# ConsComm approves Revere High project

The Revere Conservation Commission (ConsComm) held its regular monthly meeting last Wednesday evening, September 3, in the City Council Chambers. Chair Nicholas Rudolph and fellow members Brian Averback, Joseph LaValle, Bernardo Sepulveda, Wilson Correa, Thomas Carleton, and Amelia Viscay were on hand for the ses-

The evening's business pertained to the third continued hearing of the Notice of Intent (NOI) filed by the city for the new Revere High School project at the former Wonderland Dog Track at 190 VFW Parkway.

State law requires that all projects in a wetlands area must file an NOI and then receive an Order of Conditions from a local conservation commission before work can begin in the wet-

lands area. The city initially came before the ConsComm in July, but after that hearing, the matter was continued until the August meeting because the ConsComm members said they wanted more information in response to questions they had raised.

Then at the August 6 meeting, despite hearing a detailed explanation from the engineers about various aspects of the project, the members decided they wanted to wait for the Mass. Dept. of Environmental Protection (DEP) to issue its Final Environmental Impact Report (FEIR) before taking a vote, further delaying the project for another month.

That decision was highly-unusual because a local conservation commission does not have to wait for an FEIR before issuing an Order of Conditions. Ordinarily, the commission must issue its decision (the

Order of Conditions) within 21 days of the close of the public hearing for a Notice of Intent. An FEIR is a separate, more comprehensive document typically required for projects with significant environmental impacts that fall under the Massachusetts Environmental Policy Act (MEPA), and while it can inform the commission's decision, it is not a prerequisite for issuing an Order of Conditions under the Wet-

# **Zoning subcommittee** speeds through agenda

What looked like it could possibly be a lengthy city council zoning subcommittee meeting on Monday was over in a flash.

Two items that garnered considerable debate at council public hearings two weeks ago were quickly dealt with by the subcommittee.

First, an ordinance establishing zoning provisions for battery energy storage systems in the city, was tabled at the request of planning and economic development director Tom Skwierawski.

The ordinance would allow battery energy storage systems as a new use permitted by special permit in the Highway Business and TED districts.

During the hearing two weeks ago, some councilors did raise concerns about the potential larger scale battery storage facilities in the city, citing potential fires, thermal runaway, first-responder safety, floodplain siting limits, neighborhood compatibility, and the right-sizing of facilities.

At Monday night's subcommittee meeting, Skwierawski said the city is asking to table the ordinance since there is still some ambiguity behind the state permitting process for battery energy storage systems and that the city did not want to get ahead of the process.

# Officials update council on emergency communications tower plan

City and public safety officials made the case for the necessity of a 145-foot communications antenna as part of the proposed redevelopment of the old McKinley School at Monday night's city council meeting.

Last month, Ward 4 Councillor Paul Argenzio filed a motion seeking more

information on the microwave antenna, which would provide emergency communications backup for the fiber optics system for the new Metro North Regional Communica-Emergency tions Center (MNRECC) at the school.

The proposed McKinley School remodel is also slated to include early childhood learning space and city administrative offices.

Some councilors and residents had raised concerns about the proposed height of the antenna, as well as potential health impacts and the devaluation of residential properties in the neighborhood.

At Monday night's meeting, Mayor Patrick Keefe said the city would consider studying if the height of the

antenna could be lowered without affecting communications for the MNRECC and public safety officials. Keefe also noted that other locations in Revere, as well as in Chelsea and Winthrop, were considered as new locations for the emergency communications center.

Earlier this year, the city council voted to approve allowing Chelsea to join the MNRECC alongside Revere and Winthrop.

Argenzio and several other councillors said they were concerned that they were not made aware of the antenna tower prior to voting on the MNRECC agreement.

"This is a public safety project, and this is also a

numerous occasions over the past 18 months, once again was on hand for the session, and informed the members that the state had issued the FEIR with no conditions.

