Council approves new Point of Pines Fire Station

The Revere City Council Monday night unanimously approved a \$9.2 million bond authorization to demolish and build a new Alden Mills-Point of Pines fire station on the site of the old fire station that had been closed for more than two decades.

Following the 11-0 vote,

Bagel Bin goes up in flames early Tuesday morning

Firefighters battled flames and heat on Shirley Avenue at one of the most iconic restaurants in Revere - The Bagel Bin.

The call came in around 11:38 p.m. on Monday and soon turned to four alarms as firefighters worked through the early morning hours Tuesday to douse the flames. When dawn broke, you could see right through The Bagel Bin at 207 Shirley Ave. Just a shell stood.

Owners George and Ella Vlladesi stood across the street just looking at the

business they have run for 20 years being consumed by flames.

George said he couldn't understand what had happened, as he had locked up and turned off appliances the same way he has always done before he leaves each night.

Sure, Bagel Bin had bagels, but it also had its breakfast and lunch selections, and an amazing amount of character.

Ward 2 Councillor Ira Novoselsky held court more than a few times, saying the the Bagel Bin was his second home. "We're going to have to move on and rebuild," he

said. "They took care of a lot of people, they even feed some of the homeless."

"This is heartbreaking for

us," said Ward 3 Councillor Arthur Guinasso, one of many local officials who held court every morning at the Bagel Bin.

The Bagel Bin is the go-to place for those seeking political office, locally and nationally. The restaurant has served as a forum for Gov. Charlie Baker to announce grants or stop on his way home to Swampscott during winter storms. Speaker of the House Robert DeLeo has been a patron and even the late U.S. Sen. John McCain found his way there while campaigning for President.

Every mayor of Revere has been in the Bagel Bin, especially the late former mayors Robert Haas and George Colella. Haas' wife Juanita stopped by to give condolences to the Vlladesi family.

"I used to come down every day with him [Robert Haas], it was part of his life for 35 years," Juanita Haas said. "It's very sad."

Robert Haas loved the Bagel Bin so much they dedicated a sign to him right next to the building.

"Over the years the Bagel Bin has become a defacto annex of Revere City Hall with clientele that represented every corner of the city," said Councillor and former mayor Dan Rizzo. "They have served the Revere business community well."

Ironically, the Bagel Bin sign had no fire damage and stood proudly with two untouched American flags.

"This is a stopping place for people who want to meet people from Revere," said Licensing Commission chairman Robert Selevitch, who is a regular at the Bagel Bin.

"We are in complete shock," said the Bagel Bin owner's daughter, Katherine Prifti, at a press conference. "My parents started this business 20 years ago, June 2 was the 20th anniversary."

"We didn't run it like a business - we ran it like a family,"

said Prifti who choked back tears as she spoke. "We've had customers who were at my wedding. It was a family for us. Last night was surreal. This was their American Dream."

She began working in the restaurant at the age of 13, sitting on a stool next to the cash register.

"My dad knows everybody's name when they come in, he knows what they'll order. Everybody is family to us. We are so appreciative of the love and support we're getting from everyone," Prifti said.

"It's a devastating loss for not only the owner but the Revere community and the many residents who enjoyed fine food that was served there. It is my hope that George will make an effort to rebuilding or relocate within the city of Revere," said Ward 5 Councillor John Powers.

"For so many years the Bagel Bin has been a place for elected officials and Revere residents to not only have a good meal, but to discuss Revere's politics, history and gossip. I am hopeful that this beloved meeting place and Shirley Avenue anchor will reopen in the future." Said House Speaker Robert DeLeo.

"The Bagel Bin Deli was not only a great place to get a bite to eat, it was a place to be if you wanted the latest news of what was happening in the city," said Mayor Brian Arrigo. "Councillor Novoselsky would often joke that it was the 'real' City Hall. That's why the Bagel Bin was the scene when Gov. Baker came to Revere to announce a \$2 million grant to benefit Shirley Avenue. Our hearts are with the Vlladesi family during this difficult time. Please know the city is here to help you out in whatever way possible."

The Vlladeses, who immigrated from Albania, said they plan to rebuild.

