**NOVOSELSKY ANNOUNCES PLANS FOR NEW STAIRS**

After many years of disrepair and the need for funding, Ward 2 Councilor Ira Novoselsky has said that there are now plans to totally renovate the public stairs between Florence Ave. and Campbell Ave. Several months ago the City Council passed a bond for \$1.5M to repair all public stairs in the City. Finally based on tentative costs, the Mayor found it necessary to request the Council to bond the funds to make these repairs and renovations.

At an initial meeting of the Mayor's Committee, plans were revealed for the complete demolition of the stairs and then reconstruction. With the new stairs will be additional lighting at both ends of the stairs. There currently is a street light in the middle of the stairs. Properties on both sides will be landscaped and have new fencing and railings. These will be the first set of stairs repaired under this bond. It is expected to be put out to bid in late November, early December. The project is expected to begin in the spring and be ready for use by the next school year in September 2022.

The lower set of stairs are not in as bad a shape and will be repaired at a later date.

There will be a public community meeting on Wednesday, September 22, 2021 at 6:00PM at the Revere Police Station Community Room at 400 Revere Beach Parkway.

Revere Fire Chief Christopher Bright will preside over the program and deliver remarks. Mayor Brian Arrigo will also speak at the ceremony. Police Chief David Callahan

has also been invited to deliver remarks.

The Rev. John Sheridan, pastor of the St. Mary of Assumption Church, will lead a prayer at the ceremony.

Anne MacFarlane, whose daughter, Marianne MacFarlane, died on Sept. 11, 2001, has been invited to participate in the speaking program.

Bright said the Fire Department will ring the "Four Fives" to honor the firefighters and police of-

icers who lost their lives in the terrorist attacks on Sept. 11, 2001.

The Department will lower the flag to half-staff, followed by a moment of silence, the Four-Fives, and the raising of the flag to full staff.

Bright will have 9/11 historical archives on display to further honor the men and women who so gallantly served on that tragic day in New York City and in the days and months following the attack.

## Two ward races on tap for upcoming Tuesday's primary

The voters in Wards 3 and 5 will go to the polls on Tuesday, Sept. 14 to cast their ballots to determine the two candidates that will advance to the final election in November.

While there are four candidates in each race – Michael Roncevich, Wayne Rose, Anthony Cogliandro, and Albert J. Terminiello Jr., in Ward 3 – and Al Fiore, Ronald J. Clark, Christian Majano Ortez, and John Powers in Ward 5 – there is a key distinction in the two hotly contested campaigns.

In Ward 3, current City Councillor Arthur Guinasso announced in June that

he would not be a candidate for re-election, meaning that there is no incumbent in the race. In the Ward 5 race, John Powers is an incumbent running for re-election.

Guinasso has been an outstanding councillor for three decades, universally recognized as the highly esteemed dean in city government whose record of service puts him among the legendary figures in the city's political history.

Without Guinasso, who would've been a favorite for re-election, the Ward 3 race is wide open. All four candidates, Roncevich, Rose, Cogliandro, and

### CITY IDENTIFIED AS MODERATE RISK FOR WEST NILE VIRUS

Due to two additional West Nile Virus cases identified in Middlesex County and new West Nile Virus positive mosquito results identified throughout the area, the Massachusetts Department of Public Health has now identified Revere as a moderate risk level for West Nile Virus.

There are some preventative measures you can take:

Avoid mosquito bites: Apply bug spray when outdoors and be aware of peak mosquito hours. Consider rescheduling outdoor activities that occur during evening or early morning. Wear long sleeves, long pants, and socks when outdoors to help keep mosquitos away from your skin.

Mosquito-proof your home: Drain standing water such as rain gutters and drains - empty any unused flowerpots and wading pools, and change water in birdbaths frequently. Residents are also urged to install or repair window and door screens.

Protect your animals: Animal owners should reduce potential mosquito breeding sites on their property by eliminating standing water from containers such as buckets, tires, and wading pools - especially after heavy rains. Owners should also speak with their veterinarian about mosquito repellents approved for use in animals and vaccinations to prevent WNV and Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE).

The City continues to work closely with the Mass Department of Public Health to monitor newly reported mosquito-borne disease cases in the area and continues to work closely with Northeast Mosquito Control in providing weekly mosquito spray treatment. 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
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# Boncore will step down from State Senate seat

Sen. Joseph Boncore, who has served in the First Middlesex and Suffolk District senate seat since 2016, announced last Wednesday that he will be resigning from his position. He will be submitting his official letter of resignation soon to Senate President Karen Spilka.

Boncore is leaving the Senate to become the new chief executive officer at the Massachusetts Biotechnology Council (MassBio).

"I'm excited to start this new chapter in my life, but I'm a little sad to close the chapter of my life as an elected official," said Boncore. "I really loved serving the people of Winthrop, Revere, Cambridge, and Boston for the last 5

½ years in the State Senate. But I'm excited to join MassBio and work in a thriving industry that's had tremendous growth over the last decade. I really look forward to taking this organization to the next level.

"As many people are aware, I've had the experience with my twin boys, who were born severely prematurely, to see firsthand the impact that the life science industry can have on patients and patients' families across the Commonwealth, so it just seemed the right time for me to take my advocacy skills and move on to advocate for patients in Massachusetts and across the country" said Boncore.

Boncore won a special election for the Senate seat in May, 2016. He put

together an impressive record of accomplishments in the State while rising through the ranks to a leadership position as the Senate Chair of the Joint Committee on transportation.