"I want to thank you for your patience in letting this come through," said Rudolph. "It was a relief to see that it (the project) does comply and that no further review is needed."

Rudolph did raise a question about why the project does not include replacing the culverts that flow into the Eastern County Ditch that will provide the drainage for the site (an issue that commissioner Lavalle also has raised), but Hoogeboom noted that the FEIR indicated that the cost to do so will be prohibitive and that replacing the culverts will disturb the bordering vegetative wetlands. She also noted that the engineers had calculated that the existing culverts will support the capacity for stormwater runoff post-construction.

The commissioners then heard from a number of city officials. City Engineer Nick Rystrom, School. Supt. Diane Kelly, and Mayor Patrick Keefe all spoke in favor of the project.

"I've been working with the engineers and project manager and what they're doing from an engineering standpoint is sound and appropriate," said Rystrom.

"Thank you for the time you've been dedicating to this project," said Kelly. "We've put nine years of effort into this project and we're very excited to be at the cusp of making this a reality.'

"I want to remind everyone that we appreciate the time and effort that this board has put into this," said the mayor. "You have shown the competency of your board with how long you have labored over what you believe and making sure that you obtained fact-based information. We know that it has taken some time and that you have done your due diligence. It makes me proud to have boards like yours that have competency and has not rubber-stamped its approval."

City Solicitor Paul Capizzi briefly raised some technical issues with the proposed Order of Conditions. After a brief discussion on that matter, in which Rudolph said the two orders in question will be omitted, the members voted unanimously (with Viscay recusing herself because of her status as a city employee) to approve the NOI and to issue the Order of Conditions.

# **Board of Health hears update** of community health assessment

The Revere Board of Health held its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, August 28, in the City Council Chambers. On hand for the session were chair Dr. Drew Bunker, Kathleen Savage, and Viviana Catano, as well as Director of Public Health Lauren Buck. Health Agent/Director of Inspectional Services Dept. (ISD) Michael Wells, and Bd. of Health Clerk Paula Sepulveda.

The board heard a presentation from Vanessa Guardado-Menjívar, who is the Regional Epidemiologist for the North Suffolk Public Health Collaborative (NSPHC). Ms. Guardado-Meniívar told the members of the services offered by her organization (which was created in 2016 collaboratively by Revere, Chelsea, and Winthrop) and provided an update of the current Community Health Assessment (CHA), which is used to support a Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP).

She noted that the NSPHC kicked off the current CHA last fall and has been collecting data for most of this year, with an anticipated completion date in the fall.

She noted that the survey has focused on five themes: safe and affordable housing (32% of respondents said they have difficulty paying their monthly rent or mortgage); behavioral and mental health (which was the top concern of over 50% of Revere residents); economic stability and mobility (12.4% of Revere residents live below the federal poverty line); environmental health (such as air quality and flooding); and access to medical, dental, and preventive care.

"This information will be incredibly useful for a lot of reasons and especially for the health of our community," said Bunker.

Buck presented the Communicable Disease monthly report. She noted that there was the usual spike in COVID-19 this past summer, with 362 confirmed cases and another 108 suspected cases in the city. She said this corresponds with national trends which spike during the summer. Buck also noted that the age group most likely to be hospitalized with COVID are those under the age of 18. She added that this is because children are returning to school and thereby providing the opportunity for the virus to spread.

Buck noted that there were eight cases of salmonella locally.

Wells presented the ISD report for August. Wells said that ISD issued 128 certificates of fitness for housing units; performed 20 reinspections; conducted three new interior complaints with an additional five in progress; and performed two pool/spa inspections.

In the food department, ISD performed 32 routine food inspections, five reinspections, four complaint inspections, two pre-opening inspections, and two temporary food inspections.

In the exterior sanitation division, ISD agents issued 403 total citations for trash violations; three for rodent harborage; 61 for overflowing dumpsters; two for commercial vehicles in residential neighborhoods; five for multiple unregistered vehicles on a property; 25 for junk heaps, dumps, and automobile graveyards; 121 for unclean or unsanitary land (which includes overgrown vegetation); and two for unsafe structures.

