Ricky Serino and Nicholas Moulaison Sr. will square off in November for the Ward 6 seat on the Revere City Council following their respective first-and-second-place finishes in Tuesday's Preliminary Election.

Serino took the top spot in the field of three candidates with 583 votes. Moulaison was second with 183 votes.

Francis Sarro was eliminated in the race with 84 votes.

Serino won in all three precincts in the ward, receiving his highest vote in Precinct 1 with 256 votes. He emerged a victor throughout the ward by a solid 3-1 margin.

Serino received an early boost to his well-organized campaign from an endorse-

ment by State Rep. RoseLee Vincent. Serino works at the State House as a legislative aide to the popular representative.

Serino celebrated with his many supporters at a gathering at Casa Lucia. He said he was "humbled" by the huge vote he received in his first run for office.

"I am deeply humbled by today's results, and I want to thank the people of Ward 6 from the bottom of my heart for their resounding support of our campaign's message of having deep roots in the community while at the same time having a forward looking vision for the City of Revere.

"I also want to acknowledge Fran Sarro for his efforts in his campaign and congratulate Nick Moulaison on advancing to November along with me," said Serino. "From the be-

13th Annual Revere Beach Memorial set for Sunday

For one hour this coming Sunday residents will gather on Revere Beach at the bandstand and remember those lost to the substance abuse disorder epidemic.

The gathering began 13 years ago when a group from the Revere residents who had lost someone to opioids or other substances were looking for a way to

express their remembrances, grief and the stories of those who were lost.

This annual candlelight vigil is funded by donations including MGH Revere Cares and will take place this Sunday, Sept. 15 at 7 p.m. at the Reinstein Bandstand on Revere Beach.

According to Viviana Cataño, of Revere Cares, the Revere Beach Memorial serves as a way to remem-

ber those who lost their lives to substance abuse. It is an opportunity for family members and friends to gain strength and support from others who have experienced a similar loss, and it is a reminder to those struggling with addiction that treatment can save lives.

Cataño said the event will kick off like in years

Giannino tops ticket for At-Large candidates

Councillor-at-Large Jessica Giannino again showed strength at the ballot box across the entire city on her way to an impressive first-place in the Preliminary Election Tuesday.

Giannino topped the ticket in the 13-candidate field with 2,012 votes.

Nine other candidates, including the three oth-

er incumbent councillors-at-large - Steven Morabito, George Rotondo, and Anthony Zambuto - joined Giannino as nominees for the general election in November. The incumbents fared very well in the election, finishing in the three successive spots behind the pacesetter Giannino.

Morabito was second

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

people of West Revere and North Revere. Team Serino is just getting started, and we look forward to the next fifty-five days of this campaign.

Moulaison, whose celebration was held at Volare, came to City Hall to watch as the votes were being tabulated and the tallies were being posted on the wall outside the Election Department.

"I feel good about being nominated," said Moulaison. "There was a super low turnout so I know I have to hit the ground running tomorrow and make sure that everyone gets out to vote in November. I worked very hard on my campaign, day and night for the last 6-7 months."

Moulaison said he would be amenable to participate in a debate with Serino. "I

would more than willing to have a debate," he said.

Moulaison is anticipating a substantially larger turnout in November. "Come November, where there will be a bigger race with a mayor's election going on, I think we'll get more votes out and I think I can beat him in November."

Mayor Arrigo launches Results for Revere

Initiative focuses on increasing use of data to smartly deploy city resources

Mayor Brian Arrigo today announced the launch of Results for Revere, a data transparency initiative that, for the first time, will unlock performance data for city departments and share results to the public on the city's website, Revere.org. Over the next several weeks, the Journal will publish details on data most relevant to Revere residents and business owners.

"Since I took office in 2016, our teams have been hard at work to make sure our City's government runs more efficiently, and is using the latest technology to improve services for residents," said Mayor Arrigo. "Results for Revere gives constituents an inside

look at what we've accomplished for them, and holds us accountable to continue to perform at the level our taxpayers deserve."

The first set of data to be published this week includes call data from Revere 311. Visitors to the site can view the number of calls Revere 311 handles each month, as well as the number of opened and closed service requests, by type and ward. Department of Public Works' service requests far outpace those made for other departments, and include requests for potholes to be filled, missing or damaged signs, sidewalk repair and repaving.

The three-person Revere

311 call center team has answered more than 30,000 phone calls in two years, with more than 75 percent of calls answered in under 45 seconds. More than 40% of Revere 311 service requests come from its online and mobile app, well above the industry standard.

Results for Revere has also been implemented cost effectively. With the help of a Harvard Kennedy School fellowship and a software license totaling \$250 per year, the City was able to bypass comparable software packages that can approach as much as \$100,000 for cities to launch data transparency initiatives.

with 1,556 votes, Rotondo was third with 1,446 votes, while Zambuto took fourth with 1,354 votes.

School Committee member Gerry Visconti had an excellent showing, taking fifth overall with 1,333 votes.

The other five qualifiers for the November election taking spots 6-10 in the race were John Correggio (984) Brian Vesce (970), Dimple Rana (955), Wayne Rose (778), and Robert Capoccia (722).

Candidates Philip Russo (522), Kevin Sanchez (423), and Richard Ireton (419) were eliminated in the election.

Giannino, 28, who has been a force in each of her past elections, said she was grateful for the citywide display of support she received in Tuesday's election.

