### MAYORAL CANDIDATES SPENT \$519,256 IN THEIR CAMPAIGNS

Revere's 2019 mayoral election was not only exciting, but it was expensive as Mayor Brian Arrigo and Councillor-at-Large Dan Rizzo combined to spend \$519,256 in their respective campaigns for the corner office.

Arrigo, who was re-elected mayor, spent \$329,593, the largest amount among the 99 candidates who sought election in the 34 cities that had mayoral contests. Rizzo spent \$189,663 in his campaign, the third highest amount among all mayoral candidates. Quincy Mayor Thomas Koch spent \$236,739 in his successful campaign for re-election.

The candidates' expenditures listed above are according to data filed by the

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# Super Bowl Aspirations

## Revere overpowers Wayland to advance to North final

A dream season that has placed Revere High among the top football teams in Massachusetts and united the student body and the entire community continues Friday night in what many alumni are calling the biggest athletic event in school history.

The Revere football team, led by electrifying junior running back Joe Llanos and star junior quarterback Calvin Boudreau who is playing the best football of his career when it matters most, defeated a high-powered Wayland team, 42-35, in a Division 4 North semifinal before a large crowd Friday night at Harry Della Russo Stadium.

Coach Lou Ciatelli's undefeated Patriots (9-0) will play undefeated Melrose (9-0) in the Division 4 North final Friday night

in Melrose. The winner advances to the Super Bowl on Dec. 7 at Gillette Stadium in Foxboro.

Llanos, who has been sensational all season on both sides of the ball, made another major contribution to a Revere victory with 241 yards rushing, a leaping interception (seconds after spotter Ira Novoselsky predicted a "turnover" in the Revere pressbox) and a well-executed halfback option pass.

Boudreau was immense piloting Revere's offense, connecting with senior captain Lucas Barbosa for two touchdowns and senior captain Joanthan Murphy for a 19-yard TD reception that proved to be the game-winning points in a wild fourth quarter.

Revere needed every bit of its explosive offense and superb playcalling by its coaches to hold back a ter-

rific Wayland offense and quarterback Mason Bolivar, who scored four touchdowns in the game.

While there were offen-

sive exploits on both sides, there were some noteworthy defensive plays by Revere at crucial moments, including a key fumble re-

covery by junior lineman Dominic Reed that Llanos turned in to six points on a

## An Impressive Debut

### Newcomer Anthony D'Ambrosio tops the ticket in school committee race

There is a new force on the Revere schools' scene and he is 23-year-old Yale graduate Anthony D'Ambrosio.

Making his first bid for office, D'Ambrosio stunned longtime political observers with his first-place finish in the nine-candidate School Committee election on Nov. 5. D'Ambrosio topped the ticket with 5,243 votes, finishing ahead of biennial ticket-topper Carol Tye by 245 votes, along with incumbents Mike Ferrante, Stacey Rizzo, Susan Gravelle and Fred Sannella, who were also re-elected.

D'Ambrosio's impressive total drew comparisons to Councillor-at-Large Jessica Giannino, who received 5,684 votes in her re-election to office. That's impressive company for a first-time officer seeker.

And D'Ambrosio's well-organized campaign and lofty results were noticed by city officials.

Ward 4 Councillor Patrick Keefe, who was re-elected to office, said, "Anthony's vote tally certainly impressed me. I knew that Anthony had run a really nice campaign and he has a long of strong family support. I knew he was going to get on the board, but I wasn't sure how he was going to finish."

"I couldn't believe he was able to top Carol Tye, who has topped the ticket for several years," continued Keefe. "It just goes to show you that there is a new generation coming up in Revere and I think they were really impressed with what Anthony's going to bring to the table."

D'Ambrosio, who is the son of prominent local attorney and former School

Committee member Gerry D'Ambrosio and Michelle D'Ambrosio, accepted his new status as a prolific voter in stride.

"I'm just so blessed and

so lucky and grateful to be elected to the School Committee," said D'Ambrosio.

Asked about his campaign strategy that produced more than 5,300

votes, including hundreds from newcomers to the election process, D'Ambrosio responded, "My

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# Powers says he is eager to return to the City Council

Ward 5 Councillor John Powers said he is eager to get back to work after a hard-fought victory in the Nov. 5 election.

Powers defeated challenger Eric Lampedecchio by 330 votes in a rematch of their 2017 race. Lampedecchio ran a vigorous campaign for several months and attended many City Council meetings, but Powers also campaigned hard and won in all five precincts of the ward.

"I base my victory on my efforts and accomplishments for the residents of Ward 5," said Powers.

The popular councillor led the way with Mayor Brian Arrigo and his colleagues in securing approval of a bond authorization for a new fire station that will serve the Point of Pines, Revere Beach Boulevard, Oak Island, and lower Revere Street, as well as the entire city.

During his tenure, Powers has helped make major improvements to address the flooding issues in the ward. He also advocated for two new parks in Ward

5, Gibson Park in the Point of Pines and a new park in Oak Island.

