Brenda Iafrate will compete in her fourth **Boston Marathon Monday**

Four years ago, Brenda Iafrate decided to to run the Boston Marathon in honor of her 19-year-old daughter, Ariana, who had been diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes.

"I wanted to show Ariana that with determination and strength you can do anything," said Brenda.

That noble goal has

translated into more than \$25,000 that she has raised for the Bill Belichick Foundation.

Suspect in Revere police shooting arraigned on several charges Monday

The man who shot at Revere Police officers Friday, forcing them to return fire and hit the man in the foot, was arraigned Monday in Chelsea District Court on several charges.

District Attorney Kevin Harden announced Daniel Cote, 32, of Revere was ordered held without bail

on charges that he shot at police officers responding to a call Friday night of an armed man acting erratically on Broadway. He will also undergo a mental health evaluation.

Police responded to the scene after 9 pm Friday night after several calls came in of a man, later identified as Cole, brandishing a gun and walking

in the middle of Broadway

near Fernwood Avenue. Assistant District Attorney William Kettlewell said Cote shot at arriving officers, who returned fire and shot Cote in the foot. A 9mm handgun, spent casings and a hypodermic needle were recovered at the scene.

License Commission opens Food Truck applications

In June of 2020, the City of Revere approved an ordinance to allow the operation of mobile food vendors within the city limits. Historically, mobile food vendor operation in the City of Revere was restricted to temporary special events in specific areas of the city. Building on the success of these events, the City is committed to leveraging the mobile food vendor business

model, particularly its low start-up costs, to provide an entrepreneurial opportunity to individuals with limited economic resources while simultaneously diversifying the food offerings within the city. The Mobile Food Vendor Program is to be overseen Maggie Haney, Administrative Assistant in the Office of the License Commission.

"I'm excited to have a full season of mobile food vending this year," said

Maggie Haney, the City's License Administrator. "I'm hoping for a mostly sunny spring and summer, with a variety of mobile food options brightening up our beach and neighborhoods. The food truck program in the City has greatly expanded since 2020 and I'm looking forward to growing it even further.'

Visconti wants more

ry Visconti took a moment of personal privilege at the outset of Monday night's meeting to address the topic of Council decorum during meetings.

"For the past several meetings, there's been a trend in these council chambers where political posturing has gotten in the way of professionally addressing the issues that come before us. The unprofessionalism, the sarcasm, the interruptions, and the side conversations that take place - that's gotten way out of control," summarized Visconti.

The leader of the 11-member Council took responsibility for the lack of consistent decorum in the Chambers "and for that, I want to apologize to the residents of Revere."

"We have the honor of sitting in these seats because the residents have elected us to do a job,' said Visconti. "Sometimes we forget that we are here for the people and not the politics."

Visconti said he will begin to enforce rules that will limit councillors to three minutes when speaking on an issue. He added that City Council Clerk Ashley Melnik will manage the time limits.

"In closing, I ask that we all respect the decorum in these Chambers, and more important, we respect one another," said Visconti.

2022 marks the 145th season for the Swan Boats, a beloved tourist attraction and iconic symbol of Boston and the Public Garden. The oldest and smallest boat in the fleet just celebrated its 112th season, while the newest was launched in 1993. The swan on the boats is made from either copper or fiberglass, depending on the age of the boat, and encloses a paddle mechanism that is used to propel the boat through the water.

Launched in 1877 by Irish immigrant and shipbuilder Robert Paget, the Swan Boats continue to be owned and operated by the Paget family. Mr. Paget designed the Swan Boats after attending the opera Lohengrin in New York City. At the end of the opera, the hero crosses a river in a boat drawn by

Council looks to develop biosafety level regulations for proposed life science building

The City Council referred to the Legislative Af-fairs Subcommittee a motion to develop bi-osafety level regulations for the City of Re-

Council President Gerry Visconti and Ward 1 Councillor Joanne McKenna co-sponsored the motion.

"I think before we let this [project] get ahead of us, it would make sense that we collaborate with the Board of Health, Dr. [Nathalee] Kong, as well as City Solicitor Paul Capizzi, and the Planning

Board to work out an ordinance for biosafety levels," said Visconti.