"I've had an incredible opportunity to get a lot accomplished with the entire Senate and Senate President Karen Spilka, for issues that were near and dear to my heart like criminal justice reform and housing affordability and finding a way to deal with the transportation infrastructure woes that have plagued the Commonwealth."

Boncore said he what he will most about his work as a senator is the constituent services "and dealing with constituents that I've grown to know and love in a lot of cases over the past

five and a half years."

"I think any elected official will tell you that there's no better feeling that being able to help people in their time of need," said Boncore.

He thanked his colleagues in state government in the district, including former House Speaker Robert A. DeLeo ("He was an incredible advocate for the Town of Winthrop and the City of Revere," said Boncore), and State Reps. Jeffrey Turco and Jessica Giannino, for their support and teamwork.

"It's been a pleasure to not only represent the constituents, but having the opportunity to serve on Senate President Spilka's leadership team and work with that team on policy issues and driving the Commonwealth forward," said Boncore.

Finally, he expressed his appreciation to his father, current Winthrop Town Council President Philip Boncore. "My father has obviously had a long career in public service and in some ways he guided me into a life of serving

and helping others," said Boncore. "That's what piqued my interest to run for the State Senate, and that's what got me to a position where I'm able to take the next step in my life and help so many patients. Patient advocacy is really at the core of the job I'll be doing, and I'm looking forward to doing it, and I guess, in the image of my father that he set out for me. Helping people has always been something that's been ingrained in me since I was a child."

• A new Point of Pines Fire Station that will provide a quicker response time to the Pines, Oak Island, lower Revere Street and the Boulevard.

• A major cleaning of the Eastern County Ditch, replacing and relining several thousands feet of sewer drainage lines and rebuilding of the drainage pumps on Rice Avenue and Dunn Road.

## PRIMARY ELECTION DAY IN WARDS 3 AND 5 IS TUESDAY

There will be a primary election in Revere this coming Tuesday, September 14, for the Ward Council seats in Wards 3 and 5.

In Ward 3, four candidates are vying for the two top spots in order to advance to the November final election. Those candidates (as they will appear on the ballot) are Michael Joseph Roncevic, Wayne Douglas Rose, Anthony Saverio Cogliandro, and Albert J. Terminiello Jr.

In Ward 5, there also are four candidates: former City Councillor Al Fiore, Ronald J. Clark, Christian A. Marjano Ortez, and long-time incumbent John F. Powers. The top two vote-getting candidates likewise will advance to the November final election.

We urge all of the voters in these wards to get out and vote to choose YOUR ward councillor.

We also urge voters to go to the city's Election Department website to check on their voting locations, which in many instances have been changed from the usual polling places because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

## RESTORE HAPPY HOURS? ARE THEY CRAZY?

There seems to be a move afoot to place a ballot question for the November, 2022, state election that would allow for the return of so-called Happy Hours (a/k/a, drink as much as you can, as fast as you can) to Massachusetts.

Happy Hours have been illegal in this state since 1984, after a young woman was killed in a Happy Hour-related drunk-driving accident. George R. McCarthy, the former mayor of Everett who back then was the chairman of the Massachusetts Alcoholic Beverage Control Commission, which sponsored the ban, said, "I've heard all the horror stories I'm going to listen to," referring to the many fatal accidents at the time in which drivers and pedestrians tragically were killed as a result of excessive drinking at Happy Hours.

Those in support of restoring Happy Hours make two arguments. First, they say it will increase business for bars and restaurants, which need all the support they can get amidst a pandemic, and second, they point to the use of Uber and Lyft that will reduce drunk-driving incidents.

Neither argument is backed-up by any data and both lack common-sense.

We would like to make a number of points in response:

1) The majority of bar owners/restaurateurs reportedly are not in favor of restoring Happy Hours, which probably is why the Mass. Restaurant Assoc. has yet to take a position on the matter. Sales of alcoholic beverages are the main source of profit for most establishments -- so why would they want to discount them? Admittedly, there probably would be a few bars that would do so in an effort to increase business, but that only would create a race to the bottom, so to speak -- all establishments would feel the need to compete with the place down the street that is offering "all-you-can-drink for \$5.00" or \$1.00 pitchers of beer (which were typical of Happy Hours back in the 1980s). We are not aware of any study that shows how much, if at all, Happy Hours might add to an establishment's bottom line.

Moreover, we can't imagine that for any reputable establishment, the increase in business would outweigh the headaches of having to deal with the increase of inebriates on their premises, with the need to greatly-enhance their self-policing, and with absorbing higher insurance liability premiums.

But even if there might be some small financial benefit for some establishments, is it worth the cost to society for the inevitable increase in drunk driving, assaults, and other accidents that unquestionably will flow from a policy that encourages patrons to drink heavily and irresponsibly?

2) While it may be true that many people plan ahead to use Uber and Lyft -- typically for special occasions -- that does not mean that folks who decide to hit the Happy Hour at a nearby bar after work will do so on a regular basis.

The use of Uber and Lyft has not led to a decrease in drunk-driving deaths. In 1984, there were 411 drunk-driving fatalities in Mass., constituting about 62% of the total of all fatal auto crashes.

But by 2009 -- before Uber and Lyft were around -- drunk-driving fatalities in Mass. had plummeted precipitously to 130 and accounted for just 39% of all traffic-related deaths. The numbers have remained about the same both in Mass. (and nationally) for the past 12 years -- even with Uber and Lyft available. Our strict drunk-driving laws, including the ban on Happy Hours -- not the ride-sharing services -- are responsible for the sharp decline in drunk-driving deaths in Mass. over the past 37 years.