Powers said he is looking forward to working with Mayor Arrigo and the City Council to continue moving the city in a positive direction.

Powers and all elected officials will be inaugurated during a Jan. 1 ceremony.

In the other contested ward races, Ward 2 Councillor Ira Novoselsky defeated Robert Bent while Ricky Serino defeated Nick Moulaison Sr. to take the Ward 6 seat that is being vacated by retiring Councillor Charlie Patch.

Ward 1 Councillor Joanne McKenna, Ward 3 Councillor Arthur Guinaso, and Ward 4 Councillor Patrick Keefe were unopposed in their bids for re-election to the 11-member City Council.

Arrigo began his campaign with \$165,251 in his account. Rizzo started his campaign with \$6,834.55.

which victors from each division compete to become champion.

"I was lucky enough to win my division," said the 37-year-old. "I fought someone from Venezuela and Chile. I've fought up to 10 times in the division before."

The International Karate Championships originated in Long Beach, Calif., in 1964, and is an annual sports karate tournament that is held in a different country each year.

"Bruce Lee debuted at the first International Karate Championships, where he beat the guy in under a minute," exclaimed Cogliandro, who is planning for next year's tournament in Dublin, Ireland.

Cogliandro is an Associ-

ate Professor and co-owner of his family-run Broadway dojo, Revere Karate Academy, founded by his martial artist parents: Tony Cogliandro and Doreen DiRienzo. Seventy of Cogliandro's students and their families are preparing to compete in the April 2020 IKC.

"We have a big team. I'm really excited," said Cogliandro, who specializes in point fighting. "This is one of my favorite things to do because I get to travel around the world and meet a lot of great people. It's exciting."

Cogliandro is a substitute teacher in Revere Public Schools and loves to teach; especially instructing the over 150 students at Revere Karate Academy, which he considers to be a sensational sports team.

"Our school has been a part of this community for just about 40 years," Cogliandro said, while peering at a framed photograph of himself as a toddler, with his parents poised in their gis. "It's nice to get recognition for our accomplishments. We have amazing students, and a lot of champions here."

campaign was unique in that we came at it from sort of an innovative angle.

"We tied the older strategies that have proven to be successful and some newer, more innovative strategies. The older strategies: we knocked on thousands of doors and we held signs almost every single morning for months. We spent so many dozens of hours stuffing envelopes for mailers and we made phone calls and went to every event we could to meet as many people as possible."

D'Ambrosio also advertised in local newspapers and his efforts in publicizing a major endorsement from former Mayor Tom Ambrosino gave his surging campaign a boost in the final weeks. D'Ambrosio had an internship in D'Ambrosio's Chelsea City Manager's Office while he was a student at Yale.

But D'Ambrosio also went new-age in his campaign, embracing an online presence, and reaching out on Facebook, "where we connected to younger voters, soliciting their support and spreading our message."

The campaign also put together a series of short videos online. "We loved doing the videos that outlined the goals of our campaign and policy points," said D'Ambrosio.

The campaign videos resonated online, with each drawing more than 5,000 viewers.

"The tying of the old and new methods of campaigning really did end up being successful for us," said D'Ambrosio. "I believe we struck a happy medium between the two."

D'Ambrosio also benefited from an excellent performance in the School Committee candidates' forum where he looked poised and confident as he articulated well his message to the voters.

D'Ambrosio said his family, including his parents, his siblings, and his grandparents, were instrumental in his campaign. He also credited the assistance of friends Josh Verrengia and Justin Pioppi, whose family owns the popular Luigi's Restaurant in Beachmont.

"I had the most dedicated campaign team I could have possibly imagined," said D'Ambrosio. "I owe the world to them and I'm so excited they bought in to the message that I was pushing. And they really believed in it and that's why they were out there."

Younger voters, including high school students and newcomers to the city, also supported the D'Ambrosio campaign.

He has been receiving congratulatory calls - including one from Sen. Edward J. Markey - along with emails, and texts from residents, elected officials, former Yale classmates, and friends. D'Ambrosio said one of his platforms was that he will continue to advocate for the construction of a new Revere High School.

"We need a high school and a school system in general that is going to prepare students for the jobs of the 21st century with the skills necessary to get those jobs

and to succeed in those jobs," said D'Ambrosio. "During my campaign, I talked about the tech jobs and STEM-oriented jobs that just dominate the Greater Boston job market. In the construction of a new high school, we have a tremendous social and community opportunity to shape the ways in which our students build their skills for the job force and for life after school."

D'Ambrosio, who received his Master's degree from Cambridge University in England earlier this year, said he made his decision to run for School Committee after discussing it with his parents, and his girlfriend, Caitlin Walsh.

They encouraged him to go for it, and just a few months later, Anthony D'Ambrosio, is a newly elected member of the Revere School Committee.