Ward 2 Councillor Ira Novoselsky asked that City Planner Frank Stringi be included in the collaborative effort.

McKenna, who did her The motion spotlights homework thoroughly as usual, delivered a comprehensive report on the four levels (ranked Nos. 1-4) of biosafety in laboratories. Revere resident Wayne

Rose asked the City Council a direct question, "What kind of labor-atory is going there [on the Suffolk Downs site)?"

Rose then added, "No one has a clue of what's going there actually. Will animals be tested in this building?

Responded Visconti, "Mr. Rose, that's a good question. I can't answer that because I don't have the specifics, which we are looking for as well. Once we do have that, I'm sure Mr. O'Brien [managing director of HYM] will come before us and discuss that as well."

"We're trying to start the process and have a voice," said McKenna, adding that the City of Revere cannot be blindsided at it was when DCR installed parking meters on Revere Beach Boulevard. "We were clueless [about the me-ters] and that's the truth," offered McKenna.

Revere resident Gina Castiello said, "We the residents would like to know what is going there. Could you elaborate? She [McKenna] read a whole bunch of pathogens and diseases that most people wouldn't understand. Could you give us any

kind of an explanation?" Visconti reiterated his point that the issue in "the beginning stages" and it is beneficial to be proactive on the safety regulations.

Cote is charged with armed assault with intent to murder, illegal possession of a firearm and ammunition, and discharging a firearm within 500 feet of a dwelling.


Judge Matthew Machera ordered Cote to Bridgewater State Hospital for evaluation. His next court date is April 29.

"People carrying guns and being so willing to use them present terrible threats to our communities," said DA Hayden. "But what's also extremely troubling here is where

these incidents (take) place—including a crowded street in Revere. These are locations where people go about their daily lives."

Of the suspect, Hayden said in a statement, "We don't know what led to his behavior before the officers arrived, but they responded to him acting erratically in the street. We will investigate this officer-involved shooting like we do every case, thoroughly."

Two Revere Police officers were also taken to the hospital for emotional distress.

REVERE 4TH FROM TOP IN STATE'S SAFETY PROGRAM

According to a release from the Governor's Committee on Highway Safety, Revere placed fourth in the list of cities receiving honors for safety for the month of February this year.

This city was topped by New Bedford, Fitchburg, and the neighboring city of Chelsea.

Because of the heavy North Shore

traffic which is routed almost en-tirely through sections of Revere the safety honor is a remarkable achive-ment, and is due, chiefly, to the alertness of local and Metropolitan police officers, as well as the safety campaign being carried out in the

NO RULING MADE ON DEMURRER OF CITY COUNCILMEN Supreme Court Justice Hears

Arguments of Both Factions Action on the demurrer, filed by City Councilmen against the peti-tion of Mayor Andrew A. Casassa for a writ of mandamus to compel the Councillors to re-establish certain

positions and wages cut by them from the 1933 budget, is still being

withheld by Judge Walte who heard arguments in the matter at the Supreme Judicial Court on Tuesday.

Almost three hours were taken up in the arguments of Councilman M. In the arguments of Councilman M. Prank Bodner, representing the Councilmen, and Wendell P. Murray, City Solicitor, representing the Mayor.

The arguments were of a highly technical nature, including citations from court decisions, common law, municipal finance act, and the city charter. Councilman Bodner based his action in asking for the demurrer on four questions which

murrer on four questions which the court must decide. The four main points were set out as follows: 1. Does the city charter supercede powered by law to institute proceed-2 Whether petitoner by these man damus proceedings can compel the respondents to include in the an-

nual budget appropriations illegally made in 1932. 3. Whether or not petitioner is empowered by law to insttute proceed-ings for Civil Service employees and others employed by municipalities whose salaries were rejected or re-

4. Whether petitioner, by these proceedings, can compel respondents to make appropriations contended by the latter to be purely discretionary.

The proceedings of the case are being read with a great amount of interest in legal circles throughout the State, as many principles of municipal government and legal proceedings are at stake.