"I'm incredibly grateful to the residents of Revere," said Giannino. "I attribute it to the hard work of my family and all of my supporters, because at the end of the day, I couldn't do it without the people that support me, my grandmother, my father, and my committee that's there for me day in and day out."

Despite being a consistent ticket-topper in her political career, Giannino did not rest on her past triumphs, waging a highly visible campaign

and meeting frequently with voters.

"We have been going all out," said Giannino. "We don't take anything for granted and we work really, really hard every election. I'm so looking forward to the general election and I hope we get a really strong turnout and get a lot of involvement

because it's a great opportunity for the people of the city to get out there and be part of the community."

Giannino is seeking her fifth term on the City Council after winning her first election while she was still a student at Salem State University.

It's on to Nov. 5 for the other Revere candidates

It's on to Tuesday, November 5 for the candidates whose names did not appear on the ballot in Tuesday's preliminary election.

Mayor Brian Arrigo and Councillor-at-Large Dan Rizzo move on to the Nov. 5 mayoral election in a rematch of their hard-fought 2015 contest. The two candidates have been campaigning hard throughout the summer and the enthusiasm and interest in this exciting race will intensify in the next six weeks leading up to Election Day.

There will be three contested races for ward councillor seats. Incumbent Ward 2 Ira Novoselsky is being challenged by Robert E. Bent for the seat. In Ward 5, incumbent John Powers is being challenged by Eric Lampedecchio.

(Ricky Serino and Nicholas Moulaison Sr. will square off for the Ward 6 seat).

Ward 1 Councillor Joanne McKenna, Ward 3 Councillor and current City Council President Arthur Guinasso, and Ward 4 Councillor Patrick Keefe Jr. will be unopposed in the general election.

There was no preliminary election for the School Committee race Tuesday. Those seeking one of the six seats on the School Committee (the mayor is an ex-officio member and serves as chair) in November are incumbents Stacey Bronsdon-Rizzo, Michael Ferrante, Susan Gravelle, Frederick Sannella, and Carol Tye, along with candidates Anthony D'Ambrosio, John Kingston, Albert Terminiello Jr., and Michael Toto Jr.

past with introductions from North Suffolk Mental Health's Kim Hanton. She'll be followed by inspirational readings, and prayer.

"Then we will read the names of those lost to addiction," said Cataño. "There will be 279 names that will be read and more are usually added the night of the event."

The event will close with some testimony from graduates of the Chelsea Drug Court program.

Cataño said Revere Cares does accept donations at the event that helps to plan the next vigil as well as scholarship money for a Revere High School student.

"Any additional funds we raise is put towards this scholarship for a Revere High School student who has been affected by substance abuse, either their own or that of a family

member," said Cataño.

Last year there was enough money left-over to fund a \$500 scholarship for a Revere High School student. Students have to write an essay about the impact of addiction on their lives.

"Those stories are the most touching to me," said Cataño. "We get the essays from the students in the spring and then read them. It's really hard to choose one student because you realize there's a lot of young people in our community that have a lot of hardship and hurt because there are people in their lives struggling with addiction."

As far as the long term future of the event, Cataño can't imagine it going anywhere anytime soon.

"We just discussed this recently and Kim Hanton said we have to keep this going because a lot of families find this event really important," said Cataño. "They need it to feel sup-

ported and that they are not alone."

TIME TO END THE WAR ON DRUGS

For those of us who have been around for longer than we might care to admit, America has been consumed during our lifetime by the never-ending battle to combat drug abuse.

It was in 1971 -- almost 50 years ago -- that President Richard Nixon first declared a "war on drugs." The mindset that took hold thereafter, both among politicians and the public, led to a dramatic increase in the penalties for drug possession, including marijuana, which was classified as a Level One drug at the federal level, the same as heroin.

In the 1980s, First Lady Nancy Reagan launched a "Just Say No to Drugs" campaign and in the 1990s, the Clinton administration and Democratic politicians likewise maintained a strong anti-drug policy with heavy penalties.

However, the true basis for the war on drugs was stated bluntly by former Nixon White House aide John Ehrlichman in 2016: "We knew we couldn't make it illegal to be either against the war or black, but by getting the public to associate the hippies with marijuana and blacks with heroin, and then criminalizing both heavily, we could disrupt those communities. We could arrest their leaders, raid their homes, break up their meetings, and vilify them night after night on the evening news. Did we know we were lying about the drugs? Of course we did."

The end result of our five-decade war on drugs has indeed been what the Nixon administration had hoped for. There are as many Americans with arrest records as with college diplomas; an American is arrested for drug possession every 25 seconds and our nation has more citizens behind bars than any other country in the world, both in terms of sheer numbers and as a percentage of our population.

In 1980 about 50,000 people were in prison for violations related to drug laws -- but today that number is over 400,000.

Yet, the war on drugs and our mass incarceration rates have not even remotely led to a decrease in drug use.

In addition, the spillover from our drug enforcement laws has destroyed the social order in other countries, with the drug cartels essentially reigning supreme in many nations in Central and South America, as well as in Afghanistan.

But the most pernicious effect of the war on drugs has been that it has created an environment that directly has led to the high death rate from drug abuse among our citizenry. More Americans now die each year from overdoses than perished in the Vietnam, Afghan, and Iraq wars combined.

