WE'RE BUILDING A PLAYGROUND Paul Revere students help with design of new facility

When the students at the Paul Revere School return from their summer vacation on Aug. 27, they will find a newly rebuilt playground located behind the school.

And it's likely that they will like the design very much: the students themselves helped with the design of the playground, having submitted

drawings for the new playground during a "Design Day" Monday in the school library.

Mayor Brian Arrigo and Project Manager Elle Baker joined representatives from KaBoom! And Keurig Dr. Pepper at the design session for the playground, which is named Consiglio Della Russo Park.

The playground is the result of the city's partnership

with KaBoom!, a national non-profit dedicated to providing children with a safe and exciting to play, and Keurig Dr. Pepper (the K-Cups king and the soda company merged one year ago), who is the funding sponsor for the project as part of its "Let's Play" initiative launched in 2011 that promotes active play for

Farmers' Market set to begin on July 12

The Grand Opening of the Revere's Farmers' Market will take place Friday from 12 noon to 6 p.m. with a special ribbon cutting at 12:30 p.m. to mark the fifth year of the market's existence on the American Legion lawn at 249 Broadway.

The Revere Farmers' Market is an initiative of Revere on the Move, a collaboration between the city of Revere's Healthy Community Initiatives department and the MGH Revere CARES Coalition.

Dimple Rana, director of Healthy Community Initiatives, is pleased to announce extended hours to 6 p.m. to

accommodate more people and the inclusion of more farmers. The market runs every Friday until October.

"There will be music, games, face painting, popcorn, and food for the kids," Rana said, adding that there is special summer meals program from noon to 1:30 p.m. for kids up to the age of 18.

For the second year in a row the farm manager is Britney Soa, a recent Revere High School grad bound for UMass-Lowell.

Farmers taking part in the market include Farmer Dave, Flats Mentor Farm, Arrowhead Farm and Riverdale Farm. Also returning are Eloti

THE LIGHTS ARE ON Councillor McKenna, Speaker DeLeo team up for safety on RB Parkway

Ward 1 Councillor Joanne McKenna started her personal crusade 18 months ago to fix the lights on the Rita Singer Bridge after hearing from a parent of a 20-year-old daughter who had to walk daily from Beachmont Station over the bridge to her apartment.

"It was dark and the young lady was afraid to cross over the bridge because of the fact there were no lights," recalled McKenna.

Following the December, 2018 tragedy in which two children were killed on Revere Beach Parkway, McKenna stepped up her efforts concerning the lighting problems on the entire parkway.

McKenna conducted her own survey and learned that 17 lights in total were mal-

functioning on the Parkway. She brought her concerns to a Revere City Council meeting where she blasted National Grid officials.

"The [Revere] Journal put a story about it on the front page," said McKenna. "Speaker [Robert] DeLeo read it and said, 'We're going to fix all these lights.'" "Within a three-week period, all the lights on the Parkway were fixed."

McKenna was crucial to the effort by taking down the lighting pole numbers and submitting those numbers to Speaker DeLeo's office. DeLeo reached out to State Highway Department and National Grid officials and the situation was taken care of very quickly.

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Councillor Powers submits his nomination papers

Ward 5 Councillor John Powers submitted his nomination papers to the Revere Election Department Monday at City Hall.

Powers is seeking re-election to the seat in this fall's municipal election. Eric Lampedecchio, candidate for the Ward 5 seat, has also submitted his papers to the Election Department.

Powers and Lampedecchio last faced off in the 2017 election, with Powers receiving 844 votes and Lampedecchio receiving 690 votes.

The deadline for submitting nomination papers is July 23. Revere Election Commis-

At-Large Council candidate Dimple Rana takes part in Unfairhikes protest

Last week, candidate for Revere At-Large Councillor Dimple Rana and her supporters were at Beachmont T Station talking to commuters and taking selfies as part of a system-wide day of action organized by Boston City Councilor Michelle Wu to protest the T's fare hike and demand investments to make the MBTA more reliable. Rana was the only candidate for office in Revere to participate in the action, joining more than 50 candidates and elected officials and hundreds of volunteers taking action at MBTA bus, commuter rail, and subway stations across Massachusetts. Rana was not the only candidate standing out at a Blue Line station, with East Boston's City Councilor Lydia Edwards, and East Boston's State Rep. Adrian Madaro both at Maverick Station on Monday morning.