3) Proponents of lifting the ban point out that other states -- primarily in the South and West -- allow for Happy Hours. But what they don't say is that the states with the 10 highest-rates of drunk driving fatalities per capita are -- take a wild guess! -- Montana, Wyoming, So. Carolina, Mississippi, New Mexico, South Dakota, Alabama, Texas, Louisiana, and Arkansas.

Massachusetts ranks 4th LEAST in drunk-driving deaths per capita and by a wide margin. So why would we want to emulate those states -- don't we want to continue to be safer (and smarter)?

4) Finally, beyond the issue of drunk-driving, we know so much more about the damage that alcohol wreaks both individually (to every organ in our bodies) and collectively (to our families and society), than we did in 1984. Alcohol has been labeled a Class 1 carcinogen and plays a huge role in domestic abuse, non-auto accidents, date rape, and other assaults (i.e., the proverbial bar-room brawls). Happy Hours encourage binge-drinking, which will exacerbate every one of these issues. Human nature and the devastating effects of alcohol abuse are the same today as they were in 1984.

To those young people for whom reinstating Happy Hours is a driving (no pun intended) force in their lives, we simply would say this: Please wait until you grow up. You'll realize there is a lot more to life than getting hammered at a Happy Hour every week and endangering the safety of yourself and others.

Within weeks of his son's accident, a grandson was killed in a car wreck. His pain is great. He goes through the motions day by day trusting God with his life and remaining children. It is difficult to understand why his family has suffered so much in recent days. Tears flow when he begins to talk about what his family has suffered.

Life is not so easy to figure out. We think we have the answers and then later in life realize we don't know much at all. We thought we had life all figured out when we were very young but throughout the years life throws things at us that we can't possibly see coming.

Today, let's all consider others. Be kind to our neighbors, acquaintances and people we meet along the way. A lot of people are hurting from disease, death, unemployment, life's tragedies and more. "The Peppe Nappa float represents the king of the Carnevale di Sciacca. Peppe Nappa usually comes to the town of Sciacca on a boat. He comes bringing with him the joy and happiness of the carnevale from Sciacca to Boston," explained Gangi. "This year, we decided to portray Peppe Nappa on a pile of fishing nets filled with fish and confetti."

The second float depicts a fisherman on an adventure. His boat is named "Ray Bono," in honor of a late captain of the Madonna del Soccorso Society, which Gangi is a member of.

"The float represents harmony, and respecting the ocean and nature," described Gangi, President of The Artistic Group: A Little Taste of Sicily, a Revere organization.

Gangi spent two years constructing the 12-15-foot tall floats with the assistance of ten friends, using wood, chicken wire, Styrofoam, and paper

mache. He began building the mechanical movement structures during the pandemic to pass the time.

"My home town of Sciacca, Italy, inspired me to create floats," Gangi expressed. "The carnevale festival is amazing; and not being able to participate there, I wanted to bring the tradition here."

Gangi, immigrated to the United States at age ten, and is a Revere High School graduate Class of 2009. He has participated in over 14 parades since he began designing floats in 2010. Now Gangi works for a medical robotics company in Boston's West End, developing arm braces that help restore mobility in those paralyzed by strokes, nerve injuries, cerebral palsy, and other neurological diseases.

"My love of problem solving and being creative led me to my current job and passion of building mechanical structures and movements," said Gangi. "I love building floats

## RPS clarifies transportation policy after some confusion

Revere Public School (RPS) Superintendent Di- anne Kelly last week sent out a communication to parents and students to clarify the RPS transportation policy for middle and high school students for the 2021/2022 school year.

Kelly said there was some confusion about changes to the transportation policy and only those high school students who live two miles or more from RHS or Seacoast are eligible for school transportation and only those middle school students who live one mile or more from their middle school are eligible for public school transportation.

"There are certain exceptions to this rule for students whose IEP requires transportation due to the nature of their learning needs," said Kelly. "These changes are necessary because of a statewide shortage of bus drivers and the fact that more students are being dismissed at the same time at the end of the day than were when

we had expanded learning time schools."

On Tuesday, September 7th, students who were not registered to be on a school bus will not be allowed on the bus for transportation.

"Please be sure to make appropriate arrangements for your children," said Kelly. "Many students who live within two miles of the high schools or who live within one mile of their middle school have options through the MBTA that could reduce their walking distances. Those students can pick up a Charlie Card from their assistant principal which allows them to take the bus at a reduced student rate. Caregivers and/or students will need to load funds onto the Charlie Card to activate it."

Kelly added that when possible, and to promote exercise, students are encouraged by RPS to walk or ride their bikes to school and bike racks are available outside of each school.

"We understand that this policy change creates an inconvenience for

some parents but we have no options given the current realities we face," said Kelly. "We will continue to reassess and look at different options for the future."

The decision to make changes to RPS transportation policy came about and was approved by the School Committee after a survey was sent home to parents in the summer.

"We did a survey of all of the parents of students who live more than a mile from school," said Kelly. "So we surveyed the middle and high school students who live a mile greater from the school and that was over 2,200 families and a little over 1,200, or about 55 percent replied."

Kelly said one option was to bus every student who lives a mile or more from their high or middle school. That would require RPS to add two more buses to the 25 buses the school department currently has on hand.

"We could bus everybody who lived one and a half miles or more, which we have enough buses to cover," said Kelly. "A third option was to bus all of the middle school students who live more than a mile from school, but for the high school kids only bus the kids who live more than two miles from school, which again we have enough buses. The last option would be to only bus kids who live more than two miles from the school which would require only eight buses and again, we would not need to hire any additional buses."