Portugal and Switzerland have decriminalized drug possession of all kinds -- yet the death rate in those countries from drug abuse is almost non-existent. The reason is very simple: Those nations have treated drug dependency as a health issue, rather than a criminal matter.

The war on drugs, as have so many of our real wars, was based on a lie. Our addiction to incarceration has ripped apart families and destroyed individual's lives and their futures.

The war on drugs has been a failure in every respect -- and it's time that we face that reality.

Remembering a tragic day: An appreciation for first-responders

The numeric reference is all we need to see. 9/11.

Or the numbers, spoken as a single hyphenated word, now a part of our vocabulary that evokes a stark and unmistakable memory: Nine-eleven.

On this 18th anniversary of one of the most tragic days in American history, we are left, once again, stunned, silent, and sad. We again recall the sheer disbelief that commercial jets would be flown on purpose into buildings containing thousands of innocent people. We recall the then-incomprehensible vision of two of our nation's most eminent structures crumbling into grisly piles of twisted steel, ash, and human remains.

Of all the awful images seared into my memory of that day, of all the gruesome scenes depicted over the years in documentaries and memorials, I remain spellbound by the sight of the firefighters and police officers, the emergency first responders, headed toward the Twin Towers, in the opposite direction of thousands of frightened, fleeing civilians.

As terrified, helpless onlookers watched flames blaze and black smoke pour out of the gaping wreckage high above New York City, the first responders arrived at the World Trade Center, and went to work, as if it was just another job to do. For them, on this worst day of their lives, it was.

In the gripping documentary by French filmmakers Jules and Gedeon Naudet, we see firefighters dutifully assembling in the lobby of the World Trade Center buildings, amid the piercing scream of sirens and alarms and the sickening thud of bodies landing at the end of their plunge to escape the conflagration 90 floors above.

The firefighters, loaded with over 60 pounds of hose and equipment, discuss their plans, then clamber to the stairwells. The climb up the flights of stairs to go put out the fire and rescue survivors would take nearly two hours. Had they made it.

On that fateful morning 18 years ago, there were 2,977 victims. Among them, 343 New York City firefighters, 23 New York City police officers, and 37 New York/New Jersey Port

Authority police officers who died as they tried to save people in peril. State officials count another 200 firefighters who have succumbed to illnesses arising from their work at the World Trade Center in the aftermath of the attacks.

We mourn the loss of these courageous public servants. We grieve with those who lost loved ones in New York City and Washington, D.C. and Shanksville, Penn. The tragedy was felt right here at home in Revere. Marianne MacFarlane, just 34-years old, was a member of the Flight crew on the ill-fated United Flight 175 that crashed into the South Tower.

But we can find some measure of solace that thousands of lives were saved by the sacrifice and heroism of first responders. They rescued civilians trapped on the 22nd floor of the North Tower. They carried the injured and the immobile to safety. As firefighters climbed up the stairs toward danger, they provided calming reassurance to those rushing down the stairs toward safety.

The National Commission on Terrorist Attacks Upon the United States declared: "It is impossible to measure how many more civilians would have died but for the determination of many members of the FDNY, PAPD, and NYPD to continue assisting civilians after the South Tower collapsed."

The events of Sept. 11, 2001 epitomize the importance of government's commitment to public safety. Nine-eleven compels us never to speak of "public safety" frivolously, never to speak those words as platitude or as the point of an

empty promise. The ability to respond to an emergency—any emergency—is a direct product of preparedness, and that preparedness reminds us of the true meaning of "public safety."

• It means that police and fire departments are fully staffed to serve the public in time of need;

• It means that our first-responders are educated and trained to combat the hazards of a modernized world;

• It means they are equipped with up-to-date tools and apparatus that will maximize their human efforts.

9/11 reminds us that a commitment to public safety is a solemn vow to the residents of our community that we will do all that is necessary to protect their lives against harm.

It is true that a complete and ready force of first responders requires some degree of sacrifice by the taxpayers who bear the associated costs. But we must measure our own sacrifice against the sacrifice that our first responders stand ever ready to make.

Today we remember the first responders who perished on Sept. 11, 2001. We honor all those who mobilized within minutes and took part in the largest rescue operation in the history of New York City.

And most important, we salute all those first responders who serve the public every day, ready to meet any danger in order to protect human life, and who personify the true meaning of public safety.

We express our respect for you, and pledge our resolute commitment to all that you represent.

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Marc Silvestri speaks about his recovery at the SUDI Barbecue

Revere's Substance Abuse Disorder Initiatives (SUDI) Office held its annual barbecue to celebrate National Recovery Month Thursday on the lawn at American Legion Hall.

The highlight of the program came when Marc Silvestri delivered a stirring and emotional message about his recovery from addiction during the speaking program.

Mayor Brian Arrigo delivered his remarks before introducing Silvestri, the current director of Revere veterans' services and a former Revere High School football star.

"The problems that are associated with substance use are in the forefront of my minds and we can overlook some of the successes that come from all the efforts that we make to confront this epidemic," said Arrigo. "Today we celebrate those who are living proof that recovery is possible, that substance use can be conquered."

"And we acknowledge the valuable contributions by those who have survived and overcome the scourge of this epidemic," said Arrigo.

The mayor then commended [SUDI Director] Julia Newhall and her staff at the SUDI "who devote so much of their talent, their time, and their energy to assisting those in need."

