

### City Council rejects Lapedecchio's request to ease up on parking, code regulations

Tapley Avenue resident Eric Lapedecchio came to the City Council meeting Monday night with what he felt were good intentions during a global pandemic: the reduction of parking and code ordinances across the city.

"I'm not looking for a blanket of not enforcing code ordinances. I'm just looking for some relief for

our residents," said Lapedecchio. "A lot of residents are hunkered down and quarantining in their homes and as a result of this, we're seeing a lot of folks get tickets that they might not have ever gotten before around parking and trash."

Ward 5 Councillor John Powers was the first to speak against Lapedecchio's proposal.

"I'm sure this is very well intended on behalf

of Mr. Lapedecchio," said Powers. "However, I think the city is functioning and operating the way it is now in regard to code enforcement, etc., addressing those violations and that's because we've been able to have a crew out there doing that work. Our departments are out there and they're finding violations and that's the only way you're ever


there making cannolis and decorating cakes and managing inventory since we were young."





# Emergency response team announces new actions to combat the spread of COVID-19

The City of Revere's Emergency Response Team continues to monitor impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic and develop policies and procedures to maintain public health and safety for all in Revere. As of August 20, the Revere Board of Health has been notified by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health of 2,259 positive and probable cases of COVID-19 in the City of Revere. The City is averaging 13 new cases a day and currently has the third highest daily incidence rate in the Commonwealth. The City's 14-day positivity rate is 5.4%, more than three times the state average.

Last Thursday, the City of Revere's Emergency Response Team announced several actions it will take to slow the spread of the virus. A newly established Covid-19 Enforcement Team, a cross-functional team of public health and safety officials, has been working collaboratively with state officials on strategies to combat the spread of

the virus and alert residents to the urgency of health and safety precautions. These strategies include:

Issuing citations to residences and businesses hosting gatherings that do not comply with Massachusetts regulations.

Closing parks and recreational facilities that have been the site of continued non-compliance with mask requirements and group size limits. Today the basketball courts at Harry Della Russo stadium will be closed until further notice.

The City of Revere Parks and Recreation Department will continue its Safety Monitoring Program and recommend additional closures to the enforcement team as needed.

Continuing increased business inspections and issuance of citations through the Inspectional Services Department. The department is currently hiring for additional inspectors.

Support from the Alcoholic Beverages Control Commission to increase oversight at establishments

across the city.

The City's Outreach Team is also hiring a multilingual team of COVID-19 ambassadors to assist with public outreach, promote safe practices and distribute resources and referrals to residents and visitors. Revere residents interested in joining the team should apply for these positions by August 31 at [revere.org/jobs](http://revere.org/jobs). The positions are being funded through Federal CARES Act funding.

## Citations for Large Gatherings

The City of Revere's COVID-19 Enforcement Team will begin issuing \$490 fines to individuals found to be out of compliance with Governor Charlie Baker's revised gatherings order, issued on Friday, August 7, which applies to all venues and locations, including private homes and backyards:

Indoor gatherings are limited to eight persons per 1,000 square feet of accessible, indoor floor space, and never more than 25 persons in a single, enclosed,

indoor space.

Outdoor gatherings are limited to 25% of the maximum permitted occupancy of the facility or space as documented in the occupancy permit on record with the municipal building department or other municipal record holder if there is a capacity limitation on record, or eight persons per 1,000 square feet where no occupancy limitation is on record and never more than 50 persons in a gathering in a single outdoor space.

All participants in indoor and outdoor gatherings must maintain at least six feet of physical distance from every other participant in the gathering aside from participants who are members of the same household.

For gatherings of more than 10 people, all persons over the age of two must wear a face covering when they attend indoor and outdoor gatherings where participants other than those in the same household will be in attendance, unless they are prevented from wearing a face covering by a medical or disabling condition.

# Revere to receive \$100,000 in state grant

The Baker-Polito Administration announced more than \$7.8 million in Seaport Economic Council grants to support 17 projects across the Commonwealth. Through these grants, the Seaport Economic Council (SEC) will help coastal communities capitalize on their unique assets to advance economic growth, create jobs, and prepare for the impacts of climate change. The grants were approved at a virtual meeting of the Seaport Economic Council chaired by Lt. Governor Karyn Polito.

The City of Revere has received the following award: RiverFront Masterplan \$100,000

This award will fund a land use planner and a maritime engineer to assist in developing a master plan for the 19.4 acre waterfront Revere RiverFront. The planner and maritime engineer will work closely with the City's Department of Strategic Planning and Economic Development (DSPED), Superintendent of Public Works, City Engineer, and Harbormaster to gather information and develop this plan. The master plan will examine issues and opportunities, establish a phased implementation timeline, and identify public and private resources available to facilitate the plan's implementation.

"Our administration is pleased to make these new investments through the Seaport Economic Council to strengthen the potential that exists in the waterfronts and maritime sectors of the Commonwealth's coastal communities," said Governor Charlie Baker. "This grant funding and these local partnerships will be important as cities and town plan for their economic futures while adjusting to a changing climate."

"The Seaport Economic Council is proud to award nearly \$8 million in grants to support 17 projects that will help coastal communities plan for the future, especially as they work to respond to the effects of the

pandemic," said Lt. Governor Karyn Polito, Chair of the Council. "From critical infrastructure upgrades to programming for urban youth, these grants are investments in a Commonwealth and a workforce on the rise."

The SEC provides grant funding to eligible coastal communities and other entities in support of innovative ideas and projects that promote job creation and economic growth, transformative public-private partnerships, educational opportunities for young people, local economic development planning efforts, and coastal infrastructure improvements. The projects supported in this round range from major infrastructure projects in New Bedford, Fall River, and Yarmouth, to planning grants that will help South Shore communities like Cohasset and Kingston prepare for economic development and climate change, respectively. Additionally, the Seaport Economic Council continues its support for programming that exposes young people in urban neighborhoods to maritime careers and puts them on a path to continuing education.

"As we transition from reopening to recovery, we continue to look for ways that the Commonwealth can help communities and key industries come out stronger on the other side, and these Seaport Economic Council grants are an important part of that effort," said Housing and Economic Development Secretary Mike Kennealy. "We will continue to partner with municipalities to ensure they have the resources, technical assistance, and infrastructure to meet current challenges and succeed in

the future."