The recommendation that Kelly made and that School Committee Members like Stacey Rizzo supported, was to opt for the third option which RPS adopted for the school year.

"This option ensures that the vast majority of our middle school students who are typically younger, will be bused to school," said Kelly.

# City receives grant to tackle climate hazards, prepare for climate change consequences

Building on its commitment to creating a more climate change resilient Commonwealth, the Baker-Polito Administration last week announced \$21 million in grants to cities and towns including two grants for Revere through the Municipal Vulnerability Preparedness (MVP) Program. The grants were earmarked for Gibson Park Resiliency Design for \$161,516 and a shared grant with Winthrop and Boston for Belle Isle Marsh in Evaluating Nature Based Solutions to Protect Abutting Communities and Critical Shorebird Habitat from Coastal Inundation Permitting for \$145,307. To date, this brings total awards through the MVP program to over \$65 million. The grant program, which was created in 2017 as part of Governor Charlie Baker's Executive Order 569, provides communities with funding and technical support to identify climate hazards, develop strategies to improve resilience, and implement priority actions to adapt to climate change. The grants are in addition to the Administration's proposal to invest \$900 million in funding from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) into key

energy and environmental initiatives, including \$300 million to support climate resilient infrastructure.

"With the ongoing success of the MVP program, we are pleased to double the program's funding this year to support local climate change resilience projects throughout the Commonwealth," said Governor Charlie Baker. "Massachusetts communities are implementing important, nation-leading efforts to adapt to climate change. Our Administration is committed to working with municipalities across the Commonwealth to tackle these urgent challenges, which is why we have proposed a significant increase in funding for climate adaptation projects through our federal ARPA spending plan."

The MVP program is a vital tool in our efforts to prepare and strengthen our coastal and inland communities to address the impacts of climate change," said Lieutenant Governor Karyn Polito. "We are thrilled to welcome 16 new towns to the program as they take important steps in planning for the future, and to award funding to 66 priority implementation projects that range from upgrading or removing high-risk dams

and culverts to investing in Environmental Justice communities."

this latest round of funding, 93% of Massachusetts cities and towns, or 328 municipalities, are now enrolled in the MVP program. The program pairs local leadership and knowledge with a significant investment of resources and funding from the Commonwealth to address ongoing climate change impacts, such as inland flooding, storms, sea level rise, and extreme temperatures. Of these funds, \$20.6 million was awarded to 66 cities, towns, or regional partnerships to implement projects that build local resilience to climate change in the Commonwealth's fifth round of MVP Action Grant funding. Additionally, \$400,000 was awarded to 16 towns to pursue a community led planning process to identify vulnerabilities to climate change and priority actions. When complete, these municipalities will be eligible for the next round of implementation funding.

The MVP program has been recognized as a national model for building climate resiliency through strong state and local partnerships, and we are proud to have enrolled 93% of the municipalities in Mas-

sachusetts in this critical effort," said Energy and Environmental Affairs Secretary Kathleen Theoharides. "Every region in Massachusetts experienced extreme weather throughout the summer, including excessive heat, record precipitation, and flooding, and the MVP program offers vital technical and financial assistance to help municipalities address vulnerabilities and create stronger, more liveable climate resilient communities."

\$21 million announced will go towards MVP Planning Grants and Ac-

tion Grants. Planning Grants support communities in working with a state-certified technical assistance provider to lead a community-wide planning workshop to identify key climate-related hazards, vulnerabilities and strengths, develop adaptation actions, and prioritize next steps. Results of the workshops and planning efforts inform existing local plans, grant applications, and policies. Communities are then eligible for competitive MVP Action Grant funding to implement priority on-the-ground projects. Projects

are focused on proactive strategies to address climate change impacts and may include retrofitting and adapting infrastructure, actions to invest in and protect environmental justice communities and improve public health, detailed vulnerability assessments or design and engineering studies, stormwater upgrades, dam retrofits and removals, culvert upgrades, drought mitigation, energy resilience, and projects that focus on implementing nature-based solutions such as wetland restoration and floodplain protection.

air photo booth, so it's not one of those big, clunky ones that you used to set up. It prints color photo strips right on the spot, or you can have the photo text messaged or emailed. It gives you an instant photo. It's awesome. We love it. It's been a great addition to the business. Most people just want to post their photo on social media, and the photo booth gives them that immediate option to do that."

The other aspects of her business are back in high gear. She continues in her role as the official photographer for the Winthrop Youth Football and Cheerleading program and the Revere High School yearbook. She also compiles a year-ending slideshow for the RHS awards banquet and is the dance photographer for Rachel Ferrante's Academy of Performing Arts.

Family photos, wedding engagement photos, and corporate head shots are also keeping her very busy, while clients have been inquiring about the JCP photo booth for weddings, birthday parties, baby showers, and gradu-

ation celebrations.

### Making a career decision in 2011

Cimino, 36, decided to open her photography studio in 2011 one year after receiving her graduation certificate from the New England School of Photography. She had previously graduated from Revere High in 2003 and Bentley University in 2007, receiving her degree in Business Management from the outstanding business school in Waltham.

After college, Cimino began working at Enterprise Rent-A-Car and decided that, "The business world wasn't for me. I started pursuing my passion. I had loved photography since I was little."

## THE RACE FOR CITY COUNCIL WARD 3

In advance of the preliminary election that will be held on Tuesday, Sept. 14, the Revere Journal asked the Ward 3 and Ward 5 candidates to respond to questions about what they consider to be the important issues in their respective voting districts and what they would like

to see built inside the new Revere High School whose construction plans are moving forward under the leadership of Mayor Brian Arrigo and the School Building Committee.