"Revere's SUDI office is a place where individuals are treated with dignity and they're guided toward achieving their human potential," said Arrigo.

Turning the program over to Silvestri, the mayor said, "He [Silvestri] is somebody who has truly found his life's passion in what he's doing and he's somebody that I look up to and I know has overcome incredible struggles to do amazing things for the city of Revere and for so many people outside the city of Revere."

'A message of strength, inspiration and hope'

Silvestri, one of Revere's greatest running backs who went on to play college football, told the personal story of his addiction and recovery to an audience that understood his plight.

"My name is Marc Silvestri and I'm grateful for long-term recovery," he said, thanking Julia Newhall for giving him the opportunity to share his message of "strength, inspiration, and hope."

"Addiction was not a goal of mine, not something I was looking for," began Silvestri. "But now looking back on a younger self, I re-

alize I was an addict before I ever put a substance in to my body."

He said despite being a high school All-Star in multiple sports, and popular with "a ton of friends," he felt alone.

Silvestri said in July, 2000, while he was a student in college on a football scholarship, he was a victim of a violent crime in Boston. During his 10-day stay at the hospital, Silvestri said he was given pain medication "and I had that feeling of comfortableness, I was okay with myself and really, that's not okay."

He returned to college for football season "and I used steroids to get back on the field."

The star player on a championship team, Silvestri was suspended for his sophomore and junior seasons "and it put me in a downward spiral."

Silvestri entered the U.S. Army in 2006 and after getting injured in Afghanistan in 2009 on a tour of duty, he returned in 2010 "and I was heavily in prescribed pain medication at that point and under provided for."

In 2012, he returned to Boston and sought care and medication from the Veterans Administration.

"They weren't going to give it to me, I was going to seek it on my own, find it because I knew the best answer again," said Silvestri.

He described "a long, dark period" in which he was separated from his wife and children.

"I suffered and I suffered and it took me two years to wrap my head around that I didn't need to suffer any more and there was help out there," said Silvestri.

During an episode in January, 2013, he reached out to his brother and they drove to the Veterans Administration Hospital in Bedford. Silvestri spent nine days at the hospital in treatment for his addiction.

"I left the detox after nine days and I went to Causeway and I got on MAT (Medically Assisted Treatment)," said Silvestri. "And if you're on medically assisted treatment and you're here today, don't let anyone tell you that your path is any less than theirs because I'm here to tell you that it was a path to recovery that worked for me and today I stand before you as a director of veterans' service, I stand before you back with

my children, back with my wife, I stand before you as a homeowner, I graduated from an associate's degree to a bachelor's degree. I lead things every day in this city to make this city a better place.

"And I wasn't going to come here and share this message today because of the stigma," said Silvestri. "If you're here suffering today, know that there is a better tomorrow. If you're not doing what you're doing yesterday, you're recovering. If you not know doing what you were doing what you were doing last week, you're recovering."

"Don't let anyone tell you your path to recovery is in any special way - because if you're recovering, that's all that counts. There is no easy path. There are no easy days. The struggle is real but we do recover."

"My name is Marc - thank you for giving me this opportunity and bless you all," concluded Silvestri.

Silvestri received a warm ovation from the crowd, and then walked over to Mayor Arrigo and the two men shared a handshake of triumph.







part of camp this year. Six campers painted their hearts out creating beautiful artwork that now adorns our walls. I'm sending along an attachment of two of the murals.


Other activities at the six week summer camp included hiking the Blue Hills, the Lynn Woods, and the Essex

Memorial for Grace Hill Sannella to be unveiled at Revere Beach

The family and friends of the late Grace Hill Sannella will be joined on Revere Beach by state and local officials Sunday, Sept. 15, for the dedication of a plaque in her memory.

The ceremony honoring the lifelong Revere resident will begin at 10 a.m. at the pavilion across from Kelly's Roast Beef.

Grace, who died in June

of last year after a valiant battle with cancer, enjoyed a 42-year career in the City Solicitor's office. She was the wife of School Committeeman and former Whelan School Assistant Principal Frederick A. Sannella.

"There are many place in this city where a plaque honoring Grace Sannella would be appropriate," said Mayor Brian Arrigo. "It could be in the neighborhood near the Immaculate Conception Church where she grew up with her nine brothers and sisters in one of the foremost families in Revere's history, the Hill Family. It could be in the Point of Pines where Grace and her husband Fred made their home for over 40 years, and where she was a popular and active resident of the neighborhood. It could be at City Hall where she devoted 42 years as a paralegal in the Solicitor's office.

"But perhaps no place is more fitting than Revere Beach where Grace found contentment, friendship and serenity during her daily walks. She set a brisk pace as she enjoyed the warm rays of early morning sunlight reflecting off the ocean. Then she would gather with her friends for coffee, companionship and

conversation."

Since her retirement in 2009, Grace began every day by walking along the shores of Revere Beach from her house in the Pines to the Jack Satter House where she would enjoy a coffee and the warmth of friendship with many. It was a routine she steadfastly maintained up until a short time before her death when she no longer had to strength to make the trek.

"Whether it was walking with her on the beach, a lunch date, shopping, a coffee break at City Hall, a visit to Hill Insurance or just enjoying a drink with her, it was special," remembered her nephew, Kevin Hill. "Grace had a unique way of making you feel like you were the most important person she had spoken to that day and there was no place else she would rather be."