When asked why she was participating, Rana responded: "Traffic is the biggest issue I hear about whether I'm at work or on the campaign trail, and in Revere we know that the T's fare hike will force commuters off the T, into cars, and onto Revere's highways and side streets. I'm participating in today's protest because to tackle traffic, Revere needs to stand up for a more reliable, affordable T." Rana greeted dozens of commuters, handing out flyers about what riders could do to take action, and posting pictures with several T riders on

her campaign's social media accounts, including one with Revere resident, current Suffolk County Register of Probate, and T Commuter Felix D. Arroyo.

Rana pointed to community and rider representation as the top reform she wanted to see from the MBTA, saying, "Revere paid more than \$3.5 million to the MBTA in the FY 2019 budget on top of the fares paid by thousands of Revere residents every day, and yet Revere has no say in how the system is run, or what it prioritizes. As a City Councilor, I'm going to demand that Revere and our T riders have a seat at the table as decisions that have such a huge impact on our community are made."

BONCORE HELPS PASS BILL TO PROTECT PUBLIC UNIONS

Last week Sen. Joseph Boncore and the Massachusetts Senate passed An Act Relative to Collective Bargaining Dues.

The bill helps protect a public unions' ability to effectively represent all workers in labor agreements following the U.S. Supreme Court ruling in the case Janus v. AFSCME.

"Today's vote, which comes exactly one year after the misguided Janus ruling by the U.S. Supreme Court, makes clear that the Senate will always put working families of Massachusetts first," said Senate President Karen E. Spilka (D-Ashland). "Public workers are the backbone of our economy and deserve the ability to fight for fair wages, access affordable health care and work in safe conditions. I look forward to seeing this legislation become law."

In its 5-4 ruling, the U.S. Supreme Court weakened the ability of public sector unions to advocate for workers — both members and non-members — in contractual and collective bargaining activities. The decision significantly limited a union's authority to charge fees of non-members, potentially cutting off critical resources used in the effort to fairly represent all workers at the negotiating table.

"The Constitutional right to organize and collectively bargain is a basic tenant of our democracy. Last year, conservative activists on the Supreme Court curbed this right in the Janus decision," said Transportation Committee Chair Sen. Joseph Boncore (D-Winthrop), who sponsored a version of the legislation last session. "Today, the Senate corrected this injustice and took action to ensure workers across the Commonwealth

have the ability to fight for a better quality of life for their families."

An Act Relative to Collective Bargaining Dues would enable public sector unions to charge reasonable fees of non-members for costs related to representation. The decision to charge workers who choose not to pay union dues would be optional and left to the organization's discretion. The legislation would also ensure the union has access to appropriate worker contact information and codifies a union's ability to meet with newly hired employees on worksites.

After enactment by the House and Senate, the legislation moves on to the Governor's desk.

HELP SHAPE THE FUTURE OF REVERE

The City of Revere and the Metropolitan Area Planning Council (MAPC) continue their comprehensive master planning process, and launched an online survey to gather community feedback on the public's vision for what Revere could look like in the future. The survey is part of Next Stop Revere, a master plan that will help shape the City's policy, project, and budget decisions for the next 15 to 20 years.

"We are thrilled with the high level of community involvement and feedback thus far" said Mayor Brian Arrigo. "This master planning process gives us the opportunity to define what our city looks like for future generations. Your feedback is invaluable and we encourage all residents to check out the survey."

The master plan will guide the future physical and economic development of Revere based on the community's vision and goals. The survey includes questions about how the town could change in the next two decades in regards to transportation, housing, economic development, public services, recreation, and more. The online survey will take about 10-20 minutes to complete and can be accessed at mapc.ma/revere.

There will be several other opportunities to participate in the planning process, including focus groups and pop-ups at community events throughout the summer and fall. Keep track of upcoming events at dashboards.mysidewalk.com/next-stop-revere/schedule-documents.

children and families. Keurig Dr. Pepper will pay for the new playground equipment for the park which will be available for use by Paul Revere students during school hours and all children after school and on weekends.

Arrigo said during the city's ongoing master planning process (Next Stop Revere), the Paul Revere School playground site was identified as one for investment and improvement.

"Following our conversations with Principal Donna Bonarrigo and school administrators, the City Council, in advance of getting the grant, appropriated the money and we're in line for over

\$200,000 that will help pay for it," said Arrigo.

The mayor said he was impressed by the students' suggestions for the playground equipment.

"I'm excited to see the students give shape and form for some of what we're going to see on the playground," said Arrigo. "I can't wait to see the look on their faces when we get it built and it's the first day of school and they're opening up this beautiful, new playground behind the Paul Revere School."