Kelly highlights New school job posting

Superintendent Dianne Kelly is trying to spread the word about a new job opening at the schools and hopes one qualified candidate from the Revere school community emerges.

"We are looking to hire a Family/Community Leadership Coordinator," said Kelly. "We are trying to get the word out to parents with the hopes that one of our parents applies for the job."

Kelly said the candidate that gets the job will serve as a liaison between schools and parents, relaying the needs of one to the other.

"The candidate chosen will also educate teachers and staff on how to communicate and work effectively with parents as equal partners as well as advise and train parents on how to address issues with the leadership staff in school meeting," said Kelly.

The position also serves as a school-based intermediary contact for concerns and comments made by parents and community members.

The hiree will also provide referrals to community-based

services for families, expands opportunities for continued learning, voluntary community service, and civic participation.

"We also want the candidate to be able to develop community collaborations, promote sharing of power with parents as decision-makers, help parents understand the educational system so they can become better advocates for their children's education," said Kelly.

Kelly said qualifications include that the applicant must be a Revere resident with at least one child in the Revere Public Schools and authorized to work in the US throughout employment in this position.

"The right candidate also believes that all students can, will, and must learn and works relentlessly to achieve results for students and families and takes ownership of outcomes," said Kelly. "They also must be passionate about Revere Schools' mission, values and student-centered learning vision."

As part of the job description provided by Kelly to the Revere Journal other qualifications lister are:

- Committed to stu-

dents' personal growth, and understands their backgrounds and experiences

- Constantly reflects, relishes feedback, and seeks opportunities to improve; sets ambitious goals

- Remains poised, persistent, and solution-oriented in the face of unexpected challenges

- Skillfully manages multiple (and sometimes competing) priorities

- Demonstrates ability to implement complex projects with exceptional attention to detail and flawless execution

- Interacts effectively with families/parents from linguistically and culturally diverse backgrounds

- Has the ability to communicate in another language, preferably Spanish

- Fosters collaboration and models team orientation

- Brings humor and positivity to the schools and organization

- Proactively communicates with students, families, colleagues, and the community in a straightforward, open, and personable manner

- Understands the

challenges of urban environments

- Has experience in community organizing, public relations or related fields; degree preferred.

Kelly said applicants should have computer skills including word processing, data analysis, and presentation programs as well as basic math skills, effective verbal and written communication.

"This position will really lead and oversee families and community partnerships while establishing school as community "hub," forging and maintaining community partnerships," said Kelly. "Our goal is to build organization awareness at the family, community and potentially political level and lead regular family and community meetings to discuss school priorities, seek feedback, and foster authentic dialogue and trusting relationships."

out to us on our Facebook Page."

This year serving as president of the RBP he was more than pleased with the theme of the 50th landing on the moon, and the turnout of people who came to see the professional and amateur sculptors.

From working the on the Sand Sculpting Festival, Turco said he had learned that he has no talent for sculpting and wishes he had paid more attention to his bucket and shovel as a kid.

"My parents used to go to a little shop on the beach and buy a pail and shovel," he remembered. "It's pretty amazing the talent that's out there and what they can sculpt."

While he leaves as RBP president at the end of Decem-

ber he will have also worked on the road race, the Pumpkin Dash and other activities.

"We don't do activities just in the summer time," Turco

said. "People can come to the beach anytime and see how beautiful it is."

the residents in the audience and the councillors rose together in a standing ovation.

Ward 5 Councillor John Powers had made the re-opening of the Point of Pines fire station a high priority during his tenure in office. He was especially pleased to see the Council affirm his hard work and persistence on the issue.

"I'm very pleased that this project will move forward and give the residents of the Pines, Oak Island, Revere Beach Boulevard, and the entire city the highest level of public safety," said Powers. "I want to thank Mayor Brian Arrigo, Chief Christopher Bright and my colleagues on the City Council for their 100 percent support and making this a reality."

Fire Chief Christopher Bright was pleased with the Council's unanimous support of the new fire station project.

"I couldn't be more pleased with the support of the mayor, Councillor Powers, who has been relentless over the years, my membership, the public, and the entire Council," said Bright. "It's very gratifying."