Since its re-launch by the Baker-Polito Administration in 2015, the Seaport Economic Council has invested over \$52 million through 113 grants in 47 coastal communities, funding projects ranging from local priorities to shared Commonwealth-wide initiatives. Investments in coastal communities are crucial to growing Massachusetts' economy, promoting public safety, and encouraging environmental protection and stewardship. The Baker-Polito Administration will continue to provide resources and programs, like Seaport Economic Council grants and Massachusetts Dredging Program awards, to ensure that coastal communities can improve, strengthen, and safeguard the Commonwealth's unique coastal assets.

The current COVID-19 pandemic will affect voter turnout at the polls. I believe the result will come down to Election Day execution and which candidate can energize his base and voter turnout."







The state representative race between candidates, Revere Councilor Jessica Giannino and Joseph Gravellese is seeing some brisk fundraising and expenditures.

## BE SURE TO VOTE IN THE PRIMARY

This Tuesday, September 1, is primary election day in Massachusetts for both national and state legislative offices.

Primary elections in Massachusetts typically are of little or no consequence because of the overwhelming Democratic voting enrollment and because most Democrats run unopposed.

However, this year's primary election is different because of the hotly-contested U.S. Senate race between incumbent Ed Markey and Congressman Joseph Kennedy that will draw a larger-than-usual turnout for a primary.

In addition, there are two truly unique and important aspects to Tuesday's election.

This will be the first election in which we will be voting either early, by mail, or in person amidst the Covid-19 pandemic. Tuesday's primary will be a good test of the ability of Massachusetts' election officials to conduct an election under these difficult circumstances and thus will serve as excellent preparation, both for voters and officials alike, for the upcoming November Presidential election.

It is important that all of us participate in the democratic process on or before Tuesday so that both we and our election officials can be as knowledgeable as possible about the procedures that we will need to follow in November to ensure a successful final election.

In addition, thanks to the chaos that reigns throughout the country (for many reasons), it is not an understatement to say that the elections to be held this year -- both the primaries and the final -- have taken on more significance than any in our nation's history.

The Presidential elections of 1860 (prior to the start of the Civil War) and 1932 (when we were in the midst of the Great Depression) arguably were the most consequential elections since our founding, but the 2020 election cycle will be even more significant than both of those.

The pundits talk about the existential threat being posed to our democracy and institutions because of the situation in the White House. However, regardless of what one thinks of the current policies emanating from Washington, what undeniably is true is that our democracy certainly will come to an end if we fail to exercise the most important right we have as Americans -- the right to vote.

There is no greater threat to America's survival than our own apathy. A strong voter turnout in every election, including the primaries, will send the clearest possible message to our political leaders that we care about the future direction of our country.

We urge all of our readers to be sure to vote in the primary election -- it is more important than ever.

## POLITICIZING THE PANDEMIC

This past Sunday evening, President Donald Trump held a news conference to announce that the use of blood plasma in treating patients who have contracted Covid-19 has been shown to reduce the death rate from Covid-19 by 35% -- a rather dramatic reduction -- and therefore the FDA was allowing for the emergency use of plasma throughout the country.

The FDA Commissioner, Dr. Stephen Hahn, also spoke at the news conference and appeared to support Trump's statement.

The problem however, is that what both Trump and Dr. Hahn said was not accurate.

The following day, the New York Times published a story in which experts pointed out that the potential benefits of blood plasma treatment had not been proven by randomized clinical trials and certainly not to the extent claimed by Trump and Dr. Hahn.

When Dr. Hahn was contacted by the Times, he issued this statement via Twitter:

"I have been criticized for remarks I made Sunday night about the benefits of convalescent plasma. The criticism is entirely justified. What I should have said better is that the data show a relative risk reduction not an absolute risk reduction."

In short, Dr. Hahn admitted that the claims made by Trump and himself on Sunday evening were wildly exaggerated.

We would remind our readers that the FDA previously had given emergency use authorization for hydroxychloroquine as a Covid-19 treatment after it had been touted by Trump -- only to withdraw that authorization when it was shown that hydroxychloroquine was both ineffective and dangerous.

It is clear that once again the work of the professional scientists and experts is being interfered with by the White House for political purposes.

With the pandemic still causing carnage across our nation (we continue to lead the world in Covid-19 cases and deaths), it is more essential than ever that we need facts based on science -- not on considerations of political grandstanding.



If you know me, you know work ethic and engaged leadership is a trait that I value very highly. It's pretty much the exact reason I ran for local politics. I felt those representing me didn't have the drive, the hustle, the need to constantly get things done and help people as I did.

In the short period of time I have been involved in politics, I feel more led by newcomer Joe Kennedy--who doesn't even represent our district--over a Senator who supposedly lives one town over. I met Senator Markey at the recent Revere inauguration, and I couldn't help but feel

In May and June of this year, Markey missed 80% of the votes taken in the Senate (he missed 34 out of 42 votes), including a vote for \$3 billion on conservation projects, outdoor recreation and maintenance of national parks. \$3 bil-

lion. How was he not there for that vote? On something that many consider "his issue"?

Senator Markey has served Massachusetts for many years and I'm sure he's a nice guy that has good intentions. But "intentions," even good ones, are not good enough. I want to work with the person willing to work as hard as I am. I want a senator that is entrenched in my community. Households can still respond now by responding online at [2020census.gov](http://2020census.gov), by phone at 844-330-2020, or by completing and mailing back the paper questionnaire they received. holds can respond online or by phone in one of 13 languages and find assistance in many more. Those that respond will not need to be visited to obtain their census response.

Revere's current response rate is 54.3%. In 2010, the final self-response was 62.8%. The U.S. Constitution requires that every


person living in the United States is counted every 10 years. The numbers are used to allocate government representation and resources for the following decade. Revere will lose millions of dollars in federal funding for each adult and child that is not counted. Each completed Census survey equals

\$2,372 of Federal Funding for each Massachusetts resident (GWIPP, GWU, Counting for Dollars 2020).

Revere has the opportunity to receive \$23,720,000 for every 10,000 people counted.