Derrick Dixon, project manager for KaBoom! who really lit up the room with his enthusiasm for the endeavor, said two of the students' most

requested items for the new playground were tire swings and bounce-associated equipment. Other student-generated ideas included long slides, a wiffleball court, a basketball court, and a trampoline.

Paul Revere School Principal Donna Bonarrigo said the new playground will make a huge difference in the students' daily recess time. There are approximately 475 students enrolled at the school.

"We are so thrilled - it's going to make a huge difference to our school community," said Bonarrigo. "The fact that the city acted so promptly to pull in KaBoom! and bring in the grant, and get this playground built in a short turnaround time, is really impressive. It's going to be ready for the start of school and we're excited."

Baker said the city has collaborated with KaBoom! on two previous projects at Curtis Park in 2017 and Costa Park in 2014.

"KaBoom! is an amazing organization and they've connected us with Keurig Dr. Pepper company, a generous corporate sponsor that is promoting safe and active play spaces and making this project possible for our city," said Baker.

Baker is seeking 100 volun-

teers from the city for a community "build the playground day" on Aug. 23. She is also seeking volunteers to help unload the playground equipment on Aug. 21.

"We plan on opening the play space on the first day of school (Aug. 27)," said Baker.

In all my years that I've dealt with this lady, she's just superb and a pleasure to work with. She's just dogged in terms of knowing her district and knowing when things have to get done, and making sure they get done."

Our founding publisher, Andrew P. Quigley, who lived an extraordinary life, used to say, "When you look back on your life, you realize that all you really have is a lot of memories."

With school out and the excitement of the Fourth of July behind us, we now have arrived at what often are referred to as the dog days of summer -- humid, steamy, and languid -- that have burned indelible memories into our mind's eye from our earliest childhood into adulthood.

For those of us who live in the Greater Boston area, numerous vacation spots, from the mountains and lakes of Maine and New Hampshire, to the pastoral serenity of the Berkshires, to the world-famous beaches of Cape Cod and the islands, are within a short distance.

The Greater Boston area itself is full of summertime pleasures and recreational opportunities, whether it be a visit to the 15 beaches maintained by the state, boating in our beautiful Boston Harbor and nearby environs, concerts at numerous venues, or taking in the vibrancy of the Boston waterfront scene.

Let's make sure that when we do so, we can look back on a summer that created memories that will last a lifetime for ourselves and for those whom we love.

CONGRATULATIONS, U.S. WOMEN'S SOCCER

Every now and then the accomplishments of an individual athlete or team will transcend whatever it is that they have achieved in the world of sports. Prime examples include the late Muhammad Ali and the 1980 U.S. Olympic hockey team.

In our view, the incredible run by the U.S. Women's Soccer team during the recent World Cup in France that culminated with Sunday's 2-0 victory over the Netherlands in the championship game is one of those events that made us proud to be Americans far beyond their feat of winning a world title.

Not only did the team prove to be the best in the world on the pitch itself, game-after-game, with thrilling victories over Spain, France, and England in the knockout rounds, but off the field, they were incredible representatives for our nation and women the world over.

Beyond their amazing athleticism, the U.S. women displayed grit, class, and, smarts. Unlike some players on other teams who were a bit "chippy," the American women were strong without resorting to rough behavior and never lost their cool.

Moreover, the U.S. team displayed an unbridled joy for the game that all too often is lacking in sports in these days, all the way from youth to the professional levels.

Jill Ellis, the U.S. coach, noted afterwards that her team members not only were outstanding soccer players, but they also were wonderful people who were superlative teammates and supportive of each other.

We are grateful for the excitement the USNWT brought to us during the past month. We know that their team will serve as an inspiration for future soccer players, both boys and girls, and we are hopeful that they will be able to bring about much-needed changes in the realm of gender equality in the sporting world.



NEWS FROM AROUND THE REGION

FLOOD PROTECTION PROJECT AT ISLAND END RIVER

CHELSEA - Few places in the food supply chain for Greater Boston and beyond are more vulnerable than the New England Produce Center.

That huge food resource for the region, along with other industries, are very close to sea level and, as discovered a few years ago, very prone to flooding and sea level surges.

Now, the City of Chelsea is poised to begin a major project at the Island End River that will help to protect the industrial areas along Beacham Street and enhance the environment around the improving Island End River.

"That area is about 6 or 7 feet above sea level now, and experts expect sea level and storm surges at 14 feet above sea level by the end of the century," said Alex Train, of the Chelsea Planning Department. "This project is in concert with Everett and it's gathered a lot of momentum. It's a priority of the City Manager and our department because we understand how much is at risk. It's a gamble otherwise and we don't like to gamble in the planning industry."