Prior to the vote, Mayor Brian Arrigo, Director of Finance George Anzuoni, and Point of Pines residents Ann Straccia, Eric Lampedecchio, Hugo Rizzuto, and Carol Haney expressed their support for the project, asking the Council to vote favorably for the new fire station.

"I'm here to support Councillors Powers on voting tonight for the fire station," said Straccia.

Straccia told the Council a story about an Aug. 28, 2018 incident at her home that re-

sulted in her being transported to the hospital for emergency medical care.

"If it wasn't for the fire truck being there, I wouldn't be here talking to you," said Straccia. "I'm glad I can tell my story, but we really do need another fire station. I thank Councillor Powers for all the work he's done. All the tragedies he's had, and he's still fighting for that station for us. I thank him very much and I hope everyone else will, too."

Haney thanked Councillor Powers for "all the work that he has done to get us a fire station down in the Point of Pines."

"If you saw the traffic last week alone, you realize we are in desperate need for a fire station and I urge you all to vote positively," said Haney.

Arrigo said, "This fire station has been a priority for the city since I took office, in terms of modernizing and making sure that we're providing the best services to our residents like Ann," said Arrigo. "We are investing in our community and we're looking forward and this is just another step that the Council, I hope, will take tonight."

Councillor-at-Large George Rotondo said many have sought a new Point of Pines fire station.

"This is something that we all, at one time or another, have fought for," said Rotondo.

The other councillors joined Rotondo, a medical care professional, in voicing their support for the fire station, a stand they affirmed with their unanimous vote.

GOV. BAKER'S BOLD TRANSPORTATION PROPOSAL

We were talking the other day with a young man who has been a teacher at Chelsea High School for the past couple of years. During our discussion, we were surprised to learn that he lives on the South Shore (Hull) from where he commutes to Chelsea High every day by means of public transportation.

He takes the MBTA commuter boat to Boston and then walks to the nearby Blue Line, taking that to Airport Station. From there, he gets on the new Silver Line 3, the dedicated-lane bus line that takes him to Chelsea.

It seemed like quite an odyssey -- and it certainly is -- but he said his total commuting time is about an hour each way, which is less time than it would take him to drive it, not to mention far less stressful.

We were thinking about the Chelsea teacher's use of multiple modes of public transportation -- sort of an alternative, real-life version of the comedy classic movie *Planes, Trains, and Automobiles* -- in the context of the \$18 billion proposal put forward last week by the administration of Gov. Charlie Baker and Lt. Gov. Karen Polito to improve the transportation infrastructure in our state, with the stated goals of improving our roads, bridges, and public transit systems.

We do not even remotely pretend to be experts in the realm of transportation. However, what is clear is that the Baker-Polito proposal, in terms of the level and scope of the proposed investment, is (in Baker's words), "unprecedented and historic."

We have no doubt that there will be many -- who actually are experts in the realm of transportation -- who will weigh in with various proposals of their own in addition to those that are contained in the Baker-Polito bill.


We also have no doubt that the plans and ideas that will be put forward by others will be considered carefully by the governor and his staff. After five years of the Baker-Polito administration, it has become clear that their type of leadership is not of the "my way or the highway" (no pun intended) style. We anticipate that the administration and the legislature will work together to craft a bill that will improve the daily lives for all residents of the Commonwealth.

For far too long, transportation issues have been like that adage about the weather: Everybody talks about it, but nobody does anything about it. In New York City for example, the sorry state of the subways is at a critical point -- and yet the mayor and governor cannot agree on a way to fix it. In California, talk of a high speed train from San Francisco to Los Angeles appears to have reached a dead end (again, no pun intended).

By contrast, the \$18 billion proposal put forward by the Baker-Polito administration last week represents a huge step forward in fixing many of the problems that have come to light in recent years in our state.

Investments in our transportation infrastructure -- especially in this era of low interest rates -- will reap huge dividends in the years ahead, more than offsetting the costs. We look forward to the final transportation bill and to the day when Massachusetts will be seen as a national leader in solving public transportation issues.