The four candidates in Ward 3 - Michael Roncevich,

Al Terminiello Jr., Anthony Cogliandro, and Wayne Rose - and in Ward 5 - John Powers, Al Fiore, Ronald Clark, and Christian Majano Ortiz - all responded to the Journal's questions.

Following are their responses:

### Michael Roncevich

**Question 1: What are the two most important concerns in Ward 3 and what would you do to correct them.**

An issue that has been recurring not just within the ward, however throughout the city is drag racing. We live in an urban environment with tight streets and densely populated neighborhoods. Kids play on the streets; pets roam and explore the area. It is not safe that a multitude of people who may not even be from the city are drag racing and going extremely fast within our neighborhoods and main streets. I would come together with the Revere Police Department and devise a plan that would limit the ability to drag race. This plan could consist of more police officers on duty in impacted areas, more cameras, and speedometers to limit drag racing as much as possible. 

**Question 1: What are the two most important concerns in Ward 5 and what would you do to correct them?**

**1. Traffic Congestion:** Revere's traffic congestion problems primarily result from North Shore commuters using state roadways to cut-through Revere to get to/from Boston. This regional problem requires a regional solution: more commuters using public transportation. I have successfully advocated for \$25M in the Transportation Bond Bill for a regional rail station in Revere, for which we have just received \$4M of federal planning funds. I have also supported planned electrification of the Newburyport line to allow transit frequency/transit fares. Together, these initiatives will have a very positive outcome on regional commuting patterns to the benefit of Revere, and especially Ward 5.

**2. District Flooding:** This is becoming a more frequent and severe problem, especially in the Riverside community. Again, this is a long-term problem requiring long-term solutions, for which I have long been an effective advocate. These include my support for upgrades to Ward 5 sewer, pumping drainage systems, of which the recent clean-up of the Eastern County Ditch is but one example; for a priority on Ward 5 projects in the Environmental Bond Bill and the MVP program; for

high-water apparatus in the new PoP Fire Station, and for major resiliency/infrastructure improvements in the redevelopment vision of our new RiverFront District.

**Question 2: What would you like to see in a new High School?**

The Revere school system, under the leadership of Supt. of Schools Dr. Dianne Kelly, has maintained its status as one of the best urban school districts in the nation. The City of Revere and the School Building Project Committee have begun the process toward building a brand new, state-of-the art Revere High School. What would you like to see included in the new Revere High School building: for example, should there be a vocational training wing at the school, a fieldhouse/athletic complex that includes an indoor track and a swimming pool, or following the Town of Swampscott's example, the placement of a new senior center inside the new high school?

By far, the most important consideration in the design of a new Revere High School is the provision of state-of-the-art academic facilities, including the science and computer laboratories, that will assure continued quality educational experiences and outcomes for our high school students, teachers and administrators. This should include a workforce development and placement programs that will respond to the new biotechnology and other job opportunities that are becoming an increasingly important element of Revere's economic development future.

Beyond those primary goals, we have the unprecedented opportunity to design the new high school and its facilities --- academic, athletic, recreational and social --- as a resource for all aspects of the diverse Revere community. At this still early stage, a commitment to making the RHS a truly "community school" is more important than predicting specifically how that goal will eventually be realized. Those decisions will require more community input and feedback as the RHS planning process evolves; and ultimately, the Revere community -- young and old, parents and children, from throughout our neighborhoods -- will tell us what community programs they want and/need from a new Revere High School, if we encourage them to do so as I surely will.

built prior to building hundreds of apartments on Revere Beach.

Residents of Ward 5 are experiencing undue stress and anxiety as a result of the current parking and traffic dilemmas. These new apartment complexes being allotted large parking spot variances combined with the addition of parking meters are compounding the pre-existing issues. A moratorium on adding new developments after what is already approved may be a necessary until we have a city-wide master plan complete.

**Question 2: What would you like to see in a new High School?**

As a strong supporter of a new Revere High School, I would like to see STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) programs incorporated in the new development, as well as skilled faculty in these

courses. The Greater Boston Area is rated as the nation's number one biopharma cluster (1), surpassing San Francisco. We need our children to experience and learn about potential STEM career paths right here in their local community. Revere is currently looking to bring its first life science development as part of the Suffolk Downs project (2). The advantage of having a STEM program is that it provides awareness of so many new career opportunities to the students of our diverse community. Some classes that could be offered include Engineering and Automation Technology, Environmental Technology, Natural Resource Management, Information Technology, and Veterinary Science. These are critical for the upcoming generations as they are the future of our economy.

### 10 years ago September 7, 2011

The Sept. 13 Preliminary Election officially was called off by city and state officials this week. The cancellation had been approved by Revere City Councillors early last month and the measure had been sent to the State House for final approval. Last Friday, news of that approval landed in Revere. "The preliminary election is officially cancelled as per Governor Deval Patrick, who signed the bill on Sept. 1st," said Election Commissioner Diane Colella. "We got notice of it on Sept. 2nd." The Preliminary Election was also cancelled by an act of the Legislature in the last City Election, which was 2009. The current cancellation will mean that all 11 at-large City Council candidates will appear on the November ballot. A Preliminary Election would have eliminated only one of the 11 candidates, leaving 10 on the November ballot.