"I have this opportunity right now to really make a positive difference and I can't wait to pour all my energy into that," said D'Ambrosio, who intends to meet with Supt. of Schools Dr. Dianne Kelly to talk about the successes in the school system and the goals ahead. "I want to be fully prepared to be the best advocate and leader I can when I assume office on January 1."

Mystic Valley Elder Services started Mystic Tea nearly eight years ago to provide an affirming, comfortable gathering place for LGBTQ older adults and anyone who wants to meet, eat and socialize with a lot of very interesting and welcoming people. And within that time, participation in the monthly meetings has remained robust, and newcomers to the Mystic Valley LGBTQ senior community have joined the gathering, finding companionship, acceptance, and the enjoyment of shared experiences.

"It's a space where you don't feel inhibited," says Frank Lapiana, a regular participant in the group. "You may have grown up in an environment where you were mistreated or where you were made to feel like an outcast but this group setting is very comfortable and welcoming."

Mystic Tea is a gathering for anyone with a focus on serving lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender older adults in the Mystic Valley region and beyond. LGBTQ Mystic Tea is held on the third Tuesday of the month from 4:00 to 6:00 pm at Mystic Valley Elder Services, 300 Commercial Street, in Malden. LGBTQ Mystic Tea is open to LGBTQ adults from anywhere in Massachusetts.

The "tea" includes coffee, tea, and a hearty meal, but more importantly, good company and conversation.

Frank says it's a comfortable group, always ready to make a first-timer feel welcome and embraced. And he notes that for some of the participants, it's the only LGBTQ-specific space they ever encounter and they feel connected to each other.

For the several dozen regular attendees of Mystic Tea, both male and female, the monthly event has become central to their social calendars. Sometimes there are special guest speakers, presentations on senior nutrition or help navigating Medicare. Many of the members come every month and have made new friends.

"It gets you out of the house and adds variety to your week," says Christopher Mason. "Mystic Tea is a place where I can be myself and feel comfortable in conversation."



## Organization seeks to give undocumented residents the right to apply for driver's licenses

A simple trip in the car to the Market Basket for many undocumented residents of Revere could equal a catastrophic separation from their children and families – and one statewide organization has tirelessly spent the last year trying to revive the bill in the State Legislature to let undocumented residents qualify for driver's licenses.

Volunteer organizer Amelia Gonzalez Pinal, a resident of Chelsea, said Cosecha began activism with several circles around the state one year ago on Nov. 3 to bring the issue to the forefront once again. The campaign is called Manejando Sin Miedo, or Driving without Fear, and the group has done everything from traditional lobbying to spending a weekend camped out on the State House Lawn.

"We realized nobody has really engaged with the community," she said this week during an interview at Bella Isla in Cary Square. "There has been a lot of good work done. This is one of the big issues that those in our organization all struggle with...Our argument is the roads would be safe and our communities would be safer. Many other states have passed it. It won't be the first time for us. There is precedence... This issue has been hanging around the State House for 15 years. Unfortunately, it

has been very long, but the issues and the struggles of those in the community haven't changed."

Cosecha has established strong circles in Lawrence and Lowell and Worcester, but they have a very strong network in East Boston.

One of the challenges for undocumented residents who drive is that they can easily be pulled over, and without a license, that often can lead to deportation. Pinal said some men from the organization in Lawrence were working construction in New Hampshire. There was no public transit, so they had to drive. The driver had not license, and got pulled over. Two of his co-workers were undocumented, and the situation led to them being detained by the federal government.

Other struggles are economic, whereby undocumented residents cannot get a license and are then confined to jobs – sometimes paying below their skill level – that are accessible by public transit.

"In Boston, folks have a good option in public transit, but not all jobs are accessible by transit," she said. "Many of them do not have the ability to go beyond the community. It's hard for them to go anywhere. If they're in Everett or Malden or Chelsea, there is a bus, but it isn't always reliable. That makes it hard to get to work outside the

community."

One of the key arguments against the bill is many feel there is no way to definitively tell if a person's documents are legitimate. Because such a license would have to be procured through using foreign country birth certificates, there are doubts about the reliability of those documents. Many say it could lead to identity fraud and other criminal actions too.

Advocates say that birth certificates and passports can be verified through consulates, such as the El Salvadoran or Honduran consulates who have frequently visited Chelsea for document verification and renewal.

Pinal said there is a bill in the House Transportation Committee that is being held there. They are currently calling for it to be released for a vote on the House floor. There, they believe they have the votes to get it passed.

Already, Chelsea State Rep. Dan Ryan, who serves on the Transportation Committee, is an ally in the fight.

"I fully support and have co-sponsored bills that would extend access to driver's licenses to all of our neighbors who have the ability to drive, regardless of their immigration status," he said. "I was asked about this legislation when I first ran, my gut feeling then was that driver's li-

censes are a transportation issue not an immigration issue. It wasn't until I got to the State House that I realized that the bill is in the Transportation Committee; and for good reason. Unfortunately, the vitriol surrounding immigration nationally has stood in the way of passing common sense, revenue generating, public safety legislation. My hope is we get this done before this term expires."