Nephew Herb Cogliano added, "The name Grace

could not have been more perfect for her as its many meanings illustrate the virtuous way she lived her life. The words 'goodness' and 'generosity' as well as 'courteous goodwill' exemplify her selfless spirit and attractively polite and respectful manner. My aunt had tremendous integrity."

The plaque was erected by the Massachusetts Department of Conservation and Recreation at the request of the Revere City Council and Massachusetts Legislature.

"When a community loses a prominent resident like Grace Sannella, we all lose a bit of our personality," added Arrigo. "But when we can dedicate a lasting remembrance to those we have lost, we demonstrate our respect and gratitude for a life well lived."

ALL SYSTEMS GO FOR RHS FOOTBALL IN OPENER FRIDAY

The Revere High football team is set to open its season this Friday evening under the lights at Harry Della Russo Stadium when Gloucester, perennially one of the best teams on the North Shore and the defending D-4 North champion, comes to town.

Kick off is set for 6:30 p.m. The RHS football program is coming off one of its most successful seasons in its history. After an 0-2 start, the Patriots finished at 7-4 in the regular season and then added the program's first-ever triumph in the post-season, a victory over North Reading in the D-4 North sectional quarterfinals, before falling to Gloucester in the semifinals.

"We're looking to build on last year's success," said RHS head coach Lou Cicatelli. "We've had a good week of practice ahead of the first game and the team is upbeat."

Although the Patriots generally have made it through the pre-season in good shape health-wise, the Patriots received some bad news when it was learned that junior Mark Galvez will be lost for the season with a broken bone he suffered during a drill.

"Mark will be missed," said Cicatelli.

Friday night's contest will be the season-opener for both teams, with both having taken a "bye" week in Week 1 of the schoolboy grid schedule.

Although the RHS sports program has rejoined the Greater Boston League after departing the Northeastern Conference, of which Revere had been a member since 2005, the football team will continue to play in the NEC for this year and 2020.

The Patriots are in a division with Winthrop, Saugus, Lynn Classical, Lynn English, and Salem.

Friday's game will begin with a moment of silence for the late Mickey "Just Say No to Drugs" Casoli, who was a huge supporter of the RHS football team and who spoke to literally thousands of RHS athletes in the past few decades.

After this week's contest, the Patriots will entertain Peabody on Sept. 20 for another edition of Friday Night Lights.

SUPERB OPENING WEEK FOR REVERE FIELD HOCKEY

The Revere High field hockey team enjoyed an outstanding start to its season, winning two games and tying another.

"This week seemed endless," said RHS head coach Briana Scata. "We had three games in a row on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday."

In Wednesday's opener against Haverhill, after a slow start, the Lady Patriots began to gel, and once they

got going, they couldn't be stopped en route to a 5-0 victory.

Katie O'Donnell scored two goals, assisted by Emily Woodman and Kayla Armetta. First-time goal-scorers for Revere were Julianna Raffa, Sonia Salazar, and Nina Cassinello, who were assisted by O'Donnell, Giulia Cincinnato, and Eve Lescovitz.

"We certainly were tired from our first game the day before and after the long bus ride," noted Scata.

However, the Lady Patriots were back on their home turf Friday to host Malden and controlled the game from the outset en route to a 4-0 victory.

O'Donnell set a new mark in RHS program history by scoring four goals, including a hat trick in one-half, which also is a first for the field hockey program.

"Travis is anxious to show his skills on the world stage and there is no bigger stage than the Staples Center and pay-per-view," said Lake, one of the most respected trainers in all of boxing.

Gambardella said he is looking forward to the opportunity to showcase his skills.

"I'm very excited to be fighting on television," said Gambardella. "Everyone is call this Joey's coming-out party, but this is going to be Travis' coming-out party. I'm excited to be able to show my abilities, my talents, and my hard work."

Gambardella has left for California where he will continue his training and sparring sessions in advance of the highly anticipated bout at the Staples Center, the arena where the great Kobe Bryant starred for the Los Angeles Lakers.



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

Tamar Levy-Gedacht becomes bat mitzvah at Temple Emmanuel

Tamar Levy-Gedacht, a 12-year-old Israeli-American girl who lives in South Korea, became a bat mitzvah at the traditional Jewish ceremony on Aug. 10 at Temple Emmanuel in Chelsea.

Family and friends listened as Tamar, standing confident and poised alongside Rabbi Oksana Chapman, recited from the Torah during the ceremony that symbolizes a girl's religious maturity into adulthood. Boys become bar mitzvah at the age of 13.

Tamar traveled 7,000 miles to celebrate her bat mitzvah in Chelsea. She was born in Manila, Philippines in 2008. Her mother, Ester, is originally from Israel, and her father, Dan, is an American who was born in Milford. Tamar currently lives in Busan, South Korea, where her father heads up the U.S. Consulate.

Her father's career as a Foreign Service Officer for the U.S. State Department has taken the family all over the world.

In addition to the Philippines and South Korea, Tamar, along with her sister, Ariel, 14, and twin brothers, Raphael and Max, 8, have lived in Israel, India, and Poland.

Tamar's bat mitzvah was held at Temple Emmanuel because her proud grandparents, Carl and Sharon Minkovitz of Revere, are members of the congregation.

It was a momentous occasion in the history of the century-old Chelsea institution, but the star of the day was Tamar, a multi-talented

student at the International School in South Korea, who likes to sing and skateboard and also has a Black belt in taekwondo.