Can you help spread the word that the 2020 Census is safe, easy, and confidential? Can you help increase our response rate? If you answered yes, the Revere Counts Complete Count Committee would like to support your efforts through our 2020 Census Response Grant Program. We have \$20,000 available for local partners to improve or increase Get Out The Count activities in order to reach historically under counted communities and hard-to-count communities. Online applications are due on Sunday, August 30th. Grantees must spend all funds by or before September 30th.



camp counselor, to people working in technology and scientific research whose opportunities to start businesses and pursue new ideas were limited by bad policy.

By making the case directly to other legislators and to the public, we were able to build support for a bill that eventually prevented the worst kind of abuses of noncompete agreements.

I was also involved in organizing a coalition that fought for a law holding utility companies accountable for gas leaks. I was in meetings with powerful legislators and staff, directly making the case for why certain language was needed in the bill to make it effective. The end result was a bill that led to the repair of thousands of gas leaks, and further raised the profile of this important issue.

Turning the page to my time at the City of Revere, the work I did was also not glamorous, but it was important.

The day after Mayor Arrigo's victory was confirmed, I sat down for a meeting with members of Revere's Healthy Community Initiatives office. In that meeting in the basement of City Hall, the plan was hatched for the new Substance Use Disorder Initiatives office, which brought the city's work to tackle addiction under one roof and gave it proper funding and support.

In the first months of the Mayor's administration, I pushed every day in meetings to move this project forward, to apply for the grants needed to fund it,

and to work with city staff to roll it out to the public. The end result was a new, vital city office that has contributed to a 40%+ drop in overdose deaths in Revere.

I was also involved in re-launching Revere's Commission on Disabilities. The Commission hadn't met for years, and had no clear direction. So I put out a call to hire new commissioners, and recommended the appointment of Ralph DeCicco to head up this work. Working with Ralph, we energized the commission and set it on a path toward ensuring ADA compliance at city facilities, creating more programming and support for youth with disabilities, such as Special Olympics and programs at Revere Recreation, and created a transparent and fair process for applying for handicapped parking spots.

My willingness to show up and do the work is also reflected in how I've run my campaign. Even as COVID-19 has upended traditional campaigning, I've worked hard to adapt. I've done over ten hours worth of virtual town halls and interviews where I answer questions and speak directly to voters. I've published a series of policy papers both in print and online for you to review. I've spent time in all three communities in the district, dropping literature and getting to know community leaders.

The series of endorsements I have received in this race - from trade unions, to the Massachusetts Teachers Association, to environmental advocates like the Sierra Club - stem from the fact that when these groups meet with me, they know that I've done my homework on the issues, have a deep conviction to do what is right, and have a work ethic that pushes me to keep on fighting for change, even when it's hard.

When I started this campaign, I knew that nobody owed me anything - I'd have to work hard to earn each and every vote. I've tried my best to do just that, and I hope to earn yours by September 1.

## Markey for Senate campaign foregoes door knocking

As COVID-19 cases continue to rise across Massachusetts and the country, the Ed Markey for U.S. Senate campaign is prioritizing the health and safety of voters and volunteers, and will continue the policy of not engaging in door knocking this election cycle.

A traditional statewide field operation includes thousands of volunteers and staff knocking on tens of thousands of doors over the

going to correct anything. I just can't see us not enforcing traffic violations when people are parking on crosswalks, in fire lanes, or in front of hydrants. Those must be enforced 100 percent."

Lampedecchio wanted to defend his position immediately but Council President Patrick Keefe called on Ward 2 Councillor Ira Novoselsky for his remarks,

"I'm sure this all good intentioned," said Novoselsky. "I can tell you that the parking enforcement has been backed off as far as permit parking in neighborhoods and they're not tagging meters on Shirley Avenue because of the construction. But I'd hate to see them back off for [sanitary] code enforcement. We want to keep our city clean, too. I have second thoughts of trying to force this down people's throats. I appreciate his thought but there's a limit."

Councillor-at-Large Anthony Zambuto said he's not "100 percent against not giving a ticket for an overtime parking violation, [but] safety violations for handicapped parking, hydrants) have to be enforced, and I'm definitely against any relief on code violations. We're not going to back off on code enforcement.

That's very important."

Councillor-at-Large Gerry Visconti who had sponsored a similar proposal at the outset of the COVID-19 pandemic, spoke against Lampedecchio's request.

"We've just gone back to enforcing some of those restrictions now," said Visconti. "While I appreciate the motion and feel for the residents, I think it's time that we start to get things back to normal. I agree with my colleagues with the code enforcements as well."

Ward 6 Councillor Richard Serino said he was against the removal of code enforcement violations. "However I do think with a lot of people working from home and working remotely, I really don't see the issue with relaxing the street sweeping violations. I know we did it at the beginning of COVID-19 in March and April, but people are still working from home. Yes, there are signs posted, but sometimes people are working from home and may not remember to remove their cars [during street sweeping]."

Serino noted that the City of Everett is not enforcing street sweeping restrictions. "And I know with the casino over there, they've lost millions of dollars since

COVID-19 hit. I think if the City of Everett can afford it for their residents, I don't see why we can't afford to stop the street sweeping enforcement for the remainder of the season."

Ward 3 Councillor Arthur Guinasso said, "I strongly oppose the idea of reducing code enforcement. There is no time where we should disrespect our laws, park where we shouldn't park, not move our cars when we try to clean up our community. We're all in the same boat. We all know what's due of us. This is a trying time for our community but it's not time to disrespect our neighbors and our community by doing any other violation of law."

Lampedecchio offered the final word on the subject. "I am first and foremost a huge proponent of accountability especially when it comes to safety violations. What I am asking for here is the Council resume the relief that Councillor Visconti had put forth on the onset of COVID-19. As COVID-19 has ramped up again in our city, so has this enforcement. And it seems contradictory that both messages are misaligned like that."

The City Council decided to place the matter on file.

## Councillor Joanne's McKenna's home to be the testing site for airplane emissions study

Ward 1 Councillor Joanne McKenna is well known for looking out for her constituents' best interests on the streets of Beachmont and as it now turns out, officially in the air up above the neighborhood as well.

McKenna's home and yard on Winthrop Avenue will be the site for a machine that will measure the emissions from airplanes landing and taking off from Logan Airport.