A cadre of law enforcement, including Revere police officers, apprehended two major Salvadoran gang members hiding out on Revere Street last week, with one of the men confessing to a cold-blooded murder committed in New York City last July. The men were known by law enforcement to be signature members of the notorious 18th Street Gang. Lt. Dave Callahan and Revere officers were accompanied by Federal Marshals and Nassau County (New York) homicide detectives to 284 Revere St. last Thursday, where they found the fugitives.

by the terrorist attack yesterday that toppled the World Trade Center buildings in New York City, taking thousands of lives. Two of the jet aircraft used by the terrorists took off from Logan Airport in the morning. Another jet slammed into the Pentagon building. Pres. George Bush called the attackers, "faceless cowards."

Among the victims was Revere resident Marianne MacFarlane, who was a United Airlines employee aboard the second plane to hit the World Trade Center. MacFarlane, 33, a 1984 graduate of Revere High, was en route to a vacation in Las Vegas with some co-workers after having finished her shift as a United gate employee at Logan.

Building Inspector Lance Kelley reports that he issued 125 building permits in August, including seven for new homes. Kelley noted that every buildable lot in the city, especially in No. Revere, was gobbled-up during the summer months. What had been a sluggish real estate market has turned into a building frenzy in recent months.

The Beachmont fire station will reopen thanks to the additional local aid from the state that will allow the city to rehire 13 firefighters who were laid off July 1. Colella have announced the filing of legislation that will reconfigure the city's pension payments to retirees, thereby saving \$890,000 in the coming

fiscal year and allowing the city to rehire most of the city workers who were laid off on July 1.

Although the contractor for the new Garfield School still is doing work on the exterior of the building, the school opened its doors last week to 1200 students.

## State health officials announce two new human cases of WNV

Staff Report

Last week, the Massachusetts Department of Public Health (DPH) announced two new human cases of West Nile virus (WNV) in the state this year. Both individuals are male, one in his 50s and the other in his 70s and both were exposed to WNV in Middlesex County.

DPH announced the first human case of WNV identified in Massachusetts this year was also likely exposed in Middlesex County. The Greater Boston area and several towns in Bristol and Worcester counties are already at moderate risk for WNV. There have been no deaths this year associated with WNV.

Based on the three human cases, recent increases in WNV findings in mosquitoes, and weather favorable for mosquito activity, the WNV risk level of an additional 38 communities is being raised from low to moderate. These communities are: Beverly, Danvers, Lynn, Marblehead, Middleton, Nahant, Peabody, Salem, Saugus, Swampscott and Wenham in Essex County; Agawam, Chicopee, East Longmeadow, Longmeadow, Springfield and West Springfield in Hampden County; Bedford, Billerica, Burlington, Carlisle, Lexington, Lincoln, Natick, North Reading, Reading, Sudbury, Wayland, Weston and Wilm-

ington in Middlesex County; Dedham, Needham, and Wellesley in Norfolk County; Chelsea, Revere and Winthrop in Suffolk County; and Grafton and Upton in Worcester County.

"These are the second and third human cases of West Nile virus infection in Massachusetts this year and we are seeing significant expansion of virus activity in mosquitoes," said Acting Public Health Commissioner Margret Cooke. "Risk from West Nile virus will continue until the first hard frost. As we enjoy the unofficial last weekend of summer and then head back to school and work, it is important for people to remember to continue to take steps to avoid mosquito bites."

In 2020, there were five human cases of WNV infection identified in Massachusetts. WNV is usually transmitted to humans through the bite of an infected mosquito. While WNV can infect people of all ages, people over the age of 50 are at higher risk for severe disease. Most people infected with WNV will have no symptoms. When present, WNV symptoms tend to include fever and flu-like illness. In rare cases, more severe illness can occur.

People have an important role to play in protecting themselves and their loved ones from illnesses caused by mosquitoes.

### Avoid Mosquito Bites

Apply Insect Repellent when Outdoors. Use a repellent with DEET (N, N-diethyl-m-toluamide), permethrin, picaridin (KBR 3023), oil of lemon eucalyptus [p-menthane 3, 8-diol (PMD)], or IR3535 according to the product label. DEET products should not be used on infants under two months of age and should be used in concentrations of 30% or less on older children. Oil of lemon eucalyptus should not be used on children under three years of age.

Be Aware of Peak Mosquito Hours. The hours from dusk to dawn are peak biting times for many mosquitoes. Consider rescheduling outdoor activities that occur during evening or early morning.

Clothing Can Help Reduce Mosquito Bites. Wear long-sleeves, long pants, and socks when outdoors to help keep mosquitoes away from your skin.

### Mosquito-Proof Your Home

Drain Standing Water. Mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water. Limit the number of places around your home for mosquitoes to breed by either draining or discarding items that hold water. Check rain gutters and drains. Empty any unused flowerpots and wading pools, and change the water in birdbaths frequently.

Install or Repair Screens. Keep mosquitoes outside by having tightly-fitting screens on all of your windows and doors.

### Protect Your Animals

Animal owners should reduce potential mosquito breeding sites on their property by eliminating standing water from containers such as buckets, tires, and wading pools - especially after heavy rains. Water troughs should be flushed out to reduce mosquitoes near paddock areas. Horse owners should keep horses in indoor stalls at night to reduce their risk of exposure to mosquitoes. Owners should also speak with their veterinarian about mosquito repellents approved for use in animals and vaccinations to prevent WNV and Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE). If an animal is diagnosed with WNV or EEE, owners are required to report to the Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources' (MDAR) Division of Animal Health by calling 617-626-1795 and to the DPH by calling 617-983-6800.