Mickey Casoli- Athlete; Soldier; Police Officer; Mentor; Loving Son, Brother, Uncle, and friend to many

I first got know Mickey when I joined the City Council back in 2000. He immediately made it known to me where his priorities lied- public safety and children. As fate would have it, our priorities lined up perfectly. From that point on, we spoke all the time.

I think back to when I assumed the job as Mayor in 2012, I could count on Mickey to stop in each and every week to offer his advice and drop off the hermits that he would get from Luberto's Bakery. Of course, all work came to a screeching halt when Mickey made his entrance! I could definitely count on his ongoing assessment of the Revere Police Department, as well as reminiscing on how much we both valued our military service. As proud as I am of serving as an active duty sailor for six years, my military service pales in comparison to Mickey's. An accident as a

paratrooper left him with scars and injuries that he would live with forever. And somehow, he wouldn't have missed the opportunity to serve for anything in the world.

A lot of people may know that Mickey was a standout athlete. Many may know that he was a WWII decorated Veteran and member of the 11th Airborne Division and Special Forces Group 5 where as I mentioned earlier, suffered injuries that plagued him for his entire life. A traumatic leg injury led to 17 surgeries to the same leg over the course of his life. Others will remember his many years of service to the Revere Police Department as a detective in the Narcotics Unit. He spent some of that time as a detached member of the RPD assigned to the Attorney General's office. And while he was passionate about his service and contributions he made to his country, the Commonwealth, and his city, the two things that drove Mickey most was family and

the children of our community. We talked about it all the time.

I spent a lot of time with Mickey talking to kids and about the negative effects of drug use and how we could help them to really value their futures. In fact, his relentless war against drug abuse transcended into his signature voice mail message which went something like this; "Hi Dan, it's 'Mickey Say No,' give me a call when you can". Whether it was at his annual Labor Day gathering with the Revere High School Football team, in the classrooms discussing gateway drugs and how it can lead to more serious addictions, or in impromptu casual conversations with kids he'd meet around the city, he always did everything he could to help guide the youth of our community into leading happy, healthy, productive lives. While it cannot be quantified, I believe his efforts were rewarded with many, many success stories.

Mickey loved his family and talked about how his mother and father were the most important people in the world to him, and how we should all value and cherish our relationships with our parents. There was never a time when we spoke where he wouldn't ask about my entire family. Of the many people who were fortunate enough to really get to know Mickey, he cared not only about us, but our families as well.

I can't help but think about his final words whenever we'd end our conversations; "Remember, I'm the wind at your back and I'll talk to you down the line." Those words had meaning to him, and those words have more meaning to me than he can ever imagine. He will never be forgotten.

ON THE NOISE FROM WHEELABRATOR

Dear Editor,

Thank you for hanging in there with me and my incessant and almost daily emails regarding the continuing noise from Wheelabrator Saugus. This has been ongoing since June 17. This is obviously not the first time we have been subjected with noise from Wheelabrator, however, this is the longest duration we have had to endure.

The inability of me and my neighbors to get the Saugus Board of Health and the

Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection to impose enforcement measures and provide us some relief is disheartening to say the least. I appreciate all of you who have exposed this assault and I am asking all of you to do the same again.

The Saugus Board of Health which did not have their usual monthly meeting in July, decided a good day to have an emergency meeting regarding the Wheelabrator situation, was on July 17. Coincidentally, a community meeting which drew over 100 people from Revere and

Saugus regarding the noise had already been scheduled in Revere the same night. "Hmmm," you might say. After speaking with Lisa DeDomenco, the Board of Health Administrative Assistant, we were told that it would not be necessary for the public to attend this meeting as their legal counsel would be there and they would be discussing legal strategy and remedies. We would, however, be able to attend their regularly scheduled public meeting on Aug. 5.

We were advised that they would not allow any public commentary during this pub-

lic meeting on Aug. 5 and that we had our opportunity to speak at their meeting on July 17. Wheelabrator will be allegedly be allowed to speak, however. So Wheelabrator officials get the benefit of not listening to us just like they don't have to listen to the noise they continue to create.