Dr. John Durant, environmental engineering professor at Tufts University, is leading the one-year study in collaboration with the Boston University School of Public Health "to better understand aviation impacts in communities near Logan Airport."

The Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) is funding the research that will determine air pollution (chemical pollution and noise pollution) impacts of aviation and how to mitigate pollution from those

impacts.

How did Tufts and BU officials happen to choose the home of Councillor Joanne McKenna for the placement of the machine?

"We are doing a yearlong characterization of impacts near the major runways," said Durant. "We wanted a site to the north in line with the major runway configurations, and through the Logan noise study group, I was referred to Joanne by Gina Cassetta (of the Winthrop Airport Hazards Committee)."

Durant credited McKenna for responding immediately to the request to use her home as an emissions testing site.

"Joanne volunteered and she was quite enthusiastic," said Durant. "So we've installed a water-tight, weather-proof box on her residential property and putting three instruments inside that will measure three different kinds of pollution: nitrogen dioxide, black carbon, and ultra-fine particles. These are all combustion byproducts of the airplane engine, just like they come out of

the tailpipe of a car."

The testing mechanisms will be on 24 hours a day, according to Durant. Winthrop, Chelsea, and South Boston will be the other testing locations.

McKenna has been involved in regular communications with Massport during her tenure on the City Council.

"But this study just fell in my lap," said McKenna humbly. "Tufts and BU are doing a study on the quality of the air over Beachmont and my property is one of the highest points on the hill. Gina Cassetta suggested my house for the study. They [Tufts and BU officials] came to my house a few weeks ago and thought it was a wonderful location. The machine will be in my yard for a year and test the quality and the emissions of the airplanes. It's a great step for Beachmont. Finally we're going to get a study to see how the emissions of the airplanes landing at and departing from Logan affect the health of Beachmont residents."

Revere DPW Supt. Paul Argenzio said that the major rainstorm that hit Revere late Sunday afternoon (Aug. 23) knocked down a few trees and caused minor flooding, but there was no significant damage to

"We had 50 calls for trees and limbs down throughout the city, but it seems that West Revere and across from City Hall were the

"There were a few incidents in the Pines, but we really didn't get calls from Beachmont or the Shirley Avenue area. There were some power lines down on Vane Street and we waited for National Grid to clear

those."

Charlie Pema immigrated from Italy while Zamira Pema immigrated from Albania. They raised their two daughters — both brilliant students and now successes in the business world — in


Revere. The Pema sisters inherited their strong work ethic from their parents.


Bob Dunbar, executive director of Revere TV, told the two candidates that they were part of Revere history



## RLDC at Revere Karate Academy



The idea of converting karate studios into remote learning classrooms is catching on and Doreen DiRienzo is bringing the concept to Revere Karate Academy at the start of the Revere school year.

DiRienzo is one of the most decorated, international figures in the martial arts, having attained Grandmaster and world championship status during her legendary career.

She is also a former Revere schoolteacher and that led to her inspiration to launch the Remote Learning Day Camp (RLDC) at the Revere Karate Academy for the new school year.

On paper, it looks like a well-conceived and convenient alternative for working parents wishing to have a safe and spacious educational setting for their children beyond their homes. The possibility of students from the same grade and school attending DiRienzo's Remote Learning Day Camp (RLDC) would seem to create the most attainable, classroom-style, academic experience available during the continuing COVID-19 pandemic.

"It's a place for parents to leave their kids while they work," said DiRienzo. "The schedule will be school hours from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. The kids bring their own electronic device and headphones and they do their schoolwork and we'll give them recess and breaks and provide recreational activities in between their classes."

DiRienzo said the RLDC Camp will start on the first day of the school year.

"I'll be supervising the

program at the Day Camp," related DiRienzo, a licensed teacher. "We're going to be enrolling a maximum of 20 students and if we get more than 10, then we'll have two instructors. I will keep the students on task and make sure they're staying focused and doing their class work. We will keep everything on a schedule."

Of course, DiRienzo will be available to teach karate to students in a socially distanced environment following the day camp.

## Firefighters battle two multiple-alarm blazes on same night

A box alarm was struck August 5 at 8:21 p.m. for a report of a structure fire at 93 Bradstreet Avenue. Deputy Manion on arrival assumed Command and called in that a working fire was in progress.

All occupants were out of the building. With heavy fire showing from the rear of the building Command ordered a second alarm. One of the occupants stated that they were using a propane gas grill on the third floor porch when the porch and exterior wall caught fire. The State Fire investigation unit determined this to be the accidental cause of the fire.

Fire crews attacked and knocked down the porch

fire with handlines from the exterior eventually chasing hot spots to the interior as the fire made its way from the eves to the kitchen. The fire caused heavy damage to the rear third floor porch, and there was extensive water damage to the floors below.

The building was only partially occupied and appeared to be undergoing some renovations. The two-alarm fire drew mutual aid companies from Chelsea, Everett, Massport and Winthrop. Chief Bright and Assistant Chief Cullen responded on the second alarm along with additional support staff only to be diverted to another multiple alarm structure fire, which came in for 76 John Mooney Road at 9:13 p.m.

The Malden Ladder crew rescued the man from the window over the aerial, care was transferred to the

on-scene Cataldo Ambulance crew for evaluation. Deputy Todisco called in as a covering Deputy arrived on scene and assumed command. Subsequently, Chief Bright relocated from the Bradstreet Avenue fire arrived and assumed Command. The heavy fire on the rear second floor porch was extending to the roof and dropping to the first floor below. A third alarm was struck for man-power due to the extreme heat conditions and exhaustion of crews fighting two multiple alarm fires. Additional supporting companies arrived from Lynn and Saugus to compliment the mutual aid companies of Malden, Boston, Chelsea, Everett, Winthrop and Massport already on scene. Attacks were made and the fire brought under control, extinguished and overhauled but not before extensive damage to the exterior, with multiple roof holes cut for ventilation of fire and superheated gases.


The interior sustained significant smoke, fire and water damage. The Revere Fire Investigator along with the State Fire Investigation Unit has the cause under investigation at this time. National Grid was called to cut the power, the house was determined to be uninhabitable. The Boston Sparks units A10 and A11 responded to both fires and are a welcome addition at every fire scene. The firefighters, most of whom worked both fires, in very humid conditions benefited greatly from the rehab offered by the Sparks service. Thankfully, no injuries including heat exhaustion were reported.