And the deadline for the term is a real big part of the activism now going on, Pinal said. They have until July to get the bill passed, or they have to start over again. In the Senate, President Karen Spilka has recently come out in favor of the plan, but Gov. Charlie Baker has been adamantly against it for some time.

"If it goes past July, then we have to start over again and no one wants that," she said. "It will just lead to more fear. There have been three previous attempts and we don't want to have to have four. I have no doubt if we get this to the floor for a vote, we'll have a lot of support in the House and Senate. We hope there could either be an override vote of the governor, or he could change his mind. We hope we can get to either of those points."

The bill being advocated is House Bill 3012, she said.

## THE CLIMATE SCIENTISTS HAVE BEEN WRONG ALL ALONG

For the better part of three decades, the vast majority of scientists -- including those hired by the petroleum industry -- have warned the world that climate change is occurring principally because of carbon emissions from our addiction to fossil fuels for our automobiles, coal power plants, industry, and agricultural production.

They have measured the effects in any number of ways, most especially the shrinkage of the ice sheets at the polar regions that eventually will result, they have said, in a rise in sea levels around the globe.

The also have told us that a warming planet will bring about an increase in ocean temperatures, which in turn will have devastating consequences both for marine life, which cannot exist in warmer waters, and for ourselves, who will feel the impact of ever-more devastating storms.

They have warned that unless we take steps within the next decade to curb the so-called greenhouse gas emissions, the Earth could become irreversibly changed by the end of this century.

However, the scientists have been wrong. Very wrong.

It turns out that the time frame the climate scientists predicted for the dramatic effects of climate change to occur has been grossly underestimated because their models did not take into account the effect of the feedback loops created by our warming planet.

We aren't scientists, but even we understand what is happening right in front of our eyes.

The ice sheets at the poles are melting faster than even the direst of models had predicted. The extraordinary heat wave across Europe this past summer (U.S. women's soccer fans will recall the high temperatures in France during the World Cup) resulted in temperatures reaching the 80s in the Arctic Circle -- an unheard-of phenomenon.

Environment Canada, the country's national weather agency, confirmed that Alert, Nunavut, the most-northerly, permanently-inhabited spot on Earth, hit 69.8 degrees Fahrenheit (21 degrees Celsius) on July 14, the highest temperature ever recorded there.

As the ice at the poles shrinks, instead of sunlight being reflected (by the ice) back into outer space, it is absorbed by the earth. When that happens, the permafrost at the Arctic Circle starts to thaw out, releasing carbon dioxide that has been trapped in it for millennia into our atmosphere, thereby warming our planet at an even faster rate.


It now is clear that scientists' predictions that the effects of climate change were a distant prospect, for which we still had time to take appropriate action, have been vastly underestimated -- by a factor of decades.

Climate change is happening today. The devastating succession of hurricanes, wildfires, floods, and droughts of the past few years have wiped the earth clean of civilization wherever they have struck. Yes, in most instances we can rebuild (though the communities in the Florida Panhandle destroyed by Hurricane Michael in 2018 still look like war zones), but only at a huge cost -- and only until the next climate change-induced catastrophe strikes.

Greta Thunberg's future is not being imperiled. Her future is now the present.

It is the end of the world as we know it.

And unless we immediately and dramatically change our ways, we will not be fine (apologies to REM).

## House passes legislation to support and honor Veterans

On Wednesday House Speaker Robert A. DeLeo and Rep. RoseLee Vincent along with their colleagues in the House of Representatives passed two pieces of legislation to improve the mental health care for student veterans and to honor the military service contributions of a female American Revolutionary War soldier – days before the nation celebrates Veterans Day on Nov. 11.

One bill establishes a continuing education program – administered by the University of Massachusetts Medical School – to train public higher education counselors on the symptoms of conditions like post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) and available resources for treatment for veterans attending state colleges and universities. The legislation aims to provide the necessary training for both clinical and non-clinical counselors working to support the unique needs of the more than 2,500 veteran students attending the state's 29 public higher education institutions.

The second bill establishes a 15-member commission to design a memorial in honor of Deborah Sampson, who disguised herself as a man in order to serve in the Continental Army. The commission will consist of legislators, the Secretary of the Department of Veterans' Services, the Adjutant General of the Commonwealth, and representatives of veteran organizations.

"We're proud today to take action to further support and recognize veterans for their service and sacrifice to our country, especially those who are students and those who are suffering from the invisible wounds of war," said Speaker DeLeo, (D – Winthrop). "By building a memorial to recognize the contributions and bravery of Deborah Sampson, we send a deserving message of validation and support for our past, present and future female service members. I thank Chair Campbell for her thoughtful and diligent work on these issues."