If the demurrer is not sustained

If the demurrer is not sustained a hearing will be held into the facts of the case to decide whether the writ shall be issued or not. If Judge Waite upholds the demurrer the pe-tition will automatically be dismiss-

CHIEF MCCARRICK WARNS SOUNDERS OF FALSE ALARMS

This confluence of religious holidays serves as a reminder to all of us that the concept of freedom of religion began -- and still exists -- in America.

We wish to take this opportunity to wish our readers of all religious preferences a happy and healthy holiday

BAA IS RIGHT TO BAN RUSSIAN RUNNERS

We applaud the decision of the Boston Athletic Association (BAA) to ban runners from Russia and Belarus from competing in this year's Boston Marathon.

We recognize that the move casts a wide net and may serve to punish ordinary Russian citizens who have had nothing to do with Vladimir Putin's barbaric invasion of

However, we wish to make two points:

First, athletic and other organizations all over the world have banned Russian nationals from participating in their events. If the BAA uniquely were to do nothing, it would send the signal that the BAA tacitly was indifferent to the barbarous Russian invasion. Obviously, that is a message that no organization should be sending.

Second, to those who suggest that sports transcends political differences and ideologies, we say this: Get your heads out of the clouds.

There may have been a time when "sport" could turn a blind eye to what was happening in the world. But the reality is that athletics long have been used as political vehicles, starting with Hitler in the 1936 Olympics, the Soviet-bloc during the Cold War, and the Russian government itself when it hosted the 2014 Winter Olympics and devised an elaborate scheme to conceal the doping of its athletes.

Most recently, Russia has detained U.S. basketball star Brittany Griner in a Russian jail just as she was trying to leave the country, a move that can only be described as politically-motivated by the Putin regime.

In our view, every single person and entity in the civilized world -- especially the sports world -- should take the opportunity to make clear our united opposition to the barbarism of the invasion in Ukraine.

Imposing sanctions on Russian athletes is just an extension of the sanctions that have been imposed on Russia itself that likewise are impacting ordinary Russian

Yes, it may be true that individual Russians are collateral damage, so to speak, of our broad-ranging sanctions policies. But the effect upon them, which hopefully will trickle up to the Russian government, pales in comparison to the suffering of the millions of innocent Ukrainian citizens who are the victims of the genocidal war being waged by the Russian government.

SENATE SHOULD PASS DRIVER'S LICENSE BILL

The Massachusetts House of Representatives passed a bill two months ago that would allow roughly 160,000 immigrants of driving age in our state to apply for a driver's license if they can prove their identity with documents such as a birth certificate or a passport.

In our view, providing individuals who live, work, drive, and pay taxes in Massachusetts with the opportunity to obtain a license is simply common sense, which is why 16 other states have enacted similar legislation.

The Mass. Chiefs of Police Assoc. and the Mass. District Attorneys Assoc. are among the groups who have endorsed the measure because they recognize that the present law, which only imposes fines upon unlicensed operators, accomplishes nothing, but takes up valuable court time and resources from our police and criminal

Moreover, by allowing these individuals to obtain a license, it brings them out of the shadows, which also has the additional benefit of enhancing public safety and law enforcement for more serious matters.

We urge our state senators to do what they can to bring pressure upon the Senate leadership to move this bill forward ASAP.

for the 2022 food truck season and applications are accepted until the end of April. Vendors wishing to park their food trucks in the City of Revere must:

1. Apply for a 2022 License at www.revere.org/ permitting. Under "Health Licensing," click "Apply for a license now," log into your account, and under the dropdown choose "Mobile Food Cart License."

2. After applying for a license, vendors must also enter the Revere License Commission's equitable lottery system to allocate the specified rotation of times and locations for the food truck.

3. If approved by the Revere License Commission for a Revere Beach location, the operator must also apply for a DCR Short Term Commercial Permit application here: https://www. mass.gov/service-details/ short-term-commercial-permits - please note that mobile food vendor operators will be responsible for paying DCR directly with credit or debit card only.

Mobile food vendor permits for Revere Beach do not allow vendors to operate during events on Revere Beach such as the International Sand Sculpting Festival. On those occasions, mobile food vendors are not permitted to operate on the beach unless they have acquired

a separate permit for the

festival or other event.