Rabbi Oksana Chapman helped Tamar prepare for her bat mitzvah through long-distance lessons and teachings and the Temple's spiritual leader quickly ascertained that Tamar was a special person.

Words from a proud father

Tamar's father, Dan, delivered a gracious and thoughtful speech from the podium on the bema. He thanked all who made the bat mitzvah possible.

"To friends and family it means to me that you're here to help Tamar become a bat mitzvah - Thank you," said Dan. "To my parents, Mom and Carl - how you managed to put this together - words don't exist to show how overwhelmed I am. I love you both so much."

Dan shared a story about Tamar's positive attitude and determination, how she dedicated herself to learning her Torah reading.

"She wanted to put the book away at first, but then she did it. She went through that Torah reading, and then through the service, word by word, line by line. She learned it and she did it her way."

"But that's Tamar, committed to getting the job done and done well. And that's what you all saw today," said Dan. "A young woman who is warm, who is passionate, who possesses empathy - a good person, a mensch."

"Tamar, you are a great kid and I am so proud of you, for what you did today, and for what you do every day. I love you, T, - Mazel Tov."

Tamar's thoughtful advice is well received by the congregation

The guest of honor - Tamar Levy-Gedacht - whom her father called "the woman of the hour" - then delivered the most important speech of her life to date, her first speech after becoming a bat mitzvah.

It was what you would expect: creative, perceptive, and thoughtful, leaving the many guests in attendance with the important advice to heal, not hurt, people with their words.

"Before I start, I would like to thank everyone for coming. It's really wonderful to connect with this side of my family," said Tamar.

"My Torah portion is called 'Devarim: which means 'words' or 'things' in Hebrew," she related. "Devarim is similar to the word 'devorim' which means bees. You know

"bzzz." In the first few chapters of the portion (of the last Five Books of Moses - Deuteronomy), Moses is being very critical of the people of Israel, and of himself. It has been said that Moses' criticisms hurt like the stings of a bee.

"We've all been in situations where other people healed or hurt us with their words, and if we're being honest with ourselves, we have also hurt or healed people with our words as well."

"As you know I have lived in several countries all around the world. This means that I have had to go to different schools whenever my family moved, and I am often the new kid at my school."

"On the first day at a new school, everyone is usually super nice and compli-

menting you. They crowd around you and want to talk to you. These words heal you, making you feel good in your new situation. However, sometimes people reject the new kid at school, and say mean things or don't include them in group activities. Those kinds of words hurt, just like how Moses stung the people of Israel with his criticism."

"When I think about this portion, I am reminded that I have to choose my own words wisely, so that I don't hurt someone. I always try to use words that heal, instead of words that hurt."

I urge you to do the same," concluded Tamar.

And with those heartfelt words of wisdom from a 12-year-old with a bright future in this world, Tamar Levy-Gedacht had become a bat mitzvah.

NEWS FROM AROUND THE REGION

CPA LOOKING FOR HELP TO MEET DEADLINE

CHELSEA - With a pilot round of projects approved by the City Council, the Community Preservation Committee (CPC) is moving forward with plans to fund bigger preservation, open space, and housing projects.

But first, the CPC will need to continue the search for a consultant to help with the process as it becomes more time consuming for the committee volunteers and City staff.

Earlier this summer, the CPC put out a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) for administrative services to help manage the Community Preservation Act (CPA) projects, funds, and proposals, but no one replied to the RFQ.

"The summer tends to be a tougher time (to get responses)," said Karl Allen, the city's economic development planner. "But we can renew it."

While no one filled out an RFQ, Allen said there were about two dozen people who retrieved a copy from the city's website. He also noted that there was one potential applicant,

but she said she would not be able to begin work until around Thanksgiving.

Chelsea voters approved the adoption of the CPA in November 2016. It will provide hundreds of thousands of dollars each year to be used for the creation and acquisition of affordable housing, historic preservation, open space and recreation. The CPA trust fund currently has a balance of just over \$2.2 million before any money was spent on the recent round of pilot projects.

CPC Chair Jose Iraheta noted that the committee was looking to bring another round of CPA projects forward to the council by next March. Pushing back the acquisition of administrative services could delay that timeline, unless the CPC is willing to take on more work, Iraheta said.

"We are already in a tight timeframe to begin with," he said. "We need a willingness to take on some of the work if we want to meet the timeline."

Several CPC members said they were willing to take on more work to help push forward with a more aggressive timeline, including working on public outreach and holding a public

hearing on CPA progress later in the fall.

"I think some of the outreach we can do in advance," said Allen.

If eligibility forms for projects are available by January, Allen said they could be reviewed in time for applications for projects to be filled out in February, and still meet the goal of having the projects before the City Council in March for funding approval.

CPC members agreed that the RFQ for administrative services should be reposted, with Allen reworking the timeline to get projects before the council next March.

In other business at last week's CPC meeting, the committee discussed finalizing the committee's bylaws. The committee also held off on the election of officers until those bylaws are finalized.

The committee also approved using some administrative funds for the design and production of promotional materials.

HARRINGTON WINS BUTTERFLY AWARD

CHELSEA - Sarah Harrington, English Language Learner (ELL) teacher at

Chelsea High School, was the recipient of the first-ever Butterfly Award during the Convocation program Aug. 26 at the school.