"As we mark Veterans' Day, I am proud that the House has once again passed legislation which will benefit those who served our country valiantly in our Armed Forces, particularly in helping to identify and address the mental wellbeing of student veterans in the Commonwealth," said Rep. RoseLee Vincent (D-Revere). "As we honor our veterans, I thank those who served, and I also thank Speaker DeLeo and Chairwoman Dean Campbell for their commitment to ensuring Massachusetts continues to rank number one in the nation for veterans' services."

"Training counselors at our institutions of higher learning to be familiar with the challenges that veterans face during the transition from active duty and combat to civilian life, and to assist them when the going gets

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

tough, will greatly enhance the chances of a veteran completing their program of study and leading a productive civilian life," said Veterans and Federal Affairs Chair Representative Linda Dean Campbell (D-Methuen). "Deborah Sampson has been recognized nationally as being an inspiration to us all. Hers is a Massachusetts story that deserves to be told far and wide."

In 1782, Sampson used the name Robert Shurtleff to join the elite Fourth Massachusetts Infantry Regiment led by Captain George Webb at West Point, N.Y. Over the following year and a half, she participated in dangerous scouting missions, about the capture that brought about the raid of 15 Tory men, and stormed a British fort during the Siege of Yorktown.

Over the course of her service, Sampson sustained injuries including a forehead gash from a sword and a gunshot wound to the thigh. For the latter,

she removed the bullet herself to avoid detection as a woman. When she later fell seriously ill and was hospitalized, her identity was discovered. On Oct. 23, 1783, she received an honorable discharge and was the only woman to receive a full military pension for her service in the Continental Army. John Hancock and Paul Revere assisted her in obtaining her military pension, and General John Patterson selected her as his aide de camp due to

her bravery and leadership. Sampson is the official state heroine of Massachusetts.

The two bills build on the House's long-standing support for veterans with Massachusetts benefits and services often ranked as No. 1 in the nation. Most recently the legislature passed the BRAVE Act as well as legislation to assist veterans with funeral and burial expenses and property taxes.

The bills will now go to the Senate.

Junior lineman makes key fumble recovery

Dominic Reed stands 6-foot, 3 inches tall and is one of Revere's biggest football players.

Reed probably felt like he was 10-feet tall as he accepted high-fives and hugs from his teammates when he returned to the sidelines after making a huge recovery of a Wayland fumble in the Division 4 North final Friday night at packed Harry Della Russo Stadium.

Reed pounced on the football for the most pivotal

defensive play of his game. The junior's contribution became magnified when running back Joe Llanos scored a touchdown on the very next play, eventually leading to a 42-35 victory over Wayland and a berth in the Division 4 North final Friday night against Melrose.

rushing touchdown on the very next play.

Revere built a 34-14 lead in the game but Bolivar rallied Wayland to within one score, 42-35, with four minutes left.

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## NEWS FROM AROUND THE REGION

### THREE NEW FACES ON CITY COUNCIL

CHELSEA - There will be three new members of the City Council, as incumbent District Councillors Luis Tejada and Joe Perlatonda were defeated, and Todd Taylor won an open seat to replace Robert Bishop in District 1.

Melinda Vega Maldonado prevailed in District 2 over Tejada, 220-124. In District 3, the vote was close, but Naomi Zabot came out on top over Perlatonda, 172-154, according to the unofficial results Tuesday night.

In the other contested district race, incumbent Judith Garcia easily outdistanced Jason Bonetti, 161-48 in District 5. Giovanni Recupero, Yamir Rodriguez, and Calvin Brown ran unopposed in districts 6, 7, and 8 respectively.

In the At-Large race, incumbents Damali Vidot, Roy Avellaneda, and Leo Robinson were returned to office, with Vidot topping the ticket.

"At the end of the day, we ran a very clean campaign, and that resonated with people," said Vidot.

She said her successful bid would not have been possible without the support of the voters, her volunteers, and the community.

The hard work of supporters and voters was a common sentiment among those who were elected.

"I am super excited and humbled," said Maldonado. As a new councillor, Maldonado said she looks forward to working on issues related to the displacement and dislocation of Chelsea residents.

"I'm delighted and excited to have won, and I look forward to serving the constituents in my community," said Zabot. She said the issues surrounding development and traffic are among the biggest issues in the city she has heard about from voters while campaigning.

Garcia said she feels blessed voters have returned her to a third term as District 5 Councillor.

"It means a lot to have the support of the voters and the volunteers who believe in my vision and all I do for the community, especially in District 5," she said. Garcia said she will continue to look at issues that are interconnected in the city, from the environment and housing to opportunities for Chelsea's young people.

"I'm thrilled and thankful to Chelsea voters for again giving me their consideration and look forward to continuing to work and address issues in the community and work for Chelsea," said Avellaneda.

"You can never take the voters for granted," he said, adding that he has been in local politics for 20 years, but approaches each election like it is his first year.

Although Brown and Recupero ran unopposed, both were at City Hall after the polls closed waiting for results.