Such a gamble was clearly seen two winters ago when huge coastal surge storms lifted the water levels into the industrial areas along the Island End, nearly causing major disruptions and opening a lot of eyes to the vulnerability of the situation.

The project has been supported by a grant from the Coastal Zone Management Office, as well as the Chelsea and Everett City Councils.

The project includes gray infrastructure, such as flood walls and berms by the Island End River. It also includes green infrastructure with the restoration of the salt marshes abutting the Island End. At the same time, they will also be able to add some amenities for the public like a Boardwalk to connect to the Admiral's Hill Marina area.

"It's going to be a sizeable project, but in the context of the surrounding industrial businesses and the produce center, it's easily a worthwhile initiative on our end," said Train.

Right now, in Chelsea, they are at 60 percent engineering design on the project. Everett is a little bit further behind as they are in the Designated Port Area (DPA) and require many more steps. Everett is currently in a schematic design phase.

On the Chelsea side, Train said they will culminate design this summer, and then look for further grants this winter. Then they will engage in the final engineering, permitting and construction phases.

The project will also be tied into the large Beacham Street roadway, sidewalk and bike path improvements that are also coming soon.

A report in 2015 by the Metropolitan Area Planning Council (MAPC) showed that the Produce Center generates \$2.3 billion of economic activity per year, and the entire industrial district generates \$7 billion per year. There are 5,000 direct jobs there and 10,000 supportive jobs there.

"Many of that activity and those jobs benefit Chelsea and Everett residents and they are solid middle-class jobs and we're committed to protecting them for our residents," said Train.

OTHER DEVELOPMENT ACTIVITY

The City has received a PARC grant for rehabilitation of the O'Neil Playground on the hill up from Williams Street. The new design will encourage water features and tree canopies. The restoration will look to prevent heat islands and provide a cool place during the summer. The project is currently under construction and should be substantially completed by

the fall. It came in at a cost of \$884,000.

The Eden Street playground is currently in design. The new design will also feature a robust tree canopy and more permeable surfaces. The project will be bid out in September, with a fall start. Construction will start up again in the spring for a substantial completion by summer 2020. That project was supported by a \$400,000 PARC grant.

Voke Park is another area that will soon receive more attention. The Bocce Court and fields were done over two years ago, but now it's time for some attention to be paid to the playground. Already, they have had one public meeting to get input on the park, and they are working on conceptual designs now.

"We'll apply for a grant in July to secure funding," said Train.

Design will be done in June 2020 and construction on that is likely to be 2021.

The City is preparing to modernize the traffic signals and intersections at Williams/Chestnut and Williams/Broadway this summer. That upgrade will include new Smart Traffic Signals that are able to read the traffic flow and adjust signal timing on the fly. One of those lights has already been installed on Broadway and Webster earlier this year. Sidewalks will also be touched up as well.

PHOTOGRAPHY EXHIBIT AT CITY HALL

CHELSEA - Since 2016, Chelsea photographer Darlene 'Dar' DeVita has been traveling around the City Hall area and Broadway with her camera and portable backdrop - meeting the people of Chelsea and chronicling their images and their thoughts.

Such a seminal work is hard to narrow down for just one show, but DeVita will do just that on July 9, from 5-7 p.m. in the City Hall Gallery when she presents her 'People of Chelsea' work.

"I started in 2016 and got a grant from the Cultural Council in 2018, and now I'm going to be showing this work at City Hall," she said. "I interviewed and photographed so many people, black, white, old, young, Hispanic and non-Hispanic."

The exhibit is not only DeVita's photographs of people, but also text that describes some of their opinions and feelings about Chelsea.

Being a majority Spanish-speaking community, DeVita - who doesn't speak Spanish - had to find a helper. She found that in Sarah Putnam, who spoke fluent Spanish and helped DeVita tap into the entirety of the community.

"I tried to find a few people and I needed someone who could speak fluent Spanish," she said. "I ended up working with Sarah Putnam who speaks fluently. We had a blast. We went out and set up our backdrop and it wasn't that hard. We would smile and people would smile back at us. We would speak to them in Spanish and most people were cooperative."

DeVita said there was one man outside City Hall that they were trying to speak with who understood Spanish, but was mute. After finding that out, they were able to communicate with him. The man, who is well known for riding a bike in the neighborhood, allowed her to photograph him.

