about problems that are more common for older Massachusetts residents. The AG's Office also encourages student borrowers to contact the Student Loan Assistance Unit at 888-830-6277 for help.