The board also issued licenses for the following:

Buck informed the board that inspections had been conducted by her office and both applicants had met the requirements to receive their licenses.

#### **HEALTH OFFICIALS** ANNOUNCE MORE **HUMAN CASES OF** WNV IN STATE

The Massachusetts Department of Public Health (DPH) today announced two additional human cases of West Nile virus (WNV) in Massachusetts this year. One is in a man in his 40s who was likely exposed to the virus in Hampden County and the other is in a man in his 80s with exposure in Middlesex County.

These cases bring the total number of confirmed WNV infections this sea-

son to four. As a result, risk levels for WNV have been elevated to high in Ashland, Framingham, Marlborough, Natick, Sherborn, South-Sudbury, and borough, Wayland.

"Given how many mosquitoes have been found carrying West Nile virus this summer, we expected that there would be human infections this year," said Public Health Commissioner Robbie Goldstein, MD, PhD. "Infections can continue to occur until the first hard frost of the season, which is likely still many weeks away. We are encouraging everyone to continue to take the necessary steps to protect themselves from mosquito bites, including by using mosquito repellent, wearing long sleeves and pants to reduce exposed skin, and to drain anything that may be collecting water outside your home."

The first WNV-positive mosquitoes in the state this year were announced on June 17. Since then, 376 mosquito samples have tested positive for WNV so far this season from Barnstable, Berkshire, Bristol, Dukes, Essex, Franklin, Hampden, Middlesex, Norfolk, Plymouth, Suffolk, and Worcester counties. There has also been one animal case of WNV this year in a goat.

The risk for WNV is now high in 28 municipalities in Suffolk, Middlesex, Essex, and Worcester counties and moderate in 175 cities and towns in Barnstable, Berkshire, Bristol, Essex, Franklin, Hampden, Hampshire, Middlesex, Norfolk, Plymouth, Suffolk, and Worcester counties.

In addition to WNV, Eastern equine encephalitis (EEE) has also been detected in mosquitoes in Massachusetts this year. There have been 21 EEE-positive mosquito samples and no human or animal cases so far this year.

Starting next week, DPH will update the public on WNV cases in Massachusetts via weekly press releases each Friday if new cases are confirmed.

#### 10 years ago **September 10, 2015**

The race for the corner office is on. Mayor Dan Rizzo and Councillor-at-Large Brian Arrigo have begun campaigning for the general election for the Office of Mayor that is scheduled for Tuesday, Nov. 3. The two candidates earned their nominations by finishing 1-2 in the Preliminary Election Sept. 1, with Rizzo taking the top spot by 114 votes. That margin was smaller than had been predicted by many political observers, setting up what looms as one of the most exciting mayoral elections in years.

A judge overseeing the taxpayer lawsuit against the MBTA and the state Department of Transportation (DOT) in regards to the sale of property to the Wynn Everett casino signaled in court Friday that she is leaning towards dismissing the suit. If the suit is dismissed, it would assure that the casino-hotel license for the Boston-area would be awarded to Wynn, leaving no hope for a casino-hotel at Suffolk Downs.

#### 20 years ago **September 14, 2005**

After years of discussion but no progress, a new police station for the Revere Police Dept. finally appears as though it will become a reality after the City Council gave initial approval to plans for an \$18.5 million facility to be built on the

Revere Beach Parkway. The Mass. legislature convened in a Constitutional Convention this morning with the topic of gay marriage the chief subject of discussion. Senate President Robert Travaglini favors placing a question on the ballot for the voters to decide in 2006 that would define marriage as between

a man and a woman, but allow for civil unions for gay couples. If approved, the measure would overturn the decision by the Mass. Supreme Judicial Court in 2003 that held that it is unconstitutional under the Mass. Constitution to deny gay couples the right to marry.