"Everyone knows him from the bike he has," she said. "I ran into him a few weeks later and we saw each other and it was a beautiful moment."

DeVita said she is still finalizing the text, but found that everyone - aside from one woman - really enjoyed living in Chelsea.

Others included were City Councillor Leo Robinson, former Treasurer Bob Boulrice, and folks from the waterfront as well.

Even though the show is

coming up and the City Hall area is played out, DeVita said the work isn't finished.

"I really want to continue with it and I think I will," she said. "The challenge is I can't just go on the street with a backdrop. I have to get a permit from the City. They have been wonderful about it. I'm dying to go to Admiral's Hill because I'd like to hear what they have to say about Chelsea. That's definitely the place I want to go shoot next."

KELLEY'S TO TAKE PART IN PIZZA FESTIVAL

EAST BOSTON - The Boston Pizza Festival will return to City Hall Plaza on Saturday, July 13, and Sunday, July 14, and will feature East Boston's own Kelley Square Pub.

Kelley's will be one of the 30 pizzerias in attendance for the event to showcase their unique style of pizza to a massive audience.

"We have an impressive roster of pizzerias representing the best Boston has to offer," said Giancarlo Natale, co-director of Boston Pizza Festival. "If ticket sales keep up at this rate, we will break last year's attendance record and have our biggest and best Boston Pizza Festival to date."

Kelley Square Pub started over three decades ago as an idea to provide great food at filling portions and at affordable price.

John Mastrangelo Sr., a native East Bostonian, grew up in the neighborhood with a passion to be a professional boxer.

In 1984 after a stint in boxing his idea to open a restaurant in Eastie became a reality. Mastrangelo started up a small pizza and BBQ joint called Kelley Square Pub in Central Square.

Now located at 84 Bennington St., the walls of the Pub are filled with original photos of sports figures to movie stars who have either eaten in the establishment or who are personal friends of Mastrangelo's.

"I know that you might be thinking, Why Kelley Square Pub?" he said. "The original Kelley Square Pub was located in what is now called Central Square in East Boston. After researching, Central Square was originally called Kelley Square in 1900s."

While there are many offerings from BBQ to pasta dishes the pizza at Kelley's has always been a hit with customers and many argue they created the shrimp scampi pizza.

For decades Kelley Square Pub has been a family-run business that includes Mastrangelo's three sons, John his oldest son, Rock, who is a schoolteacher in the town of Winthrop, and Steven.

Since its opening the Mastrangelo's work together to provide their customers an outstanding dining experience.

MEETING ON TUFTS TOBACCO SEEKS CHANGE TO ADULT USE MARIJUANA FACILITY

EAST BOSTON - It seemed a majority of residents who showed up to last week's well-attended meeting regarding Tufts Tobacco wanting to convert to an adult-use marijuana facility were in support of the plan.

While there was the usual opposition, mainly by those who don't support any marijuana facilities opening in Eastie, the city was very clear that the meeting wasn't to debate state marijuana laws.

At Monday night's Orient Heights Neighborhood Council meeting, Tufts Tobacco owner Jimmy Sheena and a team of other Eastie residents led by attorney and former Boston City Councillor Mike Ross, pitched the idea of turning Tufts into an adult-use marijuana facility under the name Local Roots.

"Everyone on the team lives in neighborhood so we all got together and attempted to do this Local Roots business," said Ross. "Over half of the ownership are East Boston residents or have had roots here or done business here for decades and that's why we decided to name the company Local Roots."

The ownership team consists of Sheena, Ross, former City Councillor Sal LaMattina, as well as Nicole Modica, (whose mother is Carla San-

tarpio of Santarpio's Pizza and father is Dave Modica, who owned Ecco for many years), Lorraine Curry, Jane England and Tracy Glissman.

Ross said Tufts would cease selling tobacco products and switch over to adult-use cannabis sales under the Local Roots banner.

"Jimmy (Shenna) has been running a successful and highly regulated business in the community for 25 years without incident," said Ross. "Like his current business no one under the age of 21 would be able to step foot into the adult use facility. It's not like a liquor store where minors can walk in to buy chips or a soda or other non-alcohol products. This would strictly be for adults, and it will be highly regulated."

Ross explained that Tufts interior would be turned into an adult-use shop. Security measures would include a foyer between the street entrance and actual interior shop. There customers would have to produce identification showing they are adults before being let into the shop.

"There will be no flashy signs, marijuana leaves or any other signage that would advertise the business," said Ross.