Deputy Supt. Linda Breau and Assistant Supt. Sarah Kent, who are both former ELL teachers, presented the award to Harrington.

The Butterfly Award is given by the family of Carolyn Arond in her memory each year to a teacher who exemplifies the qualities and attributes that Carolyn brought to her professional practice. Namely, creative ideas, innovative instructional practices, and strong support of colleagues.

"Carolyn Arond exemplified the Chelsea Public Schools' motto, 'We welcome and educate,'" said Kent. "Throughout her professional career, Carolyn believed in creating a welcoming, safe and nurturing environment for her students."

Kent related that "Carolyn was also a creative teacher, one who took initiative and, as a result, brought joy to children in the classroom and the school."

"Carolyn was a nature enthusiast and integrated her passion in to her work," said Kent. "She initiated the idea of a Butterfly Garden at the Mary C. Burke Complex, hence the name of this honor."

"The contributions Carolyn made to her students and to the Chelsea school

community made a difference," continued Kent. "Those who knew Carolyn know this to be true. Like the 'Butterfly Effect,' Carolyn had, and continues to have a positive impact on all."

Breau told the gathering of educators that there were 12 "outstanding nominations" for the award from all grade levels.

"Sarah was nominated by both an administrator and a teacher," said Breau. "Some of the things her nominators said: a great and positive effect on the school community...like Carolyn Arond, Sarah made students feel they belong here...she is a pioneer in developing discussion routines for ELL...she works tirelessly to revise and improve her lessons embedding language development into her content...and she supports teachers offering her time to educate them on the needs of ELLs."

Harrington was also credited with creating student-led Spanish classes for educators that celebrates and affirms the language skills of our students while meeting a clear need in our schools.

"This has been a successful program for several years now and is having a true 'butterfly effect' in our district and beyond," said Breau.

In addition to the plaque, Harrington also received

a \$500 award that can be used for professional development opportunities or for materials and activities that will enhance and support student learning.

Harrington received a tremendous ovation from her colleagues as she left her seat in the CHS bleachers and walked to the podium in the packed gymnasium to accept the award.

BPDA WANTS MORE INFORMATION ON SUFFOLK DOWNS PROJECT

EAST BOSTON - Before granting approvals to the Suffolk Downs redevelopment project that will add another 10,000 units of housing to the neighborhood, the Boston Planning and Development Agency (BPDA) wants more information and clarity from developer on some key aspects of the proposal.

The BPDA recently made the formal 'Request for Additional Information' from HYM Investment following the conclusion of the Public Comment Period in the spring.

The Suffolk Downs proposal includes 10.5 million square feet of development on approximately 109 acres at the former East Boston racetrack. The multi-phased proposal will include the development of a new

mixed-use neighborhood, a 40-acre publicly accessible open space system, and two retail squares at the Suffolk Downs and Beachmont MBTA Stations.
The first phase will include approximately 1.39 million square feet of development consisting of the 520,000 square feet of corporate use, three residential buildings, a portion of the townhomes proposed along Waldemar Avenue totaling over 800 housing units and construction of the Horseshoe Pond landscaped wetland enhancements and Belle Isle Square public plaza with over 100,000 square feet of ground floor retail.
In the BPDA's letter to HYM the BPDA requested more information regarding the configuration and layout of streets; transportation mitigation; parking and loading; public benefits; emergency service access; roadway maintenance; sea level rise plans; bike lane designs; as well as future connections to the East Boston Greenway.
First, the BPDA has directed HYM to submit additional supporting information demonstrating the internal street dimensions, including all vehicular, bus, bicycle, parking/loading/pick-up, and turn lanes.
The BPDA asked HYM whether or not they had or

could provide estimated trip volumes for each street.
"It would also be helpful to understand the methodology for deriving trip volume estimates and how these relate to parcel level, or district level, planned buildout," the letter said.
The BPDA would also like to see a diagram showing the location of anticipated curbside uses across the site, including parking, loading, pick-up/drop off, and any other anticipated curbside uses.
"The diagram should be accompanied by a tally of curbside spaces for parking, loading, pick-up/drop off, etc.," said the letter to HYM.
The BPDA added that all roads should be laid out, with metes and bounds of all rights-of-way. "As per direction from the Public Works Department, certain streets will need to be designated as public," said the letter. "These should include any future rights of way which would accommodate bus, shuttle or emergency vehicle access."
The BPDA pointed out in numerous locations HYM's documents refer to mitigation measures. However, as a result of changes to the transportation modeling requested by MassDOT as well as significant changes to required mitigation, many of the mitigation


measures identified in the proposal submitted to the BPDA are now obsolete and new mitigation measures will be forthcoming.
"It would be helpful to have a consolidated list of mitigation measures," the letter requested.
"At the end of the final paragraph in Section 8 of the Draft Master Plan it is stated that, "If the amount of traffic generated by the Master Project shall at any time exceed the amount of traffic projected to occur upon full buildout, (HYM) shall work with the City of Boston to implement additional traffic demand management efforts to reduce the amount of traffic to the projected level." This language is problematic because it only refers to the amount of traffic associated with full buildout."
The BPDA said any traffic trigger thresholds for additional mitigation should be tied to specific project phases as opposed to full buildout of the Suffolk Downs site.
The BPDA added that while the proposal states there will be up to 7,216 parking spaces at the development there needs to be a clear statement from HYM that they will monitor parking needs and demands over the build-out of the project with, "The goal of reducing further the number of parking spaces in future construction