The city has received the first check from the state for the cost of the \$38 million West Revere school complex. The state ultimately will pay for 90 percent of the complex's cost.

# Councillor looks to prohibit overnight parking at schools

Parking and traffic are consistently among the biggest quality of life issues for the city council.

At Monday night's council meeting, several motions focused on those issues, including one submitted by Ward 5 Councillor Angela Guarino-Sawaya asking that the traffic commission hold a public hearing on an amendment that would prohibit overnight parking at public schools.

"To strengthen safety and security at our schools, I proposed the overnight parking ban to prohibit cars from parking in the parking lots," said Guarino-Sawaya. "I've had complaints, particularly from the Paul Revere School, of certain cars parked there every single night and they are still there when teachers are coming in taking valuable spots in that front line."

cars parked overnight potentially obstruct emergencv access as well as creating other concerns.

"We don't know what could possibly happen," she said. "It interferes with snow removal and routine maintenance. In light of all the incidents that have happened in schools across the nation, unattended or occupied vehicles pose a potential threat, as individuals could remain inside them and use them for more dangerous items."

Prohibiting overnight parking is a proactive safety measure that would protect students while also ensuring school parking lots remain fully accessible to staff, students, and visitors during school hours, Guarino-Sawaya said.

The councillor said there will be further discussion on the ordinance at the traffic commission hearing, and added that the police departto go regarding the ordinance change.

In other business, Councillor-at-Large Michelle Kelley filed a motion asking that the mayor request MassDOT to expand the deceleration southbound lane/entrance into North Gate Shopping Center on Squire Road in order to reduce traffic and accidents on Squire Road.

"This area is prone to heavy traffic congestion, accidents, and backups and I think this may alleviate some of that congestion and traffic," said Kelley. "We have room there for the island to be widened so that that deceleration line can be extended and some of the traffic can get over to that North Gate entrance a little sooner, reducing traffic in those two lanes.

Councilllors Joanne McKenna and Anthony Cogliandro noted that a similar motion was filed by the Guarino-Sawaya said the ment has a safety plan ready council several years ago, hit multiple times.

but that MassDOT studies showed that there was extensive infrastructure under Squire Road that would cost millions of dollars to relo-

"I would want (Mass-DOT) to revisit this issue, especially where that area is just getting more and more congested," said Kelley. "We are getting a carwash there, so anything that can be done to alleviate some of that traffic would be appre-

Guarino-Sawaya also introduced a motion asking that the mayor request the DPW and traffic commission, in coordination with MassDOT, install bollards at 938 North Shore Road in an appropriate position to prevent vehicles from colliding with the residential structure and fire hydrant at the property.

The councillor said the residential structure at 938 North Shore Road has been

multi-purpose use that's going to be happening at the McKinley School, that we all know is a beloved parcel in the city of Revere that has been defunct for well over 10 years," said Keefe. "This opportunity that arose just a few years ago wasn't just an opportunity to restore the McKinley School, it was also the opportunity that was much needed in finding a new home for our 911 call center. If you've ever been in the 911 call center, it is hunkered down in a less than 4,000-square-foot space in the police station and it is vastly undersized."

Keefe noted that there is no space in Revere that is not thickly settled or around people's homes.

"This site happens to be more around commercial space than homes," said the mayor.

Both Keefe and Fire Department Captain Kevin O'Hara noted that the tower will use a non-ionized frequency with no radiation microwaves and does not

pose the potential health risks of 5G communications

Argenzio said he supported the efforts to improve public safety, but added that he wished that the discussion about the potential location for the antenna had been had at the beginning of the process two years ago and not now.

Councillor-at-Large Michelle Kelley said she still had some concerns about how the antenna and the project will affect neighboring property values. "I understand that we

can't relocate the hub, the whole facility," said Kelley. "The mayor was kind enough to go through those alternate locations that didn't work for various reasons, but is it absolutely a requirement that the tower has to be at this site? Can the tower be relocated somewhere else and has that been looked at?"