Like his current business Ross said Shenna would be instrumental in keeping cannabis and cannabis related products out of the hands of minors because he has been able to do so with tobacco for many many years.

Longtime residents and businesses leaders like Joe Mario came in support of the project.

"Look, I've never smoked marijuana but it's coming," said Mario who lives near the proposed shop. "I've known the Modica and Santarpio families for years, I've known Jimmy (Sheena) for years. I'd rather do business with people I know than some corporations from outside the state. If there was ever a problem they'd be a phone call away and they've always supported the community. I'd rather be dealing with a business that we can work with on things like improving Orient Heights and supporting youth organizations than a corporation that tells us to call the corporate office and then you never hear back."

East Boston Chamber of Commerce President Jim Kearney also spoke in favor of the project. Kearney, a long-time educator, scoffed at the notion that an adult-use facility would lead to more teen use as some suggested at the meeting.

"I've worked in schools for three decades and if you think marijuana is not in the schools right now or wasn't in the schools before the laws were passed you are mistaken," said Kearney. "At least

with the taxes coming in from this business we can add more education and drug prevention programs that are underfunded to keep marijuana out of the hands of teens. In the end we have to approach this like alcohol or cigarettes. It's for adults and not for children, and parents have to start having that conversation as more and more of these types of businesses open. I also agree with Joe (Mario). These families involved care about this community and have always helped, no questions asked, when it came to donations or support for local organizations."

Former District A-7 Captain Frank Mancini was brought in as an independent party to assess Local Roots' security plan. Mancini has no stake in the proposal but gave his honest assessment and likened the security plan to the security plans the Israeli government uses for facilities that may be prone to terrorist attacks.

"It's by far one of the better security plans I've seen," he said.

As far as crime in or around the shop, LaMattina again said during a trip to Colorado when he was on the Council to get suggestions from officials there on how to regulate and zone the new industry many officials there said it actually reduced crime.

"The city councilors there who were against adult-use marijuana admitted that the shops reduced street crime and petty crime in the neighborhoods in which the shops were located," he said.

MYSTIC RIVER MAKES THE GRADE

EVERETT - In collaboration with the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), the Mystic River Watershed Association issued the 2018 Water Quality Report Card for the Mystic River watershed yesterday at the Mystic Lakes Dam in Arlington.

The Mystic River and the Mystic Lakes continue to have clean water-earning grades of A- and A in this latest report card. This is the fifth year in a row that the river and lakes have earned A-range grades.

Upper Mystic Lake meets public health standards for swimming more than 95 percent of the time in dry weather, and the Mystic River meets canoeing and rowing standards more than 98% of the time in dry weather.

"I encourage community members to go out and boat on the Mystic and Malden Rivers, and to swim at Shannon Beach at Upper Mystic Lake," said Patrick Herron, Executive Director of the Mystic River Watershed Association (MyRWA). "These are great public resources. We

Re-Booting Recycling: Our recycling habits need change

Think back some 30 years ago, when Revere joined a growing number of Massachusetts communities to provide curbside collection of recyclable materials. Do you remember the small green or red crates, and how you had to separate paper from metal from glass?

Revere made a major step in the early 2000s when the City switched to 'single-stream' recycling. Everyone was provided with a big brown bin, and the days of separating paper from metal from glass were gone. Residents dutifully went about filling their bins, happily playing a role to help the environment. And thanks to the worldwide demand for recyclable materials, recycling haulers actually paid

the City for the opportunity to pick up our recyclable materials. Those were the good ol' days of curbside collection of recyclable materials.

Today, it's a very different story. Friends, Revere is flunking recycling. Big time. According to information provided by the city's recycling collector, a full 100 per cent of our recycling bins are contaminated with materials that are not eligible for recycling. That costs the city a lot of money, and the burden falls directly on the taxpayer.

People still want to do right for the environment, and for our City. But over the years, the rules have changed for disposing recyclable materials. So it's time for a refresher course and a renewed effort to improve our recycling routines.

With the benefit of a \$40,000 Grant from the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection, our Department of Public Works this week began a concentrated program to educate residents and raise our recycling game. When people properly recycle, the cost savings to the City is substantial.

Revere currently pays \$79 per ton for the removal of recyclable materials. But when a bin is contaminated with plastic bags, pizza boxes, dirty containers, or non-recyclable material, the cost to dispose it jumps to \$105 per ton. Since January alone, Revere has spent \$36,224 more than necessary because we have had to pay for the disposal of contaminated recyclable materials. We've spent 33 per cent more dollars than we would

have spent if only proper materials were contained in the recycling bin.