We demand to be heard and we are asking you to help by exposing the Saugus Board of Health's attempt to silence us. This is not acceptable and I ask you to expose this malfeasance.

quent to a sold-out event on Friday, July 12, which saw more than 2,300 attendees.

picious origin destroyed an apartment building and several businesses at 167-169-171 Shirley Ave. Monday night. Four Revere firefighters, Wayne Ferguson, Anthony Vinciarelli Jr., John Moschella, and Stephen Duggan were treated for minor injuries.

The Mass. DEQE has issued a final order of conditions that finally resolves the impasse over the resanding of Revere Beach by the MDC. Sand from the I-95 embankment will be sifted at that site before being trucked to Revere Beach.

A Superior Court has faulted the city for allowing a developer to construct a 72-unit condo complex at 190 North Shore Road on the former right-of-way of the Narrow Gauge Railroad, which is controlled by the state. The condos now may have to be demolished.

Construction of the new, 650-seat Immaculate Conception Church has begun on the site of the former Sonny Myers Park.

The family of William Dowling still is looking for justice after the trial of two suspects in his murder was



State Police horses grace sand sculpture festival

The Massachusetts State Police have made them fully sworn troopers, complete with badges. They are also one of the best public relations arms the organization has – horses and mounted troopers. During the summer they rotate around Department of Conservation and Recreation beaches or parks during the summer.

Newton's horse is Amadeus, serious, wise and big.

Both officers underwent special training after the academy to learn about the horses and how to handle them. They also had to complete an 80-hour riding class, in addition to hands-on and classroom time. They also have to be certified every year.

Locally, you will find them in the Red Rock area, King's Beach in Lynn and on Revere Beach.

Oh, and then there is the barn work. The troopers do get inmates from the Concord Prison to muck the stalls. But there is plenty more to do. Grooming the horses and getting the trucks ready to transport the horse to the beach or park.

Stealth-black Percheron thoroughbred cross breeds, they are descended from a powerful draft horse originally from France. Trooper Mike Crowley, who has been with the Massachusetts State Police for 15 years and riding for the State Police for 12 years.

“With this job you have to like animals and want to work and get dirty,” Crowley said. “We are ride every day and we’re a full-year operation.”

“I was a city kid from Medford,” Crowley said, when asked if he had ever been on a horse ever?

The barracks for the horses is a stable in Acton where 15 horses live.

Crowley's horse is Captain, who exudes the strength of the breed while also being very approachable.

Crowley added that the horses are also trained in search and rescue, crowd control and civil disturbances. You will also find them at Gillette Stadium, including concerts, games and championships. They also do a lot of parades and travel to summer camps with the horses.

His partner Trooper Bill Newton grew up in Norfolk and also had no horseback riding experience. He's been with the State Police for 14 years and has been riding horses for the State Police for five years.

“People must say that we must love this job and we do,” Crowley said, adding the same goes for his fellow K9 troopers.







FROM THE FIRE CAPTAIN Teamwork and tactics played a large role in containing Bagel Bin fire

On July 29, at approximately 11:38 p.m. the Revere Fire Department responded with a box response for a report of a smoke coming from the Bagel Bin and the alarms were going off. The initial response included the Command vehicle, 4 Revere pumps, and two Revere ladder trucks. The Bagel Bin was a well known breakfast and gathering spot in the City for many years. The single story restaurant with a basement was the equivalent of two store fronts, each with large commercial glass windows and a glass door. These, as well as the door in the rear, were protected by heavy duty steel roll down grates and locks.

Deputy Chief Tom Todisco, the Incident Command, stated on arrival heavy black smoke was pushing out from the Grates and visibility in the street was near zero. The Fire companies immediately went to work; Ladder 1 cut the locks, raised the grates and took out the windows to gain access. Engine 1 and 5 made an initial attack with hoses through the front doors with heavy black smoke now billowing from the openings. The rear of the building was opened and the interior fire started to show itself. A second alarm was struck bringing an additional response made up of outside companies from surrounding cities and towns. Ladder 1, stick up, had an aerial view of the roof and

through the use of the thermal imaging camera realized the roof was being compromised. Deputy Todisco knowing the impending risk of collapse ordered all companies out and switched to a defensive, exterior attack. The Chief of the Department arrived along with supporting Deputies, Fire Investigation and Safety.