phases as warranted."
When it comes to Public Benefits in the proposal the BPDA complained that the Draft Master Plan is "extremely vague."
"There needs to be more detail about the public benefits (such as bicycle paths, bike parking, public bikeshare stations, etc.) including the location, characteristics, and scale or dimension," wrote the BPDA.
The BPDA added that the \$50 million mitigation fee for off-site transportation improvements, transit facilities and related infrastructure has changed substantially.
"As a result of recent conversations between proponents, MassDOT and the City, the list of transportation related mitigation improvements has changed substantially," wrote the BPDA. "This full-modified list of mitigation measures should be identified in the documents. Where fees may be paid in lieu of improvements, the documents should stipulate that, over time, the fees will be indexed to inflation."
Also in the letter the BPDA pointed out emergency services are critical for maintaining life safety and responding to events but in HYM's filing it is unclear how the street system has taken into account access for emergency services like police, fire and ambulance.
"A diagram explaining

routing for all emergency services, the implications such routing has on street design, and the source or basis for the planned routing should be provided," wrote the BPDA. "This diagram should assume direct access from Walley Street to the Suffolk Downs site which allows for two-way travel for emergency vehicles to access and exit the site; direct access from Walley Street will be critical for fire, police, and EMT services to access the Suffolk Downs site from existing locations in East Boston."
Maintenance: Proper procedures for roadway maintenance, including snow plowing, should be outlined by the Proponent. The Proponent include information on locations for onsite maintenance facilities and how maintenance agreements will be structured if multiple owners are present at this site in the future.
The BPDA also made a request for more information regarding HYM's Sea Level Rise plan.
HYM's filing states that they "continue to refine and expand a resiliency assessment of regional barrier along Bennington Street and Route 1A". More specifically, there is reference to possible barriers along Route 1A and Bennington Street to protect the project site and abutting properties, including Suffolk Downs

station and portions of the tracks. However, the BPDA wants to know the status of this feasibility assessment and whether or not HYM is planning to implement any related improvements as part of the project.
"The Climate Ready Boston Coastal Resilience Solutions program will be conducting further analysis of East Boston with a focus on the Belle Isle Marsh and Chelsea Creek areas in 2020," wrote the BPDA. "This will provide a greater understanding of vulnerabilities to current and future coastal storm events and sea level rise, as well as the types of coastal interventions and design options to protect landside areas. The Proponent should provide substantial resources to further advance the design plans and options that result from this process. Each phase of the development program must also adequately address City resiliency policies, programs and standards that are current at the time of design development."
The BPDA added that buildings on the project site must be responsive to the BPDA's Sea Level Rise Design Flood Elevation.
"The Proponent should (also) provide ongoing resources to support the maintenance and operations

BPDA.

The BPDA also felt the HYM's bike access plan did not go far enough on the site. The city is committed to implementing a network of separated cycle tracks to meet the mode share goals of Go Boston 2030. These connections will allow riders of all ages to use these facilities comfortably and with a high degree of safety.

HYM proposed separated bike lanes on the site's main street corridor. However on other parts of the site HYM will follow MassDOT's separated bike lane Planning and Design Guide which says that bike lanes are not needed on streets with speeds below 25 mph.

"A fully separated network of bike lanes, however, is critical for the City to meet the mode share goals of Go Boston 2030 and therefore should be located in more locations in the Suffolk Downs development," wrote the BPDA. "Close coordination with the City/BPDA will be critical to ensure this network meets standards set by the City of Boston."

Finally in the letter the BPDA said HYM should commit to design and fully fund the implementation of an East Boston Greenway extension from Constitution Beach to the Suffolk Downs site via Bennington and Walley Streets. This connection will be critical for allowing cyclists from the East Boston community to reach the Suffolk Downs site safely and efficiently.

TWO WOMEN DIE IN FIRE

EVERETT - A fast moving three-alarm fire with heavy flames greeted firefighters as they arrived at the triple-decker at 87 Madison Ave. just before midnight on Sept. 1, and it was

a fire that claimed the lives of two women that lived in the second floor apartment. The women were apparently roommates in the apartment, and well-known in the neighborhood as they often sat out on the porch to greet neighbors.

"The building is a total loss and we had a roof collapse from the third to the second floor," said Chief Tony Carli. "Fire crews were met with very heavy fire upon arrival. They tried to make their initial attack and had reports of people missing, but it was just too much and we had to pull back... We have decided to engineer the taking down of the home. If it was a newer building, it would have probably burnt down to the ground. Because it was older, it didn't go as fast. They built them well back then... You never want to see this outcome. Everyone did as well as could be expected. It's definitely not the outcome we wanted. It's a tight, tight area and I'm can't believe we kept the adjacent structures from catching. It's that three or four minutes we don't get notified, especially at that time of night, that makes a huge difference. If the fire can get up that quick, it's hard to fight it."

Mayor Carlo DeMaria said the City expresses its condolences; "I want to express our sincerest condolences, as a community, to the friends and families of the victims and hope that they can find strength during this very difficult time," he said. "I also want to acknowledge the bravery of our Everett firefighters, who tried valiantly to save the victims but the fire was just too intense... Due to their skill and professionalism they were able to contain the fire to the one property. We are all deeply saddened by this loss."