Planning and economic development director Tom Skwierawski said that if the tower was not located near the hub, the regional communications center would be vulnerable to the same types of communications issues it faces now.

Police Chief Maria LaVita said the antenna will not only provide backup for emergency calls to the center, but will provide improved communications for public safety officers communicating with each other in the field.

"It's the portable radio system which allows us to communicate inside buildings," said LaVita.

Councillor-at-Large Anthony Zambuto, who expressed concerns about the antenna at a council meeting two weeks ago, thanked the mayor for making efforts to communicate to the council and for looking into reducing the size of the tower.

"That's a big get, and I know it is expensive to do that, but I think it's worth it and I think the neighborhood is better off for us looking at all of this and

talking all about this," said Zambuto. "We want the most state-of-the-art system we can possibly have, and that is why I am in favor of

Reservoir Avenue resident Stephanie Desisto said she was still concerned about the impact the antenna would have on her property values and those of others in the neighborhood.

Desisto said she is not opposed to improving public safety in the neighborhood, but that she was opposed to a 145-foot tower being put in the middle of her neighborhood.

"I understand that there may be additional costs to do something differently here, but you can't weigh quality of life and diminution of property values on multiple homes that are going to be impacted with the cost that may be incurred by doing something alternatively," she said.

The Welcome Club was created to ease the transition into high school life, pairing newcomers with peers who







Annette's warmth, kindness and resilience will be dearly missed by all who knew her. Her memory will forever remain in our hearts.



## All MBTA modes free after 9 p.m. for five Fridays and Saturdays to mark start of extended service

The Massachusetts Bay Transportation Authority (MBTA) announced last month that, effective August 24 as part of Fall 2025 service changes, all subway lines and eight frequent bus routes will offer extended service on Fridays and Saturdays with five of the MBTA's most frequent bus routes with the highest number of later riders offering extended service every day of the week. Trip end times for these lines and routes will be about one hour later compared to current service end times. Extended service will also be added on some ferry lines on Fridays and Saturdays through the end of September with additional trips added.

To encourage riders to take advantage of the extended service, all subway lines, bus routes, ferries, Commuter Rail lines, and the RIDE trips will be free on Fridays and Saturdays beginning at 9 PM through the end of service September 5 – 6, September 12 – 13, September 19 - 20, September 26 – 27, and October

### Mass. DPH opens state-of-the-art Emergency Supply Warehouse

The Massachusetts Department of Public Health (DPH) today unveiled its new, interoperable emergency supply warehouse, a critical resource that strengthens the state's ability to respond quickly and effectively and provide the equipment, supplies, and medical resources needed to deliver care during public health emergencies and

to mark the occasion, touring the bright and expansive space – which has been operational since July 1, 2025 - and learning about its many capabilities and fea-

The new DPH warehouse is strategically located in Franklin, at the intersection of I-495 and I-90, offering easy access to major highways. It is adjacent and directly connected to the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) warehouse, which will facilitate rapid, coordinated statewide response during times of crisis. Spanning 75,000 square feet, the facility houses more than 21 million individual items - from personal protective equipment to bandages and dressings to refrigerated medical products.

"This warehouse is so much more than just shelves of materials, equipment, and supplies – it represents resilience, readiness, and a collective commitment to respond quickly and fully to care for our communities when disaster strikes," said Secretary of Health and Human Services Kiame Mahaniah, MD, MBA. "Today we mark an important investment in the safety, health, and well-being – and peace of mind – for those who live in, work in, and visit Massachusetts."

"Massachusetts has faced many public health crises over the years - from the Great Molasses Flood in 1919, to the Cocoanut Grove Nightclub fire in 1942, to the Blizzard of '78, and more recently the Boston Marathon Bombing and the COVID-19 pandemic," said Public Health Commissioner Robbie Goldstein, MD, PhD. "We have learned critical lessons from

each of these disasters and other emergencies, large and small. And we have taken all those lessons to heart and turned them into action. This warehouse embodies that action - that commitment – and it allows us to stand with our health care and public health partners and be ready for the next crisis we will inevitably face together."