Brown thanked the residents and business community of District 8 and said he will continue to build relationships and listen to the voters as he serves on the council. Recupero said he will continue to serve to the best of his ability, and urged any constituents who have issues in the city to call him.

The School Committee race held few surprises, but one new face took the At-Large seat.

Roberto Jimenez-Rivera, who moved to Chelsea with his wife Sarah from Cambridge earlier this year, bested Shawn O'Regan, 1,437-818.

Jimenez-Rivera said he

got to know the city voters quickly.

"I knocked on over 2,000 doors myself," he said. "I'm proud of the work my volunteers and I did, and look forward to serving and working with the parents, students, and teachers."

In the district School Committee races, Rosemarie Carlisle, Jeanette Velez, Marisol Santiago, Lucia Henriquez, Henry Wilson, Ana Hernandez, Kelly Chaney Garcia, and Yessenia Alfaro-Alvarez were all either unopposed or easily outdistanced their competition.

Carlisle, who has served on the committee for over 20 years, said she was happy the voters turned out to support her and that she would continue to work to make sure every child in Chelsea gets a good education.

Garcia said she will continue to work on issues of importance to the schools.

"I love my city and I'm going to continue to give back," she said.

### LOWER BROADWAY PARKING LOT NUMBERS NOT AS HIGH AS EXPECTED

EVERETT - The Lower Broadway overflow casino parking lot was expected to be a revenue stream worth several million dollars a year for the City - which is operating the lot for three years - but those estimates are coming in much lower due to lower usage than expected.

City officials didn't immediately have an explanation for the lower numbers, but said it was likely due to Encore making its parking lot free on weekdays, and free for Red Card holders on weekends - cutting into the use of the City's paid parking lot across the street.

City Chief Financial Officer Eric Demas said they had expected around \$5-6 million a year from the lot over a period of three years. However, that is no longer the estimate, even though the parking lot is still making money.


"Usage is down," he said. "At this point, we're not anticipating making those initial estimates we received from Encore. It is a fluid situation and we're adjusting accordingly... Through the end of September, we received a net in excess of \$400,000."

Demas said he didn't have official numbers yet for October when parking became free for everyone the whole month, but he did say the parking lot made money over the Oct. 19-20 weekend.

"We still collected \$6,000 over that weekend," he said. "People are still parking there, but not to the extent we thought they would. Encore's parking is getting full, so we do see an increased usage of our lot during the busy times at Encore on Thursday through Sunday. So, we're still getting revenues."

Mayor Carlo DeMaria said he is still encouraged by the lot, as he was a big proponent of operating it for the interim. He said they are still paying taxes on it, still intend to develop it, and the City isn't losing any money.

"We aren't seeing as much money on the parking as we thought we'd see," said the mayor. "They are still paying taxes on the property, and we are still seeing some good money for that. They only have three years to operate that lot. They're moving on to the next phase of re-development of that parking lot and all the property they purchased from Dexter to Beacham. We're anticipat-

ing reviewing some new development in there in the next few years."

Demas said they are exploring right now the idea of leasing spaces to businesses in the area that need parking - particularly during the slower periods.

"The mayor is looking to maximize those revenue opportunities," he said.

### ZONING BOARD DENIES PROJECT

EVERETT - The Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) unanimously denied a variance request that would have allowed for the conversion of a dilapidated single-story home to an eight-unit apartment building at 126 Ferry St.

The new building would have sat next to a 17-unit apartment building currently being renovated by the owner, according to Anthony Rossi, the attorney for the project.

The variances being sought for the building included rear, side, and front setbacks, but the biggest hold up appeared to be the lack of parking spaces for the project. Under zoning regulations, 16 spots were required for the six two-bedroom and two one-bedroom market-rate units, but there was no parking proposed on site.

"I know there are concerns about parking, but there are three spots that can be rented at the other building (being renovated by the owner)," said Rossi.

Rossi also noted that the building on Ferry Street is near public transportation and bus routes and would appeal to tenants who do not necessarily own cars. He said the owner would also agree to conditions in the ZBA decision in which tenants of 126 Ferry St. would not be able to get on-street parking stickers from the city.

"My concern is parking," said Arlington Street resident Kathy Getchell. "You can't tell someone that is renting that they are not going to have a parking spot. Residents will park on the street."

However, Getchell said she would find the project more acceptable if there was a condition that residents wouldn't be able to get parking stickers.

ZBA member Michael Dantone asked if there was any chance the size of the project could be reduced.

Rossi noted that the owner, Luisa Bedoya, spent a considerable amount on the neighboring property, as

well as 126 Ferry St., and is making a sizeable investment in the properties, but that she would be willing to reduce the project to six units if it was the Board's will.

According to city assessing records, Bedoya purchased 126 Ferry St. last year for \$200,000. She bought 114-124 Ferry St. in 2017 for \$2.8 million.

"We're willing to take a story off and do four two-bedrooms and two one-bedrooms," said Rossi. "We could do that and still have a nice project."