Loving father, grandfather and great grandfather



### USPS Board of Governors announces bipartisan Election Mail Committee

The United States Postal Service Board of Governors last week announced the establishment of a bipartisan Election Mail Committee that will actively oversee the United States Postal Service's support of the mail-in voting process.

The committee will be chaired by Governor Lee Moak, who will be joined on the committee by Gov. Ron Bloom and Gov. John Barger.

The Postal Service has a long history of effectively helping Americans participate in elections via mail-in ballots, which are expected to account for less than two percent of all mail volume from mid-September until Election Day. However, because of the ongoing pandemic, many states are anticipating the expanded use of the mail for voting during the upcoming national election, and in some instances are allowing mail-in voting and no-excuse absentee voting for the first time under statute, and each state has unique requirements and deadlines for ballots under state laws.

The Election Mail Committee will use its oversight role to reinforce the strong commitment of the Postal Service to the mail as an important part of the nation's democratic process, and will regularly monitor

execution of USPS's work on election mail to ensure that our part of this election process is implemented in the most effective way possible.

In a joint statement, the Governors announced:

"The United States Postal Service will play an indispensable role in ensuring that those Americans who wish to vote by mail will be able to do so and have their votes counted. The Governors take our responsibility with the utmost gravity, and we will work to ensure that the Postal Service continues to perform for the American people this election season."

"Postmaster General Louis DeJoy has the full support of the Governors. He was selected to help bring needed changes to the Postal Service, which has experienced over a decade of financial losses and faces the need for fundamental reform. ## Large turnout expected for Primary Election on Sept. 1

In past years Elections Commissioner Diane Colella would be basing her prediction for an Election Day turnout on her years of experience and personal gauging of the interest in the Revere community.

But with mail-in voting and absentee balloting on the upswing, Colella already knows that many ballots will be cast in the Sept. 1 primary.

Also propelling a surge of local voter interest is the hotly contested race for the Sixteenth Suffolk District state representative seat. Councillor-at-Large Jessica Giannino and Joe Gravelle have been waging highly visible and well-organized campaigns over the past several months for the seat that is currently held by retiring State Rep. RoseLee Vincent. The winner of Tuesday's Democratic Primary will proceed to

the Nov. 3 General Election. Revere resident Philip Russo is running a write-in campaign in the Republican Primary.

The Democratic Primary featuring U.S. Sen. Edward Markey and Congressman Joe Kennedy has also been a barnburner, with both candidates visiting Revere on many occasions during the campaign.

Colella said the Revere Election Department received 5,441 vote-by-mail applications and that 2,396 ballots have been received. The department also processed 386 absentee ballots of which 286 ballots have been returned.

The polls will open at 7 a.m. on Election Day (Please see page 11 for poll locations).

## Officials announce COVID-19 restrictions on primary night

Due to the Covid-19 Pandemic and related restrictions, and in the effort to promote public safety and protect the well-being of everyone involved, the following steps will be implemented at Revere City Hall on Primary Election Night, Tuesday, September 1.

1. City Hall will be closed to the general public on Election Night. Only authorized persons will be admitted into City Hall after check-in through the lower entrance on the Pleasant Street side of the building.

2. The following persons will be authorized to enter City Hall:

a. Election Department staff working in relation to the Election.

b. Police department officers delivering ballots to City hall.

c. Candidates for office whose name appears on the ballot, in addition to no more than two associates/campaign staff who must be registered for entry prior to 5 p.m. on Primary Election night.

i. Please provide the names of associates/staff to the Election Department before 5:00 p.m. on Primary Election night.

d. Authorized representatives of Revere TV and the media.

3. All persons entering Revere City Hall are re-

quired to wear facial coverings and to observe the 6-foot social distancing requirements.

4. Election Department operations will be conducted in the City Council Chamber to allow for more space for workers. The Council Chamber will be closed to all persons other than Election Department staff working in relation to the Election, and police officers and poll workers who deliver the ballots to City Hall. No other persons will be allowed in the Council Chamber, consistent with past practice when the Election Department operations took place in the Election Department office.

5. Ballot tabulations listed on the "tape" produced by the ballot counting machines will be posted in a conspicuous place outside the Council Chamber as soon as it is produced.

6. Revere TV will telecast, according to their resources, the delivery of ballots and the posting of the "tape" tabulations.

Your cooperation is imperative to assure the safety of those who are required to participate in this vital function. I am grateful for your patience and we will do everything in our power to assure a smooth and transparent operation on Election Night, just as we always have. The circumstances of the pandemic, however, compel us to implement these changes to our previous routine.

"signed off" on it," said RTA Vice President Charlene Logue. "However, the RPS continues to present that teachers--who come from 99 different cities and towns--will go into the buildings and teach remotely from their classrooms. They also plan to bring in "high risk groups" for "in person full time" and their teachers who teach them while the majority of students will be learning remotely from home. Three buildings that house five schools have not passed the HVAC expectations. The classrooms do not have the technology like webcams, microphones, and the bandwidth to support a virtual learning model. The list of concerns goes on and on."

RTA members aired their concerns during a standout Monday in front of City Hall on Broadway.

The standout pressed Mayor Brian Arrigo and RPS Superintendent Diane Kelly to respond to some of RTA member's criticisms.

Arrigo and Kelly confirmed that despite kicking off the school year with remote learning until COVID numbers in Revere come down, teachers will be back in classrooms to teach remotely.

Arrigo and Kelly said this move will allow teachers to draw from the resources that are only available to them when they are in a school building.

"This includes access to their entire classrooms (chalkboards, libraries, supplemental instructional tools, etc.), technical support, their peers, and other support staff," said Arrigo and Kelly in the joint statement. "We do not believe we will find success if our teachers are asked to attempt remote instruction from 99 different cities and towns without central support. Beginning September 1, in-person support for our faculty will include curriculum planning sessions, training on new safety pro-

tocols, and guidance for referring students for additional support as needed."