The DPH warehouse provides more than 4,000 pallet storage positions across three levels, with 1,000 square feet of cold-chain storage for refrigerated products. A 10-door loading dock supports the facility's high-throughput operations. State-of-the-art security and video monitoring technology protects staff and products, while advanced data-logging systems help maintain inventory integri-

"We are thrilled to be in this wonderful new location that strengthens our capacity to support the greater health care system during times of crisis, said Kerin Milesky, Director of the DPH Office of Preparedness and Emergency Management. "This new facility enhances our need to adjust our approach and processes based on the latest science and best practices, and respond to the nuances of different kinds of emergencies. This warehouse is our promise to every resident that when the next emergency comes, we will be ready to respond, safeguard health, and help our communities recover.'

## Hayden names Jeffrey Locke, former Chief Justice of the Mass. Trial Court, as head of IRB

Suffolk District Attorney Kevin Hayden today announced the appointment of Jeffrey A Locke, former Chief Justice of the Massachusetts Trial Court, as chief of the office's Integrity Review Bureau (IRB), which reviews potential wrongful convictions.

impartiality combined with his deep knowledge of the law and trial procedures give him an ideal skill set to lead the IRB. He has a balanced perspective that comes from many years of giving all sides equal consideration, with favor only to facts and evidence. These are crucial qualities in an IRB leader," Hayden said.

Hayden said Locke's mandate will be to lead an independent bureau dedicated to investigating wrongful convictions. District Attorney Dan Conley in 2004 created the office's Conviction Integrity Panel, formalizing the structure for wrongful conviction reviews begun in the 1990s under DA Ralph Martin. The CIP served as the precursor to the IRB established by DA Rachael Rollins.

"I have full confidence that Judge Locke and his staff will enhance the ofto conviction integrity review," Hayden said.

To ensure the independence of the IRB's work,

> Locke was Chief Justice of the Trial Court from January 19, 2022 through December 21, 2023. He was appointed by the Supreme Judicial Court after serving as a judge on the Superior

Court since 2001. Locke served as chair of the Massachusetts Sentencing Commission from 2018 to 2022. He was the regional administrative justice for criminal cases in Suffolk County from 2012 to 2015, and for all cases in Plymouth County from 2007 to 2011. He has served on several court committees, fice's historic commitment including the SJC Standing Advisory Committee on the Rules of Criminal Procedure; the Superior Court Committee on Sentencing and consistent with best Best Practices; and the Trial

Prior to Locke's appointment to the bench, he served as commissioner of the MA Department of Social Services from April 1999 to October 2001, initially in an interim capacity. He was district attorney in Norfolk County from 1997 to 1999.

Locke has taught trial practice at Boston College previously taught at Northeastern School of Law. He received his law degree from Boston University and a bachelor's degree from Georgetown University.







By Tuesday morning, the Election Department still hadn't heard anything. Jordan has until Friday recount.

Nevertheless, Correggio said he is prepared if a recount is called.

"I've hired representation and am ready for that if it happens," Correggio said last week.

Zambuto said he also has legal representation at his disposal if Jordan decides to request a recount.

In the other citywide race for School Committee, longtime incumbent Tom Caporale, who finished seventh by only 43 votes,

# A year without an increase?

Think again; 6.5 percent hike expected

If you're holding out for a year without a tax increase, well, circle the wagons and keep on waiting.

The City Council approved the first step in setting the tax rate on Monday night, and if the state approves the expected rate, residents are looking at an average tax increase of about 6.5 percent, or \$200 on the average tax bill.

Mayor Tom Ambrosino said in his analysis, single-family homes averaged around a 6.5 percent increase, while two- and three-family homes came in slightly lower. He said the bulk of the increases came in four- to eight-unit apartment buildings, where increases were up to 20 percent.