At one point 3 ladder pipes and multiple handlines were being used to drown the building with copious amounts of water. The partially collapsed roof made it difficult to reach the hidden pockets of fire adding to difficulty of extinguishment. The fire was contained to the building of origin but it was estimated to be a total loss.

The third and fourth alarms were stuck to bring additional manpower due to the extreme heat and working conditions. The Fire Investigation unit was on scene to investigate the cause. The Building, Water and Health departments along with National Grid electric and gas were notified to respond.

In all Engine and Ladder Co.'s from Revere, Chelsea, Malden, Massport, Lynn, Everett, Boston, Saugus and Cambridge responded to the 4-alarm fire. There were no reported injuries and the incident was closed at approximately 7:36 am pending investigation.

CENTENNIAL AVE. SHOOTING VICTIM DIES, TWO ARRESTED

Suffolk County District Attorney Rachael Rollins on July 24 announced that a man who was shot during an altercation in Revere on July 18 has succumbed to his injuries and two defendants are in custody in connection with the shooting that claimed his life.

The shooting victim, John Brooks, 35, of Dorchester, suffered a gunshot wound during an altercation in the area of Centennial Avenue at approximately 7:18 p.m. on Thursday, July 18. Brooks was rushed to Massachusetts General Hospital, where he underwent emergency surgery. Tragically, Brooks died shortly before 9:30 p.m. on July 23.

Based on witness statements and video of the shoot-

ing, Kevin Nguyen, 19, of Dorchester, was arrested by Revere Police near the location of the shooting. Jorge Cordova, 21, of Revere, was identified for his role in the shooting and taken into custody on a warrant July 24.

Both are charged with armed assault with intent to rob, attempted murder, and assault and battery with a dangerous weapon. New charges are expected in the wake of Brooks's death.

Nguyen was arraigned July 19 in Chelsea District Court and ordered held on \$50,000 bail and ordered to stay away from and have no contact with witnesses to the shooting, wear a GPS monitor, and remain under home confinement in the event he is released on bail. He is represented by Anthony Fugate and returns to court on Aug. 13.

Cordova was arraigned July 25 in Chelsea District Court

on charges of murder, armed assault to rob with a firearm, assault and battery with a dangerous weapon, unlawful possession of a firearm, unlawful possession of ammunition, carrying a loaded firearm, and possession with intent to distribute a Class D substance. At the request of Assistant District Attorney Ryan Mingo, Judge Matthew Machera ordered the defendant held without bail. The defendant is represented by attorney Tom Ford and returns to court August 30.

"My heart goes out to Mr. Brooks's family and loved ones as they grieve his loss to an act of gun violence," District Attorney Rachael Rollins said. "I give my word to Mr. Brooks's family and to the Revere community that we will hold the individuals responsible for his death accountable."

The shooting death is under investigation by State Police

detectives assigned to District Attorney Rollins's office with the assistance of the Revere Police Department.

ing support from prostitution. Doreese Mary Licari, 25, of Medford, was charged with sexual conduct for a fee, possession of a Class B drug and one warrant.

Revere Police are investigating what appears to be a carjacking that took place under suspicious circumstances on July 23 along Broadway.

Police were alerted to the crime around 10 p.m. on July 23, but the victim wasn't totally forthcoming about what happened during the supposed carjacking.

Police put out notice of the vehicle, and it was discovered in Chelsea - where a man was arrested for driving a stolen car. Police said it was not a random act, but they are investigating further.

BOOK REVIEW

'CAPITALISM IN AMERICA: A HISTORY'

By Alan Greenspan and Adrians Woodbridge



“Capitalism in America is an excellent book which delineates a history of American manufacturing and investment. Greenspan is well known to us as a result of his tenure as Chairman of the United States Federal Reserve Board. Adrian Woodbridge is a prominent contributor to the Economist Magazine and the author of several books.

Together they have compiled an interesting compendium of capitalism in America. The book includes a detailed study of the age of laissez-faire economics in the era of the great tycoons who developed many industrial innovations in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The authors continue on into the Great Depression, a period which eviscerated the indus-

trial sector and engendered many alternative responses to capitalism. The narrative continues into the post World War II years, when the economy recovered and capitalistic industrialism once again flourished.