As far as the school buildings not being up to par for reopening, Arrigo and Kelly said the city and RPS are ensuring that the buildings are clean and safe for teachers, administrators and students.

"This work to-date has included securing enough personal protective equipment to meet the needs of all our teachers, staff and students," continued the statement. "We have also evaluated all school HVAC systems and will complete the necessary upgrades and repairs this week. Increased deep cleaning protocols at all schools buildings will continue. Administrative teams, secretaries, and custodial staff have been working safely in our buildings since June, and we have ample space for our teachers and small groups of students to safely return as well."

Arrigo and Kelly added that reopening strategy is focused on safety first.

"It is guided by health care professionals and data. It is targeted to critical need students in a phased approach. And it is responsive to the support and training we know our faculty and staff need and deserve," said the statement. "This is based on the ongoing guidance of medical professionals, including Dr. Nathalee Kong of Mass General and Dr. Douglas Golenbock of UMass Medical, and the input of our families, teachers and administrators. We are grateful to the incredible team at the School Department for the tremendous amount of care and work they continue to dedicate to our schools' reopening."

Another component of a safe, remote opening is making best efforts to meet the unique needs of all our students.

"Research indicates that in-person learning, even in this new environment, is

the only effective strategy for some students who have special learning needs and are English language learners," said Arrigo and Kelly.

Smaller gatherings that allow for appropriate social distancing, combined with safety precautions like mask wearing and frequent hand washing, have been deemed safe by trusted medical professionals and organizations."

While Arrigo and Kelly agreed there are obstacles that the city will need to overcome to be successful they remain focused on solutions.

"If we work together, we can do what is best for our community and students," they said. "We look forward to sharing more details with you in the coming days and weeks. And we thank you for your patience and understanding as we navigate these unprecedented times while prioritizing the well-being and safety of our students, families and teachers."

## City close to picking a new high school project manager

## YAWKEY LEAGUE CHAMPS

Eastie Expos edge Charlestown to become the 2020 Yawkey League champions

Consecutive singles by Ben Adams, Devin Santilli and Brandon Grover loaded the bases for Jack Vaccari to knock in Adams on a fielder's choice, then Halloran knocked home Santilli to put the Townies up 5-1.

The Expos scratched back with a pair of runs in the top of the fourth. Bret Samboy led off with a double off Evan Walsh and scored when Matt Ferro doubled. Jose Paulino singled to put runners on the corners, then Ismael Tatis walked to load the bases.


Ferro scored on a wild pitch, then Mike Oliveira was hit by a pitch to load

### CLARK SCHOOL NAMED AFTER MORRIE SEIGAL

CHELSEA - The City of Chelsea and the Chelsea School Committee would like to recognize and acknowledge that the Clark Avenue Middle School has been dedicated to Morris H. "Morrie" Seigal and will be forever designated as the Morris H. Seigal Clark Avenue Middle School.

The Chelsea School Committee recommended this dedication by vote on Feb. 7, 2019. However, due to COVID-19 in May, the formal dedication of the school is postponed.

Morris Henry Seigal was a lifelong resident of the City of Chelsea, and his contributions to the Chelsea Public Schools are to be commended.

Morris Henry Seigal lived his 92 years as a lifelong resident of Chelsea. He graduated from Chelsea High School before going on to receive his undergraduate degree from Salem State College and his graduate degree from Boston University. Seigal served a three-year tour in the U.S. Army during WWII, including 18 months of combat service in the South Pacific. During his 36-year career in the Chelsea school system, Seigal was a teacher, master's assistant for grades 1-6, submaster at the Williams School, and lastly the headmaster at the Mary C. Burke School. He also served as president of the Chelsea Teacher's Union for several years. Morris served for 29 years on the Chelsea School Committee, elected in 1983 and was twice elected as School Committee Chairman. He was a youth director at the Young Men's Hebrew Association (YMHS) for 21 years and also served as the assistant director of Camp Menorah. Mr. Seigal sponsored the motion that led to the Boston University/Chelsea Partnership, which resulted in the construction of four new schools in Chelsea. He was instrumental in the motion that resulted in the naming of these schools after Chelsea residents who had lost their lives while serving their country.

### NEW BUS LANE CONSTRUCTION TO START

CHELSEA - A dynamic, new dedicated bus and bike lane will start construction in the Broadway business district in September, with an eye to finishing up the

project in three to four weeks before the end of the construction season.

Planner Alex Train and Public Works Director Fidel Maltez said they have all of the designs ready and approvals from the City Council and Traffic/Parking Commission.

"We've fully designed the bus lane project and are proceeding with construction in September," said Train. "We've had a lot of conversations with business owners concerning the implementation. But we're extremely excited for this and it's a positive and a great step in the right direction for mobility. Route 112 carries 12,000 people a day, and the Route 116 and 117 use the same route and carry more people every day. This bus lane will really improve these three big bus routes and create better waiting areas, too."

The bus lane will run along the western side of the Broadway and will be delineated by distinctive red paint to let drivers know to stay out of that lane when driving or parking. The lane will go from Bellingham Square southbound to Third Street/Everett Avenue. It will also accommodate bicyclists and provide a safer way for them to travel down Broadway as well. Meanwhile, the Fourth and Broadway bus stop will be widened and improved for those waiting there. The project is expected to cost \$570,000, and there is an online public meeting about the upcoming construction on Aug. 26 at 6 p.m.

One of the keys, Maltez said, is to make sure the Chelsea Police and City officials enforce the dedicated lane, which will not be separated with dividers or other traffic posts. He said that will be key, and that the Police are on board with it.

"That was one of the first challenges we wanted to take on," he said. "Enforcement is going to be the key...We want it ticketed and enforced. The red paint we believe will make a difference. We've seen it work in two places, including City Hall and Park Square. Having the red paint tells people not to go there. Just the red paint itself is a deterrent."

He also said they have begun to add more short-term parking zones along Broadway, and Train said they looked at frequent double parking spots and tried to home in on those areas for the short-term parking.

Those five-minute zones were unveiled along Broadway two weeks ago, and have been working well

initially.

The Broadway bus and bike lane could also tie in to other routes too.