The application period will run from April 4, 2022 through April 29, 2022. Vending locations and times will be assigned the first week of May and permits with times and locations will be mailed out immediately thereafter. The License Commission will make every effort to accommodate vendor preferences, but they cannot guarantee that all se-

lected times and locations will be assigned as requested. Those with questions about the application process are encouraged to reach out to the License Commission. Timothy Bogertman, Kathi-Anne Reinstein, and Dr. Lourenco Garcia were in attendance, as well as the HRC's Executive Director, Dr. Maritsa Barros, EdD, who is the city's recently-appointed Chief Officer of Talent and Culture.

Marra began the meeting by displaying the commission's guidelines for participation by members of the public, which is limited to the open discussion section at the end of the meeting. She warned that interruptions during the meeting would not be tolerated. Marra also focused on the section of the Open Meeting Law that requires anyone videotaping the proceedings to obtain permission beforehand.

A female member of the audience was seen to be walking throughout the meeting in the front of the audience gallery and recording the proceedings, but it was unclear whether she had complied with the section of the statute cited by Marra.

Others in attendance, who were off-camera (the Journal's reporter was not in attendance at the meeting), could be heard in an apparent attempt to heckle Marra by means of loud and derisive laughter during her initial comments. After a few minutes they quieted down and the meeting went forward, but similar interruptions continued throughout the meeting despite numerous admonitions from Marra.

At another point in the meeting, an audience member held up a home-made sign that read, "Abolish Human Rights Commission," in such a way as to block from the TV camera the face of a commission member who was speaking. That action required Marra to admonish the sign-holder to lower her sign.

Midway through the meeting, some of the audience members who did not quiet down appeared to have been escorted out of the chamber by a police officer. Finally, at the end of the meeting, the disruptions from some audience members became so obtrusive that the commission members voted to adjourn the meeting without having reached all of the items on its agenda.

This marked the third successive meeting of the HRC in which vocal audience members have disrupted the commission's proceedings, forcing the commission to adjourn abruptly. It should be noted that there also were audience members who held signs supporting the com-

The meeting began with the regular "Land Acknowledgment," in which Marra presented a map of the southern New England area indicating the various Indigenous peoples who occupied the land prior to the arrival of European settlers. The Pawtucket tribe lived on the land of present-day Revere.

Marra then guided the room through the "Arrive & Settle" portion of the meeting, which essentially is a group meditative session. Marra mentioned the war in Ukraine as she led the commission through the session.

commissioners then read in unison the HRC's Mission Statement, which is as follows:

"The Mission of the Revere Human Rights Commission is to promote human and civil rights and empower all people of Revere by ensuring that everyone, especially the most vulnerable and marginalized, have equitable opportunities, equal access, and are treated with dignity, respect, fairness, and justice."

For the first piece of business for the evening, Marra noted that the previous meeting in March had not officially been adjourned because it had been terminated after being disrupted by audience members. The commission then voted to formally adjourn the March meeting.

Barron, who was on hand to present the Director's Report and Updates, began her presentation by inviting those present to "get to a place where we feel relatable -- and how we can get Revere to be an inclusive city and to become a leading city and a model of what we can do together.'

Barros's report was as follows:

Barron stated that the city has undertaken the "21-day Racial Equity Challenge." She informed the commission that 45 people within the community had registered, as well as another 55 persons within the public schools. She said the challenge will be divided into three parts: concepts, foundational revelations and reckoning, and inspiration and motivation. Garcia, Reinstein, Pich, and Chief Bright were among the commission members who expressed their support for the 21 Day Challenge.

Barros informed the commissioners that the city's Racial Equity Municipal Action Plan (RE-MAP) will take place in the month of June.

Revere resident Asmara

Abou-Fouda made a presentation to the commission about the upcoming Muslim holiday of Rama-

This is a time for us to get closer to God," she said, noting that the celebration also includes periods of fasting.

invited Abou-Fouda members of the Revere community to partake of a Ramadan festival on April 29 from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. at the Senior Center. Interested residents can make a reservation by calling 617-545-4458. Moukhabir expressed

his thanks to Mayor Brian Arigo and the city for their support of the Muslim community with the display of a banner acknowledging the observance of Ramadan at City Hall.