I had to submit through video. I didn't expect to really gain much from the online competition, about what to expect, what I was supposed to do, or even if I should do it. The coaches at CrossFit 128 encouraged me to gain this experience as a CrossFit athlete and see where I am compared to other girls in the sport that are my age. From the start of the summer to now, I have worked alongside my training partner, Leigha, who has been to so many other CrossFit competitions like this one and has shared all of her knowledge with me. Ultimately, I'd love to see where CrossFit takes me in life. I want to participate in so many more competitions and maybe even make it to the CrossFit games one day. I just want to keep progressing in the sport and really see how good I can get."

DeSimone became hooked on the CrossFit competitions after watching videos. "When a couple friends and I talked about maybe starting CrossFit, I watched countless videos and documentaries about the CrossFit games and what the athletes do to prepare for such an intense competition. I was hooked. From the first class I've ever taken, to right before my first ever competition, I've only grown more motivated and excited for how much better I'm going to get. Not knowing a thing about CrossFit, I walked into CrossFit 128 in Lynnfield at the time and started talking to Ryan, one of the 6 coaches at CrossFit

128. He told my friends and I what classes would usually look like and what day we could start one-on-one sessions to understand the movements we'd have to learn. After my one-on-one session I jumped into morning classes and slowly but surely have grown into a CrossFit athlete. I've grown an immense amount of self-awareness and care for my body through CrossFit and it's honestly the most valuable thing I've picked up since starting. Every single day I'm learning something new about my body, what I'm capable of, and what I need to work on. It's impossible to be perfect at everything in CrossFit because there's just so much that goes into the sport! That's why I'm so motivated and committed to waking up at 5 AM everyday to head to the gym because I know I'm always going to be able to improve".

A former student of the A.C. Whelan School and Rumney Marsh Academy, Skyla credits her mom, Sheri, with her many successes. "My mom has really brought me up as an independent young woman being a single working mom for the majority of my childhood. She never failed to expose me to any

# Baker designates September as Emergency Preparedness Month

"Emergency Preparedness Month is a time each year to make ourselves and our families better prepared," said Lt. Governor Karyn Polito. "While MEMA and other agencies continue to strengthen our state's preparedness for the next disaster, we encourage the Commonwealth's residents and businesses to take simple steps to prepare before the next emergency."

"Massachusetts faces a variety of hazards and threats that can cause damage and impact residents," said Acting Public Safety and Security Secretary Terrence Reidy. "Residents can improve their personal preparedness and build community resilience by knowing their risks, taking steps to prepare themselves and their property, and knowing what to do in an emergency."

"Even though getting prepared may seem overwhelming, it can be simplified by breaking it down into smaller, more manageable steps, making it affordable, and done over time," said MEMA Deputy Director Pat Carnevale. "We encourage you to complete one task each day throughout the month and you'll be better prepared by the end of the month."

During September, MEMA and the Massachusetts Department of Public Health will share information on their respective social media accounts about

emergency preparedness topics including emergency planning, building an emergency kit, preparing for disasters, youth preparedness, ways to get involved in community preparedness, and more. The Massachusetts Department of Transportation will feature signage along highways to raise awareness of Emergency Preparedness Month.

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# State Troopers charge Revere man with animal cruelty

The Massachusetts State Police have a charged a Revere man with animal cruelty after a Trooper determined he allegedly chained a dog to an exposed steel rod at the edge of a beach, with a large rock attached to the chain to prevent the dog from escaping, and then walked away, leaving the dog to the mercy of the next high tide.

But the dog was located chained to the steel rebar rod, which was protruding from the bottom of the ramp from Winthrop Parkway to Short Beach,

and rescued by police and the owner of a Revere kennel. Had the dog not been found, he could have become submerged when the tide came in.

Elias Pacheo-Osario, 27, of Revere, was taken into custody by Troopers on Friday following a diligent investigation led by Trooper Carlo Mastromattei and assisted by several other Troopers and Revere Police Officers. Trooper Mastromattei worked on the investigation while working his shift out of the State Police-Revere Barracks and also while on his own time over the course of several days.

The dog, a male pit bull mix, is being cared for at Ocean View Kennels in Revere.

At about 12:15 PM Sunday, August 29, Trooper Mastromattei was dispatched to a report of an abandoned dog tied to a pole along the shoreline on Short Beach in Revere. Also assisting on scene was Revere Police Sgt. Jack Dean.

The approximately 50-pound dog had a thick metal chain around his neck with a heavy rock attached to it, preventing the dog from escaping. The dog was left in a secluded

Lucas Sobreira, age 29, of Everett, was indicted on one charge each of Indecent Assault & Battery on a Person over 14 and Assault & Battery. Giacomo Neto, age 41, of Lynn, was indicted on the charges of Indecent Assault & Battery on a Person over 14 (2 counts) and Assault & Battery (2 counts). All three defendants will be arraigned in Suffolk Superior Court at a later date.

The AG's Office previously announced Garland's arrest in April 2021 by Massachusetts State Police assigned to the AG's Office, the Revere Police Department, and Department of Homeland Security Investigations (HSI).

These charges are the result of an investigation

by Massachusetts State Police assigned to the AG's Office, with assistance from the Revere Police Department, the Division of Professional Licensure, and the Suffolk County District Attorney's Office.

During the course of the investigation, authorities developed evidence indicating that Garland allegedly ran a profitable and organized criminal enterprise through Crystal's Day Spa, which she owned and set up as a front for human trafficking.

The AG's Office alleges that Garland knowingly facilitated commercial sexual activity by recruiting victims and offering sexual activity between victims and buyers in exchange for a fee. The AG's Office alleges that Garland also posted online advertisements offering commercial sex, arranged commercial sex appointments with sex buyers, collected money from sex buyers, and profited from this commercial sexual activity.