A major aspect of the recycling education effort will involve inspectors who will fan out across the City on recycling collection days and look inside recycling bins. During the first two weeks of the program, inspectors will place a "Warning" tag on bins that contain non-recyclable items, or items are contained in a plastic bag inside the bin. Hopefully, this will clarify for residents which items are acceptable and which are not.

Beginning July 22, Inspectors who find unacceptable contents of a recycling bin will issue "Ooops" tags, which will specify the unacceptable contents. The recycling bins belonging to repeat offenders will not be collected.

Everyone can play a role in the citywide effort to improve our recycling practices. The City of Revere website, www.revere.org/recycle, contains detailed information about proper recycling methods and actions. And everyone should download the Revere Trash / Street Sweeping App, which provides reminders and answers just about any question you might have about trash collection and street sweeping in your neighborhood.

In the coming weeks, the City will also intensify enforcement of the new trash ordinance which the City Council adopted recently. Improving our recycling habits, and complying with the laws that control trash disposal, will not only help our city look better, it will play a key role in containing the rodent

problem.

Revere spends some \$3.8 million annually in trash and recycling collection. Residents and taxpayers can help save money, and help keep our city clean by following the simple rules that govern trash and recyclable disposal. The disposal of trash and recyclable materials is probably the most direct way that every resident can play a positive role for our city. Complaining about trash meaningless when we all have the chance to make improvements in the City's appearance. The good news is that, when it comes to improving our recycling routines, we can only improve. But we have a long way to go.

are so happy that they we can provide evidence that they are clean at a time when they are also becoming more accessible for community members with more public boat launches, canoe/kayak rentals, and connected paths and parks."

There is also good news downstream with water quality improvements noted at the Island End River between Everett and Chelsea. The grade at this site has improved from an F to a C+ in three short years.

However, the report did not contain all good news. Many of the smaller rivers and tributaries that lead to the Lakes and to the main stem of the Mystic continue to receive poor grades. For example, the Aberjona River receives a grade D+, while Alewife Brook gets a D. And conditions at many locations are worse during and after rain events.

"The pollution tracked in the report card is bacteria pollution from untreated wastewater, which gets to rivers and lakes through old and leaky infrastructure. These pathways introduce more contamination when it rains, so bacteria levels are usually higher in wet weather, especially in time to invest in our watershed's water quality is now," said Andy Hrycyna, Watershed Scientist. "The report card gathers the data needed to fix old problems and plan for the future."

The report card, which is issued for all major water

bodies in the watershed (or, "watersheds in Massachusetts") by the federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), uses data provided by the Massachusetts Water Resources Authority (MWRA), Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) and the Mystic River Watershed Association's Baseline Water Quality Monitoring Program. To gather baseline data, MyRWA depends on a cohort of dedicated citizen scientists who take water samples at 15 locations throughout the watershed each month.

The Mystic River Watershed Association works to improve the lives of the more than 600,000 residents of Mystic River communities through its efforts to protect and restore water quality, natural habitat and open space throughout the 76 square mile watershed.

WEIGHING IN ON SUPERINTENDENT PROCESS

EVERETT - On Tuesday, June 25, around 40 people gathered at the Parlin Library for the first public meeting on the process of finding a new superintendent for Everett Public Schools.

The Massachusetts Association of School Committees (MASC) and the Everett School Committee are joining

forces in its search to replace Interim Supt. Janice Gauthier. Gauthier took over in 2018 for Fred Foresteire, who resigned suddenly last December following claims of sexual harassment during his 30-year tenure.

Leading the meeting were MASC Field Director Kathleen Kelly, MASC Executive Director Glenn Koocher and School Committee Chair Thomas Abruzzese. Translators were provided by the Everett Public Schools.

Those in attendance included Sen. Sal DiDomenico; School Committee members Marcony Almeida Barros, David Ela and Frank Parker; City Councilors Fred Capone, Rosa DiFlorio and Michael McLaughlin; members of the Everett Education Coalition; parents of children in the Everett Public Schools; current and former educators in the district; and other concerned citizens.

Participants were asked to share their views about what priorities and characteristics they are seeking in the next superintendent, as well as what they perceived to be the strengths and weaknesses of the school district.

•Strengths
Participants commented that teachers and students were what made Everett schools great, highlighting the resiliency and diversity of the student body. They also cited that the high school is open until 10 p.m., giving the stu-

dents a safe place to hang out away from the city streets.

Councilor McLaughlin mentioned the many programs and sports teams available to students.