Maltez said for the bus aspect, there has been talk at the state level about adding a dedicated bus lane to the Mystic/Tobin Bridge. There is also a dedicated bus lane included in the re-design of Rutherford Avenue and the North Washington Street Bridge in Charlestown. With all those pieces working together, it could mean a seamless and quick ride to downtown Boston from Bellingham Square, he said.

"The Route 111 in particular would have a dedicated bus lane from Bellingham Square all the way to Boston if that dedicated lane come into effect on the Tobin in the future," he said.

Train said the bike lane aspect would tie into upcoming lanes on Williams and Beacham Streets, as well as a planned bike lane on Upper Broadway to the Revere line.

Looking to the long-term future, Train said there is a much larger project being designed with MassDOT to fully revamp downtown – including new utilities, sidewalks, paving, traffic signals and new public spaces. That has an estimated start date of 2025.

### NOT A LOT OF FUNDRAISING IN STATE REP. RACE

EVERETT - While the

race for state representative in Everett this summer has had a good deal of interest and debate – at a social distance of course – it hasn't generated a lot of fundraising or spending compared to other nearby races for state representative.

State records from the Office of Campaign and Political Finance (OCPF) have been revamped during this election cycle to require candidates to submit campaign reports every month – giving those on the outside a clearer look at how campaigns are running from month to month.

It, of course, has been a brave new world trying to campaign and raise money within the confines of COVID-19 restrictions, which means there are no in-person fundraising events or rallies or numerous house parties bent on raising money for campaigns. In all, incumbents have led the way due to their network of established donors from the past, and that was no exception in Everett where State Rep. Joe McGonagle outpaced his challenger, Councilor Michael McLaughlin in fundraising last month.

McGonagle and McLaughlin started June in relatively similar spots when it came to fundraising and capital available. However, McGonagle raised \$19,901 in July to bring his cash on hand to \$21,102 on July 31.

Some of his notable donations came from Councilors Anthony DiPierro and John Hanlon, as well as School Committee-man Frank Parker. Former House Speaker Tom Finneran, and his wife, Donna, also contributed to the campaign \$200 each in July. The Everett Superior Officers Union also contributed \$500 in July.

## U.S. AMBASSADOR CARRINGTON DEAD AT AGE 90

**EVERETT** - Former U.S. Ambassador Walter Carrington often described growing up in Everett during the 1930s and 1940s not as an oppressive environment for a young black boy like himself – which would have been the norm in America at the time – but rather a “racial cocoon” where he was welcomed everywhere and felt no hint of racial discrimination or prejudice from his friends or his teachers.

It was, as he described it in a heartwarming essay a few years back, “an Atypical Black American Boyhood.” Carrington, 90, grew up in Everett, attended Everett public schools, then went on to Harvard University – preparing him for a distinguished role in the Civil Rights Movement and as ambassador to Senegal and Nigeria.

Locally, in 2017, he was the Grand Marshal of the City of Everett’s colossal 125th anniversary celebration, and last year he was an honored guest in attendance on the opening morning of Encore Boston Harbor.

“Everett then was a very unique city,” he said. “We had a population of 50,000 and only about 50 black families and those black families were scattered throughout the city,” he told the Independent in 2017.

“There was no black area. It was very integrated. Later, I learned the National Urban League had done a study and found that Everett was the most integrated city of its kind in the country. I grew up in a very integrated community, which was unique for those times.”

“In fact, I grew up in an area with mostly Irish and Italian kids,” he continued. “I was the only black and I would tell people I could swear in Italian with a Sicilian accent before I had ever learned to swear in English. It was a great place to grow up in the 1930s and 1940s. That gave me the ability to thrive and go on and do things I wanted to do.”

Carrington, now of Newton, left behind his wife and constant companion, Arese Carrington.

This week, she said her heart was broken and she was honored to have been by his side.

“My heart is heavy and broken with the passing of my beloved husband Ambassador Walter Carrington,” she said this week. “He was a brilliant, loving gentle husband. We shared a great love and bond, unity, trust and respect for each other. I remember him showing me his childhood home in Everett and going down memory lane of his high school days at Everett High. He was so happy to have been the Everett’s Grand Marshal and as we rode down the streets in an open car, he was pointing out places to me.”

It was such an honor for me to be by his side on his courageous journey of selflessness in the service of humanity especially as he fought for human rights and democracy in Nigeria.

“He was such a great man, an activist to the core who did so much for civil rights, human rights, democracy, rule of law and social justice,” she continued. “He was passionate about the important things in life and always showed such humility and compassion. Heartwarming tributes have been pouring in from around the world. He touched so many lives and had an impact on so many countries. His legacies will live on forever.”

Arese Carrington said her husband will be laid to rest in the place he regarded as his hometown – Everett. Despite his sojourn round the world, his wishes were to be returned to his home

that he cherished so much.

His time at Harvard was a special one, and he was talented in debate and public speaking – something he credited to mentors in Everett like Lt. Gov. Sumner Whittier. After Harvard, he became the youngest member ever of the Massachusetts Commission Against Discrimination (MCAD). It was there he was instrumental in deciding a case against the Boston Red Sox that forced the team to integrate racially more than a decade after Jackie Robinson had broken the color barrier.

He was a member of the Peace Corps in Africa, which is what eventually drew him back there as an Ambassador to Senegal and, later, Nigeria.

A stint of four years in Nigeria as Ambassador was truly a life-changing, and life-threatening, stretch of service – and something that defined his renowned career.

Facing a harsh military dictatorship, Carrington decided he would stand up for his values and for American values – things he learned to be dear to him while growing up in Everett. Speaking up was a dangerous thing, but he said he had been resolved to continue calling for democracy in Nigeria.

“That entire experience was something important for me and gave me a chance to speak up in defense of the values I believed in,” he said during the 2017 interview.

Later, after democracy came to the country of Nigeria, the government surprised Carrington by naming the diplomatic area of the capital after him.

Still today, the Water Carrington Crescent exists as the area where more than 12 diplomatic missions call their home in Lagos, Nigeria.

Not bad for a humble kid from Everett who formed those values in the schools and on the streets of Everett, Massachusetts.

## BPDA TO HOLD ADDITIONAL MEETINGS

**EAST BOSTON** - The Boston Planning and Development Agency’s (BPDA) Molly McGlynn is reminding East Boston residents there are still two more opportunities to participate in a virtual community meeting regarding the Suffolk Downs proposal.