Barros then wished a happy Easter to those in the Revere community who observe that holiday. Rev. Bogertman and Alexis then offered their views about the meaning of Easter. Hossain noted that Passover is being observed in the coming

After Barros concluded her report, the commission took up the other items on its agenda.

The first topic for discussion was, "Solidarity with the Cambodian Community."

Marra said that there still is a "lot of harm and the need for healing' within the Asian American Pacific Islander (AAPI) community in the city.

Commissioner discussed the discrimination that still exists in the city that is directed at the AAPI community and to which she herself has been subjected.

Pics noted that the Cambodian New Year will take place on April 14-16 and she invited all Revere residents to the celebration that will held at the local Cambodian Buddhist Temple on Thornton St.

"There will be lots of food," Pich mentioned.

"This always is a wonderful event," noted Chief

The commission also took up the matter of Pride Month, which will be observed in June. Marra noted that the month-long celebration honors the LGBTQ+ community and there will be a flag-raising at City Hall. Marra asked for suggestions from her fellow commissioners about how further to observe the month.

Reinstein spoke in support of the LGBTQ+ community and offered her support for any events that might be forthcoming.

Barros suggested that the Progress Pride flag should be the particular flag to be raised. She also expressed the need for education about LGBTQ+ issues among the community at-large.

Some commissioners also expressed their gratitude to City Councillor Steve Morabito for his efforts on behalf of the LGBTQ+ community.

Marra announced that Juneteenth will be observed in the city and that City Hall will be closed for the holiday. Garcia spoke about the significance of the holiday, which occurs this year on Sunday, June 19, and will be observed on Monday, June 20, to mark the freeing of slaves in Texas, the last state where that occurred in the immediate aftermath of the Civil War on June 19.

"It is an important holiday. We need to acknowledge that the issues in the aftermath of slavery still exist in our society today,' At that point, members

of the audience continued to disrupt the proceedings loudly, forcing a Revere police officer to step forward to attempt to bring order. The committee still

had a remaining agenda item, "HRC structure and ongoing work," but the commission hastily voted to table the item until the next meeting.

The commission then voted to adjourn amidst a cacophony from members of the audience who were shouting at the commission members.

MBTA reschedules Blue Line project, ferry service added to mitigate service disruption

The MBTA's Blue Line project that was originally scheduled to start back on April 2 and continue through this Thursday has been rescheduled and will begin at the end of this month.

The Blue Line will now close between Airport and Bowdoin Stations from April 25 through May 8 for scheduled maintenance and repairs.

The MBTA is planning on replacing 1,800 feet of track in the Blue Line's harbor tunnel and this work is going to make the tunnel more resilient and less prone to some of the concerns from the environmental community like flooding. The work will also make Blue Line service a little more reliable in the future.

The work also includes tunnel inspections, tunnel lighting repair, fiber optic cable installation, and removing abandoned cable that exists in the tunnel.

However, the collapse of a portion of the Government Center Garage

that killed a construction worker and dumped tons of concrete on the road above the Green Line tunnel at Haymarket forced the MBTA to push back

the Blue Line project.

Rep. Adrian Madaro announced that he and his colleagues have worked with MBTA administrators to help mitigate Blue Line service disruptions during the course of the work.

Madaro announced this week that the MBTA will add ferry service between Lewis Mall in Eastie and Long Wharf in the North End. Madaro said the ferries will run every 20 minutes from 6am to 7 pm.

"Over the last few weeks, I have heard from many riders about the impact of Blue Line closures on their commutes and their ability to travel to work, school, and other places within the city," said Madaro. "After many discussions with the MBTA, I'm thrilled to share that there will be additional measures to mitigate the impact of these closures on the Blue Line. In addition to providing free shuttle buses, the MBTA will increase capacity on the Silver Line 3 and temporarily run ferries between East Boston

and the North End."

Madaro added that he also heard from many residents about the state of disrepair of the pedestrian bridge at Suffolk Downs.

"After highlighting this with the MBTA, I'm pleased to share that the MBTA will close between Wonderland and Orient Heights Stations to repair the pedestrian bridge from May 12 through May 29," said Madaro. "I want to thank the MBTA for listening to residents and providing alternatives to ease the burden on commuters during these challenging times. I also want to thank them for making much-needed repairs to the pedestrian bridge at Suffolk Downs. These efforts will bring much-needed improvements to the Blue Line."