"So much happens that isn't about math and history," he said. "There are so many opportunities for children to advance."

•Weaknesses
The collective sigh came when the crowd was asked to identify areas for improvement. It was apparent that the community was still reeling from the events of the past year. They alluded to a system that supported sexual harassment for decades, but also one permeated by a "pervasive culture of fear."

This has left some feeling distrustful and wary of any potential repeats of the mistakes of the past.

"It's a damaged culture," offered one educator and resident. "There's a lot of distrust. I was [there] for 31 years. I left to save myself. But a lot of people in this room knew what was going on and did nothing about it. I have a big issue with that. It's a trust issue."

In addition to rebuilding trust with the community, other potential ideas for growth included improving teacher retention, bringing community resources to the awareness of parents and families, hiring more educators of color, allowing the potential for more collaboration among elementary school classes, making

after-school programs more affordable, and emphasizing restorative justice not just at the high school level, but across the district.

•The ideal candidate
Traits the community listed for their ideal candidate were community-oriented, bilingual, open to feedback, professional, communicative, compassionate and independent. They are seeking a delegator, a bridge builder, a strong advocate for teachers; someone who values diversity, is committed to transparency, and who isn't afraid to challenge the status quo. Ideally this person would be capable of earning the respect of the teachers as well as the students.

"Someone who has authority without being authoritarian," added Everett Education Coalition member Jessica Haralson. "There is a way to be the boss and be supportive."

School Committee member Ela echoed that sentiment, saying, "We need someone who will take over and lead the schools, not run the schools."

Sen. DiDomenico was adamant that the new superintendent have the intention of staying on.

"I don't want someone who's going to be here as a stepping stone," he said. "I have seen other communities that have that problem where every three years they start from scratch. We need a commitment from them that they're not here so they can gain experience and go on to a bigger community."

The reverse argument was also made, with one resident saying he didn't want to see another 30-year superintendent.

"They lose perspective and there's too much corruption," he said. "When it's time for them to leave, they gotta' leave."

If there was one point that every participant agreed on, it was that the new superintendent should be a career educator with classroom experience. In a show of hands, nearly all present expressed that it would be a deal-breaker if he or she did not have experience in the classroom.

Abruzzese concurred, likening a superintendent who had never been a teacher to a judge who had never been a lawyer.

"It would be difficult to accept criticism from someone who's never done what I'm doing," he allowed.

The community was also mostly aligned in their desire to hire someone from within the community, rather than an out-of-town or out-of-state hire. There are currently 14 employees in the district who fit the prerequisites for the position of superintendent.

"Everyone in the community knows everyone," said Sen. DiDomenico. "We need someone entrenched in this community."

Participants expressed that a candidate from the outside would not have an understanding of or appreciation for just how diverse and energized the community is.

"It's a big universe in a small city," said one participant, mentioning diversity not just of race and ethnicity, but of language, religion and socioeconomic status.

Abruzzese, on the other hand, says he's heard from others who want a candidate who can't locate Everett on a map.

"There are strong feelings both ways," he said. "It's vital for someone to come in with a fresh outlook to everything. We'll be getting applications from out of state."

"It's going to take a very special person," he concluded. "But I think that person's out there."

•Next steps
Abruzzese said the School Committee was dedicated to realizing a fully transparent process in their search for a new superintendent, with a robust public input period. He also mentioned that all evaluation documents of superintendents are public record and that the School Committee has the authority to dismiss a superintendent that does not live up to their expectations.

The Search Committee will be conducting focus groups in the fall as well as producing an online survey in multiple languages. It will also be hosting several other community meetings to solicit public input and hope to select a viable replacement before the winter holiday.

The Everett Education Coalition was to have had a second community meeting on the superintendent search on Monday night, July 1, which came beyond Independent deadlines.

FLAVORED VAPING AND NICOTINE PRODUCTS TO BE RESTRICTED

LYNN - Starting Oct. 1, the sale of flavored nicotine and vaping products will be restricted for sale to adult-only establishments. The flavor ban does not include menthol, wintergreen and mint.

Last week, following a public hearing on May 14, the Board of Health voted 3-0 to restrict the sales of flavored nicotine products. You must be 21 or over to purchase nicotine products.

The meeting room was filled with convenience store owners from Lynn and the surrounding area. Most believe the restriction will significantly cut into their businesses.

Mike Patel, who owns a convenience store next to the police station, said he stands to lose 35 to 40 percent of his business.

"This is not good for business at all," Patel said. "I think the businesses in Lynn will suffer."

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

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
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