The AG's Office alleges that in 2018, Sobreira allegedly sexually assaulted an individual at Crystal's Day Spa. In 2021, Neto is alleged to have sexually assaulted two different individuals on separate occasions at the establishment. These victims were not aware Crystal's Day Spa offered illegal commercial sex.

AG Healey's Victim Services Division is working with victim service or-

ganizations to ensure victims have the assistance and services they need.

These charges are allegations, and all defendants are presumed innocent until proven guilty.

AG Healey has a dedicated Human Trafficking Division that focuses on policy, prevention and prosecution and includes a team of specialized prosecutors, victim advocates and Massachusetts State Police troopers who handle high impact, multi-jurisdictional human trafficking investigations and prosecutions across the state. Through the Human Trafficking Division, the AG's Office has charged more than 60 individuals in connection with human trafficking since the law was passed.

This case is being prosecuted by Assistant Attorney General Nancy Rothstein of the AG's Human Trafficking Division, with assistance from Deputy Chief of the AG's Victim Services Division Rebecca Quigley, Financial Investigators Jill Petruzzello and Patrick Cooney, and the AG's Digital Evidence Lab. The investigation was handled by the Massachusetts State Police assigned to the AG's Office, with assistance from the Revere Police Department, the Division of Professional Licensure, the Suffolk County District Attorney's Office, and Department of Homeland Security Investigations (HSI).

of the day this portion of the beach is completely submerged, with the tide rising as high as street level, past the point where the dog was chained. The dog was at risk drowning in a couple of hours if he hadn't been found.

Trooper Mastromattei subsequently obtained information that the suspect was a Hispanic male with facial hair who may live at an apartment at 35 Roughan St., an area not far from Short Beach.

The next day Trooper Mastromattei and Trooper Pasquale Zollo can-

vassed the area around the beach for residential video surveillance and located video from three separate residences showing a male suspect walking the dog toward Short Beach. A fourth video obtained by Revere Police Detective David Carmanica showed the same man walk down the beach ramp to the sand with the dog. All four videos show a metal chain collar and leash attached to the dog consistent with those found attached to the dog on scene.

On the morning of

Friday, Sept. 3, Troopers Mastromattei, John Skabeikis, and Christopher Kane went to 35 Roughan St. in furtherance of the investigation. There, they developed information that the suspect, who indeed lived there, was ELIAS Pacheco-Osario and that he was working at construction site in Wakefield. They also learned that the dog had been named "Killer."

Trooper Mastromattei went to the job site and located Pacheco-Osario, who consented to be brought to the Revere Barracks to be

interviewed. Upon arrival at the Revere Barracks Pacheco-Osario was issued Miranda rights in Spanish and volunteered to speak to Trooper Mastromattei and Revere Police Officer Joel Melendez. During the interview the Trooper and Officer were able to confirm that Pacheco-Osario had been the dog's owner and had walked to the

beach the previous Sunday, tied him to the steel rod, and walked away, abandoning him. The suspect said he had decided he could not keep the dog any longer.

Pacheco-Osario was then placed under arrest for animal cruelty and booked, escorted down stairs to the booking room and was advised that he was under

arrest. Pacheco-Osario was booked with the assistance of Officer Melendez.

A bail clerk set \$340 cash bail for Pacheco-Osario. He posted bail and is expected to be arraigned in Chelsea District Court Tuesday.

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# Markey slams Purdue Pharma Opioid bankruptcy settlement approval

Senator Edward J. Markey (D-Mass.) released the following statement after a federal judge approved a bankruptcy plan for Purdue Pharma that grants the company and its owners global immunity from liability for the company's role in the opioid epidemic. Earlier this week, Senator Markey announced introduction of a U.S. Senate resolution that would design-

nate August 31 as Overdose Awareness Day to support awareness of overdoses and honor the lives lost to drug overdoses.

"Purdue Pharma's lies about OxyContin unleashed a tsunami of highly-addictive painkillers that drowned this country in a tide of opioid addiction and overdoses. There is blood on the Sacklers' hands, and the victims of the Sacklers' greed and malfeasance deserve justice," said Senator

Markey. "A bankruptcy settlement should not absolve the Sacklers and their partners in crime from their culpability in the opioid epidemic. While funds to support on-going treatment and prevention efforts are important, the Sacklers should not be able to buy their way out of responsibility for their actions. This decision sets a dangerous precedent and bolsters the reality of two different justice systems: one for the

rich and powerful and one for working Americans. I urge the Department of Justice to appeal this ruling to ensure Purdue's victims and their families can have their day in court."

Senator Markey is a Congressional leader in the effort to combat the opioid crisis and hold Purdue Pharma accountable, having called on the Department of Justice in 2016 to investigate allegations that Purdue made false claims

about the longevity of OxyContin's pain-relieving properties. In 2016, Senator Markey succeeded in getting the Food and Drug Administration to agree to his request to reassess the way it considers the risks of addiction and misuse when it evaluates the safety of new opioids. He has passed several pieces of legislation to fund and expand opioid addiction prevention and treatment, including the Addiction Treatment Access

Improvement Act and the Eliminating Opioid-Related Infectious Diseases Act. He has also introduced legislation with Senator Mike Braun (R-Ind.), the Lessening Addiction by Enhancing Labeling (LABEL) Opioids Act, which calls for labeling of prescription opioid bottles with a consistent, clear, and concise warning label on the potential of the drugs for dependence, addiction, or overdose.


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