During the Blue Line closure the MBTA is also planning to perform signal repairs, which is a major source of issues on the Blue Line when there are so-called "blind delays" as well as address some of the drainage issues in the harbor tunnel.

As Feroli mentioned Suffolk Downs free fitness at the track will kick off on Sunday, June 5th. The series will be held every Sunday at 10am. Local fitness instructors and live DJ Chris Capozzi will lead a variety of workouts geared for all fitness levels

This season the Tack at Suffolk Downs will add a new amenity and create a dog park for the first time. The dog park is scheduled to open in early June and will feature two separate fenced areas for large and small dogs and a variety of play equipment to keep four-legged friends entertained. The Dog Park will be located next to The Track entrance.

"We are thrilled that so many local residents participated in events at The Track last year and we look forward to welcoming many families and residents back this season," said Thomas N. O'Brien, managing partner and chief executive officer of The HYM Investment Group. "This is the next step in realizing our vision for the redevelopment of Suffolk Downs as a way to build community and personal well-being among the people of Bos-

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

Program at RHS getting seniors ready for careers in education

Revere Public Schools recently launched a district-wide initiative for recruiting more teachers of color in order to diversify the staff and make the schools across Revere more reflective of the city and its population.

What RPS administrators found was there is already a talented and diverse group of students who are interested in going into teaching, administration, counseling, psychology that are part of Revere High School's "Pathway Program".

The district figured why not tap into this pool of students and help them

stay on the path towards a career in education.

"So we've had an opportunity through a partnership with Youth Works and the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) to provide paid internships this semester for RHS seniors," said RHS Coordinator of College Careers and External Learning Tiffany Opportunities Currie. "These students are currently working in public schools in the district."

Currie said these forty or so high school seniors with a serious interest in becoming a teacher, a school administrator, or a guidance counselor one

day are in classrooms in pretty much every Revere school.

"They are helping in a variety of ways," said Currie. "They're helping with classroom teachers. They're working small groups of students. They're assisting with administrative tasks for teachers, they are grading, putting information together, they're out at recess playing with students, helping them in the cafeteria. So they're all over the district doing different things based on the needs of the school."

These RHS seniors take the course as an elective,

Meeting members Peter Delios, Peter Manoogian, and Carla Scuzzarella, and Chief of Staff Kim Hanton, who represented Revere Mayor Brian Arrigo's Office at the meeting.

"We're here tonight to talk to you about what's going on in terms of the facility and what happens life after Wheelabrator," said Giannino.

Turco thanked the attendees and stated that, "I'm sorry I can't be with you. I tested positive for COVID yesterday [April 4], so I have to quaran-

Turco stressed the importance of the issue of "what happens when the landfill reaches capacity and what happens when the landfill closes."

Loretta LaCentra, who for the past 38 years she has lived a half-mile from the landfill site, told the assemblage, "We've been told on multiple occasions that the landfill would be closing. In 1996, it was scheduled to close, because it posted a danger to people's health and the environment. Here we are fast forward twenty-six years later, and we're still trying to understand why this landfill remains open. With the landfill approaching a point where it will be at its full height of five stories high within the next few years, we're once again being promised a closure date. I'm pleased that MassDEP has stated that they will not support any further expansion of the ash landfill."

Giannino called upon Kirstie Pecci, a graduate of Harvard Law School who works with the Conservation Law Foundation (CLF).

"She's an incredible advocate," said Giannino. "I don't think there's anyone who knows more about incinerators or this process than Kirstie."

Pecci lived up to Giannino's high praise, explaining that the group, Zero Waste Project which is part of CLF, focuses on "not only stopping dangerous incinerators and landfilling, but also composting and solutions, bottle bills – all the stuff that really solves these problems."

Giannino concluded the forum by thanking residents for attending the meeting and pledging

ternship class. "Some students are out

of RHS for two periods a day and at another school in the district," said Currie. "So they actually might go to a school until 11 am and then come back and finish their core classes at RHS or they might leave at 11 am and then stay at another school assisting teachers and administrators for the rest of the school day."