Dantone made a motion to grant the variances for 126 Ferry St. with the conditions that no city parking stickers be issued for residents, and that the project be reduced by one floor, eliminating two units, but the variances were unanimously rejected by the Board.

The applicant can appeal the decision to the state.

•Many of the residents attending Monday night's meeting went home early, as several projects on the agenda were tabled to future meetings, including projects at 31-33 School St. and a controversial one at 295 Chelsea St.

•The ZBA also denied a special permit to convert a two-story home to a three-story home on Bennett Street after the applicant failed to show up for the second hearing in a row.

### ENCORE TO PROVIDE WATER SHUTTLE TO EAST BOSTON

EAST BOSTON - Although East Boston voters overwhelming rejected building a resort-style casino in the neighborhood's backyard at Suffolk Downs in 2013, Encore Boston Harbor will make it easier for residents wishing to visit the casino in Everett.

Encore announced last week that it will add an Eastie stop to the casino's water shuttle route. The cost of taking the water shuttle to Encore will cost \$7 one-way. The shuttle will be complimentary for Encore's Red Card members.

"Due to the incredible success we've seen with our free self-parking, we have decided to expand our complimentary offerings to our mass transit options as well," said Brian Gullbrants, President of Encore Boston Harbor. "We hope this continues to show our

patrons how thankful we are to be Greater Boston's hometown casino."

According to Gullbrant, harbor shuttle service is now \$7 one-way, with guests receiving a \$7 food and beverage credit to use at the resort. Patrons who make use of this voucher will also receive a complimentary one-way ticket for the harbor shuttle.

The new Eastie route will begin daily service at the World Trade Center starting at noon and will travel to The Reelhouse, located at 6 New St., before proceeding to Encore. An additional harbor shuttle route will start at Long Wharf at 11:45 a.m. and will travel directly to Encore Boston Harbor.

The new water shuttle is another step towards making Boston and surrounding waterfront neighborhoods more reliant on water transportation than driving.

Already, the Reelhouse runs a free water taxi from its restaurant in Eastie to the Charlestown Navy Yard.

Also, Boston Harbor Now will soon begin ferry service in Eastie with a stop at Lewis Wharf with stops in the North End and Charlestown.

Encore features 210,000 square-feet of gaming space including more than 3,000 slot machines and 240 table games. Situated on the Mystic River in Everett, and connected to Boston Harbor, Encore Boston Harbor also boasts 671 spacious hotel rooms, a spa, salon and fitness center, specialty retail shops, 15 dining and lounge venues and more than 50,000 square feet of ballroom and meeting spaces. The grounds feature a six-acre Harborwalk with pedestrian and bicycle paths that provide access to the waterfront, an event lawn, public art and ornate floral displays. It is the largest private, single-phase development in the history of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

As more and more waterfront parcels are zoned out of Designated Port Areas (DPA) to make way for luxury housing in Boston Blue Atlantic Fabricators has been hoping to starve off the trend and remain a viable employer in Eastie.

Madaro recently toured Blue Atlantic Fabricators 20,000 square-foot manufacturing facility at the Boston Shipyard and Marina. The company, a subsidiary of Boston Harbor Cruises (BHC), employs 15 skilled workers. Three or four of the employees are Eastie residents and most of the 15 employees are making \$50,000 or more a year with benefits like health insurance and retirement.

The Blue Atlantic facility is located on the waterfront with deep water and heavy tonnage berthing access, making it ideally positioned to provide structural steel components to the emerging U.S. offshore wind industry and developers, as well as being an optimal source for potential boat builds as BHC looks to expand its fleet.

"We had been using Blue Atlantic for seven or eight months to build A-Frames for our offshore division

and saw a great opportunity to begin working together to try to get some of that work from the emerging offshore wind industry," said BHC Principal Rick Nolan. "Production at Blue Atlantic is a shining example of the continuation of Boston's working port as it was originally intended. It's keeping a skilled trade in Massachusetts and, it allows for the next step in BHC's ability to provide quality, local services and support to the growing east coast wind and energy market."

Blue Atlantic General Manager Michael Julian said with just 15 skilled employees his company is doing work on around 1,500 tons of steel material each year but with the emerging offshore wind industry Blue Atlantic is poised to expand.

"Being in a DPA is very important to this endeavor," said Julian. "I can easily see us growing to around 60 to 70 employees if we are able to get some of this wind construction work. I can tell you our employees can handle a good amount of that work in this facility. "We are surrounded by luxury apartments here at the shipyard. There's a lot of development and a lot of changing of the DPAs but is very important to us, the shipyard and the employees that work here to remain a working port."

Formed in August 2014, the Manufacturing Caucus includes more than 60 legislators from around the Commonwealth. All four incumbents received strong votes. Councillors-at-Large Hong Net (5,043), Brian LaPierre (4,974), and Brian Field (4,761 votes) were also re-elected to the Council.