The book is full of anecdotes about industrial magnates and famous inventors, but critics might rail at the lack of concern for the everyday worker and the common man, without whose contributions many of these great achievements would not have been possible. The authors seem to extol those presidents and politicians who embrace the governmental policies that encourage business, sometimes to the detriment of the lower and working classes. This might seem like an



obvious course of action, but one would think that a more humane approach would have been more amenable to the general public.

Nevertheless, Greenspan and Woodbridge do a commendable job in recreating the fascinating world of commerce and industry. Both authors are world acclaimed leaders in their respective genre's and their work is exemplary.

Greenspan reprises his years in the Federal Reserve, particularly in the period of the Clinton presidency. The book continues on into the Great Recession and the years following it. It's hard to say how much of these fiscal drags come about as a result of governmental policy or how much they are part of a

financial cycle, but authors like Greenspan and Woodbridge go a long way toward explicating the various nuances of the fiscal sequences.

This is an important book -one which will enhance the reader's understanding of capitalism and its attendant virtues and vices. The tome is a neat summation of U.S. history, especially as it involves economic factors which are so important to all of us.





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Vincenzo's Cold Brew: The Coffee Milkman

Vincenzo DeGregorio has a passion for coffee.

And now he wants to share his creation with others through his business Vincenzo's Cold Brew in Revere.

A Revere resident, Vincenzo as a high school student began selling coffee to his friends and teachers, then started taking coffee seriously as he entered college. He began figuring out his direction with the business.

He first learned about coffee and starting up a business from his uncle, who owns a shop in the North End. His family's influence played a great role in Vincenzo's business life, including his major in entrepreneurship at Babson College.

It was also his family who introduced him to cold brew when a cousin made it for him once: "I thought it was much better than iced coffee," he said. Wondering why companies have not yet targeted this type of emerging coffee market, he began experimenting with the coffee brew process to find the perfect formula for his cold brew craft.

"I just realized that I created something that people wanted . . ." he commented on his beginning steps into the coffee business.

Cold brew, the coffee his business specializes in, is considered a brewing process. Using a unique filtration process, his coffee is brewed for about 24 hours.

"You let coffee steep over a period of time. Most companies do . . . six to twelve hours. I do twenty-four . . . I use a unique filtration process which is why I call it craft cold brew," he explained. The coffee itself is described to taste cleaner and smoother because of this long period of filtration.

Vincenzo emphasizes "the purity of the product" as well as the luxury of it. While other chains are accessible in multiple locations, Vincenzo's Cold Brew is self-made and not available to areas outside of Boston. However, it is still as easily accessible without having to wait in the drive-thru.

"We call ourselves . . . the coffee milkman," as Vincenzo explained of his delivery process. Every Sunday, he and his team deliver glass bottles of his craft product to people's doorsteps. By the next Sunday

at noon, the customers put their bottles out to be replaced with their new order. On the website, vincenzoscoldbrew.com, you can sign up for a weekly coffee subscription to either your house or office. Vincenzo offers three different sizes for your convenience: Coffee Drinker (32oz), Coffee Lover

(64oz), and Coffee Connoisseur (128oz). Alongside this special delivery process, the cold brew coffee is entirely fresh; free of chemicals and preservatives.

There are a wide range of flavors, from the original to their best-selling, Jamaican Me Crazy which is a blend

of vanilla, caramel, and chocolate. Other flavors include Blueberry Dream and French Vanilla. Vincenzo is also working on seasonal flavors such as Cinnamon Sticky Bun and Banana Hazelnut, as well as authentic ones like Hawaiian Kona.

To reach a larger consumer audience for their cold brew, Vincenzo hopes to expand his business to ship nationwide. Most coffee chains have not figured out this kind of shipment, which he wants to use as a "premium, cold brew delivery service to your house".

As for Vincenzo himself, coffee "will always be a hobby/passion project". However, he sees the business forming micro-breweries nationwide with local shipping stations to preserve the freshness of the cold brew.

His ultimate goal is to "reshape the coffee culture", raising the standards for coffee from chain to craft.