With COVID robbing many seniors of a real high school experience during their sophomore and junior years, the program is a hands on approach and real world experience in a career they may want to

"I think that's the key because it really shows these students what it is like to be a teacher on a day to day basis," said Currie. "We can all say, "Oh, you can be a teacher or you can be an electrician, or you can be this or that" but what does it really mean? What do these careers look like?"

Revere has also partnered with Salem State University as part of the program-a college known for its school of education.

"We will be taking students that are in this pathway to meet with students in the School of Education," said Currie. "They're also going to meet with faculty and get an admissions overview to really understand the requirements that go into becoming a teacher as well as the supports that are in place to eventually graduate with that degree.'

Currie said the most exciting part is the school district has committed to working with these students once they leave RHS and hire them once they graduate college.

"The plan is to kind of grow our own teachers so it's a pretty cool initiative," said Currie. "There are quite a few educators that work for RPS now that went to school here So we're really trying to recruit a diverse population to represent our students that are in our schools. That's the focus of this district initiative is diversifying the population of teachers in education in Revere."

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Happy Valley set to celebrate 4/20

There are a few dates in the world of cannabis culture and among cannabis consumers that are often celebrated.

At adult use cannabis dispensaries Green Wednesday has emerged as the cannabis world's answer to Black Friday. Christmas Eve is another busy cannabis shopping day at local dispensaries. Then there's 7/10, considered a 'stoner holiday' for consuming cannabis oil products, because 710 turned upside down is "OIL".

However, 4/20 continues to be the quintessential cannabis holiday across the globe.

This year, East Boston's Happy Valley will host its first 4/20 celebration at the dispensary's McClellan Highway location on Wednesday, April, 20.

"You have four cannabis celebration days but by far 4/20 is the biggest," said Happy Valley General Manager Gilly Motta. "It's our first one here in East Boston so we're having a food truck show up, Papi's Stuffed Sopapillas,

and they'll be serving up their Sopapillas, which is like a Latin sandwich. We'll have free coffee in the morning from 8 am to noon served by Dave's Coffee. So we'll be opening two hours earlier on 4/20 hoping to catch some early bird traffic and do some spotlight products for customers in the morning."

The official cannabis holiday began In 1971 after five high school students in San Rafael, California used the term "4:20" in connection with a plan to search for an abandoned cannabis crop, based on a treasure map made by the grower. The five students set 4:20 pm as their meeting time and 4/20 became synonymous with the consumption of marijuana after the popular cannabis magazine, High Times, highlighted their exploits.

"This is our first shot of opening two hours early so we are going to see what that market looks like on that day," said Motta.

Happy Valley ran a successful event the day before Thanksgiving on the Green Wednesday cannabis holiday.

"So we are building on that event because that was a really smooth day," said Motta. "All day was transaction after transaction and a great experience for our customers. Nobody felt rushed. Our dispensary is much larger than others in the area so we have the ability to have customers and patients browse the store while there's people being checked out so there's not that added pressure of knowing your order in five seconds before you walk in the door. So green Wednesday was an absolute success. We're definitely gonna replicate that for 4/20."

Motta said inside the dispensary staff will be on hand to help as some nice music plays over Happy Valley's sound system.

"We are not going to have a DJ this time," said Motta. "Even though it's a busy day. There's a lot of room to walk around and look at things and our staff will be able to have conversations with customers and patients and give them the time that they need. We're going to have some nice music playing over

our speakers so it'll be a nice lovely sales environment."

As sponsors of this year's Boston Calling music festival Happy Valley will be raffling off some Boston calling tickets at the 4/20 celebration. Happy Valley will also

have the opportunity for customers to donate to Tree Eastie's program to plant more trees throughout the neighborhood. Motta said this fundraising drive will last all month. Also, on 4/20, customers can give a donation to Women's Lunch Place, a shelter that offers nutritious meals, hygienic essentials, specialized one-on-one advocacy services, free medical care, and a variety of creative opportunities for personal and professional growth.

"We also have a couple new product offerings coming out," said Motta. "We're doing some vegan fruit drops. They're gonna be really fun to have and let us offer some more edibles to the vegan market. So we'll have some gelatin free gummies for our vegan customers."