Jose Encarnacion finished in fifth place with 2,409 votes followed by Lennin Ernesto Pena with 1,966 votes in seventh place, and Joel Hyppolite with 1,407 votes in eighth place.

## Incumbents Fare Well In Other Ward Races

In Ward 1, Councilor Wayne Lozzi received 1,579 votes to earn re-election to the City Council. Challenger William O'Shea received 1,283 votes.

Ward 2 Councilor Rick Starbard was unopposed in his bid for re-election. Starbard received 1,035 votes.

In Ward 3, Councilor Darren Cyr, the reigning council president, received 977 votes to defeat George Meimeteas, who received 559 votes.

In Ward 4, Councilor Richard Colucci, dean of the City Council, received 471 votes to defeat Natasha Megie-Maddrey, who received 301 votes.

In Ward 5, Councilor Dianna Chakoutis received 573 votes to defeat Marven Rhode Hyppolite, who received 519 votes.

In Ward 7, Councilor Jay Walsh received 1,059 votes to defeat Alexis Reynoso, who received 315 votes.

## Coppola Tops The Ticket In School Committee Contest

Longtime School Committee member and current Vice Chair Donna Coppola led a successful night for the incumbents, topping the ticket in a field of eight candidates with 5,377 votes.

The other five incumbents were also re-elected in impressive fashion. Lorraine Gately was second with 4,835 votes, followed by fellow incumbents John Ford with 4,779 votes, Jared Nicholson with 4,428 votes, Michael Satterwhite with 4,077 votes, and Brian Castellanos with 4,056 votes.

Sandra Lopez finished seventh with 2,937 votes while Tiffany Jean Magnolia finished eighth with 2,835 votes.

## Janet Rowe Reports 19.99 Percent Turnout

City Clerk and Elections Chief Janet Rowe reported a turnout of 19.99 per cent in Tuesday's general election.

A total of 10,552 voters out of a pool of 52,796 registered voters cast their ballots in the election.

## NEW FACES IN WINTHROP ELECTED OFFICES

WINTHROP - The inclement weather didn't stop voters from getting out to the polls to cast their votes on Tuesday, Nov. 5, as voices were heard and candidates were nominated. The ballot question saw a "yes" vote passed, which means that the majority of voters were in favor of adopting the zoning bylaw to prohibit all types of adult-use marijuana establishments in the town. There were 1,499 votes for "yes" and 1,180 votes for "no," and five out of the six precincts were in favor of banning marijuana establishments.

Running unopposed,

Philip Boncore scored 1,943 votes for Town Council President. Boncore has been Councilor-At-Large since the Council began. With 259 votes, Barbara Flockhart will take over the role of Precinct 4 Councilor. As the top vote-getter with 2,243 votes, Tracey Honan was newly elected as Councilor-At-Large. Also on the Councilor-At-Large seat is Rob DeMarco, re-elected with 1,956 votes. Richard Ferrino was elected as the Precinct 1 councilor with 418 votes.

The Precinct 2 seat was the most competitive in this year's election, with John Munson, Kurt Millar and Jim Letterie, vying for the position. Letterie took the lead with 307 votes making this his 15th year serving on the council, with Munson coming in second with 194 votes and Millar with 120 votes. Steve Ruggiero holds the Precinct 6 seat with 305 votes.

The three four-year Library Trustees are Denise LoConte (1,507), Ronald Bergman (1,231), and Nancy Giuffre (1,199), with Laura Barrett winning the two-year seat with 2038 votes.

The two four-year seats for the Winthrop Housing Authority are Richard Honan (2,045) and Frank Ferrara (1,318). Top votes for the three four-year seats on the school committee are Gus Martucci (1,915), Valentino Capobianco (1,885), and Suzanne Swope (1,730).

With a voter turnout of about 23 percent, the day was deemed a success by those who saw the entire election unfold.

"We had a successful election without incident, that is largely due to our preparation, our training and our team," said Town Clerk, Carla Vitale. "I am grateful for all who ran to help our community and I am looking forward to working with all the win-

ners in the coming year."

## FAMILY SEEKS HELP IN TIME OF NEED

WINTHROP - In 2017, when resident Josh Cohen was in the third grade, he discovered that he had a large Wilms Tumor on his left kidney. Since then, he has had the affected kidney removed, and has undergone 12 rounds of chemotherapy and 13 radiation treatments at Dana Farber and Children's Hospital. Just as Josh and his family were beginning to slip back into their normal lives, they received the devastating news that his bone marrow is failing. He was diagnosed with Myelodysplastic Syndrome (MDS), which is a condition where the bone marrow no longer makes enough healthy cells for him to survive. The Cohen Family is prepared to fight again and Josh will need a bone marrow transplant to save his life, which means that Josh will have to endure many months of isolation to protect him from infection as the treatment takes hold.

"We are heartbroken to be in this position but we have to do what needs to be done. That will mean going from two incomes to one in the near future. 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

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