McGlynn added that residents still have time to weigh in on the project through the Public Comment Period.

“The meetings will include Spanish and Arabic translation, and are posted to our website here: [www.bostonplans.org/projects/development-projects/suffolk-downs](http://www.bostonplans.org/projects/development-projects/suffolk-downs),” said McGlynn. “As part of these meetings, the agency will be seeking additional community input on the project through August 21.”

The remaining virtual BPDA meetings are scheduled for Thursday, August 20 from 6:00 – 8:00 p.m. and Tuesday, August 25 from 6:00 – 8:00 p.m.

McGlynn added the virtual meetings are being held to facilitate additional outreach to Spanish- and Arabic-speaking residents, as part of the BPDA’s review of the project. At each meeting, there will be a presentation by the proponent that will provide an overview of the project, anticipated impacts, and proposed mitigation.

Following the presentation, members of the public will be given an opportunity to ask questions and provide comments and feedback. Simultaneous translation services will be provided through the Zoom

platform. Suffolk Downs project documents have been translated into Spanish and Arabic, and these are available to the public on the BPDA’s and project proponent’s websites.

With the BPDA poised to approve the 161-acre Suffolk Downs mixed-use project the community process came under some criticism that resulted in a civil rights complaint by the Lawyers for Civil Rights (LCR). LCR filed the civil rights complaint with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) back in February.

The complaint charges that the BPDA has violated federal civil rights law by failing to make the Suffolk Downs review process accessible to non-English speakers.

According to the complaint filed on behalf of GreenRoots, Inc. and City Life/Vida Urbana, LCR is asking HUD to halt the project until the BPDA comes into full compliance with federal laws, and urge the City of Boston to voluntarily conduct an independent language access audit of all city agencies.

“We are not anti-development. We are pro-growth—smart and equitable growth,” said Iván Espinoza-Madrigal, Executive Director of Lawyers for Civil Rights. “The BPDA was well aware that a significant percentage of East Boston residents speak primarily Spanish or Arabic. By failing to hire interpreters versed in the language of planning or zoning, or to translate key documents, the BPDA is effectively excluding immigrant residents of East Boston from the development process. Under well-settled federal law, this exclusion constitutes national origin discrimination.”

If approved, the project will create an entirely new neighborhood in the heart of Eastie, a historically working-class community with a significant non-English speaking population.

McGlynn said each meeting will be hosted online, using Zoom.

“You must register for each meeting through the links provided below, then you will receive a confirmation email with instructions for joining the meeting,” she said. “You will also receive an email before the meeting regarding technical assistance. The meeting will open about 20 minutes before the start time for each meeting for you to join and troubleshoot any technical issues, including respecting simultaneous translation services. If you’re calling in by phone, you’ll need to download the Zoom application to see the presentation and access language interpretation.”

## EAST BOSTON YMCA RETURNS

**EAST BOSTON** - The East Boston YMCA on Bremen Street has been busy all through the COVID-19 pandemic as a neighborhood food distribution site for families and a free emergency day care provider for essential workers.

As the state’s phased COVID reopening plan began earlier this summer things at the Eastie Y have been slowly returning back to normal with some restrictions.

As summer programs began, the Eastie Y provided summer day care for youth with limited capacity and strictly enforced rules and regulations.

Recently another part of the Eastie Y’s operations made a comeback.

The East Boston YMCA reopened its fitness portion of their operation to members at a reduced capacity.

If this pandemic has shown us anything, it is

that East Boston is a strong community,” said the Eastie Y’s Executive Director Joe Gaeta. “It has been 5 months and the community continues to pull together in its time of need. To this date, the Y has served over 250,000 meals, 3,000 produce bags and 6,000 plus hours of emergency child-care for children. The last missing part was the health and wellness portion of the Y’s mission.”

Under Governor Baker’s phased plan, gyms were allowed to reopen in Phase 3 starting July 13.

Gaeta said the Eastie Y took its time to make sure all areas of safety were met before opening their doors.

“Our gym is very safe,” said Gaeta. “The Y has taken measures that either meet or exceed the guidelines issued by the State. Each machine is spaced 14 feet apart and all group exercise classes are held outside. We have a brand new reservation system where members secure space for 45 minutes and are in their own areas while working out, this allows for targeted cleaning of the equipment after each usage every hour on the hour.”

Extra sanitation stations,

advanced chemicals and

shields are part of the Eastie

Y’s plan to keep members

safe while on their fitness

journey.

Gaeta said members

who have returned have

been very receptive to the

new guidelines and excited

about the new levels or

precautions that the Y has

labeled “Safe for you, Safe

for us.” For each entry,

members must take a virtual

pre-screen before arrival

and temperature check to

enter the facility, and masks

are to be worn throughout

their visit.

“Just because the gym

side is open does not mean

the Y has stopped its other

areas of focus,” said Gaeta.

“The gym side opens at

1pm for members so that

the Y can still be a beacon

of food service for the com-

munity. We are still giving

out grab and go meals and

pantry bags at our Bremen

Street and Ashley Street lo-

cations.”

Gaeta said grab and go

service is Monday through

Friday 8 a.m.-12 p.m. at

Bremen Street and 10am-

-2pm at Ashley Street. The

Y is also still running its

childcare center and sum-

mer camp at reduced capaci-

ties in line with the Depart-

ment of Public Health.

“We have been very,

very busy here at the Y, but

we can see the difference

we are making in East Bos-

ton” said Gaeta. “All of

this work cannot be done

without the generous sup-

port of members who opted

to keep their memberships

drafting while our gym and

programs were on hold,

their continued support is

what keeps us serving the

community.”

to move around quickly but still have the ability to easily interact with people. The team consists of five officers and a sergeant who utilize a variety of solutions to the problems that they encounter.

The officers frequently refer people or problems to other agencies that can provide additional assistance.

The officers then have the opportunity to follow-up on the issues to make sure that they are resolved.

The team is frequently accompanied by a member of our Behavioral Health Unit (BHU) who can offer a wide variety of services.

Many of the individuals that the officers encounter need help with issues such as mental health or addiction and BHU is there, meeting people where they are, to offer immediate assistance.




